

This celebration of the arts and cultural life features top names Freddie and Jennie Jones reading poetry, and Professor Brian Catling RA, Head of School at Ruskin School of Art, engaging in Performance Art in advance of his work featuring at the Royal Academy Summer Exhibition.

The launch day will include Steamroller Printing, making giant linocut and monotype prints using a 1929 Wallis and Steevens Road Roller, at The Bell Inn, followed by an evening with The Oxford Concert Party - described by the Oxford Times as "one of the most entertaining, mould-breaking groups around"

The aim of the Charlbury Art Society is to have many events free, and all others at affordable prices, involving people in the arts as fully as possible. The Art Society hopes to generate new enthusiasm for all the creativity that occurs in our small town.

The programme includes: Drama, Music, Sculpture, Poetry, Painting, Storytelling, Performance Art, Comedy, Ceramics, Singing, Film, Literature, Printmaking and Workshops.

### Charlbury Community Action Plan

 great work being done by four Follow-Up Groups

At a lively meeting hosted by the Charlbury Neighbourhood Forum's Community Action Plan Group on 16 March, four Follow-Up Groups of volunteers met each other and had initial discussions on what issues they want to look into.

The Groups are as follows:

Living Well in Charlbury

How can we help residents access help and health and care services when they need them?

Getting Around/Street Space/Keep Charlbury's Heart Beating

How can we support and improve a vibrant town centre? How to address a widespread concern about the availability of town centre parking for residents and visitors and about the management of traffic flow and traffic speed through and around the town.

Let's Get Together, including Learning on our Doorsten

Is there a need for new clubs, interest groups and shared activities? There is also a clear demand for Charlbury to be a local centre for informal learning and opportunities – how could this be achieved?

Katering for Kids and Kin

Do we need more facilities/activities for young people and their families? – and how to get more views from young people themselves.

There are some key themes/questions which seem to be arising from the discussions of all these groups:

- Are residents living in "outlying" areas of Charlbury, away from the town centre, attracted to and able to join in, social and other activities which take place in central locations, especially if they do not have access to their own transport? Does this also apply to getting people into the centre to use local shops and businesses?
- Is there a need to set up new clubs/ activities or should there be more publicity about what is already available and a means of encouraging and welcoming new joiners to give them confidence to come along for the first time?
- Are we doing enough as a community to reach out to people who may be feeling lonely, isolated, or just new to Charlbury and wanting to find out more about the town and to make new friends and contacts?
- How can the Katering for Kids and Kin Group get the views of young people on what it is like for them to live in Charlbury? It would be great to hear from young people with ideas about this and, even better, an interest in getting involved in helping the Group with some consultation.

# Charlbury Neighbourhood Development Plan Update

As you may know, the volunteer Neighbourhood Development Plan Steering Group, supported by the Town Council is working to prepare a draft Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP). This NDP, when adopted will be a legal document forming part of the framework used to determine whether planning applications should be approved or not. It therefore provides an important opportunity for the community to influence the nature of future development within the town.

An important objective in producing the Plan is to secure greater control over the type, mix, tenure and location of housing in the town in order to meet local needs. To do this we need to consider including sites for development within the plan rather than relying solely on "windfall" applications from potential developers. We are therefore inviting landowners to let us know of land they wish to put forward for consideration, whether for residential use or other purposes. There will be opportunities for residents to comment on the criteria by which sites will be assessed and later to comment on selected sites (if any!). We will also be considering specific sites for possible protection as Local Green Spaces.

Because of the legal status of the NDP, we have to be able to demonstrate that proposed policies and statements are based on clear evidence. The recent town survey has provided useful information in that respect as have other publicly available statistics (e.g. census data) but more evidence is required and we are therefore currently embarking upon other investigations. We are seeking external funding to assist with this work, some of which will require independent expert assistance:

- Local Housing Needs Assessment the number, type, mix and tenure of housing needed to meet the requirements of local people;
- Area Character Assessment to enable us to include policies to protect and enhance the character of the town and the conservation area;
- Strategic Environmental Assessment as we are considering the possible inclusion of development sites in the NDP we need to assess the potential impact of development on the environment.

- Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> September (Street Fair Day) – all afternoon.

Charlbury is really lucky to have a Pre School. We have been preparing children for primary school for the last 40 years and hope to keep this wonderful school open for future generations. Over time, so many people have worked so hard and we really hope everyone can come and join us on the **afternoon of July 15th** to celebrate this small miracle. We will be serving strawberries, Pimms, tea and scones and will have some traditional games to entertain the children, while the grown-ups admire the view and discuss cake.

Some of you might be wondering what does keep us going? It's a magic mixture of hard work and a lot of love. We hope the snap shot below will give you all an idea of how we work.

The wonderful staff: We have a team of dedicated staff who have, between them, worked at the pre school for much longer than 40 years. We are really pleased to introduce our newest member of staff, Kate who comes from a nearby Pre School and has lots of experience. She particular loves working with children outdoors and is planning some really exciting dinosaur themed learning in the classroom. She is joining the dream team led by Chris and Sue with Claire, Jenny and Ann.

The Parents: The Pre School has been and always be managed by the parents. It means we get to steer what happens each day with our children. Lifelong friendships are made through joining the committee and a lot of laughs have been had while struggling to do the simplest of things, like make a much needed cup of tea after a disturbed night's sleep! Some of our current parents even attended the Pre School.

