

## Fair 16th September

#### **GOOD NEWS: THE STAGE FITS BEHIND THE WALL!**

A question that has been on many people's lips is how the improvements at the Bell will affect the Street Fair and I am pleased to report that Steve Jones and I have had a friendly meeting with the site manager at The Bell and measured the area inside the new wall. We can now report that there will still be room to put a stage in the usual place. This is obviously a big relief and it means we can have the usual entertainment, including the now very popular Sea Shanties, sung by our own Charlbury and Finstock Morris, as well as a variety of other bands and groups playing and singing all afternoon and into the evening, when the stalls are cleared away to make space for 'dancing in the street'.

Activities start with the Egg Throwing competition on Friday evening, in association with Riverside. We will have a Prize Draw and a 'silent auction', stalls in Church Street, Hatwell's Fun Fair, a Puppet Show with Noddy, Big Ears and the Goblins, and Go-karts.

The day itself will start with the Fancy Dress Competition and Parade led by the King and Queen who this year are Ronnie Watson and Georgina Stimpson respectively. There will be a wide range of stalls and sideshows in the street with something for everyone. You can enjoy tea and homemade cake in the Memorial Hall, where you can also look at the Children's Art Competition. Not forgetting the Morris dancing, Classic Cars and a new 'Mini Landrover Challenge', run by the Scouts, outside the community centre. Do please come and join in the fun!

As you know, all of the funds raised on the day of the Fair, go to the upkeep of the Corner House and Memorial Hall. Money is particularly needed at the moment since the Trustees of the Corner House and Memorial Hall have commissioned local architect, Pete Smith, to draw up plans for the refurbishment of the Corner House to make it more accessible and user-friendly. His drawings will be on display in Church Street during the Fair so make sure you take a look.

Road Closures and Parking

Church Street and Park Street will be affected, from 9am on the Saturday. Diversions will be signed. By kind permission of the Primary School, Wychwood Paddocks Playing Field will be available for parking for visitors, on the Saturday.

Reminders will be sent to affected Charlbury residents in these locations nearer the date of Fair, and we respectfully request alternative parking to be sought to allow room for the Fair Stands in Church Street.


#### Help us on the day

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#### A Day's Life: Flora Gregory

Many of us know Flora Gregory through her work with nature, and especially her activities to increase the profile of our local hedgehog population. I wanted to know how she became interested in nature and how she set about the task of forming a new group, the Charlbury Wildlife Society

I have been coming to Charlbury since the 1970s, passing though really, but came to live here about 10 or so years ago. I have had a long working life, often in offices, with teams of people, which was very creative. But when I reduced my working hours, I took some time to think about and choose what I wanted to do next. With the challenges of climate change and biodiversity loss confronting us all, I decided to prioritise nature and wildlife – about which I am passionate. Most of the things I do now have this focus.

I knew I wanted to be outside a lot more, among trees and in the natural world. I love the feeling of the wind on my face. I particularly concentrate on the humannature relationship, looking at ways of understanding it and trying to improve it. Our time here is very brief, and how very lucky we are to be on such a beautiful planet at this time.

There's a lot going on in the town, and various amazing groups such as Sustainable Charlbury, and the Charlbury Green Hub. But none of them are specifically about nature and wildlife and our interaction with it, and none with 'wildlife' or 'nature' in their names. I hesitated for a long time as the town already had so many groups but started talking with people about forming one in 2021, connecting via Zoom calls.

There was particular interest in knowing about what was happening locally in and around Charlbury [Ed: see Charlbury Forum thread in 2021, from 10<sup>th</sup> to 20<sup>th</sup> June]. With this in mind, we started the Charlbury Wildlife Society and now have about 50 members and a distribution list of over 100. We are a typical Society with talks in the Autumn/Winter/Spring months and outings, and we also

undertake practical work such as putting up bird boxes and doing surveys. Everyone is welcome to our talks, it's not necessary to be a member to attend them, but membership fees and donations do help us pay for speakers and support organisations which support nature and wildlife.

