FRIENDS OF CHARLBURY LIBRARY

The consultation has begun into the recent proposals from Oxfordshire County Council for its libraries. The Library will remain open with the same facilities but the staff hours will be cut, the deficit to be found with the help of volunteers. The basis of the proposals is the numbers living, working, shopping and attending school within half a mile of the library. There are concerns about the accuracy of the figures used and the fact that schools and libraries are where OCC has chosen to locate them is ignored which distorts the outcome. As the basis is numerical, size matters and smaller rural communities such as Charlbury are disadvantaged. There will be a core of 22 libraries which will be open as at present, 5 who will have to cover one-third of their opening hours with volunteers and 16, including Charlbury, who will have to find two-thirds volunteers. Self-service equipment will be installed for the issue, return and renewal of books. Volunteers will be trained and expected to:

Deal with the day to day issuing, renewal and return of books and other items, including the related financial transactions

Handle enquiries

Ensure the book-stock is displayed attractively and meets the requirements of the community and the county, as all stock forms part of the county's collection

Support library promotional activities such as rhyme times, class visits, Summer Reading scheme

Representatives of the Town Council, Friends, OCC and County and District Councillors have met and put our views forcefully on behalf of the community and we shall prepare our response to the consultation jointly with the Town Council. Ideally we would like the Library to remain open as at present, but accept that may not be possible. We feel that all the libraries should share the cuts in staffing and that the larger libraries with a greater pool of volunteers should be included in the service reductions.

The consultation continues until 30 September and copies of the consultation documents, which include the questionnaire, are available in the Library or on line at www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/libraryserviceconsultation. PLEASE send in your views. We would like to be aware of those who have volunteered so the Library will be open during Street Fair to answer any questions and to hand out our own questionnaire for volunteers. It will be available also during normal Library hours.

We are grateful to all who have supported our campaign for Charlbury Library, including the Town Council who have arranged the meetings.

POLICE Police Report from **PCSO Wesley Smith**

There have been several metal thefts in the area recently so we strongly recommend that you review the security of your property. Please consider the crime prevention advice below.

- Remove any easy access onto building roofs, such as water butts, waste bins and tall trees located nearby. This makes theft more difficult. Remember to get any necessary approval from your local authority for tree cutting before work starts.
- Store ladders in a secure place. This is really important when building works that involve scaffolding are taking place.
- Tell your insurance company in advance of any building work that you are doing. Not disclosing this information may affect your insurance cover.
- Where possible, keep any gates locked and restrict vehicle access to the site.
- Make it difficult for thieves to move stolen goods by removing wheelbarrows and wheelie bins. Put these items in a secure place.
- Maximise surveillance by cutting back tall trees and vegetation which could otherwise provide a screen for intruders to hide behind.
- Regularly check your roofs so that any theft of roofing materials is found before it rains and water enters the building, causing further damage.
- Encourage members of your community to keep an eye on the building and to report any suspicious activity.
- Watch out for workmen arriving unexpectedly at a building.
- Display a warning notice that asks people to call police on 0845 8 505 505 if

they see vans or workmen around the building between 6pm and 8am, as they could be stealing the lead roof.

- Apply anti-climb paint to drain pipes and roof guttering. This restricts access to roofing. Do not apply the paint below a height of two metres. Display warning notices prominently so people know that anti-climb paint is being used. Anti-climb paint can be bought from any security products company.
- Protect the lower section of lightning conductor ribbons using a metal cage or sheath securely fixed to the building fabric.
- Consider installing security lighting. particularly at roof level where metal roof coverings are present. Check with your local authority if permission is needed to do this.

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CHARLBURY MUSEUM NEWS

- 1. Charlbury Museum has once more been awarded a Heritage Grant from the West Oxfordshire District Council. We have been given £500 to purchase MODES software, a programme specifically designed for cataloguing Museum artefacts and documents. It will be a lengthy task to record all the information, but once it is done the Museum will be able to offer a much more efficient service to visitors and researchers. We are very grateful to the WODC for their continuing support.
- 2. Visitors to the Museum will have seen the 'School Rules' for a girls' charity school in Charlbury in the early 19th century. We have had these printed on to a tea towel, which is on sale in the Museum.
- 3. Older readers of the *Chronicle* will remember the series of reminiscences of Charlbury in the 1930s, under the name of the 'Wychwood Witch'. The 'Witch' was later revealed as Vic Brackenbury, who died in 2007. The Museum is reprinting these articles in the form of a booklet, with an additional account of 'Charlbury's Dad's Army' the Home Guard in the 2nd World War. The booklet will be illustrated with contemporary photographs from the Museum's collection.

