

ANNUAL RAINFALL REPORT

The rainfall measured at Lees Rest (about a mile and a half due East of Charlbury and about 500ft above sea level) between 1 January and 31 December 2010 was 746mm(29.84ins).

The wettest month was August (155mm/6.2ins) and the driest was April (24mm/0.96ins).

August was the wettest since 1999 and despite the snow December was the driest since 1991.

Of course the rainfall in the centre of Charlbury may have been completely different.

ARTWEEKS Saturday 14 May – Sunday 22 May

Oxfordshire artweeks is a countywide opening of workshops and studios to the general public. It has been running since 1982 and now has nearly 500 sites. It runs for three weeks and divides into South 7-15th May, North 14-22nd and the City 21-30th May.

Thirteen artists will be opening their studios in Charlbury - a great opportunity to talk to the artists and see them at work.

Our artists offer a diverse selection of skills including paintings, jewellery, bird and botanical watercolours, photography, stone carving, stained glass, mixed media, embroidery and textiles, silversmithing and pottery.

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FRIENDS OF CHARLBURY LIBRARY

The Friends of Charlbury Library was formed in November 1997 at a public meeting when the library was threatened with closure. In January 1998, Oxfordshire County Council decided not to close any libraries but to reduce the opening hours. We were delighted with this but then began to campaign for a larger library more appropriate for the fifth largest town in West Oxfordshire. The library is a third of the recommended size and efforts had been made to expand the facilities since the early 70's.

The Library Service agreed to do so provided we raised £10,000 towards new premises and options were examined, the conclusion being that it should be a multi-use room in the new Community Centre. We had raised this total by 2007. The devastating news in November that it was proposed to close the Library came as a shock as well as the earlier news that the OCC funding for the Community Centre was at risk.

By now you should have received our leaflet with The Leaflet at the end of January. Please act now if you have not already done so. The petition is in the hall of the Corner House, Evenlode Books and the Post Office. Please sign. Write to all those listed. The Town Council have agreed to hold a public meeting in the Memorial Hall on Friday evening, March 25th. Do please attend and show those making the decisions how much Charlbury values our Library even if it is too small. We do not wish to lose this cherished community facility which is used by all age groups and whose closure would affect our senior citizens, families with young children and the housebound disproportionately.

HISTORY OF OLD CHARLBURY

THE TOWN HALL, CHARLBURY

The special display in Charlbury Museum from April to September 2011 will be based on 'Entertainment'. The Town Hall, Charlbury, played a large part in townspeople's entertainments between 1886 and 1960, first as a general hall and then as the Town Hall Cinema from 1939.

Chapter 1 1886 to 1914 The beginnings

In 1878 the Oxford Times announced 'certain proposals' in Charlbury for a public reading room, combined with a working men's club, temperance coffee room, lecture hall, etc. In 1879 there was a gala opening of the Royal Oak in Church Street as a temperance hotel, commercial and coffee house and public free reading room. At the opening a large star was set up to illuminate the premises in the evening. All this was the gift of Mr Arthur Albright, who came from a Charlbury Quaker family, was head of the firm of Albright & Wilson, phosphorus manufacturers in Birmingham, and was a major benefactor to the town. In his obituary in 1900 he was described as '*a prominent worker in the cause of the suppression of slavery and identified with philanthropic movements of widespread influence.*' In December 1880 the Oxford Times described the plans for a Club and Institute to open in January 1881 ('*the latter to include women and youths*'), for at least 120 members. Club membership for one penny per week would cover use of a spacious well-warmed and lighted hall, provided with papers and magazines, frequent lectures, readings, recitations, song meetings, and Saturday Free & Easy Night, with excellent coffee-house refreshments at extremely low prices. £20 was to be spent on adding to the library.

The new Club Room became so popular that by 1886 more space was needed, and Mr Albright decided to build a new Town Hall, holding around 200 people, in the land behind the Royal Oak, with access up an alley from Park Street. The opening ceremony took place in November 1886, with a concert given by the Oxford Choral class. For 20 years the Royal Oak Coffee House was managed by Mr H M Cowley, but in April 1908 a new proprietor took over – Mr G J Jones, a prominent townsman, confectioner, Wesleyan, Parish Council Chairman, and later JP. Mr Jones was also lessee of the Town Hall. In 1889 the YMCA Hall and Reading Room (later Red Triangle Club) was opened in the same alley off Park Street - admission 2d including buns, coffee and lemonade. The Hall became a popular arena for concerts, club meetings, plays, campaigns, teas, suppers, dances, parties, political gatherings and exhibitions. The population (then approx. 1,500) enjoyed concerts with ventriloquial figures, the Cinematograph and Dissolving Views, and the Walford Family with their bells and Aquadigipsycharmonica. Find out more at Charlbury Museum from 2nd April.

