The Botany Spot

Winter is almost here and whilst in late November and early December some of the autumn flowering plants linger on producing one or two blooms, and a few nuts and berries still cling to the hedgerows, the countryside begins to look very bare.

Even now though, there remain things to interest the botanist – I always enjoy examining the winter twigs of the trees and bushes along the field edges. With a bit of practice it is quite easy to identify many of them and some are really attractive.

Dogwood *Cornus sanguinea*, with its purplish-red twigs stands out even in the weak winter sunshine and **Ash** *Fraxinus excelsior* has very characteristic paired matt black buds and smooth grey twigs.

Hazel *Corylus avellana* starts to show its catkins in the autumn and very early in the new year the familiar male catkins open, covered in pollen. The female flowers are much less conspicuous and take the form of tiny red tufts of styles, barely 5mm in length, attached to a small bud.

Pussy Willow, the common name for several species of willow which produce the much loved furry catkins, flower a little later and are a real harbinger of spring.

Around this area I have spotted several different types, but the **Goat Willow** *Salix caprea*, produces particularly showy male catkins. Also beloved of children are the giant 'sticky buds' of the **Horse Chestnut** *Aesculus hippocastanum*,

some of the first buds to open once spring really starts. This is not a true native but was introduced to England from SE Europe around 1615 and recorded here in the wild by 1870.

Apart from trees and shrubs, other flowers in spring are often from bulbs or corms, making use of the energy stored underground.

Immediately January begins and the Christmas decorations are put away, faint signs of the new growing year gladden the heart in the form of the **Snowdrop Galanthus nivalis**, so loved by many the term 'galanthophile' is now widely known. Strictly Snowdrops are a garden escape, when found in the wild, but are now so widespread in all the many forms, we have adopted them as English flowers.

Winter Aconite Eranthis hyemalis from the buttercup family RANUNCULACEAE is not a native either, but has been established in the wild since the 1800s and is found in many places especially near houses.

Still available, I see one of my much read books as a child was the Flower Fairies poems and the 'Winter Aconite" sticks in the memory.

Deep in the earth I woke, I stirred. I said: 'Was that the Spring I heard? For something called!" 'No, no" they said; 'Go back to sleep, go back to bed.....

And so the poem continues with the Aconite defying advice and coming out into the ''wintry world"

(From Winter Aconite by Cicely M. Barker: Fairies of the Flowers and Trees)

These poems and their wonderful illustrations are still worth a read and introducing to younger relatives, who will find many of the flowers in the Oxfordshire countryside and in their gardens.

In January, **The Martian**, directed by **Ridley Scott** and based on the book by **Andy Weir**, is our first sci-fi film for some years. February's film **Brief Encounter** is the first in the `**ChOC Classic Cinema**' strand, more of which below.

Some of you will already know (and love) many of the films we intend to show as part of this strand. But these are films that rarely get shown on terrestrial television these days and which you may not have seen for many years. Even if you have seen them recently, we hope that you'll still come along and watch them again as part of a large and appreciative ChOC audience.

Many titles were yving for the accolade of being the first ChOC Classic. The likes of The Third Man, Kind Hearts and Coronets and Some Like it Hot all received honourable mentions and may well get an airing at a later date. But in the end we plumped for Brief Encounter (1945) as our February film. Rated the second greatest British movie of all time by the British Film Institute, Brief Encounter stars Celia Johnson as a bored housewife who begins an affair in a railway station buffet with Dr Alec Harvey (**Trevor Howard**), that soon threatens to destroy her marriage. Written by Noël Coward, directed by **David Lean** and with music by Rachmaninov, plus steam trains aplenty, all the ingredients are in place for a memorable evening. With our showing scheduled for three days before Valentine's Day, please join us to watch one of the greatest romantic dramas ever to grace the screen and help launch ChOC Classic Cinema in real style.

A Day's Life: Pradeep Shakya, cameraman and bread-maker

I am from Nepal but have lived in the UK on and off for the last fifteen years. We moved to Charlbury over five years ago and we feel very at home here. I didn't start off my life in the UK as a professional baker.

I actually trained as a cameraman and have a degree in broadcasting. When we lived in London I worked in the film industry, but gave it up to look after our children as my wife Clare worked full time. I still do a little film work and have made some short films about the artistic talent in and around Charlbury, including one about my mother in law, Patricia Freeman who is a local silversmith.

