## SURVEY UPDATE

The town survey closed on 6th April and the online survey is no longer available. If you didn't receive a survey or were unable to complete one for any reason please contact us at *info@charlburyneighbourhoodforum.org.uk* or 07421 769110.

A team of volunteers distributed surveys to 1,292 households, and we have received over 500 sealed packs of paper surveys (these may contain individual and household surveys). Over 140 surveys were completed online (this includes both household surveys and individual surveys, so may include more than one survey from each household). This is an incredible response compared to other places around the country and we'd like to thank everyone for taking the time to share their views in so much detail.

#### Separate Surveys for Businesses and under 16s

We are still working on preparing these and more information will be available soon. If you would be interested in helping to organise and/or distribute this survey, or in completing one, please contact us if you haven't already.

#### **Next Steps**

We are in the process of inviting tenders from qualified analysts to process, assess and report on the survey data. This process will take some weeks to complete, especially as we want to make sure that we give sufficient time for a full and detailed analysis of everyone's views. The results of the survey will be published here and we intend to give residents an opportunity to feed back to us.

#### **Charlbury Cricket Club**

For many years now the club has boasted one of the most popular and well-run youth cricket sections in the county, with Friday evenings in the summer

featuring as highly organised and lively weekly gatherings in the town, hosting well over 100 children not just from Charlbury but surrounding towns and villages. The foundations of this success were laid down in the early 1990s and, thanks to a succession of dedicated coaches, assistants and other volunteer helpers, has continued to grow over the years, often prompting other clubs in the area to follow in our footsteps and ensure the future of the game by investing in youth.

This year the youth section chairman is Paul Jenkins and he can be proud of the team he has around him, providing not just for the Friday training sessions but an even greater number of matches than in previous years, ranging from under 9s Kwik Cricket (soft ball), through to U15 boys and girls teams, with league and pairs games for both U11s and U13s, and possibly an U17s in the mid-summer months. As well as Paul, our dedicated coaches are Paul Butler, Martyn Scull, Michael Geeson Brown, Paul Quibell Smith and Richard Ede, helped by assistant coaches Stuart and Molly Duff, Chris Grimes, Ben Hayes, Bridget Tennent, Brett Huxley, Tim Bush and Dave Williamson. All are required to be registered under the DBS system as safe to work with children.

The English Cricket Board (ECB) enjoins all clubs to provide a safe and friendly environment and we have been doing this for over 20 years - and not just for the children: we cater for parents as well, watching their youngsters while winding down after a hard week with a welcoming bar.

The pathway is open for all our youngsters to continue with the game when they reach the age and ability to take on adult cricket and, indeed, many have already featured in our weekend league and midweek friendly sides, some progressing on to the club's 1st team. Indeed, that was one of the prime reasons for setting up CCC's vibrant youth section. Clubs who don't do the same may one day find themselves on the road to cricket oblivion.

Since May 2015 the Club has been "under new management". The current committee includes the following members: Cyril Kerry (Chairman), Simon Bridgeman (Vice-Chairman), Mandy Cooper (Secretary), Nicola Pearson (Treasurer), Darren Oliver, Martin Prew, Ann Cleaver, Steve Sullivan, Rob Casey, Adele Mortimer and Gary Jones. Many of us have longstanding Charlbury connections and involvement in community activities, especially football.

The Club started as part of the Charlbury Town Football Club but in recent years has operated separately. We are now working closely with the Men's Football Club, with whom we are combining again, and are having similar discussions with the Boys Football Club. Together we are exploring the best constitutional form to adopt for the future.

But that does not change the fact that the Sports and Social Club welcomes membership from anyone in Charlbury who wants to take part in our activities.

If you would like to help us move forward with our plans, we would be pleased to hear from you. Have you experience of fund-raising including applying for grants? Do you know something about different legal formats for sports clubs and associated organisations? Would vou be willing to supply building or other materials? 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### NEWS FROM CHARLBURY PRIMARY SCHOOL

Recent wintry weather has not dampened the spirits of the children this spring term as they continue to make the most of the many exciting and enriching opportunities provided.

March and April were filled with special events. World Book Day saw the children making amazing efforts to re-create their favourite book characters; spotted in the corridor that day were several intriguinglooking characters from *The Hobbit*, a tiny Mrs Twit from one of Roald Dahl's bestloved books, and The Saucepan Man from Enid Blyton's *Magic Faraway Tree*. Not long after, all children participated in Sport Relief by running relay laps around the playground – their sponsorship from friends and family in our community raised an incredible £4000!

But of course it is not only the special events that contribute to the children's development and enjoyment of school. As part of their regular timetable, Foundation stage and Year 1 pupils have a morning out in Cornbury Park - this is called Forest School, and is one of the wonderful ways our pupils are stimulated and challenged by our committed staff. Based on a Scandinavian concept that emphasizes the importance of children's interaction with nature, it is led by our own Mrs Senior, who is trained to facilitate children's exploration and skill development in this wild, outdoor environment. The physical and social benefits are immense and the increase in young children's confidence striking. Certain 'equipment' is always needed, and the school would welcome any contributions of everyday items like ropes, baskets, waterproof sheets, blankets, pots, pans and wooden spoons. Please bring any donations to Reception at school where they will be gratefully received.

