

Charlbury Festival

2022 is an exciting year for Charlbury Arts as it is the biannual Charlbury Festival!

The Art Society welcomes everyone with an interest in the Arts to the vibrant programme of monthly talks, twice yearly exhibitions and the new venture of the Charlbury Art Room. Currently there are about 200 members, including practising artists, novice dabblers like myself, those with an interest in art and a network of local workshops and art activities such as the Sketchbook Project with 40 members and the Swift Mosaic Project which decorates the walls of the Community Centre.

Charlbury Arts is the curator of the Charlbury Festival, a programme of music, drama, art, literature and cultural events being held from Friday 10th June to Sunday 19th June 2022. The events will take place in venues in Charlbury and there will be Open Studios to meet some of Charlbury's Artists.

The first event will be a musical evening with Jarisel, a newly formed group playing music from six countries on ten instruments. A very popular highlight follows on Saturday 11th June outside the Community Centre; a giant linocut made by local artists and monotype prints made by Charlbury Primary School, all printed before your eyes by a steamroller!

In the following days there will be live music events from D'Accord, Charlbury Primary School Choir, Mingus Tree, lunchtime piano and organ recitals and Friday Night 11th June is Music Night.

There will be a Sculpture Trail, Heritage Town and Field Walks, a Wildflower Walk and a Walkers are Welcome hike to Shorthampton to visit the Church Murals.

Sunday 13th June will be Charlbury Open Gardens Day.

For those who enjoy literature there will be poetry from The Four Wordsmen of the Apostrophe on 11th June and an evening of Poetry and Music on 12th June; also talks about publishing and the chance to meet local writers. Gain inspiration yourself by joining a Young Writers Workshop or a Local Writers Forum.

Food will be available from local Nutmeg and Thyme and chocolate lovers could join a Chocolate Making Workshop.

In this year of the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II, Charlbury Festival will stage our local CADS Merry Moments of Monarchy, a lighthearted journey through a thousand years of the Monarchy. Looking further back Saxon bones, Roman coins and life on the land will feature in a local film and show of metal detecting finds. The Charlbury Museum will be open with a new exhibition entitled 'Jubilee'.

On Saturday 18th June there will be two further highlights; Good, Occasionally Rhyming, a celebration of the centenary of The Shipping Forecast, and Shoestring Opera stages Iolanthe.

Watch out for the Charlbury Festival Programme with full details of events and how to book tickets.

Charlbury Museum News

Our special display celebrates the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II with roval memorabilia and snapshots of Charlbury life in the 1950s. The 'Jubilee' exhibition features a diverse collection, including: Coronation stamps, newspapers, commemorative coins, medals; precious china given to every child at the Charlbury Coronation tea in 1953; a colourful apron emblazoned with the Coronation procession, a miniature Coronation coach and horses, etc - over seventy items inspire this 'Jubilee' tribute. Historic souvenirs mingle with photographs that capture the iconic moments when Charlbury enjoyed past Coronations and Jubilees.

Saturday 28th May – Museum Plant Sale in the Corner House Garden, 10 am to 12 noon, in aid of Museum running costs Come and buy and/ or donate plants on the morning of the sale or on Friday evening 27th May between 6 and 6.30 pm. Alongside the Sale, CRAG will be raising funds by providing coffee and refreshments in the Hall all day.

Wednesday 15th June 7.30 pm Memorial Hall (part of the Festival)

Saxon bones, Roman coins, and life on the land. In a new film by Alan Snelling, Rob Stepney interviews Rob Jackson about unexpected archaeological discoveries and his working life spent in the fields around Walcot – a period of dramatic change in agricultural practice. This will be followed by an open discussion with Rob Jackson.

Neil Pakenham-Walsh and Rob will also bring along metal detecting finds to show the diverse stories the soil can reveal – from lost medieval silver pennies to antibiotics used to treat mastitis, and from oil painters to the Primrose League. The Museum contributed to the cost of the film. (Admission £5 at the door – cash only)

Sunday 19th June – Open Gardens.
The Museum is taking part as usual, so you may visit the Museum on that
Sunday afternoon and appreciate the

hard work of our volunteer gardener, lane Brownlow.

We look forward to welcoming Charlbury's population to the Museum this summer. It's dry on a rainy day, cool in a heatwave and fascinating always, full of beautiful artworks, histories of the town's individuals, industries and activities, things our Grandparents used to use, not to mention the farm wagon magnificently restored by Michael Jones. Our five small rooms will be well-ventilated and we invite you to wear masks if the rooms are crowded, in view of the recent increase in Covid infections.

Thanks to all our volunteers who give their time to welcome visitors from near and far. Our visitors' books are full of compliments on their helpfulness and kindness. So many visitors come from the campsites and/or the other side of the world, and it's lovely to greet real Charlbury residents too.

Last but by no means least, we give our grateful thanks to Judy Dod who has recently resigned from the museum committee because of family commitments. Her energy and enthusiasm have been an inspiration and we are grateful that she will continue to support the museum's events. The new Committee will be appointed at the AGM of the Charlbury Society on 5th May and will serve until the Charity Commission approves the proposal to form a Charitable Incorporated Organisation to run the "Charlbury Museum and Heritage Centre", probably in a few months' time.

Jubilees and Vaccinations

It is strange that in Charlbury some years of royal Jubilees have coincided with epidemics and vaccinations. In 1887 Queen Victoria celebrated her

Golden Jubilee. Our local doctor, Dr Ernest Wilcox, gave a lecture on the advantages of vaccination. There was a measles epidemic. Five children died including two children from one family, and the British School on the Playing Close closed for five weeks because of the infection.

In 1897, the Queen's Diamond Jubilee year, a public meeting was arranged in Charlbury by anti-vaxers from Birmingham protesting about compulsory vaccination against smallpox. When 19 men were fined for failing to vaccinate their children and refused to pay the fines, there were riots in February. Dozens of police arrived in town and Charlbury Band played Rule Britannia very loudly to prevent the auctioneer from selling off the protesters' goods to pay the fines.

In 2022 during the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II the Covid pandemic continues and the Medical Centre advises on the advantages of vaccination. Precautionary school closures have been prevented since 2019/20 and nowadays most Charlbury people are very pleased to have their vaccinations and boosters.