I personally have been inspired by the work of the Kirtlington Wildlife and Conservation Society. Their aim is practical - to look after wildlife and habitats in the parish and encourage the community to get involved. They have done a lot with hedgehogs and created a Hedgehog Street [Ed: see https:// kirtlingtonvillage.co.uk/kwacs] in the village. Kirtlington residents have created openings in their gardens, so far 60 gardens along with the church, school and pub have connected together, allowing hedgehogs to travel more freely around the village. Charlbury is not dissimilar to Kirtlington, just bigger and I imagine it opening up its gardens for hedgehogs.

I have been doing research into hedgehog numbers and distribution around Charlbury for several years now. Why hedgehogs? They are at the top of the list of people's favourite animals, and it's a way of involving the whole community. Often I will ask people in the street if they have seen a hedgehog recently, and can be seen with Eric—a hedgehog hand puppet—tucked into my jacket.

Charlbury Wildlife can help people create small openings in their stone walls or fences, dig tunnels, and build ramps. We collect data such as where hedgehogs are found dead on our roads—as it helps us understand where hedgehogs need support.

It is clear from information collected so far that there are modest hedgehog populations around the edges of town, the challenge is for them to move easily through town which they need to do. They travel up to three miles a night to find food and each other.

Now there is the new Hedge Fund, a

hedgehog first aider in Charlbury working with a team of volunteers to support sick or injured hedgehogs with the aim of getting them back into the wild. They can be supported with financial donations via the Charlbury Wildlife Society. Contact charlburywildlifesociety@gmail.com for more information.

My love of nature came from my childhood. I was the youngest of 5 children, our parents were both scientists. We lived in a Victorian house with a massive garden. We would stay outdoors for hours, and walked and cycled around for miles. We grew our own food and had an orchard and greenhouse.

There was space for other creatures – for example, sparrows, swifts, martins, and flycatchers. We learnt to be independent. You don't see children out and about in this way now. As a biologist, my mother would dissect owl pellets with us, for example, on the kitchen table, and we would examine the contents. This was a normal part of our life.

In my teens, I was torn between art and science, and ended up studying psychology. For many decades, I worked in documentary film production and broadcasting, still managing to take courses in art as well. I studied at the old Hornsey School of Art, and at Oxford Brookes, where I took an MA in Social Sculpture. I was particularly taken by the ideas of a German artist - Joseph Beuys which I found liberating. He maintains that everyone is an artist, and all of life is art.

In my working life I have focussed on helping people tell their own stories in their own way - giving a voice to the voiceless, and I continue to do that in my role as a mentor with an NGO helping filmmakers around the world. My interest in wildlife is not dissimilar, if we really listened to wildlife and considered its voice and enabled it to thrive, this will help us find a way through the massive crises that confront us.

We are all stewards here, treading in

others' footsteps. It helps to know what has gone before - having such a line back enables us to understand why we are where we are and think about where we are going and the future. My work as Artist-in-Residence with the Wychwood Forest Trust - looks at people's historical, present and future relationship with the land. In other collaborative work that I do I look at the Rights of Nature also considering this historical chronology.

Sentimental love is no good without practical love and action and we can all be wildlife champions. The Charlbury Wildlife Society contributes towards helping hedgehogs and other wildlife around town, but none of what we do is possible without the support of the community.

One example is the good work of Andrew Lawson who over the last 30 years has helped support a stable swift population and there is currently an ongoing programme of putting up swift nesting boxes each Spring.

This summer we have been surveying our remaining house martins and swallow populations (there used to be hundreds) and with the help of Louise Spicer we are looking at different ways in which we can support them going forward. It's much easier to build on an existing population however small than start one from scratch, so the few we have are incredibly important.

I am also involved with the Land and Nature Group which advises Charlbury Town Council and is developing a Nature Recovery Plan across the parishes of Fawler, Finstock and Charlbury [Ed: see https://charlbury-tc.gov.uk/land-and-nature-team]. A part of the plan includes expanding and improving wildlife rich habitats, corridors and highways.

As I walk around Charlbury, I often imagine myself as a hedgehog and look for highways so I can get through town.

## The Community Links Service and how it might help you or someone you know

The Community Links Oxfordshire service is contracted by the County Council to provide local information about sources of support and opportunities and activities available to help anyone over 18 to connect better into their community. The service is free of charge.