Sport is a huge part of what makes up Charlbury Primary, and the children truly strive to be the best they can be in this arena. Several sport festivals at Chipping Norton School, ranging from ball skills to dance to the annual 'Schoolympics' have seen Charlbury pupils participating with others from primary schools across the county, and invariably a big proportion of sporting champion awards go to our children. These are also excellent opportunities for Charlbury pupils to meet new friends, many of whom they will encounter when they move on to secondary school.

Year 6 is currently gearing up for this important milestone. The transition to secondary has been made much easier and far more positive in recent years by the introduction of several Transition Days in June and July where pupils spend entire days at their intended schools, sampling the timetables, meeting teachers, learning to negotiate the much larger school, and crucially, taking the bus on their own – for the majority, a first!

It is not only the Year 6s who will be growing in independence this term – early in May, our Year 4 pupils had their first residential, spending three days in Dorset visiting Moors Valley Country Park, an Oceanarium, Winchester Science Centre and Studland Beach, as well as bunking with their friends for two nights at the Swanage YHA. For some, this was their first time away from home, and formed life -long memories and returned muchmatured children to their parents at the end. Just one of the many experiences that help with our aim of developing the whole child at Charlbury Primary School.

CADS NEXT PRODUCTION this AUTUMN will be "AS YOU LIKE IT" by William Shakespeare. Directed by Glena Chadwick, performance dates 24-25-26 November 2016. Auditions will be held in June and details will be posted on the Charlbury website.

2016 is a special year for CADS as it is our 40<sup>th</sup> year in existence under the CADS banner, after the original Charlbury Players group, through no fault of their own, disbanded in the mid 70's:-

After a directive from the then present government stating that "the lighting of all public buildings was banned", a small hardcore group of enthusiasts kept in touch and once a month they met in each other's homes to enjoy an evening of play readings.

With the winter of 1975 approaching Charlbury were raising funds for a new swimming pool for the primary school and the idea of a pantomime was suggested to help raise some funds. Roy Slade wrote the script and the group staged the panto which was a great success and so it was in 1976 that CADS was officially formed with their first production being Alan Ayckbourn's "Relatively Speaking", produced by Audrey Davies and was said to be a triumph. Since then CADS have gone from strength to strength, at times staging three productions a year, consisting of plays, revues and musicals whilst also scoring notable achievements in drama festivals.

CADS wanted to commemorate this 40<sup>th</sup> milestone so the committee decided that the surviving founding members of the first CADS official production "Relatively Speaking" should be made Honorary Members, some of whom are still very much active today, and so at our AGM in March this year Mike & Denise Summers, Pam Bradley, Geoff Clifford, Terry Walker and Mike Mahoney were all made honorary members that night.

We also would like to thank everyone who has been involved with CADS, however big or small, over these past 40 years and look forward to many more years in the future


## Garden Society Summer Show

### Charlbury Morris - Needs You Come and join us to dance or play

We started way back in 1984 as a 'young turks' side – didn't know a lot about the dancing but we leapt about with great enthusiasm, originally for a wedding celebration.

Over the years we have evolved into an established side with a variety of dancers and musicians from all walks of life with a good standard of dance and music.

You might have seen us out at the **Street Fair** taking turns with our friends in Wychwayz – the Charlbury Border Morris side with the black faces.

Having a good time is the reason for the effort we put into learning and practicing the dances and to put on a good show in the summer months.

Morris Dancing is a local tradition with a history dating back to the 19<sup>th</sup> century and earlier with many dances and tunes recorded from this area of the Cotswolds .

Practice in the winter can be demanding and helps keep us all fit – you'll soon find out if you aren't !

We usually end up at the pub for a social pint after but it is not compulsory.

There are about twenty of us which ensures we have a pool of dancers to call on at any time to form a side – usually about 10 or 12 of us This avoids having to ask dancers to turn out when they have other commitments. We dance out with the Morris because it is so enjoyable.

We are called Charlbury Morris but actually are Charlbury / Finstock Morris and currently have members living in Burford, Shipton, Witney, Oxford, Chippy as well as Finstock and Charlbury. We perform at a variety of events locally during the summer dancing season and have occasional visits further afield – Bruges in Belgium next July. We have performed in Munich, Nerha in Spain, Bruges twice, Serra in Italy and Antwerp. We also have social events during the off season – barn dances and pub evenings and join other sides for socials.

## Wychwayz Border Morris

Wychwayz are a mixed Border Morris side based in Charlbury. We are a different tradition to Cotswold Morris and

our origins are rooted in the Welsh border regions. Unlike the traditional white kit of the Cotswold Morris dancers we base our costume on the colour black and like many other Border sides we have colourful 'tatters' on a black coat; ours are individually chosen to add vibrancy of colour to the outfits.

Then there is the face paint that we use. Historically the faces of Border Morris dancers are painted black. Why black? Well no one is really sure some say it comes from the origins of the dance as a Moorish dance and certainly dancers at the times of Henry VII are known to have blackened faces.