My husband and I were staying with my family in Totteridge, North London and were invited to watch the parade from some office on the corner of St James's Street and Piccadilly. I am vague about what

we did next but I suspect that we went to look at the crowds in the Mall before turning to the warmth of home, where we managed to see the whole thing on the television, which was almost as exciting as being in the middle of London. In fact, I think that I remember more from the TV than being there since I cannot remember what time of day I'm talking about and wonder if they were going to Westminster Abbey or had come away from the ceremony—I suspect the latter. One clear memory I have of that day is hearing on the tube that Hillary had conquered Everest.

CHARLBURY REFUGEE ACTION GROUP

Ukrainian guests are finally beginning to arrive in Charlbury. There are as many different stories of their journeys here as there are families; and as many different needs for support.

Here are the reflections of one CRAG member, based on common experiences over the past few weeks:

Friends and supporters in Charlbury and the wider area have been mustering support for Ukrainian refugees, and giving moral support to each other as we navigate the bureaucratic shoals that often seem designed to thwart our efforts. It's a common experience to grapple with a poorly designed visa request form, phone in hand on an unreliable line to the refugees we want to sponsor, to fill in the numerous details required by an unbending Home Office.

Another sadly common experience is then the weeks of waiting, seemingly interminable, for the visa documentation to come through. Sometimes the visa is granted but then the essential letter fails to arrive. Sometimes one member of the family, often a young child, does not receive a visa when the others do: more waiting and anxiety.

The sponsoring hosts give up many hours and days to get the system to work. Other sponsors find themselves paying the hotel bills for refugees who have run out of money, have been told their visa is granted but have not received the essential paperwork that will enable them to travel.

For our Ukrainian guests, we can only hope that being here safely is what matters most, and the warmth of our welcome will compensate for the blocks placed in their way by officials struggling to manage a completely new and untested system.

That, in the end, is what it's all about: the warm welcome and the safety. People in Charlbury and all over the country are getting together to offer not just room, but bedding, equipment, children's toys, books, food, transport, English lessons, group meals, free haircuts, guided tours, and more.

Our guests will be anxious to return home when they can do so safely. They will go with good memories of Britain that, we can hope, will last long after this war is over. And we too will have been changed forever.

The trials of our Ukrainian guests make us reflect on those refugees for whom there is no welcome scheme, only the prospect of a prison sentence or removal to Rwanda if they ever make it across the Channel, as the Nationality and Borders Bill finally passes into law after a mammoth struggle.

These individuals and families, our uprooted and grieving guests, will teach us a lot about stoicism, varying cultural norms, living with a new language, the nuances of national identity, and the common norms of humanity that we share with them.

We will help them to build up the resilience that they so badly need now and when they return to their devastated country. We will discover new depths and kindness in ourselves. We and they will offer each other friendships that in some cases will last a lifetime.

The Little OX Brew Bowls Green is now in full action and bowling well after many voluntary hours from club members for our first Open Day in the Easter sunshine. It is also time for membership annual subscription renewals which we have managed to keep the same as last year. Our aim is to ensure we give access to the game to all members and at every level; more information may be obtained from our website at www.charlburybowls.co.uk.

Our fixture card is now printed and shows our full summer programme of friendly matches, both home and away to other affiliated bowls clubs. We also have a Men's and Ladies' League team, the West Oxon Mixed League, and County and Club competitions such as the Ned Gomm trophy, sponsored by Hydac.

The very popular Tuesday night Triples, kindly sponsored by Charlbury Garage, promises to be a great focal point of the week and a good starting place to enjoy competitive bowling or just have a social evening. All the above and more can now be viewed and booked on our new Club Manager system. This fantastic system allows all members to access the latest information and book games on your PC, phone or tablet, as well as using the traditional notice board. This is backed up with our very own members' only Facebook page.

New members can play and enjoy our facilities at almost any time. Beginners are most welcome. We can provide free coaching and you can attend up to six times before committing and then we provide a discount for the first year to enable the purchase of a club shirt. Short mat inside bowling will, for the first time, continue during the summer at the

club. We plan to have a league structure on a Monday and Thursday evening because of popular demand by members, who wish to pursue this option.

You may recall from the last issue that the club managed to get to the National finals at Solihull with both a junior academy team and a mixed over 60s team this year. We also had representation at the Oxfordshire finals by several members of the club, a big credit to all involved. After a successful trial for Bowls England Short mat team, five of our junior academy players have been selected for the England Squad. Congratulations to the five; names may be shown in the next issue.

Broadsword junior academy will continue to meet on Saturday mornings from 11am and Tuesday afternoons at 3.15pm; all ages from 7-15 are supported by DBS vetted and trained coaches and once competent can play at club level, both inside and outside. The academy is supported by West Oxfordshire District Council

Building extensions: the club management committee have been very busy supporting plans and obtaining grants to expand the building to cope with tomorrow's needs. Charlbury Finstock Morris seeks new members

Do you seek some lively exercise, or feel the urge to be doing something really different? Do you relish the prospect of entertaining others with your dance or musical talent? Even if you answer 'NO' please do consider joining Charlbury Finstock Morris!

We are always looking for interested individuals from the local community—our dancers come from Finstock, Witney, Chipping Norton and Oxford as well as from Charlbury itself. Our Cotswold Morris side invites you to free Morris dancing lessons.

Our Summer dance season is from May to September. Winter activities include Barn Dances, Pub evenings and Morris Ales (gatherings of Morris sides). Practice sessions are held in Finstock Village Hall in October / November and March, April and May on most Friday evenings at 8:00pm.

Newcomers are most certainly welcome to drop by and to help our side keep this artistic tradition alive. As in the old days, we learn and respect the ancient traditions of the Morris, but we try not to take ourselves too seriously. Please do come along to one of our events or practice sessions (see website for times and locations).

Formed in 1984, Charlbury Morris revived local participation in the ancient tradition of Morris dancing in Charlbury and the Cotswold villages of Leafield, Finstock and Minster Lovell—commonly known as the Fieldtown area. Our side is made up of six or more sprightly male dancers, several versatile musicians and a merry fool! We dance various local dance traditions from Fieldtown, Ascott, Hinton, Bampton and Adderbury—taking the dance steps and music from historical sources.

'CFM' is well-known as a 'fun side'. We keep to the old dance traditions, and sometimes create our own, but always with healthy injections of fun and the occasional, equally ancient, beverage to cool our exertions! Jangling bells, wild waving hankies, whirling sticks and wild whooping are common elements of our dance. A new departure for us is singing including sea shanties; you might have seen us perform at Street Fair last year.