The Community Links area teams aim to support community members to be as independent as possible and live life to the full in the way that they want to. They are there to help people to find out about what support and opportunities exist in their local area. They will listen to what matters to them, then offer bespoke support that is tailored to what they need.

There are five friendly Community Links workers available to help residents of West Oxfordshire. They can help someone to:

- meet new people
- access information, advice and support
- get help at home
- navigate a care or benefits system
- find out about services and support available
- discover and join in with a local group or activity
- access transport
- learn something new
- feel confident to get involved

They can provide:

- Telephone support
- Home visits
- Email/text support
- A range of fact sheets and guides

They can help you access resources to make sure that you are caring for yourself as well as the person you are looking after and can also provide information and advice on what can be a confusing care system, if you need it.

#### **Charlbury Amateur Dramatic Society News**

Rehearsals for CADS September production are in full swing. The new Committee, elected at the AGM in March, under the Chairmanship of Olive Woods, chose to perform two or three One Act plays. This gives all members a range of roles to try, from the purely comic to the highly dramatic.

Olive Woods will direct "The Cagebirds" by David Campton, with parts for an all-female cast. It is a highly charged atmospheric play, based in an institution, where all the inmates have their own idiosyncratic traits.

Introduce a newcomer who threatens their "contented" routine and the danger becomes apparent. The play ranges from the humorous to the disturbingly serious and ends with the unexpected "twist" so typical of this playwright.

"An Englishman Abroad" by Alan Bennett, directed by Sue Haffenden, reveals what exile in Moscow was really like for the English spy, Guy Burgess in the 1950s. By turns witty, ironic and wistful, Bennett's play cannot fail to amuse and challenge.

Interest persists in the Cambridge group of the 1930s, who having joined the Foreign Office or Intelligence Services then spied for the Soviets. Many books have been written about them and "Spy among friends" is currently on TV.

At the time of writing, the third play "Tea for two and sixpence" is yet to be fully cast. It is a light comedy, directed by Olive, in contrast to the other two choices. We hope these plays will contribute to an enjoyable evening out for our audiences. It is certainly good to be back trading the boards after the challenges of the pandemic years.

The plays will be performed in the Memorial Hall, Charlbury on Friday 29th and Saturday 30th September at 7.30pm. Tickets £7 on the door or reservations can be made by phoning the Secretary, Sue Haffenden on: 01608 676 642



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#### Corner House: It is time to chip in!

The trustees of the Corner House and Memorial Hall are doing their best to try to ensure a successful future for these town assets. Having improved the Memorial Hall in recent times, and with the help of the Garden Society brought the garden to life as a public space, attention falls now especially on the Corner House itself.

The building is one of the most prominent in the town and is much liked by the people to all of whom, collectively, it belongs.

But although liking the building, people have also complained about its faults. It is a difficult structure to improve, mostly because what we have has evolved over a number of generations.

The original building at what we now think of as at the rear was probably built as a weaving shed, with its large upstairs windows. Later a house was attached at right-angles and that is the frontage which faces up Browns Lane towards Enstone Road. It has a very grand frontage but the house was only one room deep. Later occupants, the famous Spendloves, built an extension on the back and thus created what we now think of as the front facing Market Street.

That part of Market Street was previously called Observatory Street because at the top of the Corner House was a room from which occupants could observe Cornbury Park.

A result of all these additions and changes is that inside the building is on differing levels, noticeable on the ground floor and on the first floor. There are structural walls separating the original parts of the building and these realities make radical changes very difficult.

But these days the Corner House is well used. All the rooms are occupied with activities for the Common Good. The most obvious is Cornerstone on the ground floor, but the bookshop has expanded to ground and first floors (probably now the largest second-hand bookshop in West Oxfordshire!). There is an active art room

near the back, and the headquarters of Global Healthcare Information Network is also there on the first floor. Charlbury town museum occupies a large part of the building, and together all of the Corner House certainly has practical value in our town and beyond.

Inadequacies the trustees hope to resolve are to make circulation around the building easier. That involves putting in a user-friendly staircase and hopefully a basic lift similar to the one in the Methodist Church.