Charlbury Museum has been presented with a collection of programmes for concerts and other events held in various venues in Charlbury between 1893 and 1901. This may be inspected in the Museum and was presented by the family of Mr C B Southall, who was a music teacher, church organist and an officer in the Church Lads' Brigade.

Police Report from PCSO Wesley Smith

Speeding: Speed checks are still being done regularly in the Charlbury area and one of the roads which appears to be very fast throughout the day is Forest Road by the train station and the children's nursery. On 18 January between 9am and 10am coming in to Charlbury, 26 out of 52 cars were speeding all of which were travelling in the high 30s up to 45mph. All the children at the nursery would like to say a big thank you to those drivers who were driving carefully and within the speed limit - and to those drivers who were exceeding the limit **please slow down before someone gets hurt.**

Cycling: Please can I remind people that the one way system on Market Street and Browns Lane applies to cyclists as well as vehicles, that also includes cycling the wrong way on the pavement. On a number of occasions Chipping Norton officers have had to stop people doing one if not both of these offences. So far advice has been given, however it is still occurring and we will have no option but to start handing out £30 fixed penalty tickets.

Christmas Trees

The Council would like to thank everyone who put up Christmas trees and other decorations outside their houses and businesses, and are also grateful to Geoff Burroughs for yet again donating a tree for the Corner House (many will have noticed the more modest lighting for 2010!). Thanks also to all those involved in co-ordinating and organising the distribution of Christmas trees round the town, and to those shops and premises which gave us two enjoyable and useful late night shopping events.

Snow and Ice

This is, unfortunately, becoming a regular feature, and yet again Charlbury was not well served by County Highways, though our shops bravely kept us well supplied with all our necessities. Before next December, we hope to have finalised the positions of new salt/grit bins, and to have made arrangements for small spreaders to be available.

Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held at 8.0 p.m. on Friday April 1st in the War Memorial Hall, and is an opportunity for all Charlbury residents to ask questions of your Council, and to make comments. It is hoped that the Saturday surgeries, which take place every other month, are helping with some of the queries, but there are always many live issues that may need clarification or explanation.

Surgeries The surgeries during 2011 will be on April 2nd, 4th June, August 6th and October 1st, and are held at the Corner House between 10.0 a.m. and 12. noon.

Annual Meeting of the Town Council

This will be held at 7.30 p.m. on Wednesday, May 25th in the Corner House, and will deal with the election of Chairman and Committee members for the following year. Details of this, and all other Council meetings (to which members of the public are most welcome) can be found on the Town Council notice boards, which are outside the Corner House, opposite FiveWays store, and next to the Enstone Road bus stop. Minutes of meetings can be seen in the library, and, together with other information, on the Council's own website, www.charlburytowncouncil.co.uk. Anybody wishing to address the Council at their monthly meetings should notify the Town Clerk prior to the meeting. It should be remembered that next year, 2012, there will be fresh elections to the Town Council. All those who are interested in standing might find the above website a useful source of information, and indeed, would always be welcome to attend meetings if they wished to familiarise themselves with the activities and procedures.

Precept

The details of the Town Council Precept (budget) for 2011 can be obtained from the Town Clerk, but are as follows: The Town Council element of the Council Tax for the year 2011/2012 will be £76,341.00 (previous year £77,634). Band D will be £58.40, which represents a slight reduction from the 2010. Much of the expenditure is routine and

unavoidable, such as general maintenance, grass cutting, insurance and upkeep of buildings. Capital sums need to be put aside for the Community Centre, an initial maintenance grant for the Sports pavilion, and a loan for the cemetery extension, and grants to local organisations. Full details can be obtained from the Town Clerk.

Local government Election, May 5th

There is one seat to be contested for the Charlbury and Finstock Ward of West Oxfordshire District Council, currently held by Cllr Mike Breakell, (Lib. Dem). The Polling station is at the War Memorial Hall, and will be open from 7.0 a.m. to 10.0 p.m.