And now the time has come to face the final curtain...

In truth, I have to be honest and say that I'm rather relieved that Cornbury Festival is coming to an end, despite all the magical moments and the fantastic group of friends I've made over the last almost 20 years. Running an independent music festival is a rather foolish endeavor, and although I will take away some amazing memories, losing the life savings, family heirlooms and all the profits from my successful music consultancy business has been pretty painful. BUT the big question is: Would I do it all again? And I'm afraid the answer is YES.

Even if you've never been to a festival, you should try Cornbury on this final occasion; it was even good enough for my 80-year-old mother a few years back. "Are you OK Mother?" I asked. "I'm in danger of having a good time" she replied. 'Why should I make the effort?' I hear you ask.

Cornbury is the festival for people who don't really 'do' festivals and it is widely acknowledged by our loyal supporters and musicians who play the festival as pretty much the nicest, best run, friendliest festival in the UK. It's still very much about music and is clearly a reflection of my very wide, if a little safe, music taste. The festival is so safe that the police won't attend.

The selection of bands follows a 'something for everyone' approach, often poo-pooed by other festivals for being 'uncool'. Dear Tim Hughes from the Oxford Times & Mail believes we're so

uncool at Cornbury that we've become cool—not sure about that!
Right from the start we've made great food a central part of our festival, turning down an offer from a low-end festival caterer which could have helped finance our first year, and concentrated on the best independent caterers we could find and most of these individuals are still with us. This year we welcome back our old friends at Waitrose (Cornbury partners on five separate occasions) with an intriguing 'build your own picnic' offer, and new local Great Tew foodies 'Quince & Clover'.

If long term enduring partnerships are an indication of the loyalty we feel and, luckily, we attract, the gold medal must surely go to joint winners Pablo Ettinger from Caffè Nero and Andy Pickard from Charlbury Riverside. Both these fine Gentlemen have supported us over the years simply because they're mad about music. I'd also like to thank our longstanding supporter and Charlbury councillor Nick Potter for all his help and press cuttings over the years.

We have access to every library in Oxfordshire so are sure to be able to find something for everyone!

Charlbury Society

I have been approached many times over distribute salt and its use in agriculture the past year on my walks through Charlbury by members who have expressed their appreciation of the varied and fascinating talks we arranged for you during the past season. We are delighted that you have continued to support us with membership currently around 140. Because of that and for reasons of safety , we have continued with Zoom, and whilst acknowledging that not everyone is able or willing to join us remotely, we understand that the majority of you do wish us to continue, with some occasions, as for the AGM, returning to the Memorial Hall where you can have a chance to meet up with others and enjoy a glass of wine.

A brief summary of our talks during 21/22 follows for interest and for those who may have missed some. I also hope this may encourage some new members to join us next season.

We started our season in October with Dr Simon Townley who is the County Editor of the VCH for Oxfordshire, talking to us about the history of the Wychwood Forest and Cornbury Park. We learnt of the numerous settlements in the Wychwood mentioned in the Domesday Book , and the first documented reference of Cornbury Park in 1244. The association with royalty and the different stages of building of Cornbury House over the centuries was described in detail, as was the design of the Park in the Restoration period. I found this talk particularly fascinating as many of you know.

Our talk in November was by Rod Evans who gave us a very detailed and technical description of the planning process. It was interesting to debate whether access and traffic issues have more weight in a planning application than a reduction in the value of property.

In December we heard from Janice Kinory, archeologist, about the production, distribution of salt in prehistoric Britain and the use of briquetage in the iron age to collect and and food production.

Trevor Jackson, who served in the RAF for nearly 30 years, becoming a commissioned officer and latterly as a volunteer VIP escort officer at Fairford, was our speaker in January,

giving us a tremendously well illustrated talk on the activities that have taken place at RAF Brize Norton since the 1930s to the current day, looking at the types of aircraft that have operated from the base over the decades, and the operations they have been involved with.

In February, Clare Shakya talked to us about a topic foremost in our minds: Climate ambition, COP 26 took us forward, but not far enough. Clare has 30 years of experience in climate resilient development, covering natural resources, energy and water systems.

She is now responsible for the oversight of research as the Director of climate change at the International Institute for Environment and Development.

She explained the history of climate change, the challenges we now face and the politics involved.

In March we had a stunning virtual visit to see the restoration of Kelmcott Manor, under the leadership of Dr Kathy Haslam, Curator and specialist in William Morris and the Arts and Crafts movement.

In 1961 when Kelmscott was in a perilous state of repair, being a property of international significance, the ownership was taken over by the Society of Antiquaries of London.

Sixty years later the £6 million Project has safeguarded the Estate's future, and Kathy talked us through the complexities of working on such a fragile site during the Pandemic and lockdown, and the significance of research that has informed decisions at every stage.

We were strongly encouraged to visit it this summer.

And in April we had a wonderful talk by

four of the Museum Committee, those who actually run the museum, organise the collections and displays, and accept gifts and memories of Charlbury residents to add to the collection. Each speaker showed us a different view of the Museum and with slides outlining the history, photographs, buildings and crafts in Charlbury through the ages.

In May, following the AGM, Simon and Rhona Walker told us about the golden age of prefabrication, a much anticipated talk which we had hoped to bring you as soon as we came back to the Memorial Hall.

I am now appealing to you for help with ideas for, and organisation of the next season's lectures since this is the mainstay of the Charlbury Society, and we should be incredibly sad not to be able to continue to provide these wonderful Thursday evenings.

As I have mentioned a number of our Committee are stepping down as well as our President. So I should like to thank them all for their support over the past couple of years, and we very much hope to welcome some more members to the Committee, in order to continue with our programme.

We have been unable to organise a Charlbury Society tea in the Corner House garden, as last year, or any outings with our reduced numbers, as the remaining three people could not take this on in addition to their current roles. We would like to organise a members tea later in the summer, or even an outing, if we have some offers of help.

Finally I should like to mention the support the Society's committee members have given over the past year to the Museum in their quest to move to Charitable status as a CIO, and we shall continue to be closely involved until it comes to fruition.

COOD CONTROL OF

Charlbury Hedges

Hedges are so important in our landscape as wildlife corridors and refuges for plants, insects, birds, reptiles and small mammals. In Charlbury all our hedges are very old and the boundaries can be seen on our earliest map drawn up in 1761 by Thomas Pride for the new 4th Duke of Marlborough.