The link with primary school: We are really lucky to have a great link with the Primary School and the Foundation teacher also attended the Pre School not that long ago! Chris always likes to visit and see how our children's learning has progressed over the year and ensure everything we are doing is linked to what is needed when they start primary school.

The Volunteers: We wanted to thank all of our wonderful volunteers. We are really lucky to have so many people who give their time to support our children. Singing Sue is still regularly visiting and always brings a new surprise with her, and every Thursday Tennis, John gets all the children learning the skills they need in our playground. We also have Jean who volunteers every week and loves being outdoors too, taking the children to the woods each week with Little Wild Things. Andy Pickard mows the lawn and is always on hand to help us get more life out of our rickety garden sheds. We are also hoping by the time this goes to press that Andy will become another regular classroom volunteer too.

The Community: This year the Beer Festival has given the Pre School a grant for more wooden building blocks and the Town Council has given us a grant for more maths materials. This will support our exciting research we have been doing in partnership with Oxford University on supporting the early development of maths skills in the Early Years. Thank you to both organisations for providing this much needed funding. The Garden Society also give us a grant every year to keep our garden growing. Every member of the community who buys a cup of tea or a Christmas decoration in support of the Pre School is essential and we would not be around without your continued support.

**Our building:** We love and loath it. It's a nightmare to maintain and maintain it we have to. We have a full refurbishing lease which means that we are responsible for its upkeep. I hope you all love the new windows - we just repainted them and it cost a fortune but they do look magnificent.

**Fundraising:** We are always fundraising and thank everyone for their

continued support. This year we will have and will be running the following:

- Four Farmers Markets where we bake and make the best bacon baps in town. On June 10th we are working at the Charlbury Festival to run Children's craft activities too.
- Pig roast at Cornbury Festival: We used to run this at Wilderness Festival too but just can't quite compete with top chefs in the country and last year made a loss. We have our thinking hats on with the Primary School to come up with a new plan. Cornbury is a three-day music festival and involves over 100 hours of volunteer time but we do all get to listen to good music and have fun!
- The Monster Race: We have done this twice and this year partnered with the Football Sports social club and raised over £2000 in sponsorship. 20 parents ran 5 km and got very muddy (as well as having a lot of fun). The photo is from this year's event.
- The Pop Up Shop: Geoff very kindly lent us his shop for a week to sell nearly new children's clothes. As

parents we loved running the shop and having more choice in the town was a real treat.

As you can see we are working really hard to raise money and continue to keep the Pre School running for hopefully another 40 years! So please do come and celebrate with us and meet some of the many volunteers and parents who have worked hard to keep this wonderful school going.

We have also organised a photographer (another volunteer, thanks Edmund!) and hope to get a photo of everyone who has been involved over the last 40 years so we can see just how many volunteers it takes to keep one of Charlbury's many miracles going. # Charlbury Community Centre

#### The last lap: progress report from the Thomas Gifford Trust

On target for the official opening in early September, these final three months will see an empty shell turning into the fully-functioning, multi-purpose, state-of-the art facility that has always been our vision - a place to connect, read, learn and play.



#### What's happening now

The main contractors, Beard, are completing the construction part of the project and are due to leave site at the beginning of July. By the time they go, parking spaces, paths, and the access road will be built. Most of the hard landscaping will be in place, and areas prepared ready for planting in the Autumn when the conditions are right. Local contractors will complete the front canopy, pergola, cycle racks and areas of fencing throughout the rest of the summer. Beard have been great construction managers and are confident that they will complete the project on time and on budget.

Once the main services including electrics and plumbing are in place, decorating and fitting out can begin. Each key area will have its own specialist treatment: for the main hall there will be special flooring and lighting; built-in reception desks for the entrance and library areas; catering

We have been very busy working on the detailed finishes for the different areas and have finalised colour schemes and fabrics.

Meanwhile, work is well under way with the creation of a dedicated website for the centre which will link with an on-line system for booking the various activities. The aim is to go live in July to give plenty of time to test the system and carry out any tweaking.

Strong interest has been shown from local clubs wishing to play five-a-side football, futsal, cricket, netball and badminton. In addition, enquiries are coming in from individuals and sports coaches about running sessions that could include basketball, volleyball, pickle ball, Zumba dance, yoga and a variety of other sports. ## A Day's Life: John Gittings

Many people will remember the Great Flood of Charlbury in July 2007, the difficulties we had getting around the local area, our amazement at finding most of the routes out of the town impassable, and a car marooned in the flood waters on Dyers Hill Bridge. John Gittings was the owner of that car, and here he tells what happened to him and his wife Aelfthryth on that morning.

I live in Shipton under Wychwood, and on the morning of Saturday, 21st July, Aelfthryth and I were due to drive to Heathrow to collect our eldest son Danny and his family who were arriving into Heathrow at 6 o'clock that morning, having flown overnight from Hong Kong. It had been raining very hard the previous day: the springs at the foot of the High Street in Shipton, on the corner of the junction opposite the Red Lion (now the Wychwood Inn) had burst forth, and a visitor had quite a lot of difficulty getting back through Witney on Friday evening. During the night we heard the sound of large engines faintly in the distance but didn't think much about

Despite the fact that we knew there had been a lot of rain, we were determined to meet our family and left home about 4.20am. Within 10 minutes we were coming past Charlbury railway station, and we could see water ahead. Aelfthryth, always more sensible than me, suggested we stop, but I kept going, and we quickly came to a halt. The water flooded in up to our ankles in the driver's well. It was flowing very fast across the road in front and behind us. It took us 15 seconds to grab our mobiles, get out, and decide that the safest way out was to crawl along the bridge parapet.

