The Gifford Trust is pleased to announce that preliminary work has begun on the design of the new Charlbury Community Centre. The Centre is expected to include a sports multi-purpose hall, library, computer area and general community space. The current design does not include residential provision as enabling development.

Various funding sources have been secured, including over £160,000 raised through the on-going efforts of the Charlbury Community Centre Appeal group which is celebrating its 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary this month. Founding members, Lynette Murphy, Diana Potten and Richard Neville have been instrumental in the success of the CCCA. Anthony and Jessie Horn and Charlie and Sheila Peacock have also been huge contributors in the past few years. The CCCA has many more events planned for the year ahead and welcomes help from anyone interested in using the new Community Centre.

Further funding news was announced at the Parish meeting on April 4<sup>th</sup> when Liz Reason, Chair of The Charlbury Motor Fire Brigade Trust, said that the CMFBT has agreed, in principle, to provide funding towards the new Community Centre. Oxfordshire County Council has provided its draft funding agreement for £348,000. In contract negotiations with OCC the Gifford Trust is being represented by a partner from international law firm Squire Saunders on a pro-bono basis.

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### 'Charlbury in the First World War'

Sue Rangeley explains the Exhibition at Charlbury Museum

This exhibition explores the life on the Home Front in 1914; the poignant stories of Charlbury's soldiers, sailors, are revealed in displays which interweave factual details with family memorabilia. The war too irrevocably changed the lives of women, within the exhibition are the unique stories of some Charlbury women during the First World War. It was this facet of the exhibition, 'Women in Wartime', that caught my imagination and inspired an exciting journey of research.

It was the magic of Google that brought Nora Constable's story to life; she was born in Charlbury, her father was the landlord of The Bell. The National Archives holds the records of her nursing work; she enlisted in Queen Alexandra's Imperial Military Nursing Service in 1914. Within a few months Nora was nursing the British casualties of the gas attacks at Ypres in 1915. But what is so special about Nora, is that she was a friend of Edith Appleton, whose famous diaries, 'A Nurse at the Front', mention 'Constable' in numerous entries during 1916, at Etretat. Alas no photo of Nora has emerged (yet!), but her story is truly fascinating.

Hilda Horniblow's story is equally interesting and amazing. Her early life began in Charlbury, her father Frederick Thomas Horniblow was a stationer (his shop was where News & Things is now). The Oxford Dictionary of National Biography holds all the details of her life and career. After joining the Women's Legion in 1915, Hilda was soon showing her talent for supreme leadership, organising mass catering for thousands of men in Eastbourne in 1916. Her wartime photograph may display a gentle, passive smile, but Hilda was a woman of substance! In 1917 she was in France, seconded to the American Expeditionary Force; her role: Chief Controller, in charge of the entire army kitchens. The Women's Land Army uniform would have been a familiar sight in Charbury; the organisation was formed 1917 despite resistance from some farming communities. For local girl, Maria 'Emma' Oliver, who preferred outdoor life, rather than gloving, this war work naturally appealed; she was only a teenager, working at Hill Barn Farm (off Woodstock Rd) when she enlisted. Emma's story emerges through her possessions: a Land Army armband; a harvesting bonnet, and the reminiscences of her daughter.

The Red Cross in Charlbury was active throughout the war; Lady Margaret Watney, who lived at Cornbury Park, organised fund raising and 'working parties'. Her daughters, Rosalind and Silvia, enlisted in war work, and their stories emerged from Red Cross records and photos loaned by grandchildren. For all the Charlbury women of the 'Red Cross Working Party No. 4420' who made thousands of socks, bandages, slippers etc. for the soldiers, we have no names, only an archive record: 'excellent'

Perhaps there are more stories of Charlbury women in war time waiting to be told, if you have one please let us know. Maybe a life story to accompany the china figure of a 'Munitionette', whose dangerous factory work Lloyd George praised.

### WHERE HAVE ALL THE BIRDS GONE?

I'm not talking about pigeons and jackdaws, but the small garden and countryside birds which the RSPB shows to have declined, almost to invisibility, during the last nine years since I came to live in Charlbury. Why has it happened?