The building is to have decent toilet facilities with disabled access, and of course there are ideas of how to make the building warmer in winter.

The main lobby will become a more open wider space with opportunities to display large copies of ancient town maps so we can all appreciate how Charlbury has changed and grown.

Plans have been drawn for these changes and it is hoped to display them at the Street Fair on September 16. There will also be a possibility to hear about Corner House and Memorial Hall developments at a public meeting on November 2.

Drawing up these ideas is one thing; paying for them another. The trustees must look to all the people of Charlbury to contribute, as best they can, to the cost of these developments. The total required is not beyond reach, especially when some local people are willing to put in a few thousand pounds each.

Donations of any size will undoubtedly help improve the building for the good of all. We expect Sustainable Charlbury to help out of profits from the solar farm and of course the Street Fair is an important contributor along with other town events.



#### Charlbury Museum & Heritage Centre



A unique piece of railway history which celebrates the life of Sir Peter Parker and the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Cotswold Line, which opened between Oxford and Worcester in 1853. The name plate, provided by the CLPG, was launched on a high speed train by First Great Western at a ceremony on 17<sup>th</sup> September 2003.

Sir Peter Parker, Chairman of the British Railways Board from 1976 to 1983, was a regular traveller from Charlbury Station to London Paddington Station.

He lived at Minster Lovell. During his time in office the iconic high speed First Great Western train was first introduced to passengers (1976); known as the 'power car', the train is the world's fastest diesel powered train capable of 148.5 m.p.h. and a maximum open speed of 125m.p.h. Approximately 200 were built.

This name plate from the 'power car', First Great Western Class 43, 43127, would have travelled the tracks across the GWR network from London Paddington to Penzance, into South Wales, to Cheltenham and Gloucester and our own Cotswold Line through to Hereford.

The gross mileage during the train's lifetime could likely be 8,000,000! This

weighty metal sign will soon rest on a wall within Charlbury museum, a short walk from the station where it would have been a familiar sight on the blue liveried G.W. train, railway history preserved in the town for us all to enjoy.

Sir Peter Parker, as Chair of British Rail, is credited with guiding the organisation through difficult times and seeing the beginnings of the resurgence in train travel in the United Kingdom.

As a campaigner against the anti-rail lobby he opposed the recommendations of the Serpell Report (1982), which was advocating drastic closures of stations. One can speculate that as he was a regular traveller from Charlbury Station, perhaps his influence did give support to our town's station in the early 1980s?

In the current context of the threatened closure of ticket offices and the impact to our town's station, one can ponder on what Sir Peter's views might have been if he were alive today.

There are two train name plates in his memory, one is on the wall of Charlbury Station ticket office and we hope that it will be available for train travellers to admire once again.

The beautiful station garden is also dedicated to the memory of Sir Peter

Parker. The second name plate will be on display in Charlbury's museum in time for Street Fair 2023; a timely appearance as it will be nearly twenty years since the train was named (17.9.2003), and 170 years since the Cotswold line opened!

Finally Charlbury Museum & Heritage Centre is most grateful for the generous gift from the Cotswold Line Promotion Group of this special commemorative piece of railwayana – it will inspire a wall of Charlbury Station memorabilia.

The CLPG is a voluntary organisation with a large membership. It was formed in 1978. The group actively works to support the Cotswold line and liaises with passengers and the rail industry. In the past it has helped prevent closures of small stations such as Combe and Finstock in 1994. www.clpg.online

#### Charlbury Community Workshop: open soon for business

Since TV's Suzie Fletcher cut the ribbon on 20th May, the team involved in organising Charlbury's Community Workshop has been working towards getting the building ready for its intended purpose – to provide a place where anyone from the town and its surrounding communities can come and join in.

Our intention is for there to be a range of activities, including woodwork, upholstery, bike repairs, stained-glass; whatever people want to do and to learn about.

At the opening ceremony, chairman of the organising group Chris Potts said that once The Thomas Gifford Trust had offered the site at the end of the Community Centre, it didn't take long for things to get under way, with over 50 people signing up as being interested at last year's Street Fair.

