METAL AND FUEL THEFTS: Occurring at

vulnerable sites (both urban and rural) including empty dwellings and offices. Farms and domestic bulk oil containers have also fallen victim to crime recently especially in the outlying villages. If you see anything suspicious please contact police immediately.

DOGS: Thousands of dogs are lost every year, many as a result of theft, and even the most reliable and well-cared for dog can get lost or stolen. Dog theft has been attributed to two broad motives - breeding and ransom.

- Make sure that your dog wears a collar and identification (ID) tag when in a public place. Include your surname, telephone number, address and full postcode.

- Microchip your dog so that it is permanently identifiable should the collar and ID tag be removed. Make sure that your dog does not go out of your sight on walks. Vary your walk times and routes.

- Make sure that your fencing is adequate and check it regularly for wear and tear. Keep your dog in view when it goes out into the garden.

- Join Dogwatch. This alert service is entirely staffed and funded by volunteers, who help the Police and RSPCA in the already excellent work that they do.

Gifford Trust News

The Trustees of the Thomas Gifford Charity have been working hard over recent months to progress our plans for the Spendlove site. Receiving confirmation from the County Council that significant funding is available represents a huge step forward - this will meet around a third of the total cost of our new community building. We are continuing to work on the necessary documentation to finalise this funding and have an agreed submission date in July. This follows the County Council's verification that the funds are ring-fenced for our Spendlove project, provided that we submit a robust business plan. We have therefore appointed an experienced cost consultant to assist in this process. Once the funding is formally confirmed, we will be in a positive position to implement first stage building design. To keep you all informed, we intend to publish our proposed programme for the community development in the next issue of the *Charlbury Chronicle*.

In the meantime, we will be arranging meetings over the next two months with members of local groups and potential users of the new community building, to discuss your interests and opportunities for involvement. We are already in discussion with The Friends of the Library, and now wish to extend this exploration to all groups having an interest in this exciting project.

Alongside community discussion, the Charlbury Community Centre Appeal fund-raising group is organising a calendar of events over the coming months. The recent Desert Island Flicks evening with Sir Ben Kingsley was a great success. We are exceedingly grateful to Sir Ben and also to Graham Ralph the interviewer. Thanks also go to Ed Fenton and the team who organised the evening – they have plans for others to follow. The advertisement opposite shows details of the next major event - The First Night of the Proms – get your voices ready to join in!

Thanks to members of the County, District and Town Councils for their continuing support. We look forward to working closely with them in the future, in particular to ensure that our proposals are complementary to, and co-ordinated with, Charlbury's other community facilities.

Charlbury School spread sunshine for Variety, the Children's Charity

Last year Variety launched Sunshine Week, a brand new fundraising week for schools all over the UK with the aim to build awareness and raise vital funds to help us continue the important work that we do. As a Charlbury girl myself and past pupil, I was absolutely delighted when Charlbury School got in touch about supporting the cause with their very own Sunshine Day fundraiser. It was a pleasure to be able to go and visit the school in a sea of yellow and speak to the pupils and staff about the work of the Charity. Charlbury School went on to adopt Variety as their Charity of the year for 2012 and will be supporting the cause by holding various fundraiser and the pupils were sponsored by friends and family to complete it. So far they have raised £2500 and are creeping ever closer to their target of £3000 – Amazing!!!

Every penny really does count but this sum of money can make a huge difference to a child's life. Each year Variety provides:

- Numerous Sunshine Coaches which give hundreds of children and young people opportunities they would otherwise never enjoy.
- Hundreds of wheelchairs giving children a lifeline to explore the wider world. Specialist equipment such as car seats hoists and also modified beds – items which are critically important for a child's development and life experience.

Our objective is to increase a child's independence, level of confidence and self-esteem. We also aim to increase physical health, communication skills and very importantly enable them to spend more time together with their friends and family. However, the work of Variety has never been in greater demand and we can only fund around half of the urgent appeals we receive. Support and donations from individuals and schools like Charlbury enable us to continue the work that we do.