Increased pollutants from agribusiness and industry, vehicle emissions and the loss of wild hedgerows and woodland are among the most likely causes; and these factors seem to result from our modern way of life, as does the most important change of all: Climate Change. The overwhelming majority (around 95%) of scientists who have researched the issue of Climate Change have concluded that man's activities, particularly in vastly increasing the emission of carbon dioxide, are responsible. I have no cause to doubt them: loss of polar ice, raised sea levels, topsy-turvey weather patterns are ample proof. So what can we, as individuals, do about it?

If we think the future matters, it means that we need to control the tendency to take from the planet without giving anything back. And this is where individual choices and actions matter. "Buy what you need, not what you want" is a good maxim, even though it cannot always be applied!

I share a quite large, old stone house, with a pleasant garden partly devoted to fruit and vegetables. Stone buildings are not the easiest to insulate: there are no cavity walls to fill, so we have installed extensive double-glazing and as much insulation as we can get into our awkward roof; we heat only the rooms in regular use.

During the winter we have found our newish condensing-boiler far more efficient than its predecessor. We benefit from solar panels fitted a few years ago, which provide hot water on bright days. A cheery log fire warms the sitting-room and reduces gas consumption. Low-energy light bulbs predominate, but we still need a few conventional bulbs to aid close work, though this will change as technology improves.

My mother's injunction, "Waste not, want not!" applies not only to energy use, but to domestic shopping. We try to buy locally-produced organic food whenever possible, and avoid out-of-season food, particularly when flown from abroad (bananas and tropical fruits the exception!). In the kitchen, we reduce gas consumption by using a tiered steamer for multiple items, and try to use the electric oven for multiple dishes.

We have greatly reduced our car-mileage to around 4,000 miles a year. Neither of us now needs to commute, visits to family and holidays are rare, and most of our shopping is now on foot. The train is an increasing alternative. Flying, which produces truly massive amounts of CO2, we avoid, except for a very rare treat on a holiday abroad.

We have had encouragement and advice for most of these measures from Friends of the Earth, Greenpeace, the Centre for Alternative Technology in Wales, and local activists, to all of whom we owe a debt of thanks. Our actions have certainly not lessened the fullness of our lives, have greatly increased the comfort of our house, have reduced our bills; and perhaps most important of all, our carbon footprint. And it's not been difficult!

### West Oxfordshire's Council Tax remains second lowest

Figures released by the Government show that West Oxfordshire District Council is, once again, charging the second lowest council tax rate out of all the 201 shire district councils in England.

West Oxfordshire District Council's share of the Council Tax for a Band D property in 2014/15 is set at £81.63 a year, which breaks down to £1.50 a week for providing all its services including waste and recycling collections, environmental health, leisure centres, housing and planning.

The District Council has been praised by Government for freezing its Council Tax charge for the fourth year running and official figures show that by doing this the District Council's element of the bill has actually fallen in real-terms by 13%. Cllr Simon Hoare, Cabinet Member for Resources said: "It is excellent news for our residents that West Oxfordshire District Council is recognised as one of the leading authorities in the country for providing low-cost value for money services. This has been achieved through careful planning and an on-going efficiency savings programme."

At £81.63 a year West Oxfordshire District Council's Council Tax rate is half the national average and is the lowest of the five Oxfordshire district councils. West Oxfordshire's share of the Council Tax bill is about 5 % of the overall bill that Oxfordshire taxpayers receive. The bulk of the bill (79%) is payable to Oxfordshire County Council to cover major services such as Education, Highways, Social Services and the Fire and Rescue Service. The rest of the bill covers police and parish / town council services.

### NEWS FROM CHARLBURY PRIMARY SCHOOL

In this edition of The Chronicle I'm pleased to report on a number of community projects that the school is becoming involved with over the coming months.

Firstly, the school will be taking part in this year's Artweeks open studios festival. As one of the venues on the Charlbury trail, the school will be displaying pupils' artwork, selling cakes and refreshments, and running art workshops for children. We'd like to thank members of the school's fundraising body, the CSA, for making this happen, and we hope that it will be an enjoyable and successful event for everyone.

The school is also looking forward to participating in Charlbury's Community Led Plan. Representatives from the project will be coming into school over the summer months to discuss its aims with the children, and to explore ways of encouraging pupils and their parents to share ideas for improving the town in the future.