Having decided that a custom-built steelframe unit would be the best choice for the new workshop, the groundworks team – led by Dave Court – set out and poured the concrete slab in March, ready for the building to be delivered a month later.

Thus far, funding for the project has come from The Thomas Gifford Trust, the Glasgow Foundation, Sustainable Charlbury (which contributed to the cost of the insulation in the walls and roof), and the Town Council.

In July, Blenheim joined the list with an offer to help cover the cost of installing electricity in the building. And that doesn't include the huge number of really generous individual donations of materials and equipment, ranging from the paving blocks for outside the front door, to professional workbenches and a wonderful assortment of tools of all shapes, sizes and uses. Thankyou everyone!

Around 130 people were at the opening to hear Suzie explain just how important she feels that workshops like this are. "What I love about these community-based sheds," she said, "is that they are open for everybody to come, everybody to share their levels of skills, and for everybody to come and learn something that perhaps they didn't know."

Turning to all the equipment that people have already donated to the workshop, she went on: "That is fantastic in these days where we need to recycle and reuse all the stuff that commonly people don't realise the value of, and don't know what to do with it.

It's really important that we keep those nuts and bolts and useful little wizzbangs out of landfill, and bring them to your community shed."

A new charity has been set up to run the workshop, with all of its members having a say in what goes on. The design inside provides for a 'clean' area for upholstery, sewing and other fabric-based activities, separated by a partition from the dust and noise of the woodworkers at the other end of the building.

As with any building for community use, the basics – such as electric cabling, a water supply and drainage – all have to meet Building Control approval before serious workshopping can get under way. We are working towards that as quickly as we can, and are aiming to have the workshop open for business in the autumn.

Meanwhile, everyone who has an interest in anything to do with the workshop needs to put **Thursday 21st September** in their diary, when there will be a public meeting to tell you about progress to date. Please come along and find out more!

## CHARLBURY REFUGEE ACTION GROUP

At our latest speaker event Dr Emily Parker described her time as a volunteer doctor in Subotica, a city in the north of Serbia on the Hungarian border. Many people fleeing countries such as Afghanistan and Syria end up there trying to cross the external border into the EU on what is known as the 'Balkan route' to northern Europe. Since there is no effective legal and safe way for them to enter Hungary and claim asylum, those trying to cross the border will be pushed back to Serbia by the Hungarian police without their request for asylum being heard. They therefore have to expose themselves many times to the risk of crossing the fence and being violently pushed back and mistreated. Emily explained how these people get stuck living in unofficial camps - unhygienic squats with insufficient access to water, hygiene or basic medical care, leading to conditions like scabies. They can also experience serious injuries from violent beatings by border officials, or from the three-metre-high razor wire fences built along the 175 km border. Emily volunteered with Medical Volunteers International, who provide free medical care to people who would otherwise be left without it. Thanks to the generosity of attendees at the event, CRAG was able to send £700 in donations to support this important work. If you'd like to find out more please visit their website at https:// medical-volunteers.org/.

We have another amazing programme of six CRAG concerts for the 23/24 season, starting with jazz pianist Dorian Ford on Sunday 8th October and thereafter on

the first Sunday of each month through to the viol consort Fretwork on 4th March. Each concert is held in the Memorial Hall at 3pm. The music lasts approximately one hour and is followed by complimentary tea and homemade cake. Don't miss this opportunity to experience world class musicians on your doorstep by buying tickets in advance through our new website at https:// www.charlburyrefugee.org.uk. We're also offering a great value season ticket for the whole programme of 6 concerts, which you can also buy through the website. Every single penny of the ticket sales will be used to support organisations which have a proven track record of providing effective aid to refugees.

You'll probably be aware that despite the best efforts of charities, migrant groups and advocates for refugees in the Lords and among MPs, the Illegal Migration Bill passed all its stages on Tuesday, 18th July, and is set to become law. Its passage evoked strong condemnation from the UN's refugee agency UNHCR and its human rights commission OHCHR, who fear that the UK's action could start an avalanche which might destroy the whole edifice of international refugee protection. Despite this loss, it's important to keep reminding our representatives that we care about refugee protection, human rights and the UK's fulfilment of its international obligations.