This map shows the 90 owners of land in the parish, a large number with small "pieces" of land scattered all over the parish. This large number of small land owners to negotiate with is no doubt the reason why Charlbury didn't experience the radical reshaping of its land into large rectangular fields seen elsewhere and why we can still see these early field boundaries today.



The 1761 map shows some boundaries with large dots but unfortunately they are not explained in the key. Large dots are shown along the northern boundary of Long Hedge Furlongs and maybe the name suggests the dots are along an actual hedge (which is still there today), but large dots are also shown on some "unenclosed" boundaries and this maybe indicates the fields were enclosed. Other boundaries might be stone walls or just marked by stones or trees to identify junction points.

The old trees along the Holly Bush Furlongs track south of the Ditchley Road are at regular intervals and look like they could delineate the ends of the old strip boundaries.

Another reason we're lucky is that our hedges have been thoroughly surveyed by Alan Spicer and Don Porter; they provided a pilot model for CPRE Oxfordshire's Hedgerow Survey initiative. Now in the 2020s, the People's Trust for Endangered Species is doing a national survey of the hedges looking particularly at how they are managed and how healthy they are. Charlbury is now taking part in this survey to build on the earlier survey work done by Alan and Don.

Overcutting annually at the same point produces a visible knuckle producing new growth with nothing growing afresh from the base and providing little shelter for wildlife. Leaving a hedge totally uncut will naturally end up with the plants developing into a line of trees which will be relatively short-lived. Cutting a hedge is like coppicing or pollarding; it rejuvenates the growth from the cutting point and enables the plants to thrive for centuries.

A good cutting regime, however, is not to cut in the same place each year, but to allow the hedge to grow by a few more inches each year – this allows some old wood to develop to provide flowers and then fruit. Legally, hedge cutting can only take place between September and February but it is good to cut as late as possible to provide a food supply for birds, insects and mammals overwinter.

In Charlbury we'll be re-surveying our hedges so if you would like to help then please get in touch (01608 811057).-Some training will be provided in July by Wild Oxfordshire and paid for by Charlbury Town Council. If you would like to learn more about hedges in advance then please have a look at these excellent video links. Wild Oxfordshire provided a "Talking Hedges" series of four webinars www.wildoxfordshire.org.uk/communities/ hedgerow-webinar-series/. As part of the Charlbury Festival on Sunday 19 June I will be doing a heritage field walk along the old Woodstock Way to the Saltway. Please come and join me to find out more about our local landscape over the past 300 years; we meet at 11.15am on The Playing Close.

Probus Meeting - Being Lord Lieutenant of Oxfordshire Marjorie Glasgow

At the meeting of the Probus Club of Charlbury on Wednesday 6th April members and guests were given a fascinating insight into the work of a Lord Lieutenant by Marjorie Glasgow from Charlbury.

Marjorie is appointed by the Queen and performs her role at official functions, as one of 98 Lord Lieutenants in the UK decreed by Henry VIII, in a uniform, which is a result of its informal military connection. The role is a long term one rather than the annual one of High Sheriffs in their fancy uniforms. Marjorie substitutes for the Queen in Oxfordshire, performing functions locally that the Queen would perform at a national level in the recommended 'relentlessly agreeable manner'.

In her wide role, Marjorie is supported by 34 deputy lieutenants in Oxfordshire, who are drawn from a very varied range of backgrounds and professions, and she endeavours to widen the context of its functions well beyond Oxford City to encompass the varied and interesting county of Oxfordshire. Marjorie recently guided the Prince of Wales to visit to the Culham Science Centre in addition to an already planned visit to Harwell Science Centre and has also organised the visits of other royals, such as the Duke of Gloucester to a variety of locations in Oxfordshire. In the course of these visits, she has found herself moved by performing her role both with royal visitors, as well as by the wide range of members of the public that she has encountered.

One aspect of Marjorie's role as Lord Lieutenant is to encourage diversity and inclusion across the county, which is personally appropriate to her as a foreign -born woman. She encourages applications from appropriately deserving individuals for awards for voluntary service and enterprise. Marjorie emphasised her awareness of the importance and promotion of community,

and in general and specifically she mentioned strong local examples of this in the form of Charlbury Community Centre and The Corner House and also the only 'slightly edited Charlbury Website.' She spoke of how struck she was that so much of public life in the UK was non-political, in contrast to the situation in her native USA, and that this should not be taken for granted. This is a consequence of the UK being a constitutional monarchy.

In response to questions, Marjorie highlighted the push to recruit a younger and wider range of people to apply for the role of magistrates to better reflect the public demographic that they serve. She finds time to perform the long term role, which runs over a number of years, by taking control of her own schedule as Lord Lieutenant and integrating it into her numerous other activities and interests. In this, Marjorie is supported by the 'thoughtful doers' that are the Deputy Lieutenants.

It was stated that the role of Lord Lieutenant encapsulates the UK's unwritten constitution, and that in society many people give their time, talent and encouragement and in turn are rewarded by recognition and support.

Sustainable Charlbury is now running a grants programme recycling the surplus revenues from Southill into further low carbon projects within the community—a great example of a circular and regenerative local economy in action.

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Year-round countryside management with the Cotswold Wardens

While the winter months mean that there is less work on footpath clearance in our corner of the Cotswolds, the Voluntary Wardens have continued to improve footpath signage, with new and replacement way markers being installed. Larger projects over the past couple of months have included building a new footbridge.

We have also been very active in Centenary Wood, where ongoing woodland management tasks are being very well-received by those Charlbury residents who walk through the wood.

The growing number of dead-hedges is testament to our efforts to control the blackthorn and respond to ash die-back there, with dead-hedges now seen as being a preferable alternative to burning the waste.

Not only does this reduce carbon emissions to the atmosphere, but deadhedges provide new habitat for a whole range of wildlife. Timber from felled diseased trees is also being stacked rather than burnt as a way of sequestrating carbon.

Some of this timber has also been taken to the Wigwell Nature Reserve to be used in the new 'beaver dams', thereby supporting other community groups.

Fortunately not all our tree work has involved felling, and the Wardens have been helping with a large multi-year tree -planting project in Burford.

And whilst the Wardens' work parties are busy looking after the public rights of way, the walk leaders are planning and leading walks that make best use of the routes.

A new initiative, which has just begun, involves working with members of the Evenlode Catchment Partnership.