Broadening out to the wider community beyond Charlbury, we're also excited to be working with the Low Carbon Hub, an Oxford-based social enterprise, to assess the feasibility of installing solar panels on the school's roof to generate renewable energy. As part of its 'Solar energy for schools' programme, the Low Carbon Hub is working with a number of schools in Oxfordshire to reduce carbon emissions across the county, and solar panels are already successfully up and running at the Cherwell and Matthew Arnold schools in Oxford. As well as providing discounted green energy to the school (electricity generated by the scheme will be sold to the school at a reduced rate), the project also provides educational opportunities for raising awareness of energy use and climate change. Charlbury Primary School is part of the international 'Eco-Schools' initiative for improving the environment. This project therefore particularly appeals to us as we look towards qualifying for the Eco-Schools' highest-level 'Green Flag' award. continuing on from the work the school did to integrate sustainable practices into everyday school life to gain the scheme's Silver award. In addition, in summer 2011 pupils at the school learnt about the benefits of solar heating when they designed and built a solar-powered water heater in the school playground with members of the Charlbury Beer Festival. At the time of writing various surveys, assessments and applications are being conducted on the school's behalf by the Low Carbon Hub to check the viability of the site, and we are waiting to hear whether the project can go ahead. If all goes to plan, then we hope that pupils will soon be seeing a renewable energy source in action on our own site.

Finally, if you are new to Charlbury, you might be interested to know that we are always looking for local residents to join our Knowledge Well scheme so that we can find ways to tie-in your particular skills, knowledge and experience with national curriculum subjects to broaden the children's education. If you would like to contribute to this scheme we would love to hear from you. Please contact the school on 01608 810354.

### CHARLBURY TOWN COUNCIL REPORT NO. 71 By Councillor Nick Potter

<u>Charlbury Town Council</u>: The Town Council elected in May 2012 is now 2 years old and half way through its term of office. Cllr. Jim Holah, first elected in 2012, resigned from the Council on 17<sup>th</sup> March for personal reasons. He is warmly thanked for his contribution to the Council. The vacancy was advertised and an election requested. Only one candidate had been nominated by the Closing Date, 24<sup>th</sup> April, and so Harriet Baldwin has been elected unopposed to the Town Council.

**Pot Holes:** Those pot holes and other road surface problems that are known to O.C.C. Highways are marked with white or green paint and are in the programme for repair. Those with no markings (even if next to a marked one) need to be reported to O.C.C. Highways or they will not get done. Telephone: 0845 310 1111.

**The Annual Parish Meeting**: This was held on 4<sup>th</sup> April in the War Memorial Hall and was attended by about 30 members of the public together with Councillors. A number of topics were raised concerning traffic, speeding, ignoring road signs, size of vehicles, state of the roads/streets, vehicle and pedestrian management at the station and maintenance of the Mill Cut. All the points were discussed at the Council Meeting on 16<sup>th</sup> April and will be reported to the Police, O.C.C. Highways, or other relevant authorities.

<u>The Town Council Precept</u>: The total given in Charlbury Town Council Report No. 70 (Charlbury Chronicle March 2014) was wrong and should read £80,910.72. The other figures are correct.

**<u>Councillor Surgeries</u>**: These are set for Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> June, 2<sup>nd</sup> August, 4<sup>th</sup> October, and 6<sup>th</sup> November. They are held at the Corner House 10-12 noon.

<u>Defibrillator:</u> An anonymous benefactor has donated a substantial amount of money to West Oxfordshire District Council to purchase defibrillators for nominated towns and villages in the District of which Charlbury is one. The Council hope to be able to install the defibrillator on the wall of the Co-op (subject to agreement) where it will have easy access for all. This equipment can save the lives of those who suffer Cardiac Arrest. It is not for Heart Attacks. Once it has been installed the Ambulance Service have offered to lay on a Training Session for all those who are interested, at no cost; details in due course. The installation of the defibrillator does not undermine the role of the First Responders who live in Charlbury and in fact will compliment the work they do. The Town Council is considering the purchase of a second defibrillator to be installed somewhere in the area of the Fire Station (subject to agreement) but will have to obtain grants to the value of some £2,000.00 for this.