There was just about enough daylight coming to enable us to see what we were doing, and after a few more seconds, we reached the other side. We looked back at our forlorn car; by then the lights were flashing, which continued until the battery expired. I also remember seeing another car coming down the hill behind us, which stopped, alerted by our misfortune. I wished we had done the same.

We weren't frightened and had reacted very quickly. But once we got back on land, we were very disorientated, and looking back, I realised that we were in a state of shock. We started to walk, with a vague idea of getting home, towards Finstock. Luckily, a young man (I think his name was Rupert Dodds) attempting to go to work himself, scooped us up in his car and offered to drive us back home. We tried every way to get out of Charlbury firstly, the road to Finstock was flooded at the bridge by Finstock station, then the road to Spelsbury was flooded as well (Ed at the bottom of Pound Hill). We even tried a circuitous route via Chipping Norton and the A361, but as we got in sight of Shipton we saw cars floating in the road ahead. Eventually, we gave up and he took us to his parents' house in Thames Street in Charlbury. They took us in, lent me a pair of trousers, dried our shoes, and gave us tea and breakfast. Then they very kindly drove us to Oxford and we got a coach to London, where we were able to meet our family.

We were told later that the water had risen. 16 feet in half an hour at Shipton, when a number of blockages further upstream on the Evenlode had given way, causing a huge volume of water to come down the river, which simply overwhelmed the bridges—at Shipton, Charlbury, and Finstock—on its way downstream. The large engines we had heard early that morning were fire engines, coming from all quarters, a few from as far away as Leicester, to evacuate the residents from the Old Prebendal, some of whom had to be rescued out of the windows. The flood waters had also knocked down the parapet on the bridge there, and you'll notice if you drive that way now, that it has been repaired with gaps in it, so that if the river floods again, the water can flow through.

The car was a write off. I wanted to fetch some items that were in the boot, but was told by the garage in Milton that it was too depressing a sight.

I haven't been keen to talk about this experience for quite a long time, as I have a sense of having been rather foolish. In self-defence, it was half past four in the morning and my reactions were slow.

But the moral of this story is - when in doubt - Stop! Aelfthryth, despite suggesting we shouldn't drive through the flood, never once reproached me afterwards for doing so. It is one of the very many things I remember with great affection—she passed away at the end of 2012.

## The Friends of Charlbury Library



### **Charlbury Community Centre Appeal Report**

#### Final call for Buy-a-Brick: Deadline 30th June

In this issue of the Chronicle you will find a list of all the people who have subscribed to the Buy-a-Brick scheme so far. There are a lot of names and some have donated more than the minimum £25, so the scheme has raised over £12,000 so far. We are delighted with this, and grateful. We would be even more delighted if there was a flurry of extra supporters this month, now that we need to announce our final deadline. We cannot take any more names after the 30th of June because we need to get the plaque ordered, printed and erected in time for our opening in September. So please sign up immediately if you would like to support the Charlbury Community Centre and see your name on that list. The application form is also printed in this issue.

For those who have contributed already, please check we have your details correctly spelt and as you would like them to appear; the list is alphabetical by surname, and let Ed know if not (ef@daybooks.com).

**Please remember you are not buying an actual brick!** You are supporting the construction of the building and your support will be recognised by being included on an elegant "glass effect acrylic sign" to be displayed permanently in the lobby, alongside the doors into the sports hall.

I mentioned in the last issue that the Charlbury Community Centre Appeal was established in 2004 with the aim of raising £250,000 towards the building and fit out costs of the Community Centre. Will we achieve that target? It's still hard to know because at the time of writing we have not had the Ditchley event, which is our main fundraiser this year. But it is looking likely as the tickets are flying off the shelf and if we sell more "bricks" this month, we believe we can get there. At time of writing we have raised an amazing £232,258.28 altogether in 13 years.

We have two further fund raising events this year:

- Pimm's Stall at the Charlbury Beer Festival on 24th June
- Vintage clothing sale at Wilderness Festival on 3rd-6th August

After September this year, the Charlbury Community Centre Appeal will cease to exist, because our objective will have been achieved. It is likely to be replaced by another group called something like "Friends of Charlbury Community Centre", who will support the Thomas Gifford Trust's efforts to make the centre as inclusive as possible. We'd love to hear from people who might consider volunteering with such a group.

You may be wondering why we still need to raise funds. The Community Centre is a large, expensive project which is being built on a tight budget. Wherever possible we have had to postpone things until funding was available, whilst making sure we do all that is needed to get the building operational by September. So we will be adding to it all the time and any financial help is gratefully received. We are very proud that, as a community, we have managed to get such an ambitious project off the ground and again I would like to extend thanks to all the people who have supported this along the way and who continue to do so.

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# The Botany Spot

Summer at last and my choice of local plants to look out for at this time of year seems so immense I scarcely know where to begin. The roadside verges, the field margins, the woodland and riverbanks in this locality all provide splendid habitats for a

wealth of different species, many of which produce wonderful flowers in summer.