2012 is such an important year for sport in the UK and we are delighted to be supporting a number of Paralympians in partnership with Sports Aid. Over the past few years Variety has helped to fund equipment, training and travel expenses to ensure that these young athletes can reach their goal of Team GB. So far we can announce that 5 have been picked for their disciplines ranging from swimming to boccia and we can't wait to see them in action this summer.

Charlbury School Olympics fundraiser will be held on June 22nd.

Our Own Double-dip Recession - according to our Chronicle Weather Man!

The strange fact about 2012, so far, has been its failure to keep to a normal pattern. Usually, temperatures rise steadily, month by month, from January to either July or August – July is the warmest on average. This year has been different. February was colder than January and April colder than March, giving a graph the appearance of a double-dip.

February 2012 started very cold with temperatures not rising above 45° until 15th. The coldest day was 30° on 11th. This was one of three days when the temperature did not rise above freezing. The second half of the month was somewhat warmer, with the highest temperature of 57° on 21st. The average daytime maximum temperature was 43.76° and this was lower than that for January 2012. The 23 year average for February is 45.98°. At night, minimum temperatures ranged from 48° on 23rd/24th down to a record low of 14° on 10th/11th. Air frosts were recorded on 13 nights.

Winter 2011/12 (December to February) was slightly warmer than normal with an average of 44.93° – the 22 year average is 44.27°.

By contrast to February, **March 2012** was a very warm month. Daytime maximum temperatures averaged 54.13° (23 year average 51.35°). The warmest day was 28th at 63° and the coolest 44° on 4th. There was a particularly warm spell from 22nd to 29th when the temperature rose to 60° or above each day, with almost unbroken sunshine during this period. At night, temperatures ranged from 45° on 9th/10th down to 30° on 5th/6th. Air frosts were recorded on just 4 nights.

By contrast again, **April 2012** proved to be one of the most unsettled months in recent years, with showers, or periods of rain on most days. Daytime temperatures fluctuated between 58° and 46° until 30th, when a high of 61° was recorded. The lowest days were 6th and 28th. Overall, the daytime average maximum was 53.33° (the average for the previous 23 years was 57.06°) and it was the second coldest April since my records began in 1989. The coldest was, in fact, 1989 at 52.45° and that was followed by an exceptionally warm summer. At night, temperatures ranged from 28° on 5th/6th to 45° on 26th/27th, with air frosts on just 3 nights, the last of which was on 15th/16th.

In this edition, I thought I'd take the opportunity to talk about a few things we can all do to help save a little on our gas and electricity bills. My five 'top tips':-

If the colder winter weather is behind us, consider adjusting your central heating timers to provide less heating hours (or can it be turned off completely?)

- If you do feel chilly, make sure you're dressed accordingly in the first instance. Some natural material can be better than synthetic ones, so grab your nice warm woolen jumper! A hot, healthy meal will help you to feel warm too, but if it's still cold, put the heating on (the evenings can be especially cold if it has been a lovely sunny day with little cloud around)
- Draw curtains at dusk to trap the heat in the home tuck them behind radiators where appropriate. Insulate your home:- now really is the best time to get unfilled cavity walls, and lofts topped up. Insulation is unlikely to be this cheap ever again!

CHARLBURY TOWN COUNCIL REPORT, No. 62 By Councillor Helen Bessemer-Clark

<u>Charlbury Town Council</u>: The vice Chairman, Councillor Gareth Miller, resigned from the Town Council on 7th February for personal reasons. Because this was within 3 months of a scheduled election for the whole Council a By-election was not permitted and the Council decided not to co-opt anybody to fill the vacancy. Councillor Miller was elected to the Town Council in 2008.

Councillor Valou Pakenham-Walsh was elected Vice-Chairman at the Council meeting on 22nd February.