<u>Wigwell:</u> The Nature Reserve which is the property of Thames Water is thriving and after a long gap, negotiations are proceeding so that its management can be handed over from the Town Council to the Wychwood Project in the summer.

<u>Centenary Wood</u>: The woodland which is maturing nicely is the property of Oxfordshire County Council who are responsible for its management. Any queries about Centenary Wood should be referred to Vicky Fletcher at O.C.C. Countryside Services on 01865 815420. She is the Historic and Natural Environment Team Leader. There is no longer a County Forester and the Oxfordshire Woodland Project has been cut with the Manager made redundant.

*Riverside Festival*: Permission has been granted by the Town Council for the use of the Mill Field free of charge on 26<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> July subject to conditions and the issue of a Licence by West Oxfordshire District Council.

**Public Events**: A number of public events are planned to take place in and around Charlbury during the summer and, although they are enjoyable events for some, they are a nuisance for others. Matters concerning Traffic Management including Car Parking and matters concerning Public Order including Anti-Social Behaviour should be reported immediately to Thames Valley Police on 101. Matters concerning Noise should be reported immediately to West Oxfordshire District Council on 01993 861000 (weekdays 0900 – 1700hrs) or 01993 705056 (weekends and out of hours).

**Overhanging Branches, Wheelie Bins, Dog Fouling:** These are all ongoing problems causing inconvenience for the people who use our pavements. Please cut back branches that hang over pavements and likewise trim back hedges and plants that are difficult to pass especially with prams etc. Please put your wheelie bin and black boxes away once they have been emptied and please remember that you are responsible for your dog so "Scoop it, Bag it, Bin it"!

## NEWS FROM THE CORNBURY PARK TEAM

The Wilderness Festival takes place in Cornbury Park from 7-10 August 2014 and OX7 residents have snapped up the substantially discounted tickets for locals which have been on sale this spring. This year's tree planting on the Cornbury Estate is complete, with most of the new trees – oak, thorn and others – at Ranger's Lodge. The new grain barn at Smallstones is nearly ready; this will greatly reduce farm vehicle movements on the Charlbury to Burford road between Smallstones and Kingstanding. The walling maintenance is on-going in the park and a further stretch of dry stone walling at Ranger's Lodge on the Charlbury to Burford road begins in June; this new wall will be set further back from the sharp bend to improve visibility and safety for drivers.

Once again we'd like to remind you that while you are most welcome to walk on the official footpath along the perimeter fence connecting North Lodge to Southill, do be alert to potential wildlife hazards such as bees, snakes and deer. Please stick to the paths and keep well away from the river and the grazing stock - for your safety and theirs - and please do keep your dogs on leads. A reminder too that the permissive cycle route which follows the same path is open from spring until October every year, but there is no public access to the deer park for cars, walkers, runners or cyclists, except during special events.

### Bessie Marchant – author (1862-1941)

Bessie Marchant lived in Gothic House in Church Street. She was a prolific author. producing some hundred and fifty books, serial stories and many short stories. They appealed to all ages. She was a regular contributor to "Little Folks". In the later years of Queen Victoria's reign G.A.Henty was famous for his adventure books for boys. Angela Brazil was also producing schoolgirl stories. Bessie Marchant brought something new with her tales of resourceful girls and women, who triumphed against the odds .The dust covers of the books promised excitement: girls riding horses in exotic places, another girl controlling a rearing horse and another following and spying on some people are just a few examples. The titles were alluring too - "Hope's Tryst - A Story of the Siberian Frontier", "The Bonded Three, A Story of India", "Norah to the Rescue- A Story of the Philippines" were some. Her books were set in many lands and yet she herself never went out of England. Despite this she managed to create a really authentic background to her stories. Charlbury resident Jennifer Bartlett lived with her parents in Myrtle Cottage opposite Bessie Marchant, who often visited them. Jennifer's mother, Mrs. Price, used to tell the story that they had a long corridor in their house and Bessie Marchant was standing in the doorway of it waving her arms and legs around. On being asked what she was doing she said she was trying to imagine what it would be like to be in an earthquake. Certainly she did a lot of research and through meeting a Dr Macray, the Vicar of Southleigh, she gained access to the Radcliffe Camera and the Bodleian.