Members of the team will be joining some of our walks, giving us information about the wildlife and also showing how Thames Water is ensuring that floodwaters stay out of villages in the valley.

The first of these walks – from Bruern Farm shop – will have taken place before this Chronicle lands on the doormat, but there are others in the pipeline. One is timed for mid-June to coincide with the flowering of the meadow clary at Wigwell. There will be at least one from Stonesfield, and possibly another from Bruern Farm shop, using a different route.

Walks are being added all of the time so please keep checking the website www.cotswoldsaonb.org.uk, click on the 'Walking and Exploring' tab and then 'Guided Walks'. We look forward to you joining our walks, which are always informative.

A Days Life: Jason Biles, fitness instructor at the Community Centre

Many of us will know Jason from his work keeping us fit and active at the Community Centre. I wondered how he came to be working in the keep fit industry

I am Chipping Norton born and bred, and lived in Chippy for many years. I was an only child, but had a large extended family in the town, five aunts and three uncles! I went to Chipping Norton School at the time when the Spendlove School Charlbury was merged with it [Ed 1982]. So I know a lot of Charlbury faces, and we see lot of visitors to the Community Centre who used to live in Charlbury. I occasionally went to the Spendlove School before it closed, for matches and events. There used to be a swimming pool there, but I'm not sure exactly where it was. I get a different answer each time I ask!

Academically, I was a lazy student, I failed all my 'O' levels and so reluctantly I stayed on to sixth form to re-sit them all and eventually scraped five. I was mad about sport however, especially football. Football was my passion (I'm a Leeds fan if you're wondering). When I was 14, I was taken on as a schoolboy apprentice footballer with Oxford United, and stayed with them until I was 17. But I wasn't quite good enough to make it into the senior team, and I was released. It takes more than talent to become a first team player, and I didn't have enough dedication or focus to make it as a professional player. So in 1985 I took my five 'O' levels into RAF careers in St.Giles, Oxford and signed up as a Physical Training Instructor. I was stationed in Swinderby, Cosford (where I did my specialist training,) Brize Norton and Weston-on-the-Green where I finished my parachute training and later completed my coaching badges in football, rugby, badminton and squash.

When I left the Airforce I returned to Chippy and I took a job running a spa at a health farm near Burford. It gave me the chance to continue to study part-time

and I enrolled at Swindon College on a Diploma course in Health and Fitness Studies. After four years the health spa closed and I decided to buy all the gym equipment and start a gym of my own. My uncle, a mechanic who had trained at Rolls Royce, helped me modify and service the equipment and later that year I opened my own gym at the Regent Squash Club in Chipping Norton. I had ten very happy years there - I could walk to work each day - a great work-life balance, just a two minutes commute on foot.

During this time I married Karen, we had our two children, Jamie and Tess. I also went into partnership in another gym venture in Cheltenham, however three years into the venture we were served notice by the landlords on the property in Cheltenham and the Chipping Norton Squash Club was sold too in the same year. Although I remember feeling like this was a bitter 'double whammy' I had a seemingly bottomless pit of energy in those days and felt completely undeterred by the setbacks.

By the time both clubs had formally closed, I had already started a new gym (Aviators) at Oxford Airport, leasing one of the hangars. I employed sixteen fulltime staff and twelve self-employed contractors. Day to day, the job was about managing people, and I grew quickly as a manager. It was the biggest club I had ever owned and operated with significantly more responsibility and stress. While I was at Aviators I took a three-year part-time MBA course at Oxford Business School – and passed at the age of 40! The course was fabulous for me personally but also developing my business skills as a manager. I finally felt as if I had got the 'non-academic monkey' off my back. The 'Aviators' years were the happiest of my life but sadly 11 years on, the Airport was sold to new owners and I had to leave yet another wonderful gym behind.

Later while working at Heythrop Park Resort as the gym manager I saw a job in Charlbury advertised in 2017. I met the trustees, and found myself on Day 1 employed with Jenny Chambers as the feel as if my whole career has been one long apprenticeship leading up to this point. I teach a variety of classes to a wide range of ages: I carry out the inductions for use of the Community gym which is open every day of the week; Line Dancing classes twice a week; Toddler Gym and five exercise classes to suit all fitness abilities. My circuit classes at the centre are essentially the same classes I used to teach my recruits during my RAF days 35 years ago at Cosford. I love my job at the Community Centre, it creates much less pressure on me than running my own business did. Here I can do what I feel I am best at which is teaching. I have a lot of experience at managing people, but it's not what I am best at. I am passionate about teaching health and fitness, and I have never wanted to do anything else since the start of my career.

I take part in most of the classes I teach at the centre - it helps to keep the weight down! Throughout my 30's and 40's I played team squash, competed in triathlons and in 1992, I ran the London Marathon, which, (as anyone who has trained for a marathon will tell you), involves hours and hours of training, pounding the streets on your own, which I really enjoyed. This was quite a revelation to me because I'm a real people person. The one aspect of my job I love the most is meeting and being with people, vet I was surprised just how much I enjoyed the solitude of training for a marathon

Over the years, I feel so fortunate to have worked as a personal trainer with some fascinating people, from stage and screen and the music industry. I worked at Pinewood Studios one summer with actors during a three month long film shoot. It is a privilege when someone asks for your help or advice on health and fitness and then lets you into their world. Often you become close friends but it's important as a trainer that you are able to remain somewhat removed and grounded. For me it is all part and parcel of what keeps me feeling professional at what I do.

building neared completion. Sometimes I Do I do other sports? I haven't continued with team sports, and I have never coached a team at all. I am a fan of all team sports though. People can learn a lot about themselves through playing them. There is nothing like winning a trophy with your team, and I was fortunate to be part of such winning football teams as Chipping Norton Swifts, who I played for as a boy; Banbury United, playing for them as a teenager; and Oxford United Youth when I was a bit older. Not to mention all the finals I have been on the losing side for, but you do come to accept it's all good character building stuff in the long run.

> What else do I do? I love listening to music (I'm a music nerd) I have played in a band, and used to come to the Hothouse in Charlbury [Ed a much missed music venuel two to three times a year to listen to other bands. I now live in Little Tew with my partner and her children, and have become a keen gardener. I get a lot of pleasure from it, and am now trying to improve my compost by looking at the science of compost-making. I have three bays for the compost, water them and turn them over regularly. But it's still not right. Perhaps I've put in too much brown material?