June 2011:



A BIG 'THANK YOU' FROM VOLUNTEER LINK-UP!

I am the Volunteer Coordinator for Volunteer Link Up, the Volunteer Centre for West Oxfordshire. In June, you kindly published my letter in which I discussed our problems recruiting volunteer drivers in the town of Charlbury. Following publication of the letter, I am delighted to let you know that half a dozen volunteer drivers have now come forward! This is a fantastic result as it means that elderly people in Charlbury will no longer have to rely on drivers living further afield to make essential journeys. I would like to say a big 'Thank you' to them and also to the *Charlbury Chronicle* for its continued support!

In addition to volunteer drivers, we are also looking for volunteer befrienders to support people in Charlbury who feel lonely, or who have difficulty getting out and about. Volunteer befrienders visit people in their homes for a cup of tea and a chat, normally once a week for about an hour. At the time of writing, we have two clients who are urgently awaiting a match - An elderly lady living by herself in Charlbury would like a volunteer to visit her once a week for a cup of tea and a chat. This would provide some respite for her daughter, who is her main carer. She is very pleasant lady who loves talking! Interests include gardening and reading.; and an 86 year-old Charlbury-based lady, unable to leave the house due to recent fall, and with no family living nearby, would like somebody to sit with her once a week while her carer does the shopping.

PROBUS CLUB REPORT - CHARLBURY IN 1600.

2011 marks the 400th anniversary of the King James Bible. Charlbury church has played a major role since a former vicar, Dr Ralph Hutchinson (1593-1606) and President of St John's College, Oxford, was a member of one of the translation committees. This year, following a diocesan-wide initiative from the Bishop of Oxford, St Mary's staged a series of lectures and an exhibition of various bibles during May.

In order to encourage further interest, the Probus Club of Charlbury sponsored a public lecture at St Mary's given by Ms Deborah Hayter of the University's Dept of Adult Education. In her talk, Ms Hayter described rural life in Oxfordshire circa 1600, when the English population was only about 4 million (two-thirds the current size of Greater London). At this time, there was considerable hardship and poverty, exacerbated by the dissolution of the monasteries. There was little national organisation, and towns like Charlbury depended very much on the Parish Council, local nobility, the courts and assizes, and not least, the local constable. The lecture, presided over by Probus chairman Prof Michael Marsh, was attended by over eighty people. Many questions were raised, indicative of the interest generated by the material presented during the lecture. The event was followed by the Club's monthly lunch.

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CHARLBURY TOWN COUNCIL REPORT, No. 60 By Councillor Helen Bessemer-Clark

Looking back at the Town Council Report for September 2010, it is noted that many of the items are almost the same, showing the timelessness of some of the Town Council activities, with just a few dates and names changed. But there are also many new ventures and actions that take place each year, which also show the ongoing and future issues that are being tackled by the Council. It is hoped that those who might wish to get involved in such progress will be encouraged to stand for election next year.

Town Council Annual Meeting: On 25th May. Nick Potter was re-elected Chairman and Gareth Millar re-elected Vice-Chairman for the second year running. The other Councillors, who all sit as Independent Members, are: Helen Bessemer-Clark, Ian Cox, Susie Finch, Willem Hackmann, John Harrison, Reg James, Nicolette Lethbridge, Valou Pakenham-Walsh, Ron Prew and Liz Reason. Appointments to the Council's Committees and nominations to other bodies were also made of which a full list can be obtained from the Town Clerk. All 12 seats will be available for election on 3rd May, 2012. Details can also be obtained from the Town Clerk.

Local Government Election: On 5th May Hywel Davies (Cons) was elected to represent the Charlbury Ward (which includes Finstock and Fawler), on West Oxfordshire District Council. Hywel lives in Finstock. The previous District Councillor, Mike Breakell (LibDem) stood down at the election and is thanked for representing the ward for 9 years. The other District Councillor for the ward is Glena Chadwick (LibDem) whose seat becomes available for election next year.

