

Charlbury Street Fair, 17th September, 2022

SUCCESS LAST YEAR—MORE TO FOLLOW!

After our COVID-19 induced pause, Charlbury Street Fair in 2021 was a roaring success, a beautiful day with lots of happy faces! Our revised format brought more music and use of the Medical Centre car park (thanks to the Charlbury Medical Centre) and Sea Shanties, all of which attracted many positive comments. This year already we have had a great Quiz Night and, with Charlbury Garden Society, a stunning fundraiser with Open Gardens.

On the Fair, we are ramping up our final arrangements. This year again we have Sea Shanties from the Charlbury and Finstock Morris Men and more live music around the centre of town. The day will start with the Fancy Dress Competition and Parade, and please come and see the Children's Art Competition, Morris dancing, Classic Cars and take part in Dancing in the Street in the evening. Do please come and join in the fun!

Activities start with the Egg Throwing competition on Friday evening, in association with Riverside. We will have a Prize Draw and a 'silent auction', stalls in Church Street, the return of Scouts' Climbing Wall, Hatwell's Fun Fair, a Puppet Show with Noddy, Big Ears and the Goblins, and Go-karts.

All of the funds raised on the day of the Fair go to the upkeep of the Corner House and Memorial Hall.

On Yer Bike – or Scooter! 10 September - a good day out for all the family

The annual Ride and Stride & Children's Bike Rally

On Saturday 10 September the roads of Oxfordshire will see hundreds of cyclists and walkers taking part in OHCT's annual sponsored Ride and Stride. Whatever the weather they visit as many churches as they can to raise money to help maintain Oxfordshire's churches of all denominations.

It is not just a good way of raising money for a very good cause; it is also good exercise and good fun for all the family. You set your own target, and, just when you think your lungs cannot cope with any more, you reach another church offering refreshments, encouragement and an excuse to stop and have a look round.

You do not have to be a churchgoer to take part and enjoy a really good day out. You can sign up at ohct.org.uk/ride-stride/ and start getting sponsorship online. There are also sign-up and sponsorship forms in each of Charlbury's churches.

But here in Charlbury we are also doing lots more! The Town Council is organising the sixth great kids' bike rally round the five churches of Charlbury. Individual children start at short intervals any time between 11.45 and 12.45. Some forty children took part last year and enjoyed it enormously raising money for the Charlbury School Association as well as for OHCT. This year will be an added attraction for older children. There will be a Ten Mile Challenge, an additional route round Ditchley Park.

Parents should sign their children in from 11.30am at St Mary's showing that they have created a fundraising page for their child (via ohct.org.uk) or making a suggested minimum donation of £5 per child. More details on ohct.org.uk and charlbury.info.

The rally finishes up on the school playing field on Wychwood Paddocks where the Windrush Bike Project is organising a Bike Gymkhana for the rally children to show off their biking skills.

The Windrush Bike Project and the Town Council's Journeys Group are also organising a BikeFest there with an opportunity for adults to try out some ebikes. The Windrush Bike Project's bike doctor will also be on hand throughout the day offering free bike checks and minor repairs. (Slots for the bike checks and e-bike trials should be booked via http://windrushbikeproject.uk/)

Immediately after the Rally, weather and Covid permitting, the Charlbury School Association invites anyone (with or without children taking part in the Rally) to bring a picnic lunch and set up (suitably distanced) round the central area of the school playing field.

We need help to organise this Charlbury event and marshals to help with the traffic at the various crossroads on the children's route. The marshals will only be on duty from 11.30 to 1pm that morning. Charlbury Garden Society

There has been a great deal of activity in the society over the Spring and early Summer. The last three months has included a return of many events. Short reports from some of our new and energetic team are below which showcase just some of the society's recent activities.

Catherine Goyder—Events Coordinator

The Open Gardens, held on June 19th was a hugely enjoyable Charlbury occasion. The Garden Society arranged a tour of 12 gardens, including the colourfully planted museum garden and the tranquil spaces of the Baptist Church garden and the Friends Meeting House garden. These three gardens, together with the Corner House garden are open to the public to enjoy at any time. 9 varied private gardens provided settings for local sculpture organised by the Art Society as part of their Festival.

The Street Fair provided teas in the Hall where the school choir sang and the Morris Dancers kept punters and Garden Society volunteers selling our beautifully designed programmes entertained. £2,581.74 was raised for the upkeep of the Corner House and the Memorial Hall which the Street Fair treasurer says is unprecedented!

Following Craig Blackwell's popular talk on Wild Flowers in the Cotswolds last March he led a walk for 12 members on July 2nd through the species rich limestone grasslands of Glyme Farm with the source of the river Glyme and along some green lanes to the conserved landscape of Over Norton Park. Despite starting in heavy rain we had a totally fascinating time, along footpaths that were new to most of us and learnt a huge amount about ecology and conservation.