Charlbury Garden Society

The Charlbury Garden Society, previously known as the Horticultural Society was certainly in existence before Queen Elizabeth II came to the throne. There are mentions of a flower show in August 1911 at Wychwood House and later in 1927 a flower show was held at Lee Place, together with a motor-cycle gymkhana and dance in the evening. Perhaps this is something we ought to reinstate.

So, although we won't be celebrating our 70th anniversary this year we thought it would be interesting to see how gardening trends have changed in the years that Queen Elizabeth II has been on the throne.

During the war and just afterwards, there was a huge rise in 'grow your own' for obvious reasons. Ornamental gardens were dug up in favour of vegetables. In the 50's there was a huge surge in growing roses and having formal rose beds. Although deemed too much work now (roses can be tricky customers) the rose remains the UK's most popular flower according to a poll a few years ago. David Austin has brought out a new rose this year to commemorate the Queen's Jubilee, aptly named 'Elizabeth'.



In the 60's it was all about using conifers and heathers and creating formal conifer beds. In the 70's the idea of using outdoor space as an extension of the home became popular. Crazy paving in pinks and yellows were in evidence everywhere.



In the 80's and continuing today, an interest in wildlife gardening took off. The 90's saw the rise of popularity of quick makeover programmes; who can forget Alan Titchmarsh and Charlie Dimmock in *Ground Force?* The new century saw popularity in naturalistic gardens, with Piet Oudolf of the Netherlands influencing designs.

As we move into the present time the emphasis is shifting more and more towards the environment and how, as gardeners, we can help protect it. Gardeners are now influenced by the problems of climate change, looking after the soil by adopting 'no-dig' principles, encouraging bees and butterflies and other insects to our gardens. The Garden Society talks this year have reflected this continuing interest with John Tyler talking to us over Zoom about gardening for wildlife this January and coming in November we continue the

theme when we have a talk about garden bugs by Dr Ian Bedford entitled 'Cohabit, Control or Conserve'.



We have been grateful for the support of members during these difficult two years—the popularity of our Zoom talks (and who would have thought we would all be able to manage those) means that we shall be continuing with a few Zoom talks in the future, as well as face to face meetings. It is always lovely to see people at our meetings and the Spring Show was especially popular and it was so good to see so many new (and dare I say it younger) exhibitors. Do check out our website

support of Ukraine where the sunflower is the national flower. For those of you who picked up seeds at the Spring Fair, there are classes including the tallest sunflower and for children, a posy of flowers that includes a sunflower. There are still some seeds available (see posters around the town) but you need to be quick if you want to sow them!

So, the Garden Society continues to evolve and flourish. We are proud to continue a tradition in the town that was in existence before the First World War. And we are ready for the next gardening trend!

Jubilee Celebration

A jubilee is a special anniversary of a significant event, in this case the accession of Queen Elizabeth in 1952. Around Charlbury we have various memorials to previous jubilees.

The most impressive is the fountain on the Playing Close, commemorating Queen Victoria's diamond jubilee in 1899, but there is also a jubilee bridge, jubilee gates to Nine Acres, a jubilee seat on the Playing Close - there may be others.

A jubilee is a time for enjoyment and this jubilee will be celebrated in Charlbury by barn dancing on the school field, a civic service in the parish church and a picnic on Nine Acres for the whole town.

Sharing communal events can become a celebration of friendship, of kindness and understanding, of giving rather than taking. What is extraordinary about jubilee celebration is that the idea comes from ancient Jewish law and could be 3000 years old.

The jubilee, as described in the book of Leviticus, occurred every 49 or 50 years and was announced by blowing a ram's horn – 'jubilee' comes from the Hebrew word for horn.

The jubilee was much more than a celebration of feasting and dancing. It was a year when people sold into slavery were to be freed and land which had been leased or sold to pay off debts was to be returned to the original owners. It was a year when debts were cancelled – in our terms, it was a year for 'levelling up'.

In this country the Jubilee Debt Campaign was set up at the Millennium to draw attention to the burden of debt carried by the world's poorest countries and to campaign for debt relief. Excessive debt repayments take away resources that are vital for coping with the health, social and economic crises resulting from climate change, the Covid pandemic and other disasters beyond the control of individuals or individual countries. Even during a war Ukraine is still expected to repay debts to banks and hedge funds.

Christian Aid, one of the organisations supporting the Jubilee Debt Campaign, is promoting a petition to the Chancellor, Rishi Sunak, to broker a more ambitious debt relief deal for the poorest countries.

At the same time churches are among organisations campaigning for more generous support for people in this country hit by the cost of living crisis and already struggling with debt. The level of private debt in the UK is 2-3 times higher than government debt, leading to social and economic insecurity for many people.

Communities rallied in an incredibly positive and proactive way when the pandemic began. In Charlbury representatives of community organisations and the churches joined to offer shopping and other practical services.

Cornerstone was set up by St Mary's Church to enable donation and sharing of food and other supplies. Such support systems and networks continue to be invaluable as people and communities face an insecure future but we need government action as well to reach everyone in need.

We have much to be thankful for in this country and we can take the opportunity of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee to show this. If we can look for ways to build a more generous and just society, offering hope to all people, then we really will have something to celebrate.

Welcome Back Fund

The Council received around £8,000 in funding from the Welcome Back Fund (a government post-Covid recovery package) which we have used to:

- repair, paint and stain 41 benches;
- install nine new picnic benches at Nine Acres and Ticknell Piece;
- repair and refurbish noticeboards at Enstone Road crossroads and Sturt Road;
- design of a new town map to be displayed at the top of Church Street.

Borrow the Council e-bike!

The Town Council's Journeys team has been promoting e-bikes as an alternative to cars for local journeys. The Journeys team has organised two successful e-bike try-out days in Charlbury, where residents could try riding different types of e-bikes and talk to e-bike owners. Some people have been convinced to buy their own electric bike after trying one for 5 or 10 minutes at our try-out events. Others have told us that they would welcome the opportunity to try using a bike for a longer period and on real journeys before making up their mind, especially given the significant cost involved. Evidence suggests that people buying electric bikes tend to use them more and more over time, as they discover how useful and enjoyable they are to ride.

Partly using funds from the Councillor Priority Fund (from County Cllr Liz Leffman) Charlbury Town Council has purchased its own e-bike which it is making available to residents to borrow for up to two weeks, upon payment of a deposit. The aim of the scheme is to reduce car use in the town by promoting

the uptake of electric bike ownership by:

- having a visible Charlbury shared ebike; and
- giving residents the opportunity to trial an e-bike in their everyday lives.