The Annual Boundary Walk will take place on Rogation Sunday (May 29th). It will start at 10.0a.m. at the Old Oak Tree on Forest Hill. There will be a break for picnic lunches at Model Farm, Ditchley, by kind permission of Mr. and Mrs. Hobill. The Town Clerk would welcome any offers of help with stewarding and chauffeuring. As mentioned in the September report, we shall be looking in 2012 for a replacement for Tony Graeme, who has kindly led these walks for so long. Anyone willing to put themselves forward should contact the Town Clerk, or Tony himself (01608 810729) from whom they will receive an enthusiastic response!

Sports Pavilion

The building is now well under way. There was a small Foundation Stone laying ceremony on December 11th 2010, and there will be a Grand Opening in the summer!

Gareth Miller and his volunteers braved an extremely cold day but achieved a successful haul. Next time we would like them to come away empty-handed, to show that there is no litter in Charlbury.

Cornbury Park Licence Application

The Town Council have been informed that the revised application by Cornbury Park, has, with restrictions, now been approved by the West Oxfordshire District Council Licensing Panel. Anyone wishing to see final details of this premise licence should contact the Town Clerk. Meanwhile, conscious of the concerns of some residents about the noise level that occurs during some of the town activities, the Council has had presentations from Bill Oddy, Community Safety Officer, WODC; The President and the Licence holder of the Charlbury Cricket Club, and from Lady Rotherwick. Lady Rotherwick has also put a list of events scheduled to take place at Cornbury on the Cornbury website. It is hoped that a meeting will shortly take place between local residents and the Cricket Club officers.

THOMAS GIFFORD TRUST REPORT

We held the AGM and public meeting of the Charity in early December when I provided a report on the activities of the Charity and its annual accounts. I started by updating the position on the Charity's Spendlove site and its development.

Until July we were working on a development project with Cottsway and OCC. The three parties were negotiating legal agreements - these had been drafted and largely agreed. Meetings to finalise them had been arranged but then postponed by OCC who subsequently put a moratorium on capital expenditure.

Neil Owen and myself met with Sue Scane of OCC in September to express our concerns about the uncertainty surrounding the project and, in particular, our concern that the OCC share of the proceeds of the old primary school, which have been ring-fenced to date, would be lost to Charlbury. We were told that, given likely expenditure cuts it was unlikely that OCC funding would be available for the project in its current form. In particular, it was unlikely that there would be capital funding for libraries or adult education. A separate study on how to provide libraries in the future was in hand within OCC but it was unlikely that support for existing libraries could be maintained at its current level and in their current form.

OCC suggested that the trustees develop a proposal which could provide flexible facilities within the community scheme, incorporating the library in some form and with an educational element to them - the OCC proceeds plus interest could then be given as a grant to the community scheme. The trustees believed that this opportunity should be examined as it would enable these funds to be reinvested in Charlbury as always promised. OCC told us to wait until they were in a position to tell us their requirements for the library of the future and educational uses. In anticipation we said to OCC that the trustees could provide a flexible space that could be configured to include the basic requirements for adult learning and the library of the future. However, OCC then announced at the end of November that they are proposing to close Charlbury library. The trustees are still intending to put together a proposal which could provide space for adult learning and some form of library alongside other community activities in return for the promised funds, if the operating costs of the library can be funded.

Meanwhile the trustees have taken the decision that we cannot afford to wait for OCC and are discussing with Cottsway the opportunity for a Phase 1 development which would consist of the proposed affordable housing alone. This housing is needed to generate funds for the community scheme. It would be part of an overall planning application including the community scheme.

We have made the Spendlove site available to Nine Acres for the construction period of the new pavilion.

I reported on the Charity's accounts for 2009/10. Our expenditure which covers primarily maintenance of the Playing Close, grass-cutting, public liability insurance for both sites, and administration costs exceeds our income. This year we will not have a Town Council grant towards grass cutting which will make the shortfall greater. Any assistance would therefore be appreciated.

The Charlbury Community Centre Appeal has marked time pending a project being taken to planning. The Appeal Accounts for the year ending March 31st 2010 showed a net income during the year of £3,203 with a total at the end of the year of £140,389. Further income since has raised this to over £142,000. I would like to thank Richard Neville as the Treasurer for taking good care of these funds for us.

The Playing Close railings are being repainted under the Community Payback Scheme. Participants in the scheme are working on each Thursday when the weather is suitable and have already completed the preparation of the railings.