Her upbringing did not seem likely to give her literary aspirations. She was born in 1862 of farming stock in the village of Pelham in Kent. There were few books in the house and it seemed that she read Fox's "Book of Martyrs", probably at school, and hated it.. She received no formal education until she was eleven, when her mother sent her to a local Dame's school, run by a retired lady's maid from the big house. This did not last long as her mother suspected that her teacher was drinking and so sent her to a boarding school in nearby Canterbury. It was no more successful. When they found she wrote the letter B the wrong way round, they set her to making pothooks. She also did not get enough to eat. Her mother now decided to employ a governess for Bessie and her elder sister, while her brother went to a proper school. She learnt enough to be employed as a teacher in a Baptist school in London in her early twenties. It was at this time that she started writing. In 1889 she became the second wife of a Baptist Minister, Jabez Comfort. His sermons were said to last up to an hour. He gave up the ministry and opened a small school in Hitchen, but later moved to Witney. His clever young wife helped him with this school. It is said she learnt Latin overnight and then taught it the next day. It was while running the school that she found time to write again. One of her earliest books was for boys, "Tommy's Trek, A Story of the Transvaal". Another book claimed to be her first was "Broken Barriers" in 1889 but it was "The Bonded Three" set in India that really established her reputation. The story of a white planter living in isolation, the description of the damp heat, the sense of danger, the relationships of the children and servants are all deftly presented.

While she was in Witney the sales of her books were such that she and her husband were able to close the school and she was able to devote all her time to writing. In 1904 they moved to Charlbury, where they rented Gothic House for much less than their house in Witney. The house had been neglected and mice had eaten away the gas pipes, so

the lighting consisted of oil lamps and candles. The house changed hands several times but the Comforts were eventually able to purchase it for £450. Apparently Bessie took a bath every morning downstairs, though where that would be in the present house is not clear. She would dash up stairs with little on and get dressed. She worked in what is now the Music Room but was then called the Library. She sat at a table with a window behind her and looking out through the French doors to the garden. Her manuscripts were neatly written in a copperplate hand though she later used a typewriter. It is said that her husband carefully corrected her work and when he died in 1915, the publishers were surprised to receive a script from her written with the usual gusto but full of spelling errors and having little punctuation. Blackie's were her main publishers and they included her books in what they described as "pretty little stories". One of her first books sold for nine old pence.

Bessie Marchant did not really benefit as much as she should have from the huge number of books she produced. She did not understand fully the business side of things and she sold the copyright of her books outright for anything from £20 to £60 and thought she had done well! It was not until 1930 that she employed a literary agency to look after her sales, which improved things. She resorted to letting rooms in Gothic House and Jennifer Bartlett can remember ladies living there. Bessie was working right up to her death and one of her books was published posthumously. Her daughter Marchant Comfort continued to live in the house and when a cousin inherited the things in the house she asked Briony and Andrew Lawson, who were buying the house, to keep the collection together there. There is glass-fronted cupboard containing most of her books. There are neatly tied up manuscripts, letters and pictures. One of these shows her working in her corner of the library looking out into the garden. Jennifer Bartlett's father and Bessie Marchant shared a birthday and because he enjoyed her books, she usually gave him one on that day. In December 1921 she gave him one, which was inscribed with something she probably felt had quided her life:-

"The work we set out to do with all our heart and soul and strength is the work that succeeds"

### The Charlbury Beer Festival: a reminder of what it's all for.....

The Charlbury Beer Festival has just awarded our annual overseas grant for 2014 to Cecily's Fund, to buy school shoes for Zambian children orphaned by AIDS. Last year the CBF, with support from many readers of the *Chronicle*, raised nearly £25,000 for local good causes, and each year we give one grant (typically £1,000–2,000) to an overseas children's charity with Charlbury connections. The Director of Cecily's Fund, Molly Brech, is a Charlbury resident.

Cecily's Fund was set up in 1998 in memory of Cecily Eastwood, a Stonesfield 19-year-old who died in a traffic accident while on a gap year volunteering to help children in Zambia. With its Zambian partners, Cecily's Fund provides Zambian orphans with everything they need to go to school, and helps some of them to go on to train as peer health educators and teachers, giving them a far better chance of growing up to be self-reliant, and to live healthy, fulfilling lives and bring hope to others. As Julie Grime of Cecily's Fund explains, 'Providing a child with a good solid pair of shoes is a key part of our commitment to their education. School shoes are especially important for Zambian children who often have to walk long distances to school.' It's a great example of how a local organisation can contribute to improving the lives of poor children in disadvantaged places, and CBF is proud to be able to channel part of the proceeds from our 2013 event to this cause.