We continue to invest significantly in the facilities to encourage growth in membership (at a time when most cricket clubs are struggling), and this year saw the new outdoor net facility open ensuring that along with the

community centre cricket facility, Charlbury offers the best practise facilities for cricket, within the West Oxfordshire area.

We are also investing in the improvement to the ground and especially the two cricket squares which has seen the purchase of state-of-the-art equipment and at the end of this season the replacement and of the non turf match wicket on the main ground. We have also submitted planning application to extend the main pitch boundary by some 15 metres that should facilitate the option to play at a higher standard of cricket in the future.

Overall, we are in a great place.

Things to look out for as we go forward are.

- 30<sup>th</sup> September 2023 Oktoberfest including the Inflatables, Jubilee Brass Band and the Village Idiots. Get your tickets now (see our advert)
- 4<sup>th</sup> November 2023 Annual bonfire (yes, its back) and firework display

#### **Churches Together in Charlbury**

The Christian Aid Week house to house collection in May, using delivery only envelopes, raised £2687.37 including Gift Aid. The committee were very grateful to Cornerstone for receiving donations again and to everyone who donated or helped. The money raised is used through Christian Aid's partner organisations and helps people of all faiths or none. Recent projects include introducing new crops to drought stricken farmers in central Africa, providing emergency shelter and supplies following earthquakes in Syria and Turkey and floods in Pakistan and Ukraine, giving educational opportunities to young people growing up as refugees in Bangladesh, along with safe places for women and girls living in the camps to meet, and defending human rights and livelihoods among Palestinians in the West Bank and Gaza Strip.

### **Changes at the Town Council**

In May, Cllr Gary Harrison was elected as the new Chair of the Council. Liz Reason was elected Vice-chair. Gary thanked Liz, who was chair for two years, for her drive and enthusiasm in encouraging so many of the initiatives described below.

Cllr Tim Crisp resigned in May. He was one of the main proponents of our Home Comforts project and thankfully he will continue to work on this as a regular (non-councillor) member of the Buildings Team.

Before the June meeting, we put out a call for prospective councillors to replace Tim and were thrilled by the exceptional quality of the three applicants who responded. We elected Emily Algar as our newest council member. Emily had been running our social media for some time. Emily said, "I believe strongly in equality, whether that is creating social spaces for girls that are safe and inclusive, or empowering the young and old across Charlbury to register to vote and be involved in politics.

In July, Cllr Dan Raymond-Barker resigned for personal and professional reasons. Dan led the Council's Food Group and was key in establishing Charlbury's new monthly market. Happily, he will continue to help run Charlbury Market as a member of the Food Group. Dan's replacement will be co-opted at the August meeting (not held at the time of going to press).

The Town Council is going to start holding surgeries from September, initially for three months on a trial basis. Surgeries give individual residents an opportunity to discuss issues with local representatives on a 1:1 basis. Keep an

eye out for notices about when and where surgeries are going to be held. If the initiative is popular, it will become a permanent feature of Council activity from 2024.

### **Making Space for Girls**

Nationally, many teenage girls don't go to their local park because they feel there is nothing there for them or they don't feel safe, and thus gave rise to the Making Space for Girls campaign. In Charlbury, Cllrs Emily Algar, Claire Wilding and Gary Harrison, and our Clerk Lisa Wilkinson, have set up a Making Space for Girls Working Group which is going to consult local teenage girls to find out if they feel there are any barriers to them enjoying the park. Depending on what the Working Group finds, it will be able to look into how they can deliver more facilities aimed at teenage girls or how they can make the park feel like a more inviting place to hang out.

### **New speed limits**

The 20mph speed limit is now in place throughout Charlbury. It is great to see so many drivers sticking to 20mph, respecting the safety of us all, reducing


noxious emissions and allowing a quieter life for those who live alongside a busy road.

### Voting in Charlbury


The Town Council is starting a campaign to increase voting in Charlbury using the Street Fair as the launch. The aims are to:



- To increase voter turnout in Charlbury for both local, district and general elections;
- To improve visibility for the Town Council elections in 2024 and to explain what a town councillor does;
- To push voting during election cycles and to encourage those who do vote, to sign-up to the government's free voter ID.