Activities on the Playing Close this year include the Farmers' Markets (next one on Saturday, March 12th), the Scouts and Guides May Day Fair (on May 2nd), and the Fun Fair (which is provisionally open from July 7 to 10).

I am in my 11th year as Chairman of Trustees and told my fellow trustees a while ago it was time for me to retire which I am now doing at the end of March. We have an excellent group of trustees with a wide range of skills but they are very busy people and do not feel they can commit to the extra time that is needed by the Chair. My fellow trustees are therefore looking for a replacement for me. We are also looking for a new secretary as Helen Wright is standing down at the same time and another trustee. 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
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

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A DAY'S LIFE

**Nick Way -
Director General
Historic Houses

I am usually up first at 6.30am and after a shower, I get cups of tea for Sue and myself. I encourage the boys to get moving for school and after a breakfast of Quaker Oats and milk, I go for the 7.26am train to London and my son comes with me. It is nice when Sue joins us when she is working in Reading. Our other son catches the bus to Burford school. I find the time in the train useful, as I can catch up with my e-mails and read reports. My work involves all aspects of the Historic Houses Association. There are 1500 members, who own listed houses and gardens. These buildings

affect the way they live. I say that if the house 'lives you', then you need to be in the HHA. Apart from house-owning members, we have 32000 Friends. We are not as big as the National Trust but there are more historic houses open to the public in the HHA than the National Trust and English Heritage combined. Friends of the HHA can visit houses free of charge and are able to go to houses that are not open to the general public on special tours. We have the Friends representative for the Thames and Chiltern group living in Charlbury - Margaret Jowett. Often when I get to London I will go straight to a meeting. The other day Edward Harley, elected President of the HHA, and I met Richard Benyon, the Minister for the Natural Environment and Fisheries, with responsibility for rural affairs. We wanted him to become aware of the contribution historic houses make to tourism and the local economy. HHA houses attract 14 million visitors a year. They also provide employment; for instance, Chatsworth is the biggest employer in its parliamentary constituency with 600 staff. Conservation of traditional farm buildings is also important to the countryside, and the Common Agricultural Policy is responsible for channelling money into heritage initiatives. After the meeting, I will go to my office, which is just behind the Queen's back garden. We have a staff of eight and a lot of our work is giving practical advice and support to our members.

This advice covers a wide variety of topics. Some people have never opened their houses to the public before, and we make suggestions about how they can make it more suitable and deal with matters of conservation. They are likely to get a wide range of visitors, with educational visits by schools and adult education students. Learning and outreach facilities are important with one fifth of our members providing them, so they will have to develop relations with the local education authority. Some offer their gardens for bespoke visits from groups as diverse as ex-prisoners, refugees from Iraq or Bangladeshi wives. People from residential care enjoy days out in these houses.

Property owners are often asked for the use of their houses for television or films. For example, many people will know that Downton Abbey is in real life Highclere Castle near Newbury. Owners of smaller houses need help with negotiating film contracts. We have experience of this and can advise them. Tax and insurance are areas where we are often asked for help. I also have to encourage the government to keep heritage tourism firmly in its sights. It is the reason tourists quote most often for coming to England. I have recently written to John Penrose, the Tourist and Heritage Minister about this and also about cutting the red tape that historic houses have to deal with. For instance, Knebworth House, which pioneered rock concerts and brought additional income to a semi-rural area, is being priced out of the large concert market because of the present system of licensing. It has to have a similar licence to the O2 but without the ability to share the cost over so many events per year.

I think my education and early work prepared me well for this job. I was brought up in Solihull—(Sue and I went to the same primary school but we did not know each other then!) and from there I studied History and Economics at Cambridge University. In my first job at the Ministry of Agriculture, I was private secretary (a 'Bernard' in Yes Minister terms) to the Minister of Food and Trade, particularly export promotion. I worked in three different areas, dealing with matters connected to the Common Agricultural Policy, international trade and liaising with business people promoting British food abroad. I got to know Brussels rather well!. I was living in London and at this time met Sue. We met at a mutual friend's party, which was held on a pubship on the Thames called the "Tattersall Castle" . We married and continued to live in London. I changed jobs in 1989 and went to work for the Country Land and Business Association, better known as the CLA, which had ideas ahead of its time about paying farmers to look after the countryside. My job was to set up the CLA's lobbying in London and Brussels. In-house lobbying involves developing good and lasting relationships with people. Working with others I was pleased to persuade the government to open the way, through legislation, for new agricultural tenancies, which revitalised the tenancy sector. The CLA, in alliance with environmental organisations, also managed to persuade Gordon Brown in 2002 to put five hundred million pounds into paying land managers to look after the countryside by redirecting CAP food production support to landscape and habitat conservation.