Then on a hot early evening on July 7th,

20 of us toured the beautiful wild flower meadows and gardens of the Gray House in Chadlington with the gardener Rick and Emma Mills and Christine Elliot from the Kitchen Garden Project at Farm Ed. The Project began in the walled garden where artichokes are now grown with strawberries available from the greenhouse and asparagus in May and June.

We are planning another self-drive visit to the gardens at Rousham in early September so keep an eye on our website and the newsletter for dates. At the time of writing September 8th is the planned date.

Our membership is strong as in previous years, with 255 members to date, made up of roughly equal numbers of single members and joint members. And 50 new members for 2022!

As we reach August, the hard work of sowing, planting and nurturing throughout spring and early summer is reaping its rewards. Trips to the allotment at the moment are rewarded with everything from beetroot to beans, salad to squash and, of course, a glut of courgettes! This year, the allotments are full of flowers with dahlias, cosmos and salvias in amongst the classic sunflowers and sweet peas.

With the recent extreme heat and lack of rainfall, growers have been watering systematically to limit stress to plants. This is a contrast to last year, when conditions were unusually wet and cool, and early tomato blight took hold of many crops. As always, we take pleasure in what we can grow and learn from what Mother Nature throws at us.

We were very relieved to be able to reinstate the Annual Plant Sale this May, after the pandemic forced us to put it on hold for two years. We were able to offer a wide variety of plants sourced from a local nursery, as well as plants grown by some of our members.

Money raised from events such as these help us to support local garden initiatives such as the Eco project at the Primary School and maintenance of the new border at the Corner House.

The Spring Show reinstated after three years saw a hall full of daffodils, tulips and other Spring flowers. It was again held in conjunction with the Art Society's Spring Show.

It was a delightful afternoon and included a stunning flower arrangement which won the Best in Show.

In early September we are looking forward to the return of the main Annual Flower and Vegetable Show which includes cookery as well as Craft classes.

All Together In Charlbury - a local helping hand

Support with cost-of-living increases

Conscious that we are all currently experiencing significant price increases which are likely to continue for some time, ATIC, Cornerstone and the Town Council have been gathering together some useful information, which we hope will interest anyone wondering how to try to manage increasing pressures on their finances.

There are currently leaflets on the following:

- Sources of help and advice on a range of cost-of-living issues, including help if you are struggling to pay bills
- Sources of debt advice
- Eligibility for benefits check for people over pension age produced by AgeUK
- Government cost-of-living grants –
 what they are, who will be receiving
 them and when If one or more of
 these grants applies to you, the
 money will usually be paid
 automatically and it does not need to
 be paid back.

We hope we will all be able to benefit from practical hints and tips and suggestions of sources of information and advice and other support.

There will be a dedicated noticeboard and a display stand of leaflets at the Cornerstone project, which is based in the Corner House in Market Street opposite the "Rose and Crown" in the centre of town and is open from 10.00am to 1.00pm. Monday to Saturday. Pop in and have a look when you are next in town.

There will also be information on the *charlbury.info* website (go to the ATIC page in the Community section – Charity and World where you can get copies of the leaflets mentioned above) and also on the Town Council website: *www.charlbury-tc.gov.uk* – look at Community information – Cost-of-living support.

We hope that town residents who have useful ideas and suggestions will be able to share these by emailing information to us at <code>cornerstone@charlburychurch.uk</code> or <code>charlburyalltogether@gmail.com</code>, so that we can use these to help each other. If you have any questions, email them to these addresses.

A Major Milestone for CRAG

Charlbury Refugee Action Group (CRAG) is a group of local people who raise funds for the benefit of refugees. We also raise awareness about refugees and about the difficulties faced by asylum seekers and refugees in this country and abroad.

Thanks to the incredible generosity of our supporters in Charlbury and beyond, we have so far raised over £100,000 and been able to help refugees facing appalling conditions in France, Greece, Afghanistan and Lebanon as well as supporting Asylum Welcome in Oxford, and those fleeing from wars in Syria and Ukraine. We have also organised collections of clothes, tents, bedding and hygiene items, arranged talks about refugee issues, held fundraising social events and set up an information hub for hosts and volunteers to welcome our Ukranian guests.

Vital funds have been raised through online and 'real life' concerts; pop-up cafés during Art Weeks; bring-and-buy, car boot, and garage sales; second-hand book sales, cookery demonstrations; quizzes and cabaret evenings; an Art Fair; a Ceilidh; Christmas appeals; sponsored New Year challenges; publishing and selling booklets of our recipes, and making and selling industrial quantities of cake and thousands of cups of tea!

Reaching this major milestone, we are enormously grateful to all the individuals and groups who have raised and donated funds and supported us in many different ways, including Charlbury Friends, Charlbury Cricket Club, the CSA, the Charlbury artists, Louise Littledale, Usborne Publishing, St Mary's Church, Charlbury Methodists, Charlbury Baptists, John Partington and the Corner House Bookshop, Cotswold Frames and all the world-class musicians who have volunteered their time and extraordinary

talents at our Sunday Tea Concerts.