Another explanation which seems more likely is that the dancers formerly used to beg for money at the dance outs. As this was illegal they wanted to disguise themselves, especially from their feudal daytime employers, and since in the borders they were often miners or charcoal burners they had a ready supply of soot. Blacks gained their name from their habit of blacking their faces when undertaking poaching raids.

In fact blacking faces was often used by criminals and this led to The Black Act being passed by Parliament in 1723 which outlawed the practice of being 'blacked up'. In the forest it carried the death penalty. Fortunately this has been repealed and we can now perform at the Forest Fair in Wychwood although the pheasant feathers in our hats are a reminder of the poaching days.

Morris dancing is a living tradition, and like any tradition it survives by adapting and making itself relevant. Dancers are no longer begging farm labourers or miners – they now perform for fun instead of money. The music has changed too, bringing in influences from other genres. Even the accordion, a characteristic instrument associated with Morris, has only been part of the tradition since its invention roughly 100 years ago.

Another difference from Cotswold Morris is that we always use sticks and never handkerchiefs, and make as much noise as possible in our dances. The stick dances probably were derived from sword dances and can be quite boisterous so don't get too close!

Our dances are sometimes based on what we know of traditional ones and are often named after the place from which they came such as the Evesham stick dance, although others may be dances made up recently by other Morris sides.

Present day Morris dancing is still a very social activity; we regularly dance out with other sides often Cotswold Morris sides such as Charlbury or Ducklington Morris.

In summer we can be found dancing at fetes and festivals. My own hat is always very popular and is constantly evolving with changes in feathers and other additions. We also try different ways to paint our faces. Wherever we dance in public we always attract attention and quite often are asked to pose for photos with people.

We have quite a lot of dance outs this summer including the Wilderness Festival, the Forest Fair, and Street Fair finishing with Halloween at The Wychwood Brewery and at the Bell on Boxing Day. So you may well see us around.

We always welcome new members, either as dancers or musicians, and as our dances were for ordinary people they are quite easy to learn with no experience required. We would especially welcome some younger dancers.

If you want to try it just come along to the Shed on Tuesdays at 8.00 pm, find us afterwards in the Rose and Crown.

Sentenced to 10 years in prison, Powers' only hope was New York lawyer James Donovan (**Tom Hanks**), recruited by the CIA to negotiate his release in a prisoner exchange deal.

In the summer of 2012, a coalition of jihadist forces allied with Tuareg tribesmen overran the northern cities of Mali in West Africa, sparking global outrage. Less widely chronicled was the Shariahbased prohibition on performance, song and dance, a particularly cruel restriction in a land celebrated throughout the region—and the world—for its music.

I wept from the side of his set back then and I'll probably do it again!

#### The line-up

Rock 'n' roll survivor Wilko is one of the Friday highlights along with the ever popular Jamie Cullum, 80's acid jazz pioneers Soul II Soul, R&B troubadour Lemar, and Ska veterans The Beat. All Saints, Corinne Bailey Rae and Booker T join the Saturday bill topped by the most elegant man in music Bryan Ferry, along with Gabrielle Aplin, revered alt-country star Lucinda Williams and Lighthouse Family frontman Tunde.

After his triumph as surprise special guest last year, Seal returns with his own headline slot on Sunday. Joining Seal are Cornbury favourites The Shires, along with celebrated singer-songwriter James Morrison, guitar virtuoso Newton Faulkner and 60s rock combo The Zombies.

The Festival's comedy stage will feature cutting edge acts from the British stand-up circuit including Dane Baptiste, Carl Donnelly, Ed Gamble and Nish Kumar; and don't miss the Riverside stage run by the team behind Charlbury's Riverside Festival. Big bands and raucous rhythms dominate the Riverside stage this year from gangster swing to funky folk, jumping jazz, gypsy punk, strutting ska and good old fashioned rock 'n' roll. Headliners The Peerless Pirates, Mayhem and Saedly Dorus and The Hoolie Band are all big hitters on the Oxford music scene.

#### **Family fun**

Apart from the fantastic something for everyone line-up, families return again and again to the festival because of its relaxed safe atmosphere, activity-packed kids zone and the beautiful campsites nestled in the estate's rolling hills.

The Kids' Zone is a colourful, friendly space right in the middle of the festival, in sight of the main stage, so families can drop in and out whilst seeing all the festival highlights. And, unlike other festivals, all activities are free - there is no need to book in advance, just turn up and join in.

As well as an impressive range of free arts and crafts activities, youngsters can learn to play the ukulele, create songs, find their inner rhythm at the samba drumming workshops or pick up new disco moves. There are children's theatre and puppet shows and the ever-popular circus skills workshop.

New this year is the Mayflower Project Teen Tent, a comfortable and safe setting where young festival goers can take part in workshops to learn new skills or just hang out with friends.

Tickets start from £70 for an adult day ticket, £10 for a child; and £170 for an adult weekend ticket, £30 for a child, with under threes free.