The following Councillors did not seek re-election in May: John Harrison (first elected in 1988, Chairman 1992-95, Vice Chairman for 9 years), Ian Cox and Nicolette Lethbridge (Co-opted 2004, then elected 2008), Helen Bessemer-Clark (elected 2008). Gareth Miller and all four retiring councillors are warmly thanked for their service to the community. District Councillor Glena Chadwick (Lib.Dem) did not seek re-election in May. She was first elected to represent the Charlbury ward in 2000 and then the Charlbury and Finstock Ward (including Fawler) in 2002. She is also thanked most warmly for her service to the community.

The first meeting of the new Town Council was held on 16th May, when the Chairman was elected, and appointments made. Details will be in the September Chronicle, and on the Charlbury Town Council Website.

As this is the last article to be written covering the work of the elected Town Council for the last four years, it may be appropriate to summarise one or two especial landmarks during its tenure:

a) Station Car Park – Work has started on the Station Car Park extension at last! It should be finished by August 6th, having been scheduled to start on 16th May. We now need to encourage people to use it, rather than park in the town. We are obviously delighted about the redoubling of the railway line and glad that First Great Western have taken on board some of our suggestions for the building of the bridge and walkways at the station. Unfortunately due to lack of resources they were unable to incorporate some minor suggestions made for the car park.

b) **Little Lees Affordable Housing** – work has already started on this project, to provide affordable housing for 15 units.. Without doubt more accommodation will be needed for those with Charlbury connections, but it is a start until further suitable sites are found.

c) **Sports Pavilion** – on Nine Acres, a much needed building project, was completed with a Grand Opening in May of last year.

d)**Transport** – thanks to valiant efforts by all members of the community in signing petitions and writing to Oxfordshire County Council nearly four years ago, we have kept our Cl bus and also maintained the semi-subsidised X9 route run by RH Transport. It is vital that a similar effort be maintained during this coming year, when these same bus routes are again up for consideration for tender. Please encourage commuters you may know from nearby villages to support the Cl, as well as our own town members.

<u>Annual Parish Meeting</u> was held on 30th March, and attended by Neil Owen, our County Councillor, and Councillor Hywel Davies, District Councillor, and 8 Town Councillors, as well as 20 members of the public. A questioner from the floor was concerned with the low turn out of attendance at this meeting.

<u>The Queen's Diamond Jubilee Celebrations, 2nd-5th June:</u> You may already have received your invitation to Charlbury's Big Jubilee Lunch, which as you see will take place on the Playing Close on Sunday, June 3rd. This is being preceded by a Service, open to those of all faiths or none, at 11.0 a.m. in St. Mary's Church, the Parish Church. Charlbury Open Gardens, organised by the Street Fair Committee, will be in the afternoon, and additionally Churches Together in Charlbury are organising a Flower Festival with displays in all 5 churches. It is possible that a Beacon will be lit if a suitable location has been agreed. Watch the Notice Boards and websites for news of everything that is happening.

The Town Council's Diamond Jubilee Project is to repair and restore the ironwork on the Drinking Fountain which was erected to mark Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee . Previous Royal Jubilee projects in Charlbury have been: Erection of Shelter on 9 Acres Recreation Ground (1935), installation of iron bridge at Mill Field (1977), installation of new gates at 9 Acres Recreation Ground (2002). On behalf of Charlbury the Council have sent Loyal Greetings to Her Majesty including an acknowledgement of H.R.H. The Princess Royal's visit to the Town in 2006. (The Original letter and response sent in 2002 are in the Museum).

The Riverside Festival: Permission has been granted by the Town Council to use the Mill Field free of charge on 16th and 17th June, subject to conditions and the issue of a licence by WODC.