Annual Boundary Walk took place on May 29th (Rogation Sunday). It was well attended—up to 20 at one stage. As Tony Graeme is standing down after a long and much appreciated stewardship of this activity, it is hoped a replacement will be found to carry on this work. Surely someone has some strong walking boots to which they would like to give an airing? Thanks as always to the Hobil family for lunch arrangements and to all the stewards and helpers.

Open Surgeries These seem to be successful, though the position will be reviewed at the Council Meeting in October. Meanwhile, the next Surgery will be in the Corner House on October lst.

CTC Website. This has now had 11,432 Unique Sessions (i.e.' hits' which were followed up) – which is an average of 31 visitors per day. We hope that it will continue to be a useful source of information about the Council's activities.

Pavilion The Formal Opening by David Cameron, MP took place on 13th May. The Club Room is to be named in memory of the late John Merriman, former Councillor, Parish Council Chairman and Chairman of Nine Acres Recreation Ground Management Committee, in recognition of all he did for the Town. More money is still needed to complete the disabled access and for additonal fixtures and fittings. Any donations towards this will be gratefully welcomed by Robert Caston, Chairman of the Committee. **Charlbury Station** The new platform and bridge opened for travellers on the 0713 train to Worcester on June 6th. A more formal opening ceremony took place on June 10th when a framed photograph showing the station in a) 1971 (when the double lines stopped) and b)2011 (when the double lines started again) was presented to the Town Council by Network Rail. The back had been signed by all the engineers etc involved with the project. Speeches were made by representatives of Network Rail, First Great Western, the Town Council and the CLPG President. Lord Faulkner of Worcester. There is to be an even

more formal opening of the line in August. Further improvements are still being made to the new bridge and platform. The Staff and Students of Abingdon and Witney College are designing the garden on the new platform. First Great Western have applied for a Government Grant to extend the Car Park into the old Allotment/ Works site and the town Council have strongly supported this proposal, as it will hopefully take away some of the pressure on parking already experienced in the town with more passengers using the station.

Affordable Housing South Oxfordshire Housing Association (SOHA), the Registered Social Landlord (RSL) arranged a Public Consultation on 15th June in the Corner House where residents could see and comment on the plans for the proposed scheme at Little Lees. It was attended by about 100 people of whom nearly half sent written comments to SOHA. Once analysed these ideas will be incorporated, where possible, into the plans so that a new Planning Application can be made. The result of the Environmental Survey will also be included.

The Library:: OCC want to make severe cuts to the Library opening hours and are seeking volunteers to help run the Library for two thirds of current staff hours. It is **NOT** going to be shut down. A meeting was held between County Staff, Town, District and County Councillors and the Friends of Charlbury Library on 26th July as part of OCC's Library Service Consultation. The Friends of the Library are now preparing a response to the consultation for which they will be seeking the Town Council's support. The consultation period continues until 30 September, and it is important that as many people as possible respond. Forms are available at the library or can be completed on line. In the meantime the Library will continue to open as usual.

Nine Acres It is depressing to note that the play equipment has been vandalised. This entails a cost to the Council, which means less money for other more important matters. **Grants for the Financial Year 12/13:** Any organisation that thinks it may need a Financial Grant from the Town Council for the Financial Year 2012/13 must obtain an application form from the Town Clerk and return it to him together with supporting documents by mid-day on 31st October. Late bids cannot be considered. The Clerk can advise on what can, and cannot, be grant aided under the Local Government Act. Electronic applications can be submitted by prior arrangement with the Clerk. **Dean Pit Household Waste Recycling Centre.** As many of you know, this is to be shut

by OCC on 30th September. The Town Council have strongly opposed this action, especially as a new facility at Kidlington is now being delayed. We await a further decision as to whether a substitute Centre can be found near Chipping Norton. **Cornbury Park Premises Licence**: The Council has been asked to report that West Oxfordshire District Council granted this on 10th January and that it was reviewed and amended by a District Judge at Banbury Magistrates Court on 5th May. Full details of the amended Licence can be obtained from the District Council. Enquiries about events at Cornbury Park should be made to the Estate Office.