It was when I was at the CLA that Sue and I moved in 1992 to Charlbury. The key was that Sue's job with National Power as an in-house lawyer was relocated to Swindon. Charlbury suited us both for travelling and also as there would be a good primary school within walking distance. Sue was then recruited to teach Business Law at the new Oxford Institute of Legal Practice. I became Director of Policy for the CLA but in 2005 after sixteen years with them, I felt the need for a change. I applied for my present post because it seemed to combine my interests in history, geography, economics – and people - with my previous experience.

My lunch is often a working one – for instance the other day I had sandwiches with a meeting of our successors' group. These are people who know they are going to take over a historic house and we help them prepare for it. They are given practical advice and also they get to meet each other. Martin Fiennes from Broughton Castle has just handed over to two owners of different properties, who are going to run a joint chairmanship. I also work with the Heritage Alliance, the umbrella group for heritage organisations giving them a single voice. Lloyd Grossman is a very effective chairman of this organisation. Later in the afternoon I spend more time on the letter to John Penrose, which is being produced with the National Trust, pointing out how important it is that organisations such as ours have a united voice. I usually catch a train home around 6.20 p.m. using the journey to check my computer. With luck I am home before eight o'clock for an evening meal. I also travel within the UK including to Scotland two or three times a year. Scotland is very important at the moment with the elections for the Scottish Parliament in May. We are putting together a manifesto for candidates explaining the importance of historic houses in Scotland. In some areas it is the only employer. Equally tourism is crucial to the Scottish economy. We are recruiting a new part-time organiser there and I was in Edinburgh doing that recently.

My weekdays are very full and evenings are for catching up with what is going on at home. Therefore weekends are sacrosanct for me as a time to spend with the family and relax. We might go to a film or local music night or I might take our lads to a football match. Our beloved Birmingham City are struggling in the Premier League but have just reached the final of the Carling Cup! One of our boys plays for Wychwood FC and I like to watch some of his matches too, which is much more enjoyable! Sue and I have a project to walk the Thames path. We have been doing it for four years and have got as far as Shiplake. We hope to make the Thames Barrier by the Olympics but might arrive a year late! We also enjoy visits home from our daughter, who is in her first year studying history at Sheffield and we are planning to go and see her in her Yorkshire habitat.

I enjoy my job. It is very rewarding to see an owner of a house getting enthusiastic about a project we have helped with, such as a new visitor centre or an educational project. It is also good to see an owner of perhaps not a very well known property breathing life back into it – a real labour of love. Recently in Markenfield Hall in North Yorkshire they restored the Great Hall. It had been used as a granary and then left idle for 200 years. Now it is used as a convertible sitting room and meeting room. There is a great atmosphere as it is lived in again. I am usually ready for bed by eleven o'clock. I like to read before I go to sleep. At present I am reading 'The Music Room' by William Fiennes, younger brother of Martin – a beautifully written and touching book. I am a member of a book and discussion group in Charlbury and am always behind on my reading for that! I sleep well and look forward to the next day.

Another Year (2010) cert 12A, 129mins

Although it narrowly missed out on the Palme d'Or at the 2010 Cannes Film Festival, Mike Leigh's film is acclaimed as one of his finest. It is a typically dry slice of British social-realist cinema with a host of richly formed characters and sharp dialogue from a seasoned cast on top form.

The story drops us into each season of a year in the life of an everyday couple played by Jim Broadbent (*The Damned United*) and Ruth Sheen (*Vera Drake*). Through family tragedy, friends' breakdowns and new arrivals, Leigh keeps a light grip on the film, letting the conversation flow with quintessential British wit as emotions are gradually stripped bare in a series of seemingly inconsequential events.

Number one on the list of films ChOC members wanted us to show this season, Another Year is a reflection on how we live the later years of life.

'Another Year is the first Leigh film that only an older man could have devised; it speaks eloquently of narrowing options and fading hopes in life's later years. Yet, for all its bleak moments, Gerri and Tom represent a good way of negotiating life – with kindness and good cheer.' (Daily Telegraph)

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


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CHARLBURY MUSEUM NEWS

(In April this year we will celebrate the wedding of Prince William and Kate Middleton. The last time an eldest son of a Prince of Wales was married was in 1893, with the wedding of Prince George (the future George V) and Princess May of Teck. It might be interesting to see how Charlbury marked that occasion.)