Public Events: A number of public events are planned to take place in and around Charlbury during the summer, very similar to those which occurred last year. Some members of the public find that such events can cause them inconvenience. Matters concerning Traffic Management, including Car Parking and Public Order, including Anti -Social Behaviour, should immediately be reported to Thames Valley Police on 101. Matters concerning noise should be reported immediately to West Oxfordshire District Council on 01993 861000 (weekdays, 0900 hrs – 1700 hrs) or 01993 705056 (during weekends and out of hours).

<u>Overhanging Branches (Pavements)</u>: This is the usual request at this time of year for residents to cut back any overhanging branches, bushes or plants, that may obstruct pedestrians walking on the pavements. It would also help to keep Charlbury tidy, if waste and recycling bins could be removed as soon after the Tuesday morning collection as possible. Wheelchair users and prampushers are particularly affected by all such pavement obstructions.

Pot Holes – a perennial! But we had hoped, following an announcement from OCC Highways Dept that the road between Spelsbury and Charlbury would be closed for three weeks in March, that at least that route would no longer tear our tyres. Unfortunately, despite OCC announcing that they are planning to improve the road between Chipping Norton and Chalford Green, they have had to cancel the Spelsbury works as they are much more expensive. It is hoped that funding will be found for this work in next year's budget.

A medium sized shrub planted well within the garden can offer a beautiful form of privacy and shelter, close at hand. When thoughtfully placed it needn't interfere with others' views, light or security. However, a shrub planted further away, at the garden's boundary, may need to be significantly larger to achieve privacy and shelter.

A large plant introduced at the garden boundary may interfere with others' views, light and security as well as create work for them, pruning and so on. Planting for privacy need never be at the cost of others: a little initial care in the placing and choice of plant will enhance the lives of everyone. Why not take the long view?

ChOC spends £4k on its own equipment for Charlbury

As many readers will know by now, ChOC (Charlbury's Own Cinema, for newcomers and the uninitiated) has bought its own cinema equipment and is now fully independent. Since May 2005, when records began and ChOC showed 'Ladies in Lavender' in the Cornbury Suite at the Bell, we've relied on Chipping Norton theatre for a projectionist and the necessary equipment. In April, 'Tinker Tailor Soldier Spy' was the 83rd film ChOC has shown, and the first to be shown without outside help. We've spent nearly £4000 (a detailed breakdown appeared as a news item on April 18 on the Charlbury website, where you can still see it) and while we are still learning how to use it, we are delighted with the results and the opportunities it opens up.

Just how far we can expand our entertainment programme, take up the ideas and suggestions that are constantly being put to us, and collaborate with other organisations in Charlbury that want to show films or offer live entertainment, will depend entirely on the strength of support we get. At present two committees with a combined membership of ten put on nearly 20 entertainment events a year. That's a lot of hard work for a few people. To grow, we need more people taking part who have an interest any aspect of the work we do, whether it's learning to operate the projector and sound system, researching and checking out films and live performers, organising the hall on the night, helping run the bar, or whatever. It doesn't mean endless boring meetings, it does mean getting on with creative and productive work bringing pleasure to many hundreds of people in the course of each year. ChOC is a team: why not join us?

Coming events: We've changed the way we book films so we can bring you the best films as soon as we can. If you offer to help in the way I've just suggested, we may be able to show additional films, including arthouse movies, more foreign films, and thematic seasons or weekends. We only decide for certain what our main film of the month will be a few weeks ahead. Our film on Sunday June 10 will be **War Horse** (Memorial Hall 7.30pm, bar from 6.45), a moving and spectacularly crafted film based on the novel by Michael Morpurgo and a true cinematic triumph. Films in the following months will include **Best Exotic Marigold Hotel** and **Salmon Fishing in the Yemen.**