# Excellent news! The sun is shining on Southill Solar ....

The Southill team is absolutely delighted with the hundreds of local people who have invested in our sunny future! The number of "I'm in" posters

does not reflect the hundreds of Charlbury people who have committed to the project. If you haven't got yours yet, just let us know and we'll get one to you.

Southill Community Energy (SCE) is pleased to announce that it now has construction finance and the Southill Solar farm will start on site in July, allowing completion in time to meet its FIT target date of 6 September.

This follows agreement (subject to contract) with Solarcentury – our nominated contractor - to use its own funds to complement those raised by SCE to date.

With equity standing at £850,000 at the time of writing, SCE will have sufficient funds including loans from other coops, Resonance and a lending bank to be able to repay Solarcentury by early September, when it will take possession of the completed site.

However, we're still keen to promote local ownership and to raise equity from investors seeking to create social, environmental and community impact as well as making a healthy return on their investment.

This means that Ethex will allocate the funds raised by 6th May so that the funds can be used towards the construction. We will keep the share offer open until 31st August.

All those who have invested to date, and any investor lodging funds after 6th May, will know that 100% of their funds will see this project through to success.

And success will include starting on our planting plans for a wildflower meadow, orchards, bees and honey and more!

Since the Paris Agreement in December 2015, the world is undergoing an energy revolution. It's good to know that Charlbury, Finstock and Fawler are playing their small part. *Liz Reason* 

## Toad Update

The good news is that there was a brilliant response following our request for toad patrol volunteers in the March edition of this newsletter, so a big



'thank you' to all of them; the bad news is that we saw only 52 live toads and we were too late for 14.

This is not the total number of all the toads making their way to their ancestral breeding pond but those who choose to crawl during the early hours of darkness when the rush-hour traffic is at its greatest. The fact that there were so many volunteers this year meant that not only did they lighten the load of 'the few' but it made the drivers slow down as they became more aware of what was going on.

We had been worried at the suggestion that some of the habitats in our area had been destroyed by farmers clearing trees but it seems that low toad numbers are a nation-wide feature. Maybe the toads which survived this year will proliferate and we shall have many more next year. This year certainly was strange; whereas in the past we have seen toads continually from mid-February onwards, this year after the initial desultory arrivals, there was a long gap till late March and everything had finished by mid April.

This year is strange for other species. As I write on May  $1^{st}$  there are no swallows, swifts and house martins. I haven't seen a live hedgehog for 20 years and this is in an area where there were so many, we used to hear their noisy rootling frequently.

Maybe, we should be more aware of what we are doing to other species when we build walls and put netting on our gates and fences in order to keep the rabbits out and our dogs in. What is being deprived of their ancient rights of way and what suffering are we inadvertently causing?



#### West Oxfordshire United Nations Association

West Oxfordshire United Nations Association is the local branch of the United

Nations Association which has a long history of supporting, not unquestioningly, the work of the United Nations. The UNA has an important monitoring and observational role, including and especially on controversial issues such as membership of the UN Security Council and the process for electing the Secretary General of the UN.

The West Oxfordshire Branch, part of the Southern Counties region network, is based in Charlbury and exists here as a legacy of the passion and commitment to world affairs of former UNA Director Malcolm Harper. He and his wife Ann hosted many meetings, often in their home in Church Lane, inviting people he had met on his travels in the UK, Africa and throughout the world to give insightful, if often disturbing, first hand accounts of their experiences and observations.

On one memorable occasion women visitors came from Somaliland to discuss the challenges of stocking the library at their new university and developing opportunities for women. This was at a time when Somalia was primarily reported in terms of incidents of piracy in the British press.

The WOUNA branch has continued to meet since the unexpected death of Malcolm Harper three years ago. The previous Chairman, Brian Hodgson, who gave so much to the group had also sadly died a few years earlier. These men were irreplaceable but the group concluded that it should continue as a forum for first hand information and discussion of world affairs.

With the support of Malcolm's widow Ann, we continue a programme which includes fundraising activities such as card sales, coffee mornings and our Street Fair stall. We also continue to sell Zaytoun products as a means of offering support to Palestinian olive growers who experience serious difficulties with trading from their groves on the West Bank. Joint purchasing with Oxfam in Oxford has helped to keep our prices down. Please contact Ann Harper at The Cottages, Church Street or the Fair Trade stall at St Mary's Church if you wish to purchase olive oil or other products such as soap.

We have been fortunate in being able to find speakers because West Oxfordshire has an unusual number of residents who have focused their lives on world development issues. We are able to hold several meetings each year at which local people share their reflections on their area of expertise and first hand experience. We ask them to be mindful of the UN Sustainable Development Goals, which have succeeded the better known Millennium Development Goals, but are seeking speakers' personal views. Talks are followed by questions and sharing of opinions and this is usually a very interesting and informed part of the meeting. Sir John Birch's talk on The Challenge of Russia - What is Putin up to? gave his large WOUNA AGM audience reason to watch events unfolding in Syria with real, if worrying, insight.