Owners of properties with overhanging branches are asked to cut these back to allow pedestrians full use of pavements. It is difficult for those with prams, or wheeled shopping baskets, to have to step into the road to avoid these obstacles.

ORCC working to support Digital TV Switchover Programme and its Help Scheme

This September, the analogue television signal will be switched off forever and replaced with a digital signal. TV equipment will need to be digital-compatible, otherwise it will display a totally blank screen.

ORCC is working with Digital UK, an independent not for profit organisation formed by broadcasters, to assist Oxfordshire consumers in the conversion. There are two Switchover dates for Oxfordshire. 14 September (BBC2) and 28 September (all remaining analogue channels - ITV, BBC1, Channel 4, Channel 5).

ORCC has been appointed by Digital UK to mobilise local organisations and volunteers in Oxfordshire to help their service users and residents in their community to make the switch to digital TV successfully.

ORCC will be publicising the Switchover Help Scheme, run by the BBC, which has been set up to make it easier for older and disabled people to switch to digital TV. People are eligible for the scheme if they are aged 75 years or more, have lived in a care home for six months or more, get (or could get) certain disability benefits, or are registered blind or partially sighted.

The Help Scheme is run by the BBC and can provide: Easy to use digital TV equipment A security-checked installer A 12 month aftercare service.

This will cost only £40 or is free to people who are in receipt of benefits.

Everyone who is eligible for the Help Scheme has received a letter telling them all about it but not everyone may have read it or understood what is on offer and how to get help. These are the people that ORCC will be urging local organisations and volunteers to reach.

Organisations will be encouraged to hold events and presentations, giving advice on how to switch over to digital TV. There is funding available through a Small Grants Scheme to encourage extra events locally. Materials developed to help run events and explain switchover can also be provided.

Key figures - "supporters" - in the community will be asked to check that vulnerable people they know who are eligible for the Help Scheme have understood what is available and are accessing the Scheme if they need to.

Switching to digital-only TV

Oxfordshire, parts of Berkshire and Buckinghamshire will begin switching to digital-only TV on 14 September 2011. The two-stage process will complete two weeks later on 28 September. This means the existing analogue TV signal will be switched off and replaced with a new, stronger digital TV signal.

Switchover is happening so that Freeview services (digital TV through an aerial) can be extended to people who can't currently get them. Any analogue television left unconverted will no longer be able to receive TV programmes after the switchover. If you already have Freeview, you will need to retune your TV on the day of switchover. Oxfordshire Rural Community Council will be running advice points in Didcot and Witney to help with any questions you have about switchover, including re-tuning, equipment and the Switchover Help Scheme.

The advice points are taking place from 10am to 4pm on 14th, 15th, 28th and 29th September.

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ROY SHADBOLT – a life of gardening

I was born in Charlbury and was brought up in the house in Hixet Wood where I live now. I had a brother Ron, who was eighteen months older than me. I went to the Infants' and Primary school locally. I did not pass the exam to Chipping Norton and so stayed on at the Playing Close school. Mr Lawson took us for gardening. The plots were where the Co-op is now. Each class had its own plot and we all grew different vegetables, which were used in the canteen. I really enjoyed doing this. When I came to leave most of my friends went off to work at the car factory in Oxford. My brother was working on the Cornbury estate as a gardener. He was doing well and Mr. Buckle the head gardener told him that if I wanted to work there I could. So in 1950 at the age of 15 I went there as a garden boy.

The Cornbury estate at that time was owned by the Watneys, the brewing family. There were ten gardeners - four worked in the greenhouses, four in the vegetable gardens and two at the seven acre Pleasure grounds that surrounded the house. The greenhouses grew bananas, grapes, peaches, nectarines and cherries. Beer barrels were used for planting trees such as peaches. In the greenhouse full of peaches they had bags rather like bras to catch the fruit so that they did not fall off when ripe and bruise. Grapes would be picked in August and then taken to the fruit room. The stem of the grapes would be put into a bottle of water and then they would last until the end of January. The Watneys had an estate in Sutherland north of Inverness. When they were up there three boxes of fruit and vegetables would be sent up to them. It all had to be packed very carefully. The peaches were wrapped in cotton wool. They were sent off at 5.30. pm on the Monday and the chauffeur would pick them up at 9.30 am in Inverness. Crops not needed by the family were sold locally. At Eights week in Oxford our strawberries were sold for a pound but that came down to ten shillings after the week. We grew flowers out of season-tulips. lily of the valley. Hellebores would be forced and sold for Christmas at sixpence each. One greenhouse had 1,000 carnation plants. There were carnations in the House all season. They were picked every Thursday and taken up there at 10 am. A lady, Mrs. Guy, came up from Charlbury to arrange them. We supplied flowers to Critchley's, a shop by the New Theatre in Oxford People used to go there to buy flowers for the actresses.