Sadly, the need to help refugees both in the UK and the rest of Europe is ever greater, so this autumn we have another exciting programme of fundraising concerts planned for Sunday afternoons in the Memorial Hall. On **October 16**th we welcome classical oboist James Eastway and friends. Pianist Margaret Fingerhut returns with violinist Bradley Creswick on **November 6**th, and we round off the year with the wonderful Somerville College Choir returning on **December 4th** with an unmissable festive concert.

We are able to offer a season ticket for all the concerts again, and don't forget that tea and a slice of one of our amazing cakes is once again included in the ticket price!

The Corner House and Memorial Hall – the baton changes hands

After what seems to have been a terribly long time, the hand-over of responsibility for looking after The Corner House and the Memorial Hall from the previous management committee to the newly established trustee board finally took place in mid-July. And, of course, as far as everyone who uses the buildings' facilities is concerned, the changeover actually means no change at all. The facilities are there, waiting to be used, with the new on-line booking system working well.

With peoples' focus often on the iconic Corner House, it can be easy to overlook the Memorial Hall and everything that it has to offer. In fact, over the past couple of years – taking advantage of the dropoff in bookings during and since the lockdowns – the management committee has spent over £20,000 on giving the Memorial Hall a make-over.

The last jobs to complete the project were being done at the end of July, when the decorators who had earlier given the inside a new coat of paint came back to finish off the outside walls and window-frames.

What we have now is a community hall that is as good as, if not better than, any other in the district. Both the main hall and the Green Room behind it are equipped with current-standard projection equipment for talks, meetings and presentations.

The Garden Room provides a comfortable venue for less formal occasions, and the fully equipped kitchen is used week-in, week-out by both the Day Centre and Meals-on-Wheels.

By the time you are reading this, the kitchen will also have had a professional make-over, to make sure that it is

completely up to scratch in terms of health and safety.

Over the past couple of months, the Memorial Hall has been used for activities such as pilates, martial arts and judo. The toddler and poetry groups, the WI and the town council are all regular users, while the hall was also an important venue for events during the Charlbury Festival. Bring or Take returned after being thwarted by lockdowns, and there have been several occasions where the hall has been used for children's parties and other large-scale private events.

All-in-all, the Memorial Hall can provide a comfortable venue for everyone, from small groups who need just the Green Room or the Garden Room, right up to large-scale events that take over the whole building – and the garden too. And it's important to remember that the garden around the hall and behind The Corner House is available to anyone who wants to make use of it: for meetings, for music, or just as a quiet spot in the centre of town.

The buildings and the garden are for you to use – so please do so.

Most of you will be aware that your town has a fire station. But what do you know about it and the team of firefighters that work there?

Your fire station is crewed by "On Call Firefighters". This means that they all have primary employment and also commit to providing cover for Oxfordshire Fire and Rescue Service, either when working in their primary job or when they are at home in the evenings and weekends.

It is a big commitment from the team, who all have busy family lives and a 'day job'. However, the rewards are great. In that they do get paid and the job satisfaction from helping others in difficult situations is second to none.

The station attends many different types of incidents. Fires, car crashes, floodings, dealing with chemical spills and assisting other agencies, such as South-Central Ambulance and Thames Valley Police.

To be ready for the incidents, the crew attend training courses throughout the year and every Wednesday evening, practice different skills at the fire station.

You may also see the crew around the area at various events. Where they are there to give out safety advice and let everyone have a look around the fire engine and see all the equipment they use.

The crew is currently made up of Caspar Morris, who is our Watch Manager.

We have two Crew Managers, Lee Harbord and Paul Mumford.

The rest of the crew is made up of Bob Cross, Dale Norris, Chris Edeson, John Goldsmith, Jack Millard and our newest member, Harry Bradbury.

Recently firefighters that had served over five years, were presented with the Queens Platinum Jubilee Medal by our Chief Fire Officer, Rob MacDougal. To commemorate the Jubilee and thank them for their service to the community.

Charlbury Fire Station has a proud



A Life: Jennifer Bartlett (1935-2020): Museum enthusiast, Peace Group member, artist, and friend of many

Many people remember Jennifer with great fondness- she was an artist, opening her studios for all to see her work, a stalwart of Charlbury Museum, a help with various Charlbury organisations, and a good friend to many. Here we share a few of our memories of her life.

Jennifer was Charlbury born and bred, one of the four children of Helen and Sidney Price. Helen taught domestic science at Charlbury School, and Sidney ran Brice and Price, the garage at the top of Dyers Hill. Jennifer always showed artistic talent, and after school in Charlbury and Chipping Norton, went to the Whitelands Teacher Training College to study to be a secondary school teacher, with art as her main subject. She married Fred Bartlett at St Mary's in 1957, and they lived and raised their family, in a number of places -London, Doncaster, Nottingham and eventually Leicester -where Jennifer taught.