The first of the early summer flowers, which seems to herald the start of the season, is abundant and commonplace but is still one of my favourites, Cow Parsley Anthriscus sylvestris. Sometime in May, magically the grass verges are transformed into a waving mass of delicate, frothy white flowers, seemingly almost overnight. This is the first of the common umbellifers to flower (Family APIACEAE, the Carrot family), but it is joined soon after in June by the Rough Chervil Chaerophyllum temulum, which is common and similar to Cow Parsley but with more delicate and whiter flowers, it also has some purple blotches on its stems. Then Upright Hedge Parsley **Torilis japonica** follows in July and bears a superficial resemblance to its earlier relatives - all are beautiful! Some members of this plant family however, need especial care when handling; the huge, unmistakeable **Giant** Hogweed Heracleum mantegazzianum achieved some notoriety in the Oxford Times in 2015, due to a worried mother who thought she had spotted these dangerously irritant plants all along the river in Oxford. They cause dermatitis on contact, especially in sunlight. The mother may have been correct in her identification but *Heracleum sphondylium*, the smaller ordinary **Hogweed**, is far more abundant in this locality and I suspect in Oxford as well!

#### Hemlock Conium maculatum.

introduced to Britain in ancient times, is superficially like Cow Parsley but is hairless and usually has many purple spots and blotches on the stem; it also possesses a 'mousey' smell and is much taller than Cow Parsley, up to 2.5m high.

This plant flowers from June to August and is found locally; it should be avoided as it is **HIGHLY POISONOUS** containing several toxic alkaloids.

Two further interesting and beautiful summer flowers spring suddenly to mind with my mention of plant toxins, both of these are also found round Charlbury, the bright red, familiar **Common Poppy Papaver rhoeas** is a cheering sight along the edges of fields. It contains toxic opium alkaloids in the same way as the **Opium Poppy Papaver somniferum**, which is also found wild round here, from time to time and is commonly grown in gardens.

Opium poppies are also grown in England to make morphine for the NHS and sadly are grown in huge quantities in places such as Afghanistan for the illegal drug trade and the production of heroin.

Just as well-known, but in more wooded areas, where the soil is less alkaline, is the splendid but poisonous spotted **Foxglove** *Digitalis purpurea*, the original source of a group of medicines containing cardiac glycosides used to treat heart conditions.

My list of wonderful summer flowers has turned into a poison catalogue, or source of pharmaceutical drugs, whichever way you want to interpret it. It does however illustrate how important wild plants are and as well as being beautiful they can also be very useful.

Why not pull that old wild flower book off the shelf and dust it down, or invest in a small modern pocket guide and identify some for yourself? Or you could purchase your children or grandchildren an up-to-date 'i-Spy (sic) Wild Flowers' (it is available on the web in updated form). Who knows, it may spark a life-long interest in the natural world!

The 2017 outdoor season started early, the first game on a cold Saturday April

15<sup>th</sup> with Charlbury hosting a visiting team from the Lancashire club Longridge.

Normally at this time of year the pitches are damp and in favour of bowlers, but with no rain for several weeks conditions were conducive to plenty of runs, more than 400 on the day. Our visitors were more than happy, scoring over 230 of them and enjoying the hospitality afterwards. It was the club's turn to go touring the following weekend, down to seaside Brighton to get ourselves warmed up for the coming league season. On April 29 they were well and truly in the groove, racking up 302 runs in 45 overs as they put league visitors Yarnton and Cowlev to the sword. The Sunday women's team also started their campaign well, a narrow win over visitors Moddershall from Staffordshire in the Midlands League, And the first game for the youth section was another success, the U15boys beating Great Tew.

### **GREEN BINS**

Now that the County Council are once again charging for the removal of green waste, it might be a good time to consider what you are doing

with the waste from your garden. Perhaps you have decided to pay for fewer bins or maybe not pay at all? As a Master Composter, I believe that many gardeners are giving away a valuable resource that could be used to improve the soil in their gardens and save them money. With just a little thought you could save on the collection and save on garden products. The compost heap is a good place to start. Most annual weeds and grass cuttings can

be composted and, providing you have a good mixture of greens (weeds and grass) and browns (toilet roll inners, used paper towels, egg boxes, wood shreddings) mixed with air, in a few months your waste will provide the "black gold" of compost that will enrich your soil and feed your plants. Woody cuttings take longer to compost: they can be cut small with pruners or shears, or, if you have a shredder then you can either add the shreddings to the compost or use as mulch around shrubs or on paths. In the autumn, leaves can be gathered and made into leaf mould, which makes an excellent soil conditioner.

# Churches Together in Charlbury

Springtime and new life fit very well with the Easter story. After a dry winter, when nothing seemed to be stirring, suddenly we are enchanted by primroses and bluebells, fresh leaves, bird songs and insects buzzing. The first Christians must have felt like this. After seeing Jesus die a dreadful death, they were amazed and overjoyed to find their friend was still with them. Churches in Charlbury, like churches everywhere, are decorated with flowers and greenery in celebration of His resurrection.

We use living things, flowers, fruit, leaves, branches and vines as decorations on many special occasions. They are a symbol of our ties to the natural world around us. In Lent we held a series of talks about our natural environment under the title 'Only one earth'. The talks focussed on the dangers of over exploiting the world's resources and some of the actions we might take to avert the damage being done, often in the name of progress.