I also make music videos for musicians among the Nepali community here in the UK. The videos are based on traditional Nepali music and can be viewed on You Tube as well as on TV in Nepal! They are a little like Bollywood films, with lots of dancing but are also quite different. I am currently working with a Nepali folk singer Bir Chandra Rai who lives near Dover. There is a large Gurkha community around Dover. The Gurkhas come from the Midhills region of Nepal where the British Army still go to recruit from the three or four different tribes there. There are three regions in Nepal – the Himalava, the Midhills, and the Plains. I come from the Midhills region.

My wife Clare used to work for the British Government in South Asia so as a result we have lived in Bangladesh and India as well as doing a stint in Nepal. I have always been passionate about cooking and growing my own food but my life as a baker began in India where my wife and myself were keen to find an alternative to the sugared flat breads (naan) that you find there. I was introduced to sourdough bread by my brother in law and loved it, so I decided to try and make my own.

Real sourdough bread is made only from 'wild yeast', flour and water. However, commercial bakers often add regular active yeast to their 'sourdough' breads as well as many other additives. I started by taking a wild yeast starter back to India, after a break in the UK. The temperature and humidity is very important in making sourdough bread. It has to be right. So I made mistakes but kept going and gradually improved.

Sourdough bread has been made for thousands of years and is now getting more popular. When we returned to the UK from Delhi, I decided to carry on with my passion of making different Sourdough breads and began my own bread-making business from home. I converted a building in the yard into my bakery and bought a specialist wood fired oven from Germany.

Before setting up the business, I studied with the master baker Andrew Whitley in Edinburgh, who started the Real Bread campaign in the UK to get bread made with less additives. His course was on 'Baking for a Living'. It was a four-day course but I stayed only for three days, as I was only interested in the sourdough part. Whitley learnt about sourdough bread in Russia, and I was lucky enough to get some fifty-year old Russian culture from him that he had managed to smuggle out of Russia a few years before. It was with Andrew's wild yeast that I started my business – The Bread Shed. My culture is made from flour – usually rye flour- and water, mixed and left overnight. To get a stronger culture, I halve the mixture, add more water and some salt and this takes a week to ferment.

When I first started, I made bread only one day a week but I have slowly increased it to two days. I now bake on Tuesdays and Fridays. The sourdough process is a long one. It takes 24 hours, so I need to start it the day before the baking day. About 11am on the day before, I begin to feed the starter culture with a little more flour and water and leave for the next 18 hours. On the baking day, about 6am, I mix the bread flour with water - making two loaves takes about 800g of flour and 600ml of water, but the exact amounts depends on the type of flour I'm using. I leave this for about half an hour before adding

about 192g of the culture. Mixing the flour and water together a little while before adding the culture gets the gluten going and shortens the kneading process. I also add a little salt. I now leave the dough to ferment, a process called bulk fermentation.

I also light the oven at 6am. I have a German Haussler oven. It takes about 18 kilos of firewood. I source this locally, buying the wood in larger pieces and using a log splitter to get the pieces the right size for the oven. It takes two hours to burn and reaches a temperature of about 500° C. I spread the embers and when the oven cools to 310° C, I can bake.

In the meantime I knead the bread. I used to do it all by hand, but now as I make about 30-35 loaves in a batch, I use a dough machine. Depending on the flour I'm using, I put the loaves in either a loaf tin or a Benetton basket, which is made of rattan, to prove. Proving takes about two hours. The loaf tins are rectangular, and I use them for organic stoneground flour. The Benetton baskets can be round or oblong, but both have curved sides. I use these for loaves made of rye, or spelt, or wholemeal. Occasionally I make baguette-type loaves, putting them to prove in a linen cloth. I put a different mark on each type of loaf so that it is easy to tell what flour they are made from. When the oven is at the right temperature, I rake out the embers and brush the floor clean, and put in the loaves. I put the tins in the oven, but the loaves that are in the Benettons I take out and cook directly on the oven floor. They take about 30 minutes to cook.

Lastly, I deliver the loaves to my customers. I mostly bake to order, and supply the bread to the Charlbury Deli, Chadlington Quality Foods, a local veg box scheme, as well as taking private orders. Occasionally I will bake more loaves and take them to special events, such as Chadlington Apple Day, and the Plough Inn at Kingham. I tend not to do the local markets, as it is not financially worthwhile, as the stall rents are too high for me. Eventually, I would like to bake more, but I am taking it slowly at the moment. I would like to increase the variety of breads I make, for example, making some focaccia but I also need to find time for my other passions: cooking, gardening, photography and woodwork as well as spending time with my family.