The Museum and shoes

Jennifer came back to live in Charlbury in 1981 when she inherited her Aunt Alma's shoe shop in Sheep Street. She kept the shop open for several years, but in the end gave it up.

This is the start of her long involvement with Charlbury Museum, giving it her grandfather Henry Price's shoe-making tools, notebooks, and boots. Jennifer herself wrote in an article "I remember being shown Aunt Lizzie's shoes when I was quite small, by Uncle Chris and Auntie Alma in their shoe shop in Sheep Street.

My Grandfather, Henry Price made the tiny leather shoes, embellished with a velvet rosette and pearl button, for his first child Elizabeth Jane in 1880-81. Recently married, Henry and Edith moved to Myrtle Cottage, Church Street in 1879; his shoe-making workshop was at the front of the cottage, the back

room was my Grandmother's sitting room. Myrtle Cottage was home to their nine children, my father Sidney was their youngest child."

She donated a large number of items to the Museum from her uncle's shoe shop, from her parents' garage, from Gothic House including Bessie Marchant's typewriter, and domestic items, books and toys from her own home.

She was always helpful in lending items to the different exhibitions in the museum. Sue R remembers-"a favourite of mine is the pair of rubber miniature boots for lambs' feet manufactured by Dunlop to protect against foot rot – a fairly rare item. Jennifer told me that Aunt Alma used to keep them on her counter to amuse the younger visitors to the shop". Working with Jennifer "rekindled my love of historical research and started a passion for Charlbury's past"

Janet remembers "Jennifer introduced the system of stewards welcoming visitors to the museum. No task was too small or too large for her, from cleaning items in the Mini-Museum, to advising on the restoration of the wagon. She worked closely with Ann Gilbert, another

artist and museum enthusiast, and with the curator Ron Prew, all three worked hard for the Museum. And we all remember Jennifer's delicious scones which were always a best seller at the Museum's coffee mornings!

Her legacy lives on in the Charlbury museum and we are fortunate to have historic Charlbury items which she has donated. We miss her".

The Peace Group

Charlbury Peace Group was already going by the early 1980s, and Jennifer was an active member from its earliest days. Sue S remembers 'taking a specially chartered train to an anti-Trident demonstration with Jenny and her youngest son Simon along with other Peace Group members in 1984. We left Oxford station at the crack of dawn for Barrow-in-Furness'. Liz remembers that "one year we organised a Peace Fair in the Corner House. It was very ambitious, with refreshments, lunch, a Civil Defence type of 'shelter' that we rigged up for younger people to clamber into, a small exhibition, and at the end of the day, the symbolic releasing of balloons" The group regularly ran a stall at Street Fair, organised petitions, and in late 2003, set up daily vigils in the centre of the town in opposition to the war in Iraa.

Once a year, Liz and Anna remember, "we made the 'Hiroshima flowers', every August. We met, usually in Jennifer's workshop, to arrange five vases of flowers, mainly green and white, using as much as possible from our own gardens. Jennifer designed and made the little wooden doves for each vase, with 'Remember Hiroshima' printed on". The flowers were put outside the five Charlbury churches, on the Saturday before Hiroshima Day, which is 6th August. Gradually this activity faded away and the pandemic has ended it now.

Jennifer supported the cause of peace all her life: her gentle manner and her strong ethics helped to define who she was.

A talented artist



Jennifer was a print maker, and converted an outhouse in her garden into her studio. She made her collagraphs on a converted manale before. much later, obtaining a more modern press. Di remembers: "we both set up our studios in 1993 or 94. Oxfordshire Art Weeks was verv Oxford based then, and there were no artists showing in Charlbury in

1995.

So we went round the Oxford studios, and in 1996 we decided to open our studios here for Art Weeks, By 2000, there were 7 of us exhibiting. It was initially very studio based, but nowadays, people exhibit in churches, village halls and so on, which is good". Charlbury is now well known for the amount of work shown during the Art Weeks. Jennifer belonged to the Printmakers Cooperative in Oxford, and had exhibitions locally and further afield. She was inspired by standing stones, Africa (from her visits there to see one of her sons and family), plants and the natural world around her.

Friendship

We all have many memories of her friendship and kindness. Here are just a very few. Vi remembers Jennifer as her first friend in Charlbury "she persuaded me to help dust the objects in the museum, and I stewarded many times since then.

She was so easy to talk to, and would share her wide knowledge of wild flowers as we went on our walks. Thanks to her, I got to know more people in Charlbury".

Barbara has fond memories of outings with Jennifer and Ann Gilbert: "walking gingerly along the clapper bridge between the two Eastleachs, visiting Waterperry gardens and its museum, and more. A special treat was a visit we made, with my daughter Kate, to the New Look exhibition at the V&A in 2007. I still remember all four of us watching a video of a model being tightly laced into a 'waspie.' We shuddered, remembering such things. Kate was horrified".

Sue R remembers that having tea with Jennifer "was always a treat. She would bring out her Chastleton china tea set, inherited from her Auntie Alma; it had belonged to her Great Aunt Lizzie who had worked at Chastleton House.