Loving the natural world is a first step and churches can show that we care about the future of our planet by the way we manage our buildings, buy energy, care for any land belonging to us and integrate our appreciation of all living things into our worship. The last of the Lent talks introduced the idea of working towards an Eco Church Award, either as individual churches or as the five Charlbury churches together.

An Eco Church Award, offered by the charity A Rocha, does not just reflect the way we operate as a church but includes the interests and lifestyle of members of the congregation and our links with environmental organisations and action groups and the local community as a whole. We were so pleased that Christine Elliott, well known to readers of the Chronicle for her articles on environmental

issues, was able to take part in one of the Lent talks.

While the Lent talks were taking place, we were also hosting Lent lunches of soup, bread and cheese. These were much appreciated and raised £1318 for Christian Aid's work with refugees. The next major event for Churches Together is Christian Aid Week, when we shall once again be collecting financial contributions to help tackle poverty and injustice in many parts of the world. Our Lent talks reminded us that climate change affects the poorest people more drastically than people with access to greater wealth and resources and Christian Aid is working to address this injustice.

Churches Together in Charlbury will also be making a contribution to the General Election by working with West Oxfordshire UNA group to organise another hustings, to which all the candidates are invited, before polling day.

Meanwhile Charlbury enjoys the summer and some of the churches will be venues for Artweeks and the Charlbury Festival among other events. And St Mary's churchyard and the gardens of the other Charlbury churches are always open for you to find a peaceful place to rest.

Or why not walk to Shorthampton via Walcot and visit All Saints Church with its ancient wall paintings and glorious views? A booklet is being prepared with information about the route and suggestions for prayer and meditation which reflect the surrounding countryside. It will be available in St Mary's Church together with an Adventure Notebook for children and young families.

We are so fortunate to live in such a beautiful part of the world. We must value, care for it and share it.

# Charlbury 250 years ago What's changed?

Recently I've been studying the historic maps available at our museum in Charlbury and at the Bodleian Library. The earliest map for land ownership around Charlbury is the Thomas Pride Survey done for George Spencer, 4th Duke of Marlborough in 1761 just three years after he succeeded to the title and two years after he'd bought the Walcot Estate from the Jenkinson family.

His father Charles Spencer, as 3rd Duke of Marlborough, had bought the Cornbury Estate in 1751 and the Perrot estates in Fawler in 1756. The accompanying terrier details the ownership, tenancies, land use such as arable, pasture, meadow, coppice and acreages specifying whether in open common fields or enclosed. Then I've tracked each field through the 1770 update done again by Thomas Pride, the 1820 survey, the 1847 Tithe Award survey, the 1859 Jesse Clifford survey, and the early editions of the Ordnance Survey maps, the first in 1881 and the third in 1922.

I was surprised how persistent the field boundaries have remained over the past 250 years, even through the period of ownership being consolidated further by the Marlboroughs and I mused over what the Duke's tenant farmers Richard Morris, Richard Gardner, and John Williams would recognise if they could come back to Charlbury today.

They had fields all over the parish but their farmhouses were in the town, the two Richards lived next door to each other on farmsteads where the Priory is now and John lived in the farmhouse at the bottom of Nine Acres Lane on the north side. In 1761, the re-aligned road around the re -built Lee Place was being called "New Road" and the Scots Pine trees near Wellington Cottages must have been planted on that new road which cut diagonally across rectangular fields. The map shows the remnant of the old road in a straight line from Five Ways to the Old Grammar School and the new road cutting across the drive to Cornbury and the new lodges erected for Lee Place.

Forty years later big changes happened to the roads in Charlbury when the turnpikes were constructed about 1800. Until then the 1761 map shows Woodstock Way going along Ditchley Road, Quarry Lane and along the current footpath before turning right along the Saltway.

There was also a track along Woody Lane through Lee's Rest Wood and then along the parish boundary to the same point on the way to Woodstock - this track through the woods was made into the turnpike road with a new diagonal road built across rectangular fields between the current Stonesfield Lane corner and the next bend at the top of Woody Lane. Baywell Gate, the tollhouse for this turnpike road at Five Ways corner still existed on the 1923 OS map.

The Enstone Road crossroads were created with a new tollhouse and new roads from the bend in Nine Acres Lane and the bend in The Slade by Ditchley Road to the new crossroads. The third turnpike road change was the realignment of the Burford Road over the river where the bend round Rushy

Bank was bypassed by a new straight road with Scots Pine trees planted alongside. Fifty years further on, about 1850, sees the building of the railway line this cut through fields south of the river but kept to the higher ground at the edge of the hay meadows which were on both sides of the Evenlode.

Lees Rest Wood was felled before the 1881 OS map was surveyed but its ghostly shape is shown as a curvy sinuous hedge around the new fields created around Lee's Rest Farm – this would be an assarted hedge with remnant trees and shrubs from the woodland and it still exists today.

Apart from these major landscape changes, by far the biggest change these farmers from 1761 would notice, would be something on a much smaller more detailed scale – the contents of the fields and hedgerows, the birds, flowers and insects would be so drastically different. The sounds of birdsong and insects, people and horses working in the fields all replaced by tractors, cars, lorries, strimmers, lawn mowers, hedge trimmers, and leaf blowers.