It was only a year ago that the first committee meeting of ChOC*live* took place and ChOC decided to add live entertainment to its programme of films. Since then, we have staged four very different live evenings at the Memorial Hall. As you read this, perhaps you'll be thinking of the show you saw at the end of May, **The Opera Dudes**. Their reviews have been terrific. Our programme for the latter part of this year is again going to offer a diverse range of entertainment, kicking off on 29 September with **Ensemble OX**, the chamber music ensemble founded by Charlbury resident Marion Ackrill. They last performed in Charlbury in 2009 so their return is long overdue. A DAY'S LIFE

I get up at 8 o'clock, have a cup of tea and get off to work by nine. I drive to the Cowley Road in Oxford where I work for Mind, at a wellbeing project called 'The Mill' which is a centre for those with mental health problems. I get in, switch on the computers and generally prepare the building for the day ahead. It is a 1930s building, which used to belong to the Trade Union movement where

they held their union meetings. It was an information office during the war but went back to being used by the British Leyland unions in peace time. Mind bought it in 1992 and it provides us with a main hall, offices, a kitchen, a music studio and art gallery. I have another cup of tea with the other staff, usually about four and have a quick brief on the day ahead. The doors open at ten and our clients come flooding in. People who have severe and enduring mental health problems are referred to us by community health teams and other similar organisations, but other people from all walks of life who are looking for help can just walk in. You never know what the day will bring or who will turn up at the project. The first thing to do is get lunch organised for the cafe we have at the project. Between 10 and 10.30 am the 'Food Bank' van arrives. This charity collects food from local supermarkets, which is close to the sell by date and un-sellable then gives it to us and other local charities. They send us fruit, vegetables, eggs and bread. The Oxford Botanical Gardens also supply us with fresh vegetables. Then we look at the food we have and decide what to make for the day – for example, spinach, potato and vegetable curry. Volunteers and service users all help each other with the cooking. My job as a wellbeing worker covers all sorts of therapeutic and caring activities, but my main project is the running and upkeep of the music studio. We record and make CDs of singers, bands, rap artists, poets and drama group audio sketches. It has proved very successful.

The people, who come to us, all come voluntarily. It is a step for some people from being discharged from a psychiatric ward to us, a well being service. The next step can be to a recovery service, which can help them back into education or employment. The people who attend our project range in age from 18 upwards. They could be suffering from schiz-ophrenia, hearing voices, obsessive compulsive disorder, paranoia, anxiety and personality disorders. They come in every day, some from hostels, night shelters, benefit supported digs and some who are living on the streets. It's a very happy environment but sometimes we get people coming in, who are suicidal, desperate and tearful. We can arrange one to one sessions to find out what their problems are and see what we can do to help. Sometimes it is as simple as sorting out bills and benefits but often it is not. We usually have about 40 to 50 people in a day and are very busy. There is an increasing demand for our services especially with all the health cutbacks and ever increasing demands of modern life.

It is interesting how I came to work for Mind. I was born in 1965 on New Year's Eve at home in North Leigh. My Mum and Dad ran a golf glove business in Stonesfield and made gloves for most of the top players including the Ryder Cup golf team. When I was 12 my father died and my mother, younger brother and I moved to Charlbury, where I have been ever since. I was educated at the Spendlove School and was in the last year

to attend there before it closed. I joined the Royal Marines when I was 17, as my elder brother had done. In 1986, when I was twenty one I decided to join the Oxfordshire Fire Service. Early in 1987 I was present at an explosion in Ditchley Road quarry, where my sub officer and friend, John Wixey was killed. In those days there was no counselling on such occasions. I found it particularly stressful when children were involved in fires or car accidents. It was some years later when I was diagnosed as having post-traumatic stress disorder. A culmination of tragic incidents attended and lack of psychological care after the death of John Wixey led to my being medically discharged from the service in 2001. The Fire Service was a life changing experience, working with some exceptional people. I was very sad to have to leave. After that I was not very well for a few years and this experience has led to me being able to understand mental health problems first hand. I started volunteering in Oxford doing music therapy at mental health centres such as Gemini, Restore and Headway. I then met my present boss who asked me to work with her team at Mind.