I was always inspired by her stories of growing up in Charlbury, her early childhood memories of Bessie Marchant, who lived at Gothic House and so on." And Di described her as "a deep friend. We collaborated together for many years"

And more

Jennifer was a volunteer with Meals on Wheels for many years. She became President of the Charlbury Society in 1997, and was very protective of the Charlbury of her youth. She had a deep knowledge of the town and its people, and a wealth of anecdotes from her childhood.

She kept in touch with her old college friends and ex pupils from Leicester, and was very keen to encourage young people. She continued her own education, undertaking a lot of different courses at Continuing Education in Oxford. She was able to absorb information and use it to be such an interesting and informative person.

"And she made the best meringues in Charlbury"

A community workshop: come along and get involved!

A couple of months ago, a working group was formed to take forward the idea of having a community workshop for Charlbury.

Although in it's early days yet, the current concept is to have it in two specially adapted shipping containers situated at the end of the Community Centre (nearest to the surgery).

The Cotswold Voluntary Wardens: hands-on and professional

Each time you go for a walk on our local footpaths, the chances are that you will see the little round discs with arrows on, showing where the path goes or where there is a change of direction. Who puts them up? Or when you go through a kissing gate, or across a footbridge over a brook – who installed them and makes sure that they stay safe to use? And what about those patches of nettles and brambles that seem to grow just where the footpath runs? Someone cuts them back to keep the footpath clear; but who?

The answer is, of course, the Cotswold Voluntary Wardens. Set up as long ago as 1968, the Wardens today have around 400 members who regularly go out in groups all across the Cotswolds to look after the countryside so that people can enjoy it to the full.

Run under the umbrella of the Cotswold Conservation Board – which has its headquarters (and a pretty good teashop) in Northleach – the Wardens are here to do what needs to be done.

And what many people don't realise is that there is more to being a Warden than just wielding a brushcutter or being able to fix a piece of fencing.

For a start, all of the Wardens (and right now there are around 25 active Wardens who cover this area of the Cotswolds) have to have regular First Aid training, as well as training to be able to use specific types of machinery – such as those brushcutters – safely and in line with current regulations.

Each job is carefully planned in advance, with proper risk assessments to make sure that the people available that day are up to the tasks involved, whether it's clearing nettles or building a bridge. And the teams who go out on site, with a work party leader in charge, are fully insured as well, for their own security as well as that of the general public.

So, what have we been doing around here over the past couple of months?

Keeping footpaths clear is the easy answer, but there's been more to it than that.

We have given the old sheep washes – an often-missed part of our landscape – at Ascott and Milton their annual 'haircut', and we got the Foxburrow Wood site trimmed and ready for this year's Wychwood Forest Fair at the end of July.

Maybe we saw you there!

Churches Together in Charlbury

The churches in Charlbury are facing a period of change. The Revd. Sally Welch has left St Mary's and All Saints, Shorthampton, to take up a new post as a Canon at Christ Church Cathedral in Oxford. At the same time the Revd. Rose Westwood has moved from being Superintendent of the Witney Methodist Circuit, where she was also the Minister of Charlbury Methodist Church, to a new ministry in Cambridge. And Churches Together in Charlbury is losing Louise Littledale from St Teresa's who has been in the chair for the past three years, all through the pandemic. Louise is moving to be near her family in Bristol and we will miss her very much.

We also have to adapt to changes in the way church buildings are used. The parish church now regularly provides space for art exhibitions and concerts. There are plans for new kitchen and toilet facilities making hosting such events easier and more accessible for people with disabilities.

Grass cutting

Grass cutting has been a hot topic recently. The responsibilities are complex, with different areas cut by the County Council, West Oxon District Council, Housing Associations, the Town Council and private residents.

The Town Council is switching towards more nature-friendly mowing patterns to encourage wildflowers and insects, but this doesn't mean not mowing at all. You can read our agreed mowing policy here: https://charlbury-tc.gov.uk/land-and-nature-team/.

The County Council has stopped mowing some of the grassed areas which it owns and which it used to mow – for example at Five Ways – and the Town Council is working to resolve this situation. At Ticknell Piece Road, where West Oxon District Council has had responsibility for mowing, an agreed cut in March/April did not take place, so the grass grew longer. This has led to discussion with residents on how grass areas there could be managed, reflecting all views.

There are other areas such as the Green, where ownership of grassed areas, and responsibility for their mowing, is unclear. Nevertheless, following complaints about mowing there, we are going to meet residents to investigate what mowing can be arranged.

Street Fair 17th September

The council will have stalls at this year's Street Fair. Please come and say hello, meet some of your councillors and tell us what you'd like to see us do for – or with – you. There'll also be information about an upcoming consultation into traffic improvements for the town.

Town Cllr James Styring welcoming the Countess of Wessex during her visit to the



town on 17th May, on behalf of the Town Council and the people of Charlbury. The royal visit was organised by the Lord Lieutenant of Oxfordshire, Marjorie Glasgow, to mark the contributions made to the local community by volunteers during the pandemic.