The e-bike is intended for use by residents of Charlbury or those who regularly travel to work in Charlbury. If you fancy borrowing it for two weeks (free of charge) then please fill in the contact form at https://charlbury-tc.gov.uk/borrow-the-council-e-bike/.

Hydro-turbine on Sluice at Mill Field

Part of the Town Council's mission involves seeking to produce clean, local and sustainable energy for the people of Charlbury. To that end, a site on councilowned land has been identified as a potential location for a Micro-Hydro installation. This project, if we get the funds to finance it, will utilise the existing Mill Race and Sluice Gate that diverts water from the River Evenlode to produce electricity using an Ultra-Low Head Micro-Hydro Turbine. The site is close to several places that could use the electricity, including potentially EV Charging points for community use.

The primary objectives of the project would be:

- to provide cost-effective low carbon energy to satisfy a local electrical demand; and
- to feed surplus electricity to the National Grid if required.

The Council has recently been given a £40,000 grant by the Rural Community Energy Fund to cover the costs of a detailed feasibility study into this proposed project. If the early parts of the feasibility study show potential, we will then engage with the residents of Charlbury to measure the level of support for this project before proceeding.

Grass-Cutting Management PlanIn the context of the climate and

biodiversity emergency declared by Charlbury Town Council, we have adopted a Grass-Cutting Management Plan. A change in the management of grassy areas within the town is arguably the simplest opportunity to directly reduce carbon emissions, sequester carbon and improve biodiversity.

Aims:

- To ensure that the management of land under the control of Charlbury Town Council is sensitive to wildlife as well as people.
- In the longer-term, management should reduce any adverse impact on the environment and enhance the rural experience for the people of Charlbury.

Objectives:

- To provide appropriate amenity to the public – have short grass for games, paths for dog walkers, wildflowers to enhance people's connection to the natural world.
- To reduce direct carbon emissions reduce the number of mechanised cuts, reduce the use of strimmers (damaging to slow-worms, hedgehogs, invertebrates), avoid the use of leaf blowers (damaging to invertebrates).
- To increase carbon sequestration into the soil – allow vegetation to grow for longer and increase the range of plants – deeper plant roots in turn increase carbon dioxide uptake.
- To provide wildflowers for pollinators local native flora is good for bees, hoverflies, etc.
- To provide year-round security of habitats for invertebrates – many butterflies and other invertebrates complete their life cycle and overwinter in amongst grassy vegetation so some areas need to be left uncut until the spring.

Thanks to everyone who spoke, exhibited and participated in the event.

The Oxfordshire Fair Deal Alliance has been in administration in Oxfordshire now for a year. We have just begun to implement our first budget. Among the measures that you will begin to see will be the further implementation of 20mph speed limits around the town and elsewhere in the county, as we start to roll this out. We are re-establishing the County Youth Service, building two new children's homes in the county so that children can be looked after closer to family and friends instead of out of county, investing in supported living for adults, and putting an additional £1.3 million into measures that will help us to tackle climate change. We have also successfully bid for money from the government for our Bus Service Improvement Plan,

One of the benefits of being Leader of the County Council is that I am a member of the North Cotswold Line Task Force. This has meant that recently I have been able to open up the discussion about doubling the line between Charlbury and Hanborough and I hope in the next few weeks that this will become part of the overall plan for the line. Up to now, the plan has always been to leave the single track between Charlbury and Hanborough alone and not to double it, but this means that we will always be stuck with one train an hour, while other stations further up the line will have two, and under the current plans, Hanborough will have four. This will only encourage people to drive to stations where there are more regular trains, so I am campaigning hard to make sure that this doesn't happen and will report back regularly on this.

The ban on HGVs on Burford bridge was recently lifted and the county is now going to look at a county wide strategy for HGV movements. There was a lot of concern expressed by some of the surrounding villages, in particular Leafield, because of the displacement of lorries and this was taken into account

when making the decision. As far as I am aware this did not affect Charlbury as the weight restriction discouraged lorries from coming this way. However it is time to consider HGV movements across the whole county rather than in the somewhat piecemeal way that this has previously been dealt with, and especially to ensure that they are banned from coming through Charlbury.

You may recently have seen that the Town Council has purchased an electric bike for people to borrow. I was very pleased to be able to help with the purchase of this bike through my Councillor Priority Fund, and I look forward not only to borrowing the bike myself, but to hearing how others get on with it.

I wish everyone a very good time over the Jubilee weekend and let's hope that the weather is on our side!

I hope to see and will work to ensure that Thames Water and the environment agency get their act together to ensure we have clean rivers and more robust infrastructure and investment to ensure our environment is protected and cherished. Whilst accepting this is a massive issue, we should not be daunted by the small steps we can all make including our farmers in the crops grown and the way they are grown. Indeed, we need to get behind sustainable initiatives that improve all our lifestyles with

sustainable transport and a balanced healthy outlook.

I wanted to take this opportunity to thank all the residents and community groups who have taken unbelievable initiatives to support the Ukrainian people by providing homes or accommodation and have given generously to provide the kind of wraparound support we would give to our own families and friends. This spirit shown by many in Charlbury fills me with a sense of pride that I, as one of your district councillors, represent people who care and show a compassion and a clear understanding of what it means when we say humanitarian support. (I will spare the government for my criticism of their lack of real leadership and drive in this area, so as not to spoil the focus of my and Liz Leffman's gratitude)

The end of an era is fast approaching with the Queen's incredible journey and celebrations and whatever the changes that come with that may I wish you all a positive and engaging future.

MORE THAN POMP AND PAGEANTRY



In June 2021, an announcement from 10 Downing Street cheered, intrigued or surprised many Charlbury people. That announcement was that one of our community—a woman with a very British sounding name—had been appointed to one of the most historic posts in the country.

So who is that woman and what is the historic office? Marjorie Glasgow is unknown by many of us but is certainly known by others as having been a driving force behind the successful £2.5 million Charlbury Community Centre project.

California-raised Marjorie moved to England with a Stanford University degree in Journalism and Economics, husband Dine, two children, and a new business venture. They relocated to Charlbury permanently after living here part-time starting in 1999 . Their business, The Ridge Group, specialises in renewable energy and related community partnerships.