In 1993 I had attended my first festival at Glastonbury and it was then that I decided to teach myself guitar. By 1995 I had had formed my own band and since then have played countless gigs in England and the south of France where we were warmly accepted. We released an album with one of the tracks being played on Baghdad radio. This was just before the war and I'd like to think this song wasn't the cause of it all!

One o'clock is time for lunch. We all have lunch together, although it is not a break for us; we are still working. The afternoon sees more courses taking place. These include art courses, silver-smithing, drama, getting into reading, lost crafts such as knitting, darning and many discussion groups. Some are psychological groups working in cognitive behaviour therapy for example catering for groups of up to twelve people. There is a good success rate with this and other psychological groups. Music therapy has an almost immediate feel good effect. The service users leave about 3 o'clock. We tidy the place up, mopping and sweeping before starting the admin including the on-line register saying how many attended and what courses they did. Then over a cup of tea, my colleagues and I meet with the volunteers and flag up anything that needs noting such as odd behaviours or any problems. It can be very distressing work and you need to share any worries or stresses you may have with the rest of the team, not take them home with you.

Depending on the traffic, which is bad at that time of day, I am usually home by 5.45pm. I then check my e-mails. I am particularly busy now with the build up to the Riverside and Cornbury festivals. I became involved with the Festival when Alan Frazer stopped doing his riverside picnics. My friends Chris Wray, Siobhan Lambert-Hurley and I decided we should carry it on. It started in a small way and has grown from there to what it is now. There is a lot of administration and we have to make sure that we have complied with all the conditions required by the WODC. These are things relating to staging, keeping everyone safe, the height and strength of the fences and electrical requirements etc. We also have to liaise with the police, ambulance and fire service making sure we comply with the general health and safety requirements. We book 35 bands and we go through hundreds of demos sent as e-mails or CDs from all over the world. One promoter even paid for me to go to Bali to see his band, which was fantastic. Tommy Longfellow is a great help with this and he runs the second stage at the festival. Also, the programme has to be prepared which involves dealing with the advertisers, deciding on the running

order and getting the biographies of the bands. The stall holders and caterers have to be contacted and Gary Walker helps with all this. We are very proud that the festival provides so much family entertainment and this year for children we are having the Saltbox Music Company, workshops, bush craft demonstrations on surviving in the wild and there will also be Physics in the Field, which aims to make physics fun for youngsters. In this we get a lot of help from the pre-school groups and the local churches. A large committee of friends also help with the organisation. As well as the Riverside Festival I also run the third stage at the Cornbury festival in Great Tew and I help Tom Longfellow with the once a fortnightly music night at the Rose and Crown, so there is much to do. When I've been through the necessary admin, I'll have a snack and about eight o'clock I'll go to the Rose and Crown where there'll probably be more discussion about the Riverside Festival. One of the things we are glad about is that the festival is still free. We manage to fund it by running the main food stall and the only bar as well as money coming in from selling programmes and T-shirts and also selling stall pitches. We are grateful for the grants we get, particularly from the Charlbury Town Council.

I am usually in bed by 11 o'clock. I like to read for a while, particularly books on the history of the Second World War. I am a restless sleeper because of the symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder, so always wake up tired in the morning. I have so many good friends here and have had some wonderful adventures with them. Chris Wray and I walked in the Himalayas to Annapurna base camp, to recount just one of many. I do not have so much time these days to play with the band because of my job and festival work, however, this involves me with many other people and friends in the music scene. The Riverside Festival has now been running for sixteen years and is a community event for families and all ages and I am very proud of it.

I hope there are many more days in the life of Andy Pickard 'mental health well-being worker and music festival organiser' as I still have a lot to do!

Charlbury Music Class

It may come as a surprise to many residents to learn that the Charlbury Music Class is now in its 33rd year! It was started by the tutor, Dr Kate Eckersley, while she was doing her D.Phil. in music at Oxford University.