When I started as a garden boy, I used to leave home at 7.15 pm and cycle to the House. My first job was to go to the cook and see what she wanted from the kitchen garden that day. Another job I had was to pollinate plants in the greenhouses with a rabbit's tail. My Saturday job was at 11.30 sharp to sweep the three sets of steps going down to the Head gardener's house and the paths roundabout to make sure they were clean and tidy at the weekend. The rest of the time I did jobs for the gardeners. I had half an hour for lunch and three quarters of an hour for dinner. I finished at 4.45 pm, I was paid £2..2..6d, which was 5 shillings above the going rate. I gave a pound of this to my mother. The Agricultural Union recommended that all workers should have one week's holiday but we had two. We also got milk at half price and a load of firewood every year. There is an account of my time as a garden boy in a book by Susan Campbell "A Calendar of Gardeners' Lore revealing the Secrets of the Walled Kitchen Garden." When I got home work did not stop. I had to help my father on the allotment on Crawborough. My grandfather lived near us and kept pigs, so there were jobs there. At harvest we helped in the fields. There is a

picture of my brother and myself working in the Lees Rest field. The corn is piled in stooks and there is a Canadian woman driving the tractor. When work was finished we would go down to the YMCA run by Mr Shayler and there we could play snooker, billiards and cards. But at 7 o'clock the cinema would open and we went there. It was open five days a week. By ten o'clock I would be in bed.

After I had been at Cornbury for a while Mr. Buckle, the head gardener, said that I should go to another garden like Blenheim and get more experience. I did not want to and I preferred to be able to live at home. I learnt a lot from Mr. Buckle. I used to help him set up his show of carnations at one end of the tent at the British Legion Flower show. At the end his flowers would be auctioned off and fetched eight shillings a dozen – the money going to charity. He also used to exhibit at the Oxford Town Hall. He was very proud that he beat Havergal Waterperry. He got first prize with his orchids. We liked this as four of us would get to go to the show one day and four others the next. We'd spend half the day at the show and then go to the pictures. He also showed sweet peas and he came fourth in a London show. He said he would not have come first but he lost to the other two because their stems were longer. He had a method for growing sweet peas up to twenty feet. He would grow the first seven feet and then he would grow it horizontally for another seven feet and then very carefully erect them making sure the stem was not damaged. The process would begin again till it reached the height.

When I first went to Cornbury two brothers Jack and Ernest Hutt worked there - Jack looked after the vegetable garden and Ernest, who always wore a stiff collar to work, looked after the pleasure gardens. In 1955 I was asked to take over from Jack. The soil in the gardens was excellent. We used to dig nine tons of turf from the park and make a havrick layering the turf and manure. This would stand for two years. Then a fire was made under a bath of water with a grid on top. The earth was placed on this and steamed and so sterilized. The Cornbury soil when tested has always done well. In 1966 Mr Watney died. He left everyone a week's wages. Cornbury was bought by Lord Rotherwick. The estate was run in a much less labour intensive way and many employees lost their jobs. I stayed on and became Head Gardener in 1972. I had married a house maid from the House and we lived in the Gardener's cottage. We had a son, who has gone into banking not gardening. There were only 2 gardeners beside myself and I found I was working a seven day week. I was made redundant in 1990 and I decided to be s elf-employed. I still worked for Lord Rotherwick at Rangers' Lodge for three days a week and for his brother Charles at Finstock Manor for two days. In 1997 the old Lord Rotherwick died and Rangers' Lodge was let out. I decided to retire though I did do odd gardening jobs. Now I concentrate on my own garden.