Am I an organised person? I have to be!

























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Charlbury Society

Charlbury Community Centre

As Mr Cameron observed when he, along with former Charlbury resident and celebrated actor, Freddie Jones, officially opened Charlbury Community Centre on 9th September, "This is a fantastic facility made possible by all those who have volunteered their time and energy – as well as generosity – to provide our community with a space that everyone will benefit from".

A place to connect, read, learn and play. It has always been our aim to offer something for everyone and during its first three months, the Centre has made fantastic progress.

It's great to see groups of friends getting together in the café and young people meeting each Friday evening for the youth club in The Thomas Gifford Room and sports hall. And it's a sight to behold three afternoons a week in term-time when 60 children from Charlbury Primary School are in the sports hall for their PE classes. There's storytime for little ones in the library, fitness classes for all ages and ability, pool and table tennis, sports that some people have never heard of...... And there's still more that can be done!



The new library is a fantastic facility with its warm and welcoming environment, and the added benefit of the self-service machine allows books to be borrowed or returned at any time when the Centre is open, even outside library hours. Many of Charlbury's sports clubs have regular bookings in the main hall, and new activities including pickleball and walking football have got off to a flying start. Witney & District Football League is running a futsal tournament that will start in December and continue throughout the winter season, putting Charlbury at the forefront of this fastgrowing sport. Badminton courts can be booked on a casual or regular basis and there's now a thriving Monday evening club. These are just some of the regular activities taking place at the centre.

For 2018, we are working with Age UK to provide activities such as strength and balance classes for older people. There's so much exciting potential and to make sure that no-one, of any age or ability, misses out through lack of opportunity, we need your feedback and ideas. How about a jigsaw club? Scrabble and chess sessions? Board games? A reading club? If you are interested, please let us know, and there's a suggestion box in the reception area for other ideas. Or just pop in and talk to Jenny.

These are some of the points you have raised:

Q. There's still work going on to complete the building. What more needs to be done?

A. Inevitably with a project of this scale, there have been a few teething problems, especially with the operation of the main doors, all of which the contractor, Beard, is committed to resolve. The new front canopy frame is now installed, and the next stage will be to add glazing over the part nearest the building so it will provide a sheltered approach to the main entrance.

Chelsea Flower Show garden designer, Susan Dunstall (who lives in Charlbury) has donated her time and expertise to create a planting scheme for the borders, which will be carried out over the coming weeks when the conditions are favourable. Unlike Chelsea, the Community Centre gardens are for the long-term and will mature at their own pace with the emphasis on fragrance and seasonal interest.

Q. Can the café have longer and different opening times, for example, on Sunday?

A. We are working closely with Charlbury Deli, which operates the café and we are listening to people's comments. Café hours will be adapted to suit the busiest times, and any changes will be posted on the Centre's website and in the café/reception area.

Q. Can I book the centre for a children's party?

A. It's a perfect venue! A suggested programme is one hour in the sports hall with Jenny or Jason to burn off some energy, perhaps using some of the sports equipment, followed by an hour in The Thomas Gifford Room for games and refreshments. Bring your own food, or catering can be provided on request.

Q. What about activities for children in the school holidays?

A. This October half-term Jason organised three very successful afternoons of activities in the sports hall, which is likely to be just the forerunner of regular programmes for the future.

Q. Are the iPads in the library available for anyone to use?

A. There are currently three iPads available for all visitors to the centre. They will also be invaluable for searching the library catalogue, reserving books and for general browsing when, for example, all the library PCs are occupied or when the library is closed. They can also be used by young people attending the youth club, but only under supervision. Ask a member of staff or a volunteer if you would like to borrow one.

Q. Can I bring my dog into the centre?

A. To ensure that the Community Centre provides a pleasant and comfortable environment for all visitors, we regret that only assistance dogs are allowed inside. There are tethering and drinking stations just outside both entrances.