E-bike The Town Council has been promoting e-bikes as an alternative to cars for local journeys. Evidence suggests that people buying electric bikes tend to use them more and more over time, as they discover how useful and enjoyable they are to ride, and the Town Council's e -bike is designed to act as a taster for people thinking of going electric and we now have an e-bike you can borrow if you live or work in Charlbury. If you fancy borrowing the e-bike for up to two weeks (free of charge) then please fill in the contact form at https://charlburytc.gov.uk/borrow-the-council-e-bike/. Bookings are now being taken for September and into the autumn.

Grants for the Financial Year 2023-24

Each year the Town Council makes grants to local organisations for the benefit of the community. If your organisation may need a grant for the financial year 2023–24, you can complete an application form at https://charlbury-tc.gov.uk/apply-for-

a-grant/ or ask the Town Clerk for a hard copy. Applications, along with supporting documents, must be received by midday on 31st October 2022. Late applications cannot be considered. The Clerk can advise on what can, and cannot, be grantaided under the Local Government Act.

The Bell

We know people are concerned about the Bell, which has now been empty for some eighteen months. Its owners, Greene King, say they are in the process of finding new tenants and we believe that some refurbishment work is planned. To protect the pub's future, the Town Council has had The Bell listed as an 'Asset of Community Value' (ACV), meaning that if it were put on the market, the local community would be able to put together a bid to buy the premises to keep it in use as a pub. An ACV would also give some protection in planning terms.

Teaching Ukrainians in Charlbury

Town Councillors Claire Wilding and James Styring are running a programme to teach English to local Ukrainian refugees. We currently run seven classes in Charlbury and three over in Icomb, near Stow-onthe-Wold. We teach around 20 students with a team of 14 volunteer teachers. One of the biggest needs of Ukrainians when they arrive in the UK is to improve their English. Our students' English has improved quickly since we started this programme in May. We are very grateful to Charlbury Baptist Church for allowing us free and very frequent access to their church hall at the top of Dyers Hill and also to Charlbury Refugee Action Group (CRAG) for helping us get started and providing us with hundreds of pounds worth of teaching materials.

Traffic Survey

Almost a year ago a team of 30 volunteers collected traffic data at different times of the day, over two sessions a couple of weeks apart (in term time and during the summer holidays) to gauge the volumes and directions of traffic that is passing through Charlbury every day. Richard Fairhurst has processed the many thousands of data

points that we collected and has produced a report which you can read at https://charlbury-tc.gov.uk/journeys-team/. The data showed that the majority of vehicles driving were travelling from Witney to Enstone and back again in the afternoon, but the flow is heavy all day. Traffic flow to and from Spelsbury (in other words, Chipping Norton to Witney) is the second largest flow and there's also significant flow towards Woodstock in the mornings and back again in the afternoons, which is traffic mainly originating in Charlbury.

As would be expected, town centre traffic levels are lower than on the Slade. Consistently through the day, 10% of turns at Five Ways are into the town centre via Park Street or Hixet Wood; and 15%–20% of turns at the Enstone Road crossroads are into the town centre via Enstone Road. The one-way system serves to funnel traffic through Market Street and about 80% of Market Street traffic then leaves Charlbury via Dyers Hill: however, much to our surprise, the great majority does not turn into the station.

At the bottom of Nine Acres Lane, meanwhile, the major movement is from Thames Street onto Nine Acres Lane. This is mostly traffic originating from Dyers Hill. This suggests a significant flow from the Burford area to the Enstone and Woodstock roads. The data is being used to inform Charlbury's 'Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan' which is currently under development. Graffiti

The Town Council has purchased a graffiti removal kit so that we can tackle the graffiti that has sprung up around town.

Accessibility

We have worked with the Thomas Gifford Trust to create an accessible entrance to the Playing Close to help residents with wheelchairs, walking frames and pushchairs. We are working on other improvements to make our green spaces more accessible.

When I was first elected as County Councillor for Charlbury and the Wychwoods, there were several things that I wanted to do for the town.

I wanted to sort out the parking problems on Nine Acres Lane. Many people contacted me about the fact that the double yellow lines did not go far enough up from the corner, which meant traffic frequently backing up behind parked cars.

I also wanted to make it easier for buses to get along Brown's Lane by slightly increasing the length of the double yellow lines there, and for parking near the pre-school to be restricted to make it safer.

So it was with great delight that I chaired a meeting on July 21^{st} , where I stood in for the Cabinet member for Highways, as I was able to approve a raft of measures which I had worked on with the Town Council, and which will go a long way towards improving traffic and parking in our town, including the measures that I have described. I don't know exactly when the new lines will be installed but it will be fairly soon.

A week later, OCC started work on the Enstone Road crossroads, a scheme designed to improve visibility and safety for everyone. Again, this is something that I have worked on in partnership with the Town Council to achieve and I look forward very much to seeing that completed.