I remember Mr. Hutt telling me that gardening is in you or it isn't. Gardening is easy if you get it right but getting it wrong makes it hard. If you get your garden in good condition in April you get ahead. When you are gardening time does not matter.

HISTORY OF OLD CHARLBURY

THE TOWN HALL, CHARLBURY Chapter 3 Entertainment 1939 – 1960

World War II: Charlbury and surrounding villages were filled with soldiers during WWII in private billets and public buildings. The Army requisitioned the Town Hall at the beginning of the War, believing it to be a local authority building. After an appeal, it was returned to the Quaker owners, but continued to be used for ENSA concerts and parties for the troops. The garden behind the Town Hall became an Army cook-house, complete with cold store. Soldiers would spend time in the Royal Oak Coffee Tavern, where they could sit by the fire with a hot drink. The Royal Oak was the ARP headquarters for a time and held the codes for action to be taken when invasion was imminent.

In 1936 Mr C H Morris had given the Scouts the site for the Scout Hut in Nine Acres Lane. The Corner House in Market Street was opened in 1939 as a social centre for a Girls' Club, with club rooms, library and dance hall. It was presented to the towns-people in 1945 by Mr Morris, and the County Council library was formally opened in 1948. The Parish Room at the original Vicarage in Church Lane was used for film shows, whist drives and meetings by the new Vicar, Mr T J Wood, from 1940. After the war it served as an extra classroom for the primary school and is now part of Queen Anne Cottage. Parties and dances were also held in the Victory Hall and the YMCA Hall during the War.

The Town Hall Cinema: Following magic lantern lectures, the cinematograph and velograph in the 1890s, a cinema show began in the Town Hall in November 1927 for 3 nights a week, managed by the Empire Cinema, Woodstock. The first picture to be shown was "The Devil's Circus" with Moira Shearer. In December 1931 Mr Constable of Middle Barton (which had its own cinema) applied to renew the licence to show films in the Town Hall. Frank and May Jeffs took over the Royal Oak as caretakers in the late 1930s and then ran the cinema from c.1939. When the owner, Mr William Albright, died in 1943, the property was offered to the Parish Council but was declined, and Mr and Mrs Jeffs later bought it. The cinema was reached via an alley in Park Street, and there was a long narrow path for queues round the cinema wall to the door of the box office. The projection box was reached via the garden, and projectionists included Vic Merry, Harold Sandalls and Walter Ford, and a few soldiers who helped with film projection as light relief to their normal duties

The programme changed twice a week, usually consisting of a main feature, B feature and the Gaumont British news, and concerts and meetings continued to be held on Wednesdays and Sundays, when there was no film show. On VJ Day there was a free cinema show for the children in the afternoon.

The cinema continued through the fifties with extra shows for schools (eg the 1953 Coronation film). It became a regular twice-weekly commitment for many customers from Charlbury and surrounding villages. But as television and cars became commonplace, audiences gradually dwindled and the cinema closed in December 1960. The Royal Oak and Town Hall were sold in 1962 as a private house, and the Hall was demolished. By this time the War Memorial Hall had been built in the Corner House garden, and with the Corner House it became the focus for Charlbury's entertainment. Charlbury's own

Cinema (ChOC) is now reviving the old traditions.

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NEWS FROM CHARLBURY PRIMARY SCHOOL

The school was delighted with this year's academic results, particularly in the context of recent media reports about educational underachievement in primary schools in Oxford and across the county. This year's SATs results at Charlbury School are above National expectations in Reading, Writing and Maths at the end of both Key Stage 1 and 2 (7 and 11 year olds). Proportions of children achieving higher levels than the national averages are particularly impressive in both key stages, and the progress of children with special educational needs clearly demonstrates that every child is being given good support and opportunities for fulfilling his or her academic potential.

Extending the children's imaginations beyond the national curriculum, pupils recently became involved with a Charlbury Beer Festival project to fund the building of a solar-powered water heater for an orphanage in New Delhi. Members of the Beer Festival committee came to school assembly to talk about the children's home, Karm Marg, and to explain the benefits of solar heating. Year 5 pupils then helped to design and build their own solar-powered water heater in the school playground using local recycled materials. The heater was later transported to the Cricket Club in time for the Beer Festival, where the hot water it produced was used for washing hands and beer glasses! The hope is that the school will develop links with Karm Marg in the future to make new contacts and friendships in India.