### CHURCHES TOGETHER IN CHARLBURY

Last year the churches in Charlbury decided to try to raise £5000 for the Afghan Women's Educational Centre (AWEC) in Afghanistan, through a community partnership scheme arranged by Christian Aid. During Lent this year people attending bread, soup and cheese lunches gave over £1,800 for the project and this together with some generous donations means that we have already sent over £3,300 to Christian Aid – two thirds of the total we are aiming for.

Large numbers of women came out to vote in the recent presidential elections in Afghanistan, in spite of intimidation in some parts of the country, showing that the work of organisations like AWEC is bringing results.

One of the aims of AWEC is to establish local councils, known as shuras, where both men and women can contribute to local affairs. There are now 89 women's shuras meeting every month. For women who have previously had their needs—ignored, even by family members, it is a life-changing experience to be able to express their views openly and share in discussion. In some places, women have been invited to attend male shuras to offer their ideas for cooperative decision-making in the community. Electing women to positions of leadership in the shuras is challenging negative perceptions of women, and women are now being—consulted by their male counterparts.

We will continue to fundraise for AWEC until we reach the £5000 target. This will then be eligible for matched funding from the European Union bringing the total to £20,000.

The security situation in the north and west of Afghanistan is becoming worse but women working for AWEC say the regions taking part in the project have not been affected too much and work is continuing as planned. Their aim is for a peaceful and prosperous Afghanistan in which the rights of all are respected, despite the challenges of the security situation. Our aim is to encourage and support the people of Afghanistan who are working for change.

### **Report from County Councillor Rodney Rose**

You probably will know flooding is one of my responsibilities and it has kept me somewhat busy since Christmas. Following the floods I hosted a flood forum for all parishes in Oxfordshire from which a summary will soon be available on the Oxfordshire County Councils website.

This report would not be complete without a summary of the OCC budget position: The budget was decided at the full Council meeting on 18 February. A council tax increase of 1.99% was agreed and whilst any increase should be avoided, this small increase of 46p per week for a band D property means that some valued services can be retained. Despite all the savings and reductions there were some positive announcements: An additional investment of £800,000 to end 15 minute personal care visits by extending the time of visits; an extra £350,000 will be available for the setting up of a Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub in Oxfordshire: there will be £1m extra for general highway maintenance to be spent across the county – with priorities for this spend to be determined during the coming months; a total of £400,000 will be set aside as a contingency to deal with problems stemming from flooding and other winter weather issues – the exact nature of how this money will be spent will be determined once full assessments have been made when waters have subsided; a total of £315,000 will be invested in community budgets. It has been a challenging budget and now we have to make sure we deliver the savings. The word from the Chancellor of the Exchequer is that we are but half way through the cuts needed to put the Country back on track, so it looks like we still have some work left to do.

### Report from District Councillor Liz Leffman 01608 810153

The recent application for the solar farm at Southill has been supported with letters by more than 50 local residents, and many more lent their support following the various public meetings. At the time of writing, the Uplands Area Planning Committee has yet to meet to decide whether it can go ahead or not, but it has been recommended for refusal by planning officers. This is very disappointing to the team that put the proposals together, as a great deal of work went in to engaging with the community, and ensuring that visibility of the site would be minimal, so that the landscape, which we all care about, would be protected. It is to be hoped that if councillors do refuse permission on this occasion, modified plans can be submitted. If so they will have my personal support.

As usual, a lot of my time has been spent making sure that the environment in Charlbury is kept clean and tidy. I've had a lockable dog bin installed by the Bowls Club following several incidents of dog mess being thrown onto the bowling green. I'm pleased to say that we seem to be having fewer problems with rubbish left uncleared at the Spendlove, though I have had to get in touch with WODC officers recently about the amount of rubbish left lying around after the recycling lorries have been through. This is due to the doors of the lorries being left open so that rubbish flies out when the lorries move on. I'm pleased to say that my complaints have been taken seriously and the contractors have been told to close the doors to prevent this from happening. If anyone sees a lot of rubbish around after the lorries have been, please do let me know, and I will take this up again.