These overwhelming changes have happened relatively recently, in my own lifetime, and sadly we have just got used to it as "normal" but I think it would be greatly upsetting if, like them, you had lived with the corn crakes, lapwings, turtle doves, nightingales, and flowery meadows with the great buzz of insects.

However, if we want to, we can encourage what little wildlife there is left around us, we can salvage some of our children's vanishing heritage in the grass verges, hedgerows, and patches of grassland which haven't been "improved".

# THE CHARLBURY SOCIETY HISTORICAL RESEARCH GROUP

The Silver Screen

When Dr Thomas Silver became Vicar of Charlbury in 1828, St Mary's was far more elaborate than it is now. Jesse Clifford, in *My Reminiscences of Charlbury*, has left us a wonderful description of the beautiful carved oak rood screen, the high family pews with canopies and curtains, the two galleries and the painted texts on the walls. But apparently this wasn't all to the taste of Thomas Silver. He wanted to see his congregation, so he had the curtains taken off the pews and removed the rood screen. I wonder what he did with it.

Jesse Clifford also says there were tombs in the churchyard with rounded tops: probably like the 'bale tombs' in Chipping Norton, Burford and Swinbrook. Apparently Silver removed the tomb tops and used them as quoins or corner stones for a 'retiring place' he built at the east end of the church for the Sunday school children. Presumably this means a lavatory, and no doubt the Vicar thought himself very progressive. But where are those lovely tomb tops now?

One of Silver's projects during his ministry here was to encourage Finstock and Fawler to have their own church. He was the driving force behind the construction of the chapel-of-ease at Finstock, which was built on land given by the Churchills of Cornbury and consecrated in 1842. The chapel was looked after by a curate who worked under the Vicar of Charlbury until 1860, when Finstock with Fawler became a separate parish and the chapel became Holy Trinity church. In *Charlbury of Our Childhood*, Caroline Pumphrey says that Silver described Finstock churchyard as 'a fine healthy place to be buried in'; when he died in 1853 he was buried there himself, though his grave is no longer identifiable and there is no monument to him, either in Finstock or Charlbury.

The little church in Finstock was enlarged in 1906, when the choir and sanctuary were added. There are some interesting 'before and after' photos on display. Somewhat ironically, in view of Thomas Silver's involvement with the place, the improvements included placing a brand new, beautifully carved rood screen across the chancel arch. Silver must have been positively whirling in his grave outside! But as part of the alterations carried out in 2005, the rood screen has now been shifted to the back of the church. So perhaps the Rev Dr Silver is finally resting in peace.

# RIVERSIDE FESTIVAL 29-30 July 2017, Charlbury

### Free fun for all the family down by the river

If you want to hear Oxfordshire's finest musical talent for free, head for Charlbury's Mill Field at the end of July for the ever-popular Riverside Festival. The festival has grown year on year since it began life 22 years ago, with more than 40 acts playing everything from folk music to blues, rock, ska and hip hop, attracting thousands of music lovers of all ages, and yet Riverside is still the friendliest, most relaxed music festival in Oxfordshire and, astonishingly, still completely FREE to enter.

This year Riverside hopes to raise awareness of the decline of the bee population, so the kids zone will be a hive of bee-related fun activities, and festival goers of all ages will have the chance to meet local beekeepers and find out what they can do to help.

#### The Music

This year's line-up includes two Riverside favourites: three-piece Oxford-based postpunk band **Zurich** (think New Order meets U2) and **The Standard** known for their uptempo feel-good funk; and, new to Riverside, London-based alt indie band the **HOO HAS.** As in previous years, local record stores Rapture in Witney and Oxford's Truck Store are running the Second Stage which transforms into the Riverside Disco tent at the end of the day: and over on Ben's Fringe Stage, there will be a variety of acts. This stage has been renamed Ben's Fringe in memory of the great Riverside volunteer Ben Wright, who died in 2016. Ben was completely bald and would have been amused that the Fringe stage is dedicated to him.

In addition to the Riverside bar serving craft beers from Witney's Wychwood Brewery, the Pimm's and Tins tent returns along with the Riverside Gin and Tonic lounge and the popular Pre-School Tea and Cakes tent. There is also a wide assortment of stalls selling traditional festival fodder from burgers and pizzas to curries, noodles and a hog roast.

#### Be part of it

Riverside Festival would not exist without the huge band of local volunteers who make it happen. Charlbury Primary School and the Beer Festival help with equipment, Charlbury's Pre-school provides tea and cakes, and the local recycling group ensures that 99% of Riverside's waste doesn't go to landfill. West Oxfordshire District Council has given Riverside Festival an Inclusive Award in recognition of its work to ensure the festival is open and welcoming to people of all abilities whether they be volunteers working at the festival, performers or, most importantly, the audience.

### Charlbury Town Council report

#### Planning applications – how they work

Charlbury is seeing more medium/largescale planning applications than usual – perhaps because developers are trying to get their proposals in before the District Council's Local Plan, which includes a list of approved sites, is adopted.

Understandably, these speculative applications are often a matter of concern for neighbours and other nearby residents.