A question of sport

Q. I want to get fit but don't want to join in a team sport. What is there for me?

A. There are weekly yoga, Dancercise and Pilates classes in The Thomas Gifford Room.

At the time of going to press, Jason's first **Commit To Get Fit** programme, a new seven-week course of exercise classes, will be underway, and it's not too late to join in. It consists of one body -conditioning and two circuit-based classes with people working at their own pace in a fun, relaxed environment. How Charlbury got a new Library

The story begins in 1997, when Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) was considering the closure of 30 of the County's smaller libraries to save money. The Town Council (CTC) arranged a public meeting to consider this on 21 November and it was at this meeting that there was a suggestion that the Friends of Charlbury Library (FOCL) should be created. Interested residents registered an interest and the first meeting was held on 10 December.

The priority had to be to retain the Library but it was agreed that if we were successful, we would then campaign for better premises as the current one was cramped, too small and had no access for the disabled.

Thanks to an anonymous donation we were able to leaflet every house in the town explaining the situation and providing a sample letter to be sent to the MP. A petition was started and delivered to the OCC Chairman and the County Librarian on 20 January. Nearly a third of the population had signed. A coach took protesters to County Hall on 27 January 1998 when the relevant OCC committee was debating the Library closure.

On the day, we left the Spendlove carrying residents ranging in age from 90 years to 6 months! We had a banner and posters and joined other similar groups outside the Hall. One speaker from each Library was allowed to address the meeting. The meeting lasted all day and the outcome was that no Library would close but the opening hours and book fund would be reduced. This was good news and FOCL were now able to move on to the campaign for a new Library. Thanks to generous donations from those on the coach, we were able to open a bank account and began fund raising with coffee mornings. CTC also gave a grant to help pay for meeting rooms.

County Councillor Brian Hodgson was a founder member of FOCL and through him we found that our Library had been identified as below standard. The Committee visited the Library in January 1999 and saw for themselves. We then began a dialogue with the Library officers and initially looked at other venues in the town but none was suitable.

FOCL made donations of books to the Library and continued fund raising with coffee mornings, stalls at Street Fair and talks by authors including Angela Huth, Michael Crick and Prue Leith.

A feasibility study was carried out by OCC in 2002 which concluded, as had FOCL, that the ideal site for the new Library was in the Charlbury Community Centre (CCC). We agreed with OCC that we would contribute £10,000 towards the cost and this had been raised by 2007. As the funds had been raised, it was decided that activity would be put on hold for the time being.

Then in 2010, came a bombshell from OCC who were again considering Library closures, including ours. Again a leaflet was delivered to all homes and a successful Read In was held at the Library on 5 February 2011 as part of a national campaign to promote Libraries. CTC arranged a public meeting on 25 March 2011 and again FOCL took the lead in opposing the proposals. Thanks to additional government funding, once again the Library was saved but half the opening hours would be staffed by volunteers.

On 4 September this year, something happened which I had long wondered if I would live long enough to see. The new Charlbury Library opened in the new Community Centre. The space, displays, the staff counter, the children's area are a joy. The only snag was that the self-service machine was not working but that is now operating again.

It is thanks to so many people that this happy outcome came about. All the committee members and officers of FOCL over the almost 20 years, the members of FOCL who paid their subscriptions, those who attended the fund raising events and provided raffle prizes etc., CTC who supported the campaign, West Oxfordshire District Council who paid for the lost opening hours while they could, those Library officers and staff who worked with us. Jean Porrill who arranged and cooked for the Coffee Mornings, Willem Hackmann who devised competitions for the Street Fair stalls and gave the Magic Lantern show (I don't think I shall ever forget the snoring man and the rat) and the late Brian Hodgson, who contributed so much from the OCC angle and found speakers for the talks, the speakers who gave of their time and expertise for free. Rosalind Scott who took on the task of organising the volunteers. And from me, to Janet Walker and the late Nigel Walsh, my secretary and treasurer for 13 years. If I have forgotten anyone, please forgive me.

Our WI Carol Service is on Thursday 7th December at 7pm in St. Mary's Church, all are welcome and there are mince pies and mulled wine afterwards!



The money we raise will go to groups of volunteers supported by the charity Help Refugees and working with refugees mostly in France and Greece.



Charlbury Neighbourhood Forum Update

The housing question

Work is continuing on a Neighbourhood Development Plan for Charlbury. The biggest question is housing: how much the town needs, where it should go and the size and type. A report is underway looking at local housing needs. This will provide evidence on the affordability problem in Charlbury as well as the need for specialist housing for elderly or disabled residents.