In order to slow traffic coming into the town from Banbury Hill, on July 21st I also approved a build-out which will force cars to stop and wait, so that too will help to make that end of the town safer.

Another transport-related improvement that I dearly want to see happen is an increase in the frequency of trains from Charlbury to Oxford and London, and I've been working on that too.

Plans for the North Cotswold Line are currently being considered by the Department for Transport, but as there is something of a hiatus in government at the moment we are unlikely to see much come out any time soon.

The current plan is for four trains per hour from Hanborough and only one from Charlbury but I have been told that they have now worked out a way to allow for two trains an hour from Charlbury.

This development is really important as I would not want to see people driving to Parkway or to Hanborough because the train service there is so much more frequent, as that could have a negative effect on both the environment and the future of our station.

I will continue to press for this and for other improvements. Now that West Oxfordshire District Council and Oxfordshire County Council are both led by the two councillors for Charlbury, we have no excuse for not being able to achieve the very best for our town!

Charlbury Primary School has been awarded the international accreditation of an Eco School Green Flag with Distinction for their work this year in making the school more environmentally friendly and raising eco-awareness in pupils. Eco-Schools is an international education programme that prompts young people to explore sustainability and climate change

and take action.

Last September, the school's eco committee, the Eco Warriors, conducted an environmental review, assessing how eco-friendly the school is. They reviewed everything from the school's recycling practices, to energy usage, to how environmental themes are covered in classrooms. Based on their findings, they chose to concentrate work this year on the three areas of increasing biodiversity, improving management of waste and finding out about how plastics pollute the oceans. A year of activities was planned around these areas that would involve all classes in the school in learning about these sustainability themes and taking action around the school grounds to make improvements.

Activities included planting a vegetable and herb garden and learning how to identify and care for different plants; making seed balls to plant two wildflower meadows to provide for pollinators; building a hedgehog home, monitoring hedgehogs around Charlbury and writing to the town council about ways we can do more to protect hedgehogs. All the children in the school also had the chance to plant a tree in Wychwood Paddocks and an annual biodiversity survey has begun which will monitor biodiversity as it increases due to the tree planting and the new wildflower meadow. Classes learned about the R's of waste management (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Repair, Refuse) and have started to find ways to improve how waste is managed and considered. The school learned about plastic pollution during World Oceans Day where activities included creating a whole-school art mural

of sea creatures and raising money for the World Wildlife Fund's marine conservation work by adopting a turtle.

We are very grateful to all the support we have received this year from the Charlbury community including those who have kindly donated plants and offered their time and expertise, in particular we would like to thank Charlbury Wildlife Society, the town council's Land and Nature team and Charlbury Garden Society. We hope to be able to build on this year's achievements in the coming years as we continue to work together to make the school more environmentally friendly and further embed learning for sustainability within our curriculum. Finally, we are extremely grateful to Sustainable Charlbury for the grant support they have given the school this vear to help fund our work.

The Charlbury Exhibition Foundation

(CEF) is a charity to promote the education of young residents of Charlbury. We trace our origins back to bequests made by local people, Ann Walker in 1667 and Richard Eyans in 1666. Most of our income comes from renting out our property, the Old Grammar School, as well as a small grazing field, Poor Boys Close.

The Old Grammar School was built in 1837 and is a Grade II listed building. Since 1975 we have rented the Old Grammar School building to another local charity, the Charlbury Pre-School. The objectives of CEF and Pre-School are complementary, the promotion of education for young people living in Charlbury, which allows the building to be used for the purpose originally intended by the donor, Ann Walker, whose name is inscribed on the front of the building.

Traditionally, the rent CEF receives from the Pre-School has been used to fund grants given each autumn to local young people who are in further education, at college or higher education, at university or who are on apprenticeships.

CEF now urgently needs to improve the

energy efficiency of the Old Grammar School, which has been little altered since it was built. We have identified as immediate priorities insulating the loft to modern standards and installing secondary glazing on the windows. Those measures will make a contribution to the climate-change challenge and will be of lasting benefit to the Pre-School children in improving the conditions in which they are taught and to Pre-School in reducing the environmental impact and energy costs each year.

We have provisionally estimated the initial budget for those first measures to be in the region of £20,000. Following a review of our financial position, and bearing in mind our overall responsibilities, we shall be looking for outside funding to assist in this work.

In those circumstances, CEF has decided with great regret that it will not be able to make grants to students and apprentices this year. We shall review the position again carefully next year.

News from the Charlbury Patient Participation Group (CPPG)

COVID Vaccination

A combined flu and COVID vaccination programme is likely to start at the end of September/beginning of October.

Over 50s will be offered the flu vaccination, but the cohort for the COVID booster has not yet been confirmed.

Missed appointments at the Surgery:

It has been reported to us by Wesley Rouse, (Practice Manager) that many patients are not attending their asthma review clinics even though they have a booked appointment.

The number of patients not turning up for their face to face appointments with GPs has also increased which is an enormous waste of precious resources.