Our local UNA branch also links with other organisations with compatible aims to increase our combined impact. We have sent joint letters to The Prime Minister and the Foreign Secretary following shared peace vigils with Churches Together in Charlbury in support of Gaza; members have also attended Amnesty meetings in Chipping Norton. We are also sympathetic to groups such as the Charlbury Refugee Action Group which have formed in West Oxfordshire in response to the recent crises.

Our next meeting is on June 8th when Charlbury resident Neil Pakenham-Walsh will speak about his work disseminating health care information internationally -"People are dying for lack of knowledge: Healthcare Information For All and the role of the WHO" in the Morris Room, Corner House, 8pm, Admission Free. There is no local membership fee for WOUNA but we suggest that regular attenders join the national United Nations Association via their easy to use website *www.una.org.uk.*

#### A Days Life: Mary Jones (1848-1925)

## As transcribed by Barbara Allison with kind permission of the Foster family.

Mary Jones wrote regularly to her daughter May, who lived near Boston in Lincolnshire with her husband and little son. Mary was the wife of George Joshua Jones, a well-known Charlbury baker and confectioner, who was on the parish and district councils, as well as other public bodies. They were deeply involved with the Methodist Church, where Cliff their son played the organ.

Mary's letters mention her other surviving children: Kit, who was the teacher at the tiny village school in Idbury, and Ethel who was a nurse in Oxford.

Here are extracts from some of her letters in the winter of 1923-24, when she was 75, and had been married for 50 years. They give us a glimpse of her life, her interest in her family and their health, how she saw outside events impact on the community, and community events

#### Monday 21st Jan [1924]

My dears all

So the railway drivers' strike has really begun, only as yet in a partial way thank goodness. There was a train each way this morning, but very likely Kit may have to cycle home by way of Milton-it depends what information she could glean on her way this morning. And such a wet day here. About the little darling's constipation I hardly know what would be best to keep that right. Treacle is a fine thing to regulate some folks. You might try a little with his breakfast and tea. Spread some on a small slice of bread without butter. It will soak in & he is sure to like it, and will not be messy

Father went to the tradesmen's ball at Cornbury. A great many there, and everything very grand. Connie went but Cliff did not. They got home at 3am in the morning

There were no newspapers come by train this morning. The Daily News regular supply came in a Motorvan, Other customers had to do without. A wicked strike it is without a doubt, and all because about 40 firemen are asked to do with  $\pounds 6$  a week wages instead of  $\pounds 7$ .

Another thing I think of is to get the darling to eat the <u>fat</u> of meat. Don't mention the word <u>fat</u>, that sometimes revolts children, call it 'White meat', he will soon prefer it. Do you remember Aggie Fidler was like that? And I remember another child who liked 'white meat'

#### [from Kit]

Yes! Just got home, cycling through mud & rain & a face wind from Idbury begorr! & wet through for the 2<sup>nd</sup> time today. I reckon I earn my little bit of corn. Aren't strikes wicked? This is my 3<sup>rd</sup> experience in 4 years! Ah well, thanks be for being able to bike. What you lose in strength you gain in peace of mind! I couldn't have not gone with 40 children waiting for me could I? Lots to say when there's breathing space. Love to you 3 – we 3.

#### *Tuesday* [29<sup>th</sup> January 1924] My dears all

We got your letter Monday morning. They have to come all by road now! I think from Oxford. We shall be glad when this wretched strike is over. Last week Kit had to cycle home each day, but this week the 'five' train from [*missing*] is running, but in the morning Cliff takes her in the car, for no 'down' train runs before 12 oclock.

Of course, people say she might sleep at Idbury, & perhaps she could at the Rectory or the manor, but then she would be neither a Visitor nor a lodger, & she could not offer them money for her board, so she prefers to come home each day however bad the journey may be.

What a lot of bad weather you have had too. Hope it will soon be better. Very fortunately we had plenty of coal in for there is none to be had at the Wharf.

Love from all and more to follow Your Mother

#### *Tuesday* [?5<sup>th</sup> February, 1924] My dears all

The strike was over early last week, so Kit was able to take her daily journey as usual, and I hope to goodness the Dockers won't strike as the Railway men have promised to support them. I think that is owing to Mr Thomas having no longer control, and the new President being a 'wilder 'man. It is a poor lookout.

There is a rough cold drying wind today, always a dismal sound. But Aunt Annie came out in it, she will be nipped one of these days and get pneumonia being so venturesome. And will be 85 in May. Cousin Lott will be 84 in June, so we are a bunch of old people hereabouts.

I sent a paper for you to see the Congratulations [*on their Golden Wedding anniversary*]. I suppose it got mentioned up street. We had your plum pudding and Cliff and Phyllis came up for tea. Con had a bad cold so did not come up lest it should be catching. Hope the darling is well & your dear selves too

#### **TOWN NEWS JANUARY TO MAY 1916**

#### WAR NEWS

The local branch of the National Farmers' Union held a fund-raising event in February at the Bell Hotel for the **British Farmers' Red Cross Fund** - a sale of live and dead stock. One feature was the presence of **the well-known lamb of Mr Geech of Burford** (a fine type of Oxford Down), which has been sold and resold several hundred times and has thus raised about £560. At Charlbury it raised £36 10s. With the ladies' sale in the Town Hall of clothing, millinery, groceries, provisions, furniture etc, the amount raised was £550.