In the spring, we invited landowners and developers to come forward with proposals for development sites. We received two responses, which will be considered once we have a better understanding of the scale of housing needed. You may wonder why we are looking for development sites. This is because West Oxfordshire's Local Plan will require a certain amount of new development within our area. If we can identify our preferred sites for future development in the Neighbourhood Plan, this will give us more control over its location and of the mix of housing to be built on the site. If we do not do this, we will be reliant on sites put forward by developers which might not meet the needs of the town or be well located.

Preserving Charlbury's Character

Protecting Charlbury's heritage and character is a priority for the Neighbourhood Plan. This is why we are carrying out a "character assessment" of the town. A team of 24 volunteers are, between them, visiting every street and green space in the parish. Their assessment will include the buildings, spaces, views and greenery.

Some volunteers have specialist skills in architecture, heritage conservation or local history, whereas others have no particular experience and are learning "on the job". Their work will be drawn together into a single report providing an assessment of Charlbury as seen by local people. This will be used to produce policies to protect and enhance the town's character. For example, these could be to ensure new development fits the character of the town, important features are preserved and valued views are protected. Results should be available in January.

Churches Together in Charlbury

At our AGM on 22 October we welcomed Helena Cullen from Asylum Welcome in Oxford, who told us about the difficulties of refugees arriving in the UK, especially about young refugees under 18 years with whom she works. After the trauma of leaving their home country and the dangers of travelling across the sea and much of Europe, those who manage to reach the UK who have no family here will be looked after and educated by the local authority where they are first discovered.

In the past year there were 99 young refugees, some as young as 12 years, in and around Oxford. Up to 17 years old they have financial and practical support but when they turn 18 they lose their benefits, have to re-apply for asylum and may then face deportation. Asylum Welcome gives support and advice to young people and adults facing great uncertainty about their future. The help ranges from legal and medical expertise for those applying for asylum, including those who have suffered torture, to providing a youth club, a lunch club and a food bank for people with few friends or resources.

Now Churches Together has started a new year with Stella Bristow from the Methodist Church in the chair. We are looking forward to Advent and Christmas celebrations, followed by the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in January and the Women's World Day of Prayer in March. We are also planning bread and soup lunches in various churches on Fridays in Lent in support of Christian Aid.

Also in Lent we are planning a series of talks on the theme 'Modern Prophets'. How do we define a prophet? We may think it means someone who foretells the future. Or we may have an image of a fierce Old Testament prophet shouting doom and gloom at a local tyrant. A more useful definition from the Concise Oxford Dictionary is 'a person who advocates and speaks innovatively for a cause'. In this sense a prophet is someone who sees the present situation more clearly than most of us, who faces up to reality and who recognises what might be done to change things for the better.

In these talks we shall be looking at inspirational people who have changed the way we see the world in our lifetime, particularly the way we treat other people, and what they themselves have done to bring about that change. We plan to introduce the series with a new film, 'Summer in the Forest', about the work of Jean Vanier who started the L'Arche communities where people with learning difficulties and other complex needs can live and work. Look out for more information in the New Year.

The construction of the Community Centre, relocation of the footpath, proposal for a new Football & Sports Club, and other changes together have led the council to review how Nine Acres is run, and we would like to hear your views. In particular, we would like your input on how users of Nine Acres – formal and informal – can best be represented in the day-to-day running of the field and pavilion.

Speaking at Town Council meetings

We are always pleased to offer Charlbury people the chance to speak at the Town Council's monthly meetings. We hold two regular meetings: one considering our responses to planning applications, and a full council meeting for all other matters. In common with other councils, the Standing Orders of the council do not allow for open participation during discussions, but a time is set aside at the start of each meeting for the public to address the council. In particular:

 Please contact the Town Clerk before noon on the day of the meeting to let him know you would like to speak.

- Please limit your address to five minutes (for full council, or three minutes on particular planning applications). If it is possible for people with allied views on a single topic to co-ordinate one single address, that would be appreciated.
- We publish our agenda in advance so that Charlbury people are informed what will be discussed at the meeting. This means that the council cannot usually enter into discussion of matters raised, as these will not have been published on the agenda. They can, of course, be considered for the agenda at a future meeting; or may relate to issues already on the agenda, such as correspondence received. If you'd like a written response to any questions raised, please leave your details with the Clerk.
- A brief record will be included in the minutes of the meeting. The chairman does have the right to rule any statement as inappropriate though obviously we hope this will not be the case. Please ensure that comments are not personalised.