Social Prescribing:

Jennifer Dixon-Clegg is the Social Prescribing Link Worker attached to the Charlbury Medical Centre. Jennifer works with her colleague Emma Fox, another Social Prescribing Link Worker in the Rural West Primary Care Network (PCN). Jennifer and Emma work for Age UK Oxfordshire who provides Social Prescribing Community Link Workers for many GP surgeries in Oxfordshire. As Social Prescribers, Jennifer and Emma work with anyone over the age of 18.

Linking with help that already exists in your community is often the most helpful way to improve health and wellbeing, or to find the help you need when changes make life unexpectedly difficult. Your GP may refer you to Jennifer, or you may wish to contact her yourself.

You don't need to wait to be referred by your GP. She is easy to contact, has time to listen and to help with the things that may be bothering you. Social Prescribing Link Workers work with you and can visit you at home if that is best, to suggest practical day-to-day solutions for everyday concerns .

If you would like to speak to Jennifer, please call the Medical Centre Reception and ask for Jennifer's contact details.

Automatic Front Door

Is now at last in place. The button to open the door is placed on the inside of the pillar nearest the door.

Collection of Equipment

A collection by the Red Cross of no longer needed zimmer frames, crutches, wheelchairs etc took place in July organized by the CPPG. Please let us know if you have any equipment stowed away. If there is a sufficient quantity another collection can be arranged.

Muscular- Skeletal Service (MSK)

Most patients with joint, bone and muscle problems are currently referred to a private company, 'Healthshare' (outsourced from the NHS). Many patients have reported an unsatisfactory service from this company. 'Connect Health' has recently obtained the contract and will be taking over from October.

Patient Participation Groups have been assured by Connect Health that patients will be able to self- refer, will be triaged by a clinician, and will be able to state whether they would prefer a face to face, video, or telephone consultation.

Assurances have been given that the complaints procedure will be rapid and easy to access. Please contact us if you have any concerns with this service.

Wild flowers in your lawn help it stay green

This year has seen the worst drought since 1976 and lawns turned brown in July. Grass roots are relatively short but wild flower roots go much deeper taking up moisture to continue growing, so the leaves of some plants like self heal, yarrow, wild carrot, bird's foot trefoil, lady's bedstraw, field madder, black medick, and clovers were still green.

In June and July, I saw many examples where these plants were flowering beautifully in short grass between monthly cuts and providing essential nectar and pollen for visiting bumblebees and other insects. Sadly though, as the weather dried up and the grass stopped growing, it was unfortunate to sometimes see the flowers being mown even when there was no grass to cut - eventually they re-flowered but in the meantime the bees had to find food elsewhere. These flowery short lawns are called tapestry lawns and can be a wonderful opportunity where longer grass isn't appropriate.

Each year the weather affects how the grass grows - it needs rainfall and warmth but not heat. Growth starts at 8-10°C, optimum growth between 18-24° C, then growth declines and stops when the soil dries out. 60% of the top growth occurs in the first 6 weeks, so, even if you want to encourage a wild flower meadow, it is important to mow until the end of April - the flowering plants will then flourish and not be swamped by the lush grass. If you have yellow rattle though, which is parasitic on grass and reduces its strength, then don't cut too late otherwise this annual won't be able to flower and seed to provide plants for the next year.


During the Charlbury Festival in June, my heritage field walk included a talk from Robert Hobill, Farm Manager at Ditchley, who explained the dramatic change we've seen in the fields on the eastern side of Charlbury. Last year these fields were growing wheat but in September

they were direct drilled with a flower-rich grass mix under the Countryside Stewardship option AB8. This five-year grant scheme rests the soil and provides habitat for invertebrates and birds. In total, Ditchley have planted up 444 acres under AB8 including 150 acres near Charlbury. The seed mix is 90% fine grasses: chewings fescue, red fescue, crested dogstail, hard fescue, smooth stalked meadow grass, and bent; together with 10% flowers: bird's foot trefoil, black knapweed, black medick, lady's bedstraw, ox-eye daisy, red campion, musk mallow, red clover, sainfoin, self heal, white campion, and yarrow.

This first summer the fields have been mown several times to control black grass and rye brome, which are troublesome legacy weeds from the cereal crop. These cuts have also enabled the flowers to develop without getting swamped by the grasses and some have even flowered this first year. From mid-August the fields will either be mown or flash grazed by sheep for 2-3 weeks having been arable fields for decades. none of the boundary hedgerows are stock-proof, so electric fencing will have to be used to control the sheep. However, please be assured that access along public footpaths will always be kept open and never be fenced off. Mobile water bowsers and drinking troughs will also be supplied.

For the next four years the land will continue to be managed to benefit wildlife (mown in April and grazed/mown from August) with 10% of each field being left untouched to provide a refuge for overwintering insects. Many birds like yellowhammers, skylarks, willow warblers and chiffchaffs nesting in ground level vegetation will also benefit from lack of disturbance.