Between January and May the following deaths have been reported: Henry Hall Norton (wounded at Gallipoli, died on 27th January in a military hospital in Alexandria in Egypt); Jim Kerwood who had family connections at Walcot Farm (killed on 6th February by a shell); George Crump, gardener of Chilson (who died of cerebro-spinal fever in Aldershot Military Hospital); William Buckland of Yew Tree Cottage, Sheep Street (killed in action on 16th May in France); Christopher Dyke of Hazeldene Cottage (killed in action on 6th April in the attack on Sanniyat in Mesopotamia). These names bring the number of deaths of men from the parish to nineteen since August 1914.

#### **DEATH OF MR J MARSHALL STURGE JP**

Mr Sturge, who has died aged 77, bore a great part in the Emancipation of the Slaves and was the close friend of Bright and Cobden. Among his most vivid memories was that of hearing his uncle Joseph's account of the deputation of Quakers to the Czar just before the Crimean War. After a period in the Montserrat Legislature, he spent his last years in Charlbury and loved everything that belonged to outdoor life, with an unusual knowledge of birdlife.

## MR SMITH'S WILL: A CAUTIONARY TALE

#### Findings of the Charlbury Society Historical Research Group

This true story provides a rare glimpse into the rather gentlemanly way in which legal business was conducted in these parts in the late eighteenth century.

One day in November 1792 Edward Smith, yeoman of Walcot, went with John Holloway, a miller from Charlbury, to transact some business with Thomas Winter, an attorney in Chipping Norton. While they were there Mr Smith asked Mr Winter if he would prepare his will for him, and Mr Winter said he would do it when he pleased. So on 27 February 1793 Mr Smith returned to Chipping Norton and gave instructions for his will to Mr Winter, which the latter 'reduced into writing'. 'Some time later' he gave this writing to one Edward Matthews of Chipping Norton, who occasionally drew drafts for him.

Some time in March Edward Matthews received a visit from Mr Winter's clerk, who said that his employer had gone out and 'he was in want of some writing to go on with'. So as Edward Matthews was busy he gave him the draft of Mr Smith's will, which he said he had begun, and told him to finish it, which the clerk duly did.

Some time in April, Mr Winter's clerk happened to see Mr Smith at market in Chipping Norton. He told him his will was drawn out and suggested he went down to Mr Winter's to have it read over to him. Mr Smith asked whether Mr Winter was at home, and on being told he was, he went to see him straight away and asked to have the will read. Mr Winter however said 'he had better take it Home and read it at his leisure' and that if he wanted to change anything it could be done when he brought it back. So Mr Smith took his draft will home where, like me more than two centuries later, he probably spent long hours struggling to decipher the crossings out, insertions and abbreviations with which the six-page document is riddled. It might not have been for nothing that Mr Winter had

entrusted this important task to Mr Matthews rather than his own clerk.

On 1 May Mr Smith returned, once again in company with the miller from Charlbury, 'and pulling from his Pocket the said draft of his said Will', handed it over to Mr Winter, who asked if he approved of it, and he said that he did. So the will was left with Mr Winter to be finalised. However, when some 5 weeks later Mr Smith enquired if his will was ready for signature, Mr Winter, evidently not the kind of lawyer who liked to do things in a hurry, 'answered it was not fair copied but that it should be when he pleased'. Whereupon Mr Smith replied 'let it be done by the next time I come to Market and I will call and Sign it'. This was on 5 June. But on 8 June Mr Smith suddenly died and the will remained unsigned.

This naturally caused a lot of bother, because an affidavit (from which I have been quoting) became necessary to prove the veracity of the will, and a citation also had to be produced to give Mr Smith's beneficiaries a chance to object to the will being placed in the hands of his executors. Only then could probate finally be granted.

Have you made your will?

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## Peace@thePub

An Atheist, a Buddhist and a Christian went into a pub...and found a great deal in common. It's been happening since 2010 on the first Friday of every month at The Bell in Charlbury. Yes, it's Peace@thePub, at which we call to mind the wider world and in particular the "slow-burning" issues which flare up now and again but then drop out of the headlines. War, environmental degradation and natural disasters leave a legacy of suffering which is often only just beginning when the media spotlight switches elsewhere. It is amazing how many people in Charlbury are dedicated to the patient work of reconciliation, rebuilding and prompting change both locally and in other countries.

But why silence? Because then we aren't discussing what we are doing and whether we see it as keeping vigil, meditating, praying, or just being present. Over the years we have found that *not* talking actually builds up a sense of belonging together, not just with one another but with others in Charlbury and, indeed, with all of humanity. If that sounds rather intense and off-putting it isn't meant to! Most people can sit in silence for a few minutes and we have always welcomed people who come for as long or as short a time as feels comfortable to them. From time to time we have taken action on matters that cause deep concern. These have included the prompting of donations for work in Syria, writing to Government Ministers and Ambassadors and, last year, organising a petition to the Prime Minister in advance of the Paris Climate Talks. When possible we like to engage with the work of local people who are working for a better world – so do get in touch with us if you support an appropriate cause. We often find, when we look in depth at an issue, how many positive things are going on out of the limelight, and how resilient people can be in the face of the most appalling circumstances.