A full set of rules, and the council's Standing Orders, are available on request from the Town Clerk.

Correspondence addressed via the Town Clerk for the attention of councillors is routinely circulated for consideration during the full council meeting. Please ensure this arrives three days before the meeting – thank you.

Permissive paths

The permissive path across Nine Acres Recreation Ground will be closed all day on Wednesday 3rd January 2018. We understand that the Wychwood Project will be closing the permissive paths across the Wigwell Nature Reserve on the same day.

In brief

The Town Council is continuing to advance plans for a 20mph speed limit in much of Charlbury, and has met again with Oxfordshire County Council and submitted revised plans. We are optimistic we now have broad agreement and that a traffic order will be published during 2018.

- We have expressed serious concern to West Oxfordshire District Council that many tasks previously done by WODC are now being carried out by a shared services company, Publica, set up with a number of Gloucestershire councils. Our concerns include consultation and the loss of local knowledge when matters concerning West Oxfordshire are dealt with in Gloucestershire.
- Congratulations and thanks to all those involved with organising and staging this year's Street Fair. (See elsewhere in the Chronicle for a full Street Fair report.)
- Cllr Ron Prew laid the Town Council's wreath at the War Memorial in St Mary's Church on Remembrance Sunday, 12th November.
- And, of course, Charlbury Town Council wishes everyone in the town a Merry Christmas and a very Happy New Year.

It feels like only yesterday that I was enjoying the delights of this year's Charlbury Street Fair, walking into the newly-opened Community Centre for the first time, or cheering on the cyclists who flew through the town as part of the Tour of Britain. So much has happened over the past few months, and I wanted to update you on a few issues which you may not have seen in the national news, as well as those of local interest.

In October, I was pleased to host a Westminster Hall debate on the Future of Healthcare in Oxfordshire, as local healthcare has been my top priority since being elected. In the debate, I made very clear my disapproval over the lack of proper consultation regarding recent healthcare decisions in West Oxfordshire; I am sure you will agree with me that patients *must* be involved in the decisions that affect them.

As many of you raised with me at my Street Surgery in the summer, or when I have been out and about knocking on doors in Charlbury more recently, protecting the natural world is a critical matter for the UK. I absolutely agree, and I hope you will welcome the recent announcement that the Government is looking into 'reward and return' recycling schemes as part of our great effort to reduce plastic waste. I also hope you will welcome the ban on ivory sales, as well as the recent reform meaning the maximum sentence for crimes of animal cruelty will be increased from six months to five years.

I was particularly honoured to speak in the debate on baby loss during Baby Loss Awareness Week. The death of a child is the most devastating loss for a parent and baby loss is too often a hidden subject, even in a community as compassionate as Charlbury; I am sure you will agree that we must do all we can to support those who have felt the pain of losing a child. I look forward to reading my purchases from the Corner House after my MP surgery there in October and I hope to see you in and around Charlbury !

At a recent Oxfordshire County Council meeting, I put forward a motion proposing a "rural weighting" for GPs in rural parts of Oxfordshire. This is because we are 30 GPs short across the County, and practices are finding it very hard to attract new GPs to an area where housing is very expensive. I put a similar motion to West Oxfordshire District Council a few months earlier, which was supported by all councillors. It was disappointing that the Conservative and Labour members on the County Council turned my motion down. However, I was very gratified to see a few weeks later that the Secretary of State has effectively adopted the principal, by offering new GPs in rural areas a "golden hello"! I hope that this will help to alleviate the shortages that we are experiencing, especially in and around Witney.

I have been going out and about with Highways officers to alert them to the problems that we have on the roads in our area. One of the worst in Charlbury was recently in Church Lane. I received an e mail from a resident one Sunday telling me that her sister-in-law had broken her ankle on a pothole there. I alerted Highways and was pleased to see that the following day the potholes had been marked up, and were filled a week later. Pleased, but also very sorry that it took an accident to get them sorted.

And even now I have to say the work is far from high quality. That is why the Lib Dem group on the Council recently proposed prudential borrowing to pay for repairing our roads, but this was turned down by the Conservatives and Labour. Our view is that unless we are prepared to borrow to repair our roads now, we will have to find even more money in future, and refusing to borrow while interest rates are low is false economy. Our roads are visibly worse than those a few miles away in Gloucestershire, and is hard to understand why that should be so.