The Royal Wedding – The Charlbury celebrations (from the *Oxford Times*)

'The Royal Wedding on Thursday July 6th was marked in Charlbury when at 2 pm 400 children assembled on the Playing Close, and were conveyed in six wagons, gaily decorated with flags and evergreens, to Cornbury Park, accompanied by the Town Band. The Vicar, Mr Morris, Mr Kay and Mr Richards helped to seat the children comfortably in the waggons. Upon arrival at the park games were indulged in till tea, and afterwards until the time to return home.

Also, during the afternoon the new bathing-place was opened. The opening ceremony was performed by Miss Edith Maisey in the presence of upwards of 200 visitors. Some aquatic sports were arranged by Mr Jones and prizes competed for. A free tea was provided at the river, by Mr Jones's kindness, and a club tea and dance took place. In the town a number of flags were displayed from various residences, and the Union Jack was hoisted on the church tower. The church bells also rang a merry peal.'



Africa United (2010) cert 12A, 88mins

The extraordinary story of three Rwandan kids who walk 3000 miles to the Soccer World Cup in South Africa through the endless horizons of Africa in pursuit of an unlikely dream.

As they walk they gather a tribe – a ragamuffin team – of broken and brilliant characters who help them negotiate a way through a series of glorious, dangerous, hilarious and often bizarre situations. Through these kids, we encounter an Africa few people ever get to see; we experience the hard reality of an epic walk through seven countries as well as the joy, laughter and hope – ‘the ubuntu’ – that comes from making an incredible journey together.

The writer, Rhidian Brook, has structured the story of orphan Dudu, his younger sister Beatrice (Sanyu Joanita Kintu) and middle-class soccer fanatic Fabrice (Roger Nsengiyumva) as a road movie. The feature debut of director Debs Gardner-Paterson, *Africa United* is a UK/ South Africa/Rwanda co-production, shot in three countries and with the emphasis squarely on the experience of young black Africans. *'Director Debs Gardner-Paterson gets disarming performances from her young leads and the soundtrack is terrific.'* (Total Film)

Sacred Words: 400 years of translations of the Bible

400 years ago this year the most celebrated book in the English speaking world, the King James or Authorised Version of the Bible, was published. Charlbury has a special link with the King James Bible through Ralph Hutchinson, Vicar of Charlbury, who was one of the panel of Oxford scholars appointed to oversee the revision of earlier English translations. 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

The threat to the Library, the state of the roads and the so-called 'noise problem' seem to be the dominant Charlbury issues at the moment. The first two are OCC matters but we are all able to lobby, write and ring up as much as possible. The third is of WODC concern so I will address it here, though things may have changed by the time you read this.

The character and structure of a community is very delicate; it has developed almost organically, created by the efforts of its inhabitants or by chance. Some things get discarded and are no longer needed: others disappear and are much missed; many are retained and become cherished traditions. In ordering the life of a community no-one can please everyone all the time; the most one can do is to try to please most people most of the time.

The application by Cornbury for a premises license initially caused some alarm because it seemed so wide-ranging. However, WODC Licensing Panel considered it carefully with much deliberation and finally granted the application but with many alterations and amendments. Most of the objectors were reassured and felt that this was a sensible compromise but, at the time of writing, an appeal has been lodged against this decision. This appeal has put the existence of the Music Festival, much enjoyed by many and enabling a great deal of money to be raised for local schools, in jeopardy. People are worried as to how far this hard-line approach will threaten well loved events like the Beer Festival or Riverside. Let us hope that the unique character of Charlbury as a beautiful, quiet Cotswold town but one which is also lively and vibrant, will survive and the spirit of compromise triumph.

The past winter months have been difficult due to inclement weather affecting a new, and in general much appreciated, waste collection service. And now we are dealing with financial cutbacks on many fronts too. The local train and bus services have operated reasonably well, and the new dual track Cotswold Line that is currently under construction should have advantages too, especially if the increased parking possibilities envisaged at Charlbury station can be financed. These will be really important if less funding is available for bus services.