We have a mailing list and if you join you'll get a copy of the monthly "focus". Quite a lot of people are on the list and only come occasionally, or not at all. That's how it's meant to be- we know that early on a Friday evening can be an impossible time for many. Thanks as always to The Bell for the use of the room to meet. It's really good too to chat together after the meeting, to slake our thirst and ensure that the silence is well and truly broken!

To add 25% to what you give, we suggest you look up the website of Help Refugees, a registered charity which helps many of the grassroots and voluntary groups which we continue to support.

As to our work, it is only fair to point out that too few people are doing too much. We are really grateful for the help that a number of you give us, and without it much less would happen, but all the planning, the organisation, the liaison, the news gathering, the forward thinking is being done by a group that can be counted on the fingers of one hand.

So to explain: we need people who will

- liaise with the five churches in Charlbury, the WI, youth groups, musicians, sports clubs etc to encourage refugee support.
- take on specific fundraising ideas.
- talk to the schools and develop projects with children.
- take clothing and other items to collection points in, for instance, Oxford, Stroud, Witney and further afield
- drive supplies to the distribution centre in Calais, and help there.
- plan projects with, and learn from, other refugee aid groups in the county and nearby.

And so on. In other words, refugees need YOU! Please get in touch now if there is

something you can do. Call 01608 811378.

Since the last Chronicle, we have had some generous contributions including  $\pm 500$  from Charlbury Quakers which enabled us to donate over  $\pm 700$  to the charity Help Refugees (see above). We are receiving contributions from individuals on a weekly basis, and we would also like to thank these generous donors.

We have collected food, clothing and other essentials which people from Hooky and Witney have taken to the Calais/Dunkirk warehouse.

A very special personal appeal over one weekend, asking for funds to put towards feeding the 12,000 refugees trapped on the Greece/ Macedonia border, raised a heroic £2006, of which over £800 came from an appeal put out by Rev Mark Abrey, vicar of the Chase Benefice (the Chadlington group of parishes).

The ceilidh in March raised £400 (thank you Brigid, Kath and many others). A collection at a Churches Together in Charlbury service in December raised £252. Charlbury Fairtraders have contributed £150 which we put towards a donation of £250 to Calais Kitchens, a charitable fund set up by Help Refugees which helps fund several 'kitchens' providing food in Calais.

Further recent monetary donations include  $\pounds 600$  to the Refugee Community Kitchen (feeding people in Calais, Dunkirk and the small isolated camps now scattered across northern France since half of the 'Jungle' was bulldozed),  $\pounds 375$  to RefuAid who concentrate on medical assistance and integrating refugees into local communities on the Greek mainland, and  $\pounds 375$  to Hot Food Idomeni who daily try to feed the 12,000 people there.




















### **NEWS FROM OUR PCSO**

A scam is a scheme designed to con you out of money. You will be contacted out of the blue either by telephone, email or in person. If you are offered a deal that seems too good to be true, it more than likely is, so be sure to check over all the facts and do not feel rushed into making a decision.

Prize draw scams; Being told you have won a prize draw/competition but in order to receive the money you must dial a number - there will this that they don't inform you of (if the

be a charge for this that they don't inform you of (if the company was genuine, they would make you aware that there is a cost to call them).

Computer virus scams; where you are called and informed your computer has a virus and you are asked to input a code from the caller which enables them to take over your computer. They then have complete access to your files/photos and personal information.

Leave your firewall switched on and don't open suspicious or unknown emails, attachments, texts etc

Before entering payment card details on a website, check that the link is secure (indicated by a padlock symbol in the browser window frame, NOT on page itself.) If you click on the padlock, check the security certificate.

If you suspect a scam you should report it to both the Financial Conduct Authority and Action Fraud. If the company is not registered with FCA , you can report them on 0800 111 6768. Do not give out personal details or money.

Our thanks to them all for many years of dedicated service.

The two empty seats will be filled by cooption. The next Town Council elections will be held in 2020, except in case of resignation or other vacancy.

### UPDATE ON PROPOSALS FOR UNITARY COUNCIL[S]

Without consulting the public or the County Council, on Thursday 25th February a surprise announcement was made by Oxfordshire's District Councils and Oxford City Council. It called for the abolition of the County Council and the establishment of four district quasi-unitary councils, to include parts of Gloucestershire and Northamptonshire.

(A unitary council combines the functions of a county council and a district council into one body.) In addition, the announcement called for the creation of an unelected quango to be known as a 'Combined Authority' to take on difficult areas of responsibility currently with the County Council, such as social care and major road projects. So, this would mean four councils spread across three counties, plus an over-arching unelected quango.