A famous philosopher once defined politics very simply if crudely as a matter of answering two questions – 'Who gets what' and 'Says who'?. Explicit in these two questions is the concept of conflict between those who want X and others who do not want X. Elected politicians are the 'Says who' in this conflict of interests. So how do these conflicts become resolved. In the UK, politicians get democratically elected by the majority of those eligible, those 'who want to get what'. The elected are the says who'. So how do decisions in favour of one interest group and against another get decided.

In our area, the Conservative run District Council has a number of tools in deciding. The first is a simple overarching objective to make West Oxfordshire the best place to live, work and visit'. A tad hyperbolic and overblown the cynic might say. However, I have found it a very useful lodestar in reaching a view and very practical and useful actions have flown from a clear appreciation of the objective.

For our area to be great place to live we need clean streets, efficient rubbish collection and a dedication to our immediate environment . We must build the needed amount of housing both private and social. We need to ensure that the utility companies fulfil their duties most particularly Thames Water. We need to support and fund community projects. The list goes on and on. We must build a modern infrastructure hence the huge investment in high speed broadband that is now underway, to attract business that will provide permanent, well paid jobs. We must continue our free parking policy to support local centres and the retailers and markets who trade there. Finally the tourist trade is estimated to bring over £200million of income to the area every year. Why do so many tourists want come here? Because it is simply one of the one most beautiful areas of the country. Truly an area of outstanding natural beauty. We should work very hard to keep it that way.

So the 'Says who' have guiding principles to decide 'who get's what'. We will never all agree that every decision made is the correct one but at least we can be reassured that these decisions are made for reasons that we believe to be in the best long term interests of us all.

### **Oxfordshire County Council Bus Review**

Although final details have not yet been announced, we do now know that the C1 Charlbury RailBus will continue to be operated by GoRide and that the X9 Chipping Norton-Charlbury-Witney service will be operated by Pulham's Coaches instead of Stagecoach.

The on-demand Charlbury Taxibus service T1 is being withdrawn due to insufficient demand. The changes come into effect from 2nd June.

On the railways, there are only minor changes to train times. The main change is that the present weekday 2005 from Charlbury is retimed to 1943 from 19th May and will arrive in London 30 minutes earlier than at present.

### MESSING ABOUT ON THE RIVER ......

For the last three years volunteers have been assisting our Lock Staff on the Thames at the 45 locks along its length between Lechlade and Teddington. Now, ahead of our fourth season, we invite you to apply to become a Volunteer Assistant Lock Keeper at a lock near you.

The Environment Agency, which is navigation authority for the Thames, is now recruiting for the 2014 season and are looking for volunteers who can commit to assisting at least one day a week between May and the end of September. Volunteers can agree their hours with lock keepers but need to be available at least from 11 to 5. Volunteers are particularly needed along the river between Reading and Lechlade. Volunteering is a great way to meet people and to find out more about the Thames, its history, wildlife and management. At the same time volunteers know that they are doing something worthwhile that is really appreciated.

Our Volunteer Assistant Lock Keepers work alongside paid lock keepers. They help boats pass through the lock safely: taking ropes, directing traffic, and operating sluices and lock gates. They help maintain the site: painting, tidying and gardening. They provide information to visitors, be they on foot or afloat, so that they can make the best of their time on the river. Visitors really appreciate the local knowledge that volunteers can provide. All applicants are invited to an assessment at a local lock. Here they will have the role explained to them and be shown what it involves in practical terms. They will also be assessed to decide which site may be most appropriate for them and to ensure that they have the physical capabilities required. After successful completion of the assessment, they attend an induction course which focuses on safety and preparing them for the lock side.

On the lock side the volunteers follow a documented training programme before being signed off to take charge of the lock on their own. This will only be for short periods, while the paid keeper is at lunch for example. The volunteers are there to augment the service provided by paid staff rather than to replace them. Volunteers are provided with some uniform and can claim mileage for travel to and from a lock local to them. They also receive a monthly newsletter which keeps them in touch with what is going on along the river and other activities of the Environment Agency.