The Draft Core Strategy for West Oxfordshire is out for consultation until March 11th. This draft plan will then be finalised before submission to an independent Inspector later in the year. However the system is forever changing and in theory at least the Localism Bill will devolve greater powers to local councils and neighbourhoods, and establish new rights for communities which could give them more control, for example, over local housing decisions. In West Oxfordshire major new housing developments are proposed for Witney and Carterton but should they go to the west, the east, or the north of each settlement. There are no other major plans for housing expansion in the current plan, but even locating fifteen affordable homes to meet present needs in Charlbury is not an easy decision.

The Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG) is a multi-agency problem-solving group working with the police to tackle neighbourhood priorities identified by the community. A survey conducted last autumn by the neighbourhood team to identify these priorities for 2011 made for interesting, yet encouraging reading: **No. 1 priority: No issues (!)**; No. 2: Anti-social behaviour; No. 3: Speeding; No. 4: Parking

CRIME: The results of this survey are echoed by recent Charlbury crime figures for July-September 2010, compared to the same period last year: **All crimes: -25%** (Chipping Norton -38%); **Anti-social behaviour: -17%** (Chipping Norton -51%). Over the Christmas period, Charlbury (like other local towns and villages) was described by the neighbourhood police team as a 'tumbleweed town'. The only blot on this quiet picture was a spat of burglaries in the wider local area. The majority of these took place in houses whose doors or windows were left open/unlocked, or where ladders were left unsecured and subsequently used by burglars. The police advice is clear: You should **lock your front and back doors, and make sure that burglars can't use your ladders to get into your house.**

DOG FOULING: There seems to be a minority of recalcitrant dog owners who regrettably do not clear up after their dogs.. Dog fouling on the pavements is the most offensive type of litter on our streets, and it can also be dangerous. The sight of a toddler visibly shaken after slipping on dog dirt in Browns Lane recently is not one that I want to see again in a hurry. So **PLEASE CLEAR UP AFTER YOUR DOG (S)!** It is the responsibility of the dog owner or the person in charge of the dog to clear up any dog foul left by their dog.

This will, of course, cause immense inconvenience to the residents of Charlbury. When this work is completed Highways can get on with the long overdue repairs to the road.

The proposed closure of the Charlbury Library has activated the community. The Friends of the Library, the Town Council and local councillors are getting together to fight this move and keep the lights on in the Library. I am sure that during the consultation period a Town Meeting will be arranged where a representative from OCC will come and answer questions and, more importantly, listen to what we have to say.

NEWS FROM CHARLBURY PRIMARY SCHOOL

The theme of this edition's column is what goes on at school during a typical lunch break. Whilst many children choose to bring a packed lunch, we are lucky enough to have a fully-equipped kitchen serving a good-quality cooked meal for those who would like one. This term the school is delighted to welcome Charlbury's Louis Buy to the post of Catering Manager. Louis, who has been working as a professional chef for the last seventeen years, is doing a terrific job of providing nutritious, tasty food to the children - sometimes nearly 100 of them! Louis started cooking at the age of five with his Nanny Sal, who was herself a trained chef. It was Nanny Sal who inspired his passion for good food and home cooking, and she is the reason Louis decided to become a chef himself. He trained at Keble College in Oxford and has worked in the kitchens of a variety of colleges and restaurants, including The Bell in Charlbury.

Getting his hands dirty growing, digging and scrubbing vegetables with Nanny Sal taught Louis the value of understanding where food comes from and the importance of 'living off the land', a message he is keen to share with the next generation. He believes it is crucial to make sure that children eat good food, because a healthy diet leads to a healthy life. He tries to cook from scratch as much as possible, and plans to use the produce grown in the school grounds to supplement the local fresh food supplied by the County Council's catering service, which includes meat from nearby Callow Farm. The children are very enthusiastic about Louis's home-cooked dishes and when asked about their favourites, there are cries of, amongst others, "pizza, savoury rice, vegetable lasagne, yorkshire puddings and carrot cake!"

Lunch is usually served 'family style' with tables of mixed year groups including two children who serve the food to the others on their table. The children are also encouraged to help themselves to extra vegetables from the serving dishes on the table, and to pass the dishes to those who want them. This creates a very congenial atmosphere.