Over the past 18 years Margie, as she is widely known in Charlbury, has been active in many aspects of local life, including St Mary's Parish Church, formerly chairing the Thomas Gifford Trust (through which post she helped bring the Community Centre project to fruition) and Meals on Wheels. More

recently she, her husband Dine and others at St Mary's started the greatly appreciated Cornerstone project. She is also a member of the Council of Governors of the Ditchley Foundation.

The historic office is that of Lord-Lieutenant, a post established during the reign of King Henry VIII. The purpose then being partial reorganization of local government and taking over the military duties of the Sheriff who had controlled the militia and the forces of the Crown. When the military responsibilities passed to the Secretary of State for War in 1871, the post of Lord-Lieutenant largely took on a ceremonial nature and the incumbent became the Sovereign's representative in the county. Today the appointment is made by the Queen, upon the recommendation of the Prime Minister.

Every county in the United Kingdom has a Lieutenancy headed by a Lord-Lieutenant.

Mrs. Glasgow heads a team comprising a Vice Lieutenant and thirty-four Deputy Lieutenants, collectively known as the Oxfordshire Lieutenancy. She joined the team as a deputy lieutenant in 2019 and was appointed to the 'top job' in 2021. She is the first woman to hold the Oxfordshire Lieutenancy and one of only two non-British born holders of the post. Her dual U.S./U.K. nationality made her eligible for the job. Her commitment to the community made her suitable for the role. Although appointment comes following recommendation from the Prime Minister, the post is non-political and is an unpaid honorary position relinguished on reaching the age of 75.

Margie's appointment was confirmed by Letters Patent. There was no ceremonial investiture. As Margie says, "I just woke up on October 1st, 2021, and was the new Lord-Lieutenant for Oxfordshire". Margie and Dine spent a long weekend at Windsor Castle in March as guests of the Dean of Windsor where, with other new and serving Lord-Lieutenants, she was instructed on her role and given other

important information.

The office comes with a uniform of navyblue jacket and trousers, both having scarlet trim. A scarlet band on the peak cap carries a badge depicting a Tudor Rose surmounted by a crown. Buttons, shoulder boards (often called epaulettes) and all other detailing are in silver. A silver belt is also worn and a sword completes the outfit. The uniform is tailored by Kashket and Partners with buttons, badges and detailing by Firmin and Sons.

Margie is the 30th holder of the post and the 7th during the Queen's reign. She follows in the footsteps of Edward Hyde, 1st Earl of Clarendon, of Cornbury Park and Edward Lee, 1st Earl of Lichfield, of Ditchley Park, as well as six dukes of Marlborough.

A Lord-Lieutenant's first and foremost duty is to uphold the dignity of the Crown. She is responsible for arranging royal visits, greeting and attending upon royal visitors and Heads of State when visiting the county and escorting them throughout. Duties also include presentation of medals and awards on behalf of the sovereign, such as the British Empire Medal, the Queen's Award for Enterprise (in Innovation, International Trade or Sustainable Development) and the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service.

Seeking to promote a spirit of cooperation by encouragement of voluntary services and benevolent organisations, taking an interest in the business, industrial and social life of Oxfordshire and various voluntary activities within the county is also of utmost importance. "When I was asked to take on the role, my main question was what difference could I make?" Margie commented, adding "I have learned that, with the diverse group of Deputy Lieutenants, we have the opportunity to connect and encourage the 'Thoughtful Doers' across Oxfordshire. There are so many good works being done in our county - if we can strengthen the doers and help replicate their projects, our communities will become stronger and people will feel better connected".

Close ties with the military in the county are maintained, as they are with the cadet forces at six schools across Oxfordshire. From those six cadet forces, four young people are selected as 'Lord-Lieutenant's Cadet' for a year and one of them will always accompany the Lord-Lieutenant.

The Lord-Lieutenant is chair of the County Advisory Committee, responsible for recommendations to the Lord Chancellor and Lord Chief Justice for the position of magistrate in Oxfordshire.

With the Queen undertaking fewer public engagements during recent months, Margie has not met Her Majesty during this period in office. She has met her on another occasion however, most memorably as a guest of the Royal Overseas League at St James Palace in 2010. Of this meeting, Margie commented: "As I waited to be presented to The Queen, I noticed how each person she met seemed to capture her entire attention. When I was introduced to Her Majesty, I was struck by how deeply she looked at me. As I look back, I think about how many people she has met over the years and have wondered if most have had a similar experience".

The United Kingdom is known around the world for its monarchy and the pageantry associated with it. While state visits and national royal events are timed to the second, with rehearsal after rehearsal, local royal official visits have a little less rigidity in the timetable. There is, though, still a need for a great deal of planning with regards to protocol and etiquette. Flexibility is also essential as the best laid plans can be thrown into guestion - not least due to the royal visitor showing more interest in a subject or individual than planned. Witness the visit of the Princess Royal to Charlbury in September 2006. The princess, when touring Charlbury Museum, had seen the displays of the varied work of the late Vic Brackenbury and, on learning that Vic was amongst the crowd waiting in Market

Street to see her, insisted that she meet him. Those extra fifteen minutes spent in the museum and then out in the road speaking to Vic, prompted a lot of anxious glances at the wrist watches of those responsible for the smooth running of the remainder of the day which was to be spent elsewhere in the county.

The Lord Lieutenant's involvement was required earlier this year when the Duchess of Cornwall visited the University of Oxford. One aspect of the day was surely of personal interest to Margie when, at the Weston Library, the Duchess viewed the Sheldon tapestry map of Oxfordshire, one of a series of four and dating from the 1590s. HRH was shown the map by Charlbury resident Nick Millea, the Bodleian Library's Map Curator. How interesting that Margie, the holder of this 430 year old office should be able to see a 430 year old tapestry map of 'her county' and that two Charlburians played such important roles in the royal visit.

The following month also required the attention of the Lord-Lieutenant when the Prince of Wales visited the south of the county on a scientific tour of the Culham and Harwell sites. Shortly thereafter, Margie accompanied the Princess Royal at the Watchfield Primary

school which is next to the Shrivenham military academy. The current group of students at Watchfield Primary speak 36 different primary languages with English as a second language.

Like all other royal visits these three occasions followed a series of meetings; face to face, virtual and telephonic, to ensure that every detail of the day's programme was considered and honed. Rather like a swan gliding, seemingly effortlessly, without the observer being able to see everything needed to make the whole operation so serene and smooth running.

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


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