### **Charlbury Skatepark**

Resident Liam Flaxman has approached the Town Council to ask for help with improving the skatepark at the top of Ticknell Piece. With Liam, we have set up a Skatepark Working Party which has identified urgent repairs need to make the ramps safe for users. The Council has agreed to pay £2,500 for repairs. In the longer term, we would like to see the skatepark become a vibrant place for skateboarders and BMXers. As it stands, the facilities are too hard for beginners, so the Skatepark Working Party is looking at plans for adding facilities that are better suited to novice skateboarders. Below is a plan of the kind of thing we are thinking of: the 'new path' links to the existing play park. We will consult users and obtain tenders before seeking external funding to get the additional facilities built.



### **Nine Acres Recreation Ground**

The benches at Nine Acres have all been cemented to the ground. This means that people can enjoy them in the play park area where they are intended to be used. (We kept finding them hidden in the bushes or being used as a platform to jump onto the new trampoline.) We have also had to spend £2,500 to repair the basket swing and the safety rail on the multiplay.

**Parishes Together** 

Charlbury Town Council has co-ordinated the first meeting of what promises to become a powerful alliance between neighbouring parishes. 'Parishes Together' saw Charlbury, Chadlington, Fawler, Chilson, Spelsbury, Shipton-under-Wychwood, Finstock and Enstone councils agreeing to work together on nature recovery planning, cycling/walking routes that join up our communities, and river/water quality. We also agreed to co-ordinate responses to the revision of the Local Plan. Watch this space!

### **Land and Nature Group**

CAG Oxfordshire has just secured limited funding through the Nature Recovery Network Seed Corn Fund which will help them to continue their support for us and

other parishes embarking on nature recovery planning. Our aim is for the LNG to become an exemplar for parish cluster-level nature recovery planning.

Applications, along with supporting documents, must be received by midday on 31st October 2023. Late applications cannot be considered. The Clerk can advise on what can, and cannot, be grant -aided under the Local Government Act.

# Special walks for a Cotswold Gateway town

It is over five years now since Charlbury was designated a Gateway Town, along with nine others across the Cotswolds. The signs as you enter the town indicate that walkers are welcome, and indeed they are. There's plenty for them to enjoy as well as the opportunity to explore the nearby countryside.

Part of the Gateway project included creating two new circular walking routes, mainly following existing footpaths and bridleways. Shown on the special map on the Church Street wall, just down from the Rose & Crown, these routes provide opportunities to discover hidden corners, views across the Evenlode valley and a rich diversity of wildlife.

The Cotswold Voluntary Wardens make sure these routes are kept in good order, a challenge this year as the vegetation growth has boomed with the excessive rainfall. Recent tasks have included cutting back nettles and brambles along the permissive path below the Burial Ground, and removing branches that were obstructing other footpaths.

If you don't know about these routes, here's a reminder:

# Cotswold Gateway - Charlbury 1

This 1.8-mile circular route takes you down Dyers Hill, along Mill Lane and into the Mill Field where you can sit by the river and enjoy listening to the birds or watch butterflies flit from flower to flower. At the far end of the Mill Field, cross the river and then choose which way to come back to Pound Hill; either along Watery Lane, or along the Cotswold Way through the fields. A short uphill pull to the Burial Ground, using the

permissive path, and you're soon back in the town centre.

### Cotswold Gateway - Charlbury 2

This is just a little longer than the Mill Field route and takes you along Hundley Way to Banbury Hill Farm and The Old Shed. Return to Charlbury by a traffic-free route leading to Wigwell Nature Reserve. Take time to admire the wonderful wildflowers that flourish here before heading back into the town centre.

# When are apples ready to pick?

Some varieties are ready as early as July, some as late as November, so knowing your apple variety really helps. Don't pick them before they're ripe because they won't have developed their full flavour. Unripe apples taste starchy, the pips will be white rather than brown, and they will be harder and smaller than when ripe – you might even think they are cookers rather than gorgeous dessert apples.