West Oxfordshire District Council is the planning authority, not the Town Council. It is WODC's elected councillors (advised by their full-time officers) who make the decision on any application. You can find out about current applications by registering with the 'My Alerts' service on the WODC website (www.westoxon.gov.uk then click 'Login/Register'), by checking the list automatically posted to the Charlbury website every Monday morning (www.charlbury.info), or by looking for yellow posters on lamp-posts!

The Town Council is consulted on, and responds to, all applications in Charlbury. Our views are advisory only – WODC can (and does) go against them – but we hope that they help WODC to make a more informed decision.

If you would like to comment on a planning application, the most important thing is to lodge your comments with WODC before the deadline for each application. You can do this on the WODC website, or write to the WODC offices at Elmfield, Witney. Comments which refer to WODC planning policies, or to the legal protections for the Cotswolds AONB and the Charlbury Conservation Area, will carry more weight.

The Town Council does also appreciate receiving a copy of your comments. This helps us draw up our own response. You can email these to charlburytc@btinternet.com.

Town Council responses are discussed and agreed at our two meetings towards the end of the month. The Planning Meeting, where councillors work through all the applications received, is on a Monday at

8pm (7.30pm if a speaker has been invited). All are welcome to observe the meeting: there is no opportunity for public participation, but comments received in writing prior to the meeting will be taken into account.

Then, on the Wednesday at 7.30pm, the report from the Planning Meeting is approved at the full council meeting. Charlbury residents are welcome to speak at the beginning of this meeting if they book a slot with the Town Clerk (charlburytc@btinternet.com, 01608 810117).

Charlbury residents are invariably well-informed and passionate about the town – so we hope this brief guide will help you make your voice heard most effectively on new developments.

#### **Town Council election**

At the time of the Chronicle going to press (the end of April), the vacant seat on Charlbury Town Council remained unfilled after no candidates were nominated on two successive occasions. If a candidate comes forward on the third attempt, there will be an election on Thursday 8th June (together with a certain other election taking place on that day).

If not, nominations will be reopened for a fourth time, with details posted on the Charlbury website, noticeboards and Town Council website. We would encourage anyone interested in the future of the town to step forward. The time commitment is not onerous (two evening meetings a month) and it's a real chance to help make Charlbury better. Don't just sit there and complain – get involved!

#### **Annual Parish Meeting**

The APM took place on Friday 31st March in the Memorial Hall, with addresses from Town Council chairman Peter Kenrick, our district councillors, and representatives of Charlbury organisations. Attendance this year was low but, as ever, the meeting provides an opportunity for residents to ask questions of the Town Council.

#### West Oxfordshire Local Plan

The WODC Local Plan sets overall planning policy for the district. WODC has now submitted its revised plan to the Planning Inspector who will be considering at hearings in May and July. Charlbury Town Council lodged a detailed set of comments

focusing on the protection of town services and preservation of the AONB, especially in new developments.

#### Station car park enlargement

Great Western Railway is in the early stages of developing plans to enlarge Charlbury station's car park, through a second deck on the existing sunken area, and new spaces on the part of the meadow parallel to the railway line. No formal planning application has yet been submitted but GWR representatives addressed the council this spring. We have stressed the importance of looking at station parking and traffic issues throughout the town, rather than at the car park in isolation, and asked GWR to participate in a working group with us, the district and county councils. We are also pushing GWR to engage with the Environment Agency on flooding, pollution and other environmental measures which we believe are crucial in this sensitive place.

All our meetings are open to the public. Full council meetings will be held in the Corner House at 7.30pm on Wednesday 28th June, 26th July and 23rd August, with Planning & Correspondence two days before (8pm unless there is a speaker).

The next open 'surgeries' will be in the Corner House from 10am-12pm on Saturday 3rd June and 5th August.

### The Wychwood Project

The Wychwood Project has been helping to conserve West Oxfordshire's special landscapes and important wildlife habitats since 1997. The support of local people is

vital to the Project's success.

The Wychwood Project works within the area that was once the Royal Hunting Forest of Wychwood. At Domesday in 1086, the royal forest of Wychwood covered much of what is now West Oxfordshire. Today, the project covers 41 parishes and 120 square miles of the former forest.

The main aim of the project is to inspire people to restore and conserve landscapes and habitats and works in partnership with local communities planting new woodlands and hedgerows, rebuilding drystone walls and conserving wildlife-rich meadows, woods, hedges and ponds. In addition, we provide advice, training, and opportunities for local volunteers to become directly involved in caring for the Wychwood countryside.

We are lucky to have a rich mosaic of landscapes and wildlife habitats in the Wychwood area. These landscapes and habitats include river meadowlands, ancient or species rich hedgerows, ancient woodland remnant, arable field margins, floodplain wetland and floodplain pasture, wood pasture, heathland and acid grassland, limestone (lowland calcareous) grassland, lowland mixed deciduous woodland, parkland and ponds, traditional orchards and veteran trees.

Volunteers underpin the success of the Wychwood Project. People volunteer their

time in many different ways depending upon their time, skills and interests. Examples of the role of volunteers include the trustees who oversee Project direction and charity governance, to the people who organise and run the annual Wychwood Forest Fair; the hedge layers, walkers, botanists, and other wildlife enthusiasts who work on a regular basis to conserve Wychwood's landscapes and habitats 'on the ground', to people who support the work behind the scenes in the project office.

Our biggest and most notable success to date is the creation of Wychwood's largest community woodland `Foxburrow Wood'. 22 acres have been planted with over 11,000 trees and shrubs and a welcome trail, and parking area for users.