The Districts are now in the process of commissioning management consultants to produce a report to evaluate their proposals. Initially their brief to consultants stated: "The District Councils' view is that a single county-wide unitary authority is <u>not</u> the right solution for Oxfordshire". It went on to say that any finding suggesting a single county-wide unitary would not be approved. The status quo would also NOT be considered.

The Oxfordshire County Council view was that a single county-wide unitary authority was an option that should be considered (along with the Districts' proposal and other options for two or three unitary councils), and had thus been forced to begin the process of commissioning a separate management consultant's report. Any change along these lines will need powers devolved down to local areas, and appropriate funding to match. A larger unitary authority could not properly oversee small local planning and other general issues.

Despite County and public pressure, District Council leaders have not agreed to commission a report covering all the options. Council-Tax payers will now have to fund two separate reports, as the County Council cannot agree to any study that does not compare all options and, ideally, be run by an independent body of some sort. Results of both studies can be expected from early July.

Elections are a great opportunity to meet people and to hear what you are concerned about and one thing that just refuses to go away is Dean Pit! I have been told that the recycling centre at Stanton Harcourt is now refusing to take certain items because the landfill part of the site has been closed. This makes it all the more urgent that we find a replacement for Dean Pit in this area and Andy and I are in discussion with West Oxfordshire District Council officers about this, so we hope to be able to tell you more soon.

West Oxfordshire District Council's cabinet recently announced that they plan to break away from Oxfordshire and form a unitary authority with Cotswold District. This is part of a general plan put together by the District Councils in Oxfordshire. The Councils are employing a consultancy, Price Waterhouse Cooper, to look at the proposal and see if it is viable. Meanwhile, Oxfordshire County Council is conducting its own consultation in a bid to create an Oxfordshire unitary authority. Whilst it may make sense for us to have one layer of local government instead of the two we have now, having two separate consultations across the county strikes me as a shocking waste of taxpayers' money. There will be a chance for us to have our say on this later in the summer.

### **DIANA GRIFFITHS MBE**



Long time Charlbury resident Diana Griffiths celebrated her 100<sup>th</sup> birthday on Monday 25<sup>th</sup> April 2016 at the Old Prebendal

House retirement home in Shipton-under-Wychwood. Diana, and her husband Griff moved into Maryland on Enstone Road in 1966 and she lived there for 45 years until 2011. "Griff" passed away in 2006.

Born in Hove in Sussex, she attended Battle Abbey School in Hastings. On leaving school she worked for a local optometrist before spending a couple of (gap) years in Munich, Germany.

Once while in a bistro, with student friends, Adolf Hitler came in with Unity Mitford, one of the infamous Mitford sisters, but sadly sat out of earshot. A while later Hitler was in Munich with Mussolini and she attempted to take photographs of them but was quickly told by the SS that it was "verboten".

She also witnessed German military convoys passing through Munich on the way to annex Austria. It was shortly after this, in late 1938, she decided to return to the UK.

In early 1939 she volunteered for the Women's Auxiliary Air Force and later that year, just prior to war being declared, she received her official call up to the Air Force and thus began what was to become her career. After code and cypher training in Oxford she received her commission and in July 1940 was posted to the United States spending time in both New York and Washington.

Further postings took her to Canada, North Carolina, the Bahamas, where she had tea with the Duke and Duchess of Windsor and Bermuda. She returned to the UK in 1944, shortly after D Day and for the next ten years was based in the UK. It was, as she described it, a dreary period compared to her time abroad although there were one or two highlights involving the royal family. One such occasion was commanding the WAAF (drill display)

contingent at the 1953 Royal Tournament where following one performance she was introduced to Queen Elizabeth II who was taking the salute.

In 1954 she was posted to Singapore. She flew in a Hastings bomber and the journey took 5 days. She was the Command WAAF Administrative Officer and Welfare Officer (for both airmen and airwomen) for the region which included Hong Kong, Ceylon, Malaya, Borneo and the Nicobar Islands.

Two years later she returned to the UK spending time at the Air Ministry and Fighter Command Headquarters at Bentley Priory.

In 1963 after 24 years in the Air Force she retired having attained the rank of Wing Officer (equivalent to the male rank of Wing Commander). She was destined for even higher ranks but because she met and decided to marry Squadron Leader Wynne (Griff) Griffiths the rules at that time were such that one of them had to retire.

On moving to Charlbury with "Griff", Diana became involved in the community and in volunteer work. This was to lead to her meeting Queen Elizabeth II for the second time when in 2001 she was awarded an MBE for "Services to WRVS in Charlbury" for her involvement with Meals on Wheels for over 30 years. She was 85 at the time of the award and continued helping out, if needed, until the age of 90.

She was also the unofficial "Rose Queen of Charlbury" as she could be relied upon to submit entries for the Horticultural Society annual flower show every year in almost all rose categories and her name is inscribed, more than once, on many of the cups.

Diana received the Queen's card on her birthday and, although she is now living in Shipton-u-Wychwood, her former regular Charlbury postman Rick Henderson was in attendance and gave her a bouquet of flowers and a lovely card of his own with some very touching words from her "Favourite Postman".



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