All apple trees drop small apples roundabout June – the famous "June Drop" - the tree is saving its energy to produce better apples later on.

You can help further by removing more small apples particularly reducing large clusters down to 2 or 3. Summer pruning in August also helps – give the tree a haircut by shortening new growth to 1/3 length – this exposes the fruit to more light and sunshine which helps them ripen and colour up.

The tree will let you know when the apples are ready – it'll start to drop ripe apples, which will also be easy to pick – lift an apple in the palm of your hand and the stalk will snap off from the twig, if it doesn't snap off easily then leave it a bit longer. Apples exposed to the sun will always be ready first - I always pick a tree over a few weeks taking those from the top and sunny side first while leaving the others to get larger. Apples bruise easily, lay them gently into your trug and don't drop them the last few inches – treat them like eggs!

Early varieties ready in August and September need to be eaten straight away – they won't keep, but apples ripening from October onwards will keep for several months in the fridge or a cool dark shed – ready to be enjoyed right through the winter.

Here in Charlbury, we can all enjoy about 80 apple varieties, plus plums, damsons, pears, and quinces all picked locally and provided free. The fortnightly Sunday afternoon Big Apple Take-Aways on the Playing Close were a Charlbury fixture from 2008 until 2019, but since COVID all the picked fruit is now available to everyone at the Cornerstone at The Corner House from Monday to Saturday 10am-1pm. Just come along and help yourself to the different varieties throughout the autumn – all are welcome.

This unique Charlbury tradition is only made possible through the generosity of those people with fruit trees in their gardens who have more than they can eat and don't want the rest to go to waste. These usually include drawings, paintings in watercolour, acrylic and oil, original prints using different techniques, ceramics and sculptures in various materials. This autumn the exhibition is themed 'Myths and Legends' and will be

held at Wilcote Art Studios on the 6th to 8th of October. The gallery, 'tucked under the beech trees of the ancient Wychwood Forest' is a great venue for our autumn exhibition. The address is Wilcote Art Studios, Hunts Copse, Wilcote Riding, near Finstock OX7 3DX. There is plenty of parking.

Each exhibition we have works from local artists well known in Charlbury and also from artists new to Charlbury Arts, joining as they move into the area or as they start to feel more confident about showing their work. New artists are very welcome! It is always interesting when the submission forms start to come in so that the catalogue and labels can be prepared for the exhibition. Titles of works may be self explanatory or leave a mystery to be solved on the day that works are delivered!

At our Spring Exhibition this year there seemed to be more works than hanging space in the Memorial Hall! Careful placing of works sympathetic to each other was achieved using past experience of hanging. There was just enough space and the exhibition was ready for the well attended Private Viewing and for the next few days with Charlbury Garden Society Spring Show. Many people commented that they had enjoyed the joint event.

In November 1933, the inaugural meeting of the Charlbury Scout Group Council was held at The Royal Oak (although a Scout Troop had met intermittently in previous years).

At that meeting, the District Commissioner explained the duties of the Group Council. Mr Morris was elected as President and Mr Hughes as Treasurer, In addition a 'Lady Cubmaster' (Mrs Hughes), Scoutmaster (Mr Lindars), Assistant Scoutmaster (Mr Smithson) and Rover Leader (Mr Nash) were appointed ex officio. An additional committee member, Mr Hadland, was also elected.

The reports for the year 1933—34 record Cub camps, a rally at Youlbury, semaphore testing at Chipping Norton, Scout camps and district competitions. The Rovers put on concerts and plays in aid of various charities and worked towards their Wood Badge, aiming to become leaders of the future.

It's heartening to know that outdoor activities, competitions, helping others and learning to lead are still part of the Scouting programme today. The summer term saw all sections attending West Oxfordshire District Camp at Northmoor, as well as Scouts enjoying water activities at Dorchester on Thames. We helped with litter picking at the Beer Festival and welcomed Explorers (the approximate modern equivalent of Rovers) who led a meeting of Korean activities for us, prior to setting off for the World Jamboree.

We are planning to have an 'open house' in November, welcoming all those involved with Charlbury Scout Group (past and present) – please look out for more information on Charlbury Info and posters around the town.



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
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