In its current format, the class meets five times a year at The Bell Hotel at intervals between April and October. All meetings are on Wednesday and run from 10.30 to 3.20 with a 50-minute lunch break. Lunch can be taken at The Bell, but that is not compulsory. The cost of lunch is not included, but free coffee and tea is provided.

The subjects are chosen at the end of the previous year by the class. Kate talks about the subject and plays musical examples on CD. The tone is friendly and informal. Those attending are not expected to have any technical musical knowledge, and there are no "tests".

The first class this year took place in April, with 26 present. The next class is on Wednesday 18 July, when the subject will be comparison of the last symphonies of Beethoven, Sibelius, Shostakovitch and Haydn. Further classes in September and October.

Work to start on station car park extension

The long-awaited extension to Charlbury station's car park is to be built this summer.

According to car park operators APCOA:

"I am delighted to let you know that work on the new car park at Charlbury Station will start on 14 May, with equipment arriving from 8 May. This is something our customers have needed for some time and it is great news that contractors will soon be on site.

"When complete we will be able to offer an additional 75 spaces in the North car park, and a further 8 spaces for disabled passengers in the South car park. This is an important improvement for the station and something we have been keen to deliver for some time. Contractors have been appointed to do the work and are committed to complete by the end of September.

"We have worked with them to ensure the development will only cause the minimum amount of disruption to our customers. However, there will be a short period during the early phase of the works when the contractors will need to use some spaces in the existing car park. Every effort will be made to ensure they release these spaces as soon as they possibly can.

"The new car park is part of our commitment to Putting Customers First and represents more investment in Charlbury station of over £470,000. This follows the doubling of the track, the new footbridge and improvements to services. The additional spaces will make parking and subsequent rail travel from Charlbury much more convenient, and I hope you agree that this will benefit the local community."



The 2012 Charlbury Beer Festival: Mixing Tradition with Innovation

The 15th Charlbury Beer Festival – now the biggest one-day independent beer festival in the country – will take place on **14 July 2012 at Charlbury Cricket Club**. The fun starts at noon and will continue till 11 pm, with live music throughout the day – kids' activities – a wide range of food from local caterers – and a variety of ciders, perries, wines and soft drinks for those who aren't tempted by the fifty or so real ales on offer. We are also pleased to be hosting the 2nd World Open Aunt Sally Singles Championship.

But of course the point of the Beer Festival is to raise money for good causes. Most of these are local, but last year the Beer Festival took the decision to give a small share of its funds to an overseas project helping disadvantaged children, if we can find a project that fits our criteria. In 2011 we provided a grant for a solar water heater for an orphanage in India, which was a great success: not just for the children in the orphanage, but also for the children of Charlbury Primary School, who learned about solar technology and built their own version of a water heater that was on display and used at last year's Beer Festival.

This year the Beer Festival has decided to support a project to help disabled children in Zimbabwe, by providing them with access to specially designed communications software on five iPads. The iPads are being tailor-designed by the Charlbury-based charity Special Effect team, led by Mick Donegan, for use by children with disabilities such as cerebral palsy. Two of the iPads are now on their way to the children's charity that will be using them, the Zimbabwe Parents of Handicapped Children's Association (ZPHCA); and with three more to come, Mick will be providing training to the ZPHCA coordinator in how to use the iPads to help the children. This is a very exciting project, combining the wonderful work that Special Effect does to transform the lives of affected children and the needs of a group of disadvantaged children, and the hope is that it will be so successful that corporate sponsors will come forward (such as Apple!) to spread the work more widely in Zimbabwe and elsewhere.

We hope that Mick Donegan will be at the Beer Festival on 14 July, to chat and answer questions about his groundbreaking work; in the meantime, more information about Special Effect can be found at www.specialeffect.org.uk – and don't forget to visit www.charlburybeerfestival.org too. We hope to see you there!