The new WODC recycling system has been in place now for a few weeks, but it has suffered a lot of teething problems. I have had complaints from residents who have not had their blue bins delivered, and also from people who have received them but do not need them as they have no space to store them. On top of that, there have been a large number of missed collections. I raised this at a recent Environment Committee meeting. I have also raised a question regarding the fact that flyaway plastic is no longer being recycled. The answer that I received was that the processors no longer want to handle flyaway plastic as the cost is greater than the return. If it was put into recycling bins it would simply be sent to landfill. This is far from satisfactory and I have asked that the policy is reviewed regularly in case the situation changes.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish all Charlbury residents a very merry Christmas, and a happy New Year.

Recycling has dominated local services and I am afraid, the new system with a new contractor has proved to be problematic with bins not been collected, and confusion over what is being collected and how. Councillors have received many complaints and we have taken action to pass on the information and remonstrate with officers to ensure that this is put right. For clarity fly away plastic, (and that means carrier bags and light plastic wrapping) is to be placed with the main rubbish-grey bins) glass and electricals in the black box. Please let us know if you are still having problems. An apology has been issued by the council for the upheaval but really better planning, communication and foresight could have avoided many of the problems.

Can residents also please ensure bins are not left at the ends of pathways/ driveways once the rubbish has been collected. I am sure you will agree it makes our street look better.

Regarding the long awaited Local Plan, we are hoping this will be in place by February/March, a further delay caused by the inspector seeking further clarifications. An end to property speculation and the start of structured planning for housing with infrastructure will then commence and hopefully our communities can feel more confident in a sustainable future being more fully realised.

On the issue of homelessness in West Oxfordshire, I have been meeting with agencies around Oxfordshire to bring about a more comprehensive approach and understanding of homelessness. Whilst the issues are complex, the solutions of ensuring everyone has a roof over their heads can be achieved with some creative, joined up thinking together with a commitment to sustainable living. A conference is being planned to bring organisations together in the new year. If you want to help or want to contribute, please let me know! Finally, a support group is in the process of being set up for the LGBTIQ community in rural West Oxfordshire, one of the first of its kind. By the time you read this, three meetings will have been held in Chipping Norton, Charlbury and Witney and more are being planned in the new year. A plan is being drawn up so that meetings, advice and social events will take place regularly across the district, reflecting the needs of a wide cross section of the LGBTIQ community. For more information, go to Facebook LGBTIQ West Oxfordshire.

Regarding Syrian refugees housed and now living in West Oxfordshire, we need to ensure that the support offered particularly in the learning of the English language is sustained and that the good work done to date is not undone. It is too easy to forget the plight of Syrian refugees and those in other parts of the world because the news media has turned its attention elsewhere. A report will feature in the next edition.

There are a number of people in our communities who continue to lead by example and keep their campaigns going, notably CRAG in Charlbury and I want to personally thank them on behalf of us for their continual fundraising and events they arrange.

As your local councillor for two and half years now, I feel you have given me the support I need to represent you and ensure your voice is heard.

May I wish you festive greetings and may the New Year bring us all peace, support and positive outcomes!!

Travel news



Railway timetable update

Great Western Railway is planning to further improve Charlbury's n January 2nd Towards

train service from January 2nd. Towards Oxford and Paddington, the main changes are:

- On weekday mornings, a 09.50 departure replaces the 10.22.
- The 15.04 replaces the 15.40.
- A new service is introduced on Saturdays at 15.09, filling a two-hour gap.
- A new service is introduced on Sundays at 09.34, offering the earliest arrival in London at 11.01. (The 11.30 will however no longer run.)

In the other direction, the main improvement is that the 17.52 from Paddington will no longer call at Maidenhead, and will call additionally at Hanborough.

The intention is that more trains will be formed of intercity-type carriages, either the current High Speed Trains or the new Intercity Express trains. The current fivecarriage Adelante trains are moving to the North-East and much of the Turbo fleet to the West Country. Teething problems are very possible so please do check details before travelling.

For passengers travelling from Oxford Parkway to London Marylebone, Chiltern Railways has announced late return trains from London at 00.01 (Mon–Thu), 00.10 (Fri/Sat) and 01.10 (Fri/Sat). There is already a 23.10 service arriving at Oxford Parkway at 00.18, in time for the 00.27 bus to Charlbury.

GWR and Network Rail are still working on plans for the proposed car park extension but no further information has yet been published.