After lunch it's time to play! In addition to the existing variety of outdoor activities, we noticed how much children of all ages are enjoying the new climbing frame which was purchased recently with money generated by fundraising activities. The school would like to thank everyone in the community for supporting our fundraising events and making it possible to provide the children with such an excellent facility. WINTER WEATHER REPORT

November 2010 was a month when records tumbled – one after another! The month started rather warm, with a maximum temperature of 59° on 5th, but then began to fall. Nevertheless, by around mid month, they were still averaging about normal. The second half of the month was cold, especially the last seven days when daytime temperatures were in the 30s. The coldest day was 30° on 28th, but temperatures remained at or below freezing during the final three days of the month. This broke the previous November day low temperature of 32°, recorded in 1993. Overall, November 2010 averaged 44.43° (21 year average 48.96°) and was the second coldest, with only 1993, at 44.10° being colder. At night, it was also a shock to the system, with temperatures ranging from 55° on 4th/5th down to a record low of 20° on 28th/29th. Actually, the previous low record of 24° was equaled on 26th/27th, broken on 27th/28th (22°) and then again the following night.

Autumn 2010 was below average in each month (September, October & November). Overall it was 54.27 (average 56.88).

If November came as a shock, then **December 2010** turned out to be a bigger one. The 21 year average daytime maximum temperature for December is 43.38°. In 2010, we only reached this figure on one day - 44° on 11th. Every other day was below average. The month started with another three days where the temperature stayed at or below freezing. During the month, this happened on no less than thirteen days, with the lowest being 27° on Christmas Day. Needless to say, December 2010 turned out to be by far the coldest in the last 22 years with an average of 35.06°. The previous coldest December was in 1995 (38.19°). With daytime temperatures being so low, it will not come as a surprise that some nights were bone-chillingly cold! We had an air frost on 25 of the 31 nights, and this must be a record. The coldest temperature was on 19th/20th at 10° (*about minus 12.2°C*), the previous December record low was 15° in 1991 and we got lower than that on four nights in 2010. The highest night temperature was 38° on 10th/11th. Although I do not have easily accessible records for night time low temperatures over the 22 years, I did decide to calculate the average low for December 2010. This came out at 26.74° and I suspect that it is the first time during this period that any month has produced an average below freezing. To add to this, if we take the average maximum day and minimum night temperatures during the month the result is a mean temperature below freezing, at 30.90°, which must also be a record low.

Remaining on the subject of records being broken, **2010 as a whole** was the coldest in the last 22 years, the previous record being 55.53° in 1996. The average maximum daytime temperature was 55.22°, which is well below the 57.58° for the previous 21 years, with only three months (April, June and July) being above average.

January 2011 was also a colder than usual month, but nothing compared with December. Daytime maximum temperatures ranged from 53° on 13th down to 33° on 29th. The average was 41.81° which was somewhat below the average for 1989-2010 of 43.86°. At night, an air frost was recorded on 14 occasions, with the lowest 24° on 30th/31st. The warmest night during the month was 49° on 13th/14th and 14th/15th.

Charlbury Beer Festival To Support An Overseas Project

Members of the Charlbury Beer Festival committee have decided to give a small share of the overall proceeds of the annual Beer Festival to an overseas project. This idea has been brewing for a while, and reflects the committee's vision of connecting Charlbury with communities far less advantaged than our own, and ensuring that the funds raised from the Beer Festival are allocated fairly and responsibly across a spectrum of community projects.

The plan is to identify a project working with disadvantaged children in a poor country. The project would have to qualify for our help in the same way a project here does – i.e. to be a recognised charity, with audited accounts and with a need for a small amount of funds for a specific piece of equipment or for an event. The project should have some connection with Charlbury, and at least one member of the committee will be expected to be personally familiar with the project before any funding is given. With the agreement of Mrs Jane Holt, the Head of Charlbury Primary School, we are also hoping that that the recipients will be interested in establishing and maintaining links with the school, to give local children an opportunity to share photos and experiences with children in developing countries.

We have identified Zimbabwe as a priority country for assistance, given the stresses that charities there are under and the many needs of poor children in that country, but our first project may well be for a solar water heater for an orphanage in India.

Real Accountability – making a real difference

Since April 2010, all Primary Care Trusts have a duty to report on consultations on commissioning decisions undertaken during the financial year. 'Real Accountability' shows how consultation and engagement have helped to shape and inform health services in Oxfordshire. From end of life care, improvements to patients experience in community hospitals to the enhanced medical services offered by some GPs such as dermatology clinics, we have asked people what they think, what we could do to improve and develop services. We have used that feedback to improve patient experience and develop services that really meet the needs of their users.

The examples in 'Real Accountability' also show the range of methods we have used to consult people, including online surveys, focus groups, public meetings, attending existing community groups and one to one interviews. As part of the consultation process we engage with different people, groups and organisations to make sure we reach as many relevant people as possible.