Closer to home, we are exceptionally lucky to live in a place like Charlbury with such a diversity of talented and interesting people. The school is therefore keen to revive the 'Knowledge Well' project, originally set up by former parent governor Birgit den Outer, whereby local volunteers come and meet with the children in school once or twice a year. 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
NEWS FROM CORNBURY from the Cornbury Park Team





There was a wide range on offer; roller-skating, gymnastics, racquet sports and lots more. If you have not been aware of this do discover what's planned for the next school holidays.

There was some alarm recently when old style refuse lorries were seen in Charlbury collecting recycling. Actually it was a testament to the success of the new scheme. The amount of recycling has increased so much that three new lorries were needed (which came into service at the end of July) and, momentarily, some of the older lorries had to be pressed into use.. However, none of the recycling they collected went to landfill but all to its correct destination.

May Gurney, the new contractors, gave councillors at WODC an excellent presentation recently to show how the new scheme is bedding down and achieving its aims---basically more recycling. Actually the **total** amount collected has also fallen. When this was queried the contractors said that research has shown that in areas where food waste is collected, people notice how much they are throwing away (not the waste conscious citizens of Charlbury I'm sure!) and then change their shopping habits accordingly----so people can change!

On Tuesday 26th July the first Charlbury Library consultation meeting took place. What could have proved a difficult meeting was admirably chaired by Nick Potter. The Friends of the Library, led by Amanda Epps, subjected the Council contingent, Cllr Judith Heathcote, John Jackson and Karen Warren, to sustained and astute questioning over the Council's proposals regarding the future of our Library. The public position is clear - we want to keep the Library open as it is. However, we must consider the use of volunteers for some of the opening hours. To this end, there will be more consultation, I'm sure more horse trading and wrangling to achieve the best possible outcome. At some point we must identify the 'volunteer potential'. There is never an infinte pool of volunteers and with so many people already serving the community, it is hard to see how many more can be coaxed out. For myself, in a rush of madness, I have offered to man the Library desk for a few hours at some point. Therefore, if you can see yourself doing a stint, please come forward. We were 'green' without knowing it!

This article in an American newspaper was seen by Alan Burroughs who thought that Chronicle readers might find it of interest

A cashier said I should bring my own grocery bag because plastic bags weren't good for the environment. I explained 'We didn't have the 'green' thing in my day'. He responded 'That's the problem. You didn't care enough to save our environment.'

Right. We returned and reused milk, soda and beer bottles. We walked stairs as there wasn't an escalator in every building. We walked to the grocery, we did not climb into a car to go two blocks. Diapers were washed, we didn't have disposables. Clothes dried on a line, not with an energy-gobbling machine - wind and solar power dried them. We had one TV or radio, not one in every room. The TV screen was small, not the size of a room. In the kitchen we blended and stirred by hand; there weren't machines to do everything.

When we sent a package, we used newspaper, not Styrofoam or plastic bubble wrap. We didn't burn gasoline to cut the lawn. We used a push mower. We exercised by working and didn't need to go to a health club to run on treadmills; drank from a fountain instead of plastic bottles; and replaced razor blades instead of throwing away the razor.

Kids rode their bikes to school or walked instead of turning their moms into a 24-hour taxi service. We didn't need gadgets to receive a signal from satellites 1,000 miles in space to find the nearest pizza joint.

Sadly this generation laments how wasteful we were because we didn't have the 'green thing' back then?

Non-emergency Patient Transport Consultation

Oxfordshire NHS is looking to make savings in many areas of their service and the non-emergency patient transport is one of those services. A consultation is running until 31 July to gather the public's views over the proposal to cut £200,000 from the transport service, which costs the NHS approximately £3million a year. The NHS hopes to do this by reinforcing the eligibility criteria and ensuring that patients who may be able to use 'walk on' transport do not receive the service. However, the proposed cut in the service will likely put further pressure on the **voluntary car schemes** in Oxfordshire and will have a disproportionate effect on vulnerable people in rural areas of Oxfordshire who have little to no access to public transport services.