#### NEWS FROM CHARLBURY PRIMARY SCHOOL

There's a distinct outdoor feel to this term's update! With so many educational benefits associated with children learning in the open air, whenever we can we take the opportunity to extend our classrooms beyond their four walls and use our outdoor environment.

We're lucky to have a great multifunctional outside space at Charlbury Primary School for the children to use throughout the school day. Our younger pupils regularly take their learning outside, for example to explore our sensory garden or to revel in messy play; our older pupils spill outside for netball and basketball sessions (and the odd ukulele lesson!) and the area is always well-used during break and lunch time each day.

But with this regular and energetic use, over time the school grounds do need a bit of a perk up so this issue is all about the plans and activities we have organised to do just that.

At the start of the spring term, we revived our after-school Gardening Club. Already the children have tackled the weeds around the school grounds and have made great inroads in our main growing bed, sowing seeds to cultivate herbs, vegetables and flowers. As part of our plans, we would love to be able to supply the school kitchen with some home-grown produce which can be turned into school dinners for the whole school to enjoy, so in April, the children prepared and planted out seed potatoes which they are delighted are now starting to sprout!

We're very grateful to Findlay Construction, the contractors working on the Elmsted development in Pooles Lane, who donated a huge amount of soil to us, which we have used to fill in our old disused pond area so it can be used for a large vegetable patch.

We're also delighted that local resident and parent Harriet Kopinska will be providing the children with composting lessons to help us get even more productivity from our crops next season.

We are however in need of a few more resources to enhance our plans so if you have any spare tools (gardening forks, spades, brooms) you'd be willing to donate to us, please contact the School Office at 01608 810 354 or drop them off at Reception - thank you.

In May, our much-anticipated new outdoor play equipment is being installed. This new wooden play apparatus includes outdoor tepees, balance poles, a clatter bridge, a log traverse and a new climbing wall. The project has been funded with £10,000, much of it generously raised and contributed by Charlbury School Association and topped up by a Charlbury Beer Festival grant of £3,856. We are extremely grateful for the on-going support of both of these charitable organisations, without which we would not be able to provide such fantastic enhancements to our outdoor environment for all pupils.

Finally, on Saturday 20 May, we are holding a 'Groundforce Day' to help spruce up the school grounds and by the time you read this, we hope we will have been joined by keen gardeners and volunteers from the community to help us paint fences, weed borders and generally tidy our outside spaces ready for a host of summer lessons, PE sessions, break-times, country dancing and sports day practices, all of which characterise early summer at Charlbury Primary School.

### All Together In Charlbury (ATIC)

All Together in Charlbury (ATIC) – our Good Neighbour Scheme (GNS) – has now been

officially launched at a well-attended public meeting held on 9 March. ATIC will be managed by a steering group of Charlbury volunteers, who came forward at the meeting: Jane Crane, Hugh Goyder, Roger Marsh, Meryl Smith, Sue Tokumine.

The meeting recognised that there is already a lot of informal caring and good neighbourliness already going on in Charlbury. ATIC will aim to fill any gaps in informal coverage and to support existing acts of kindness and sharing.

All Together In Charlbury will be aiming to provide the following services:

- transport to hospital or other medical/ health/care appointments
- transport for other purposes such as to get to the shops or hairdresser, to take part in a local activity or club or to visit someone in hospital or a care home
- getting shopping or collecting prescriptions
- household tasks (such as changing a light bulb or smoke detector battery) or gardening
- visiting or befriending
- help with pets
- letter writing or simple form-filling
- reading for people who have difficulty reading for themselves.

The scheme will be there for residents of any age and circumstances who, for whatever reason, are unable to carry out a task themselves and who have no family or friends available to help. The only exception will be that we cannot help unaccompanied minors.

At the launch meeting the decision was taken to ask Volunteer Link Up (VLU) to take on for us the work to receive requests for help from Charlbury residents and to link them with a willing ATIC volunteer.

This is a service that VLU offers free of charge to local Good Neighbour Schemes, if they do not wish to carry out this work themselves.

This will mean that Charlbury residents wanting to request help through ATIC will ring Volunteer Link Up's phone number (01993 776277). VLU will then find a local ATIC volunteer to meet each request.

Volunteer Link Up is an experienced and well-respected charity formed in 1983 and based in Witney, which runs its own District-wide Good Neighbour Scheme and is also promoting and supporting new local GNS across Oxfordshire.

By using Volunteer Link Up's professional services in this way ATIC can benefit from the knowledge of experienced staff and from VLU's accredited administrative systems for supporting both "clients" and volunteers.

Anyone who kindly volunteers to help All Together In Charlbury meet local needs will be volunteering for ATIC as a Charlbury-focused community scheme and will be recognised and supported by ATIC. However, under the terms of our helpful arrangement with Volunteer Link Up, for formal administrative purposes they will become a member of VLU's volunteer team.

The All Together In Charlbury steering group is now in the process of getting ATIC ready to go into operation. ATIC volunteers are being officially "signed up". Nowadays this inevitably involves some paperwork to complete and in line with good practice each volunteer will have a DBS (Police) check.

There is also publicity material to be produced and circulated, so that everyone in the town will know what help can be available through ATIC and how to get in touch.
