Charlbury Community Action Plan – where do we go from here?

We've had the Town Survey and the results are now being published. Key issues have been identified and views on needs have been expressed – so what are we going to do about them? Come along to the Memorial Hall on 16 March at 7.30 p.m. and get involved!

The Charlbury Community Action Plan Group (CCAPG) of the Neighbourhood Forum is working to draft an Action Plan focusing on action that the community needs to take (with outside help, if necessary) in response to the views expressed in the survey.

The CCAP Group needs interested local residents to come forward to lend a hand with exploring solutions and improvements that would benefit them and others in the town. The more people we can get involved, the less time will be needed from each person interested in following-up a particular issue. Follow-up will be a joint effort.

The CCAPG is setting up a number of Follow-Up Groups for this purpose, as follows:

Living Well in Charlbury

How can we help residents access help and healthcare services when they need them? What will enable us all to live as well and independently as we can in the community?

There is interest in different types of housing: Supported, Affordable, Downsizing, Self-build, Flats/bedsits. Can we learn from imaginative community-led housing projects elsewhere?

Keep Charlbury's Heart Beating

How can we support and improve a vibrant town centre offering access to a range of services and attract visits by all

sections of the community as well as people from outside the town? How can we promote business activity? There may be better ways of using (sharing) the town centre space to provide a more congenial community focal point.

Getting Around and Street Space

How can we ensure that we maintain and improve access to and use of transport other than the private car – to get around town and, when necessary, to get out for access to services and activities elsewhere?

There is widespread concern about the availability of parking for residents and visitors and about the management of traffic flow through and around the town. We need to find out what could be done.

Let's Get Together, including Learning on our Doorstep

There are lots of ideas for new clubs, interest groups and shared activities coming from the survey. There is also some sense that there should be more opportunities to meet up with others. There is a clear demand for Charlbury to be a local centre for informal learning and opportunities to pick up, share and improve a range of skills. How can we use local talents as well as expertise from outside?

Katering for Kids and Kin

Do we need more facilities/activities for young people and their families?

The Community Action Plan Group is organizing a launch event for the Groups on Thursday, 16 March 2017 in the Memorial Hall starting at 7.30 p.m. Come along and hear more about the Groups' role and join a Group of your choice, if you want to have a say in how particular survey issues should be followed up.

All Together in Charlbury (ATIC)

A Good Neighbour Scheme for the town

Responses to the town survey organised by the Charlbury Neighbourhood Forum show that there is clear local interest in setting up a Good Neighbour Scheme for Charlbury.

A Good Neighbour Scheme (GNS) is a voluntary group which aims to provide informal help and support to people in the community who need it by linking them up with someone who has offered some of their time to enable the Scheme to meet requests. A Scheme aims to be available to residents of all ages and circumstances.

Through the town survey some community -minded residents have already expressed a willingness to give some time to being ATIC volunteers, which is wonderful.

The kinds of help that can be available through a GNS will depend on local needs and the interests of the range of volunteers who have come forward. A key service is usually providing transport to hospital or other medical/health/care appointments but people may also want to ask for transport for another purpose - to get to the shops or hairdresser, for example, to take part in a local activity or club or to visit someone in hospital or a care home.

Some GNS also offer help with:

- getting shopping or collecting prescriptions
- household tasks (such as changing a light bulb or smoke detector battery) or gardening
- visiting or befriending
- help with pets
- letter writing or simple form-filling
- reading for people who have difficulty reading for themselves.

The scope of **All Together in Charlbury** (**ATIC**) (the proposed name for our Good Neighbour Scheme) will be decided by those interested locally. **The way** forward and how the scheme should operate will be discussed at a public meeting to be held on Thursday, 9 March 2017 at 7.15 p.m. in the Methodist Church Hall, Fishers Lane.

A GNS start-up grant of £500 has been obtained for the town through Volunteer LinkUp, a charity based in Witney which promotes and supports GNS. The money is being held on trust for this purpose by a local voluntary group and the money will be available to an **All Together in Charlbury (ATIC)** steering group, when one is formed. Representatives of Volunteer LinkUp will be present at the public meeting on 9 March to provide information about how **ATIC** can be run and to answer any queries.

If you are interested in finding out more about **ATIC** or would be willing to be involved as a volunteer, do come along to the meeting. Bonnets and bloomers, braces & boots

Exhibition for 2017: Allen's Drapery, Church Street

Last year the museum was given a large tin trunk which for many years had been stored in the attic at The Old Drapery at the bottom of Church Street. The Lack family were moving out and offered it to the museum with all its contents. We had no idea what was inside but what a treasure trove it turned out to be!

Books and papers had all been flung higgledy piggledy into the chest as if in a great hurry – there were handwritten ledgers dating back to the 1880s, invoices for goods bought in, letters from customers, even metal spikes (now rusty with age) with customers bills still stacked on them. The Allen family had run their drapery business from the premises for many years and here were the records telling the story of their shop.

The ledgers consist of day to day records of who visited the shop, what they bought and how much it cost. There are many familiar Charlbury names here – Holloway, Lainchbury, Gomm, Price, Albright, - but many customers also came from the surrounding villages. Jesse Clifford bought his gloves here, Lady Churchill placed large orders including silk scarfs, woollen cuffs and gaiters, umbrellas and mufflers, and local dressmakers bought their materials and ribbons.

It must have had an excellent reputation a review of the shop published in 1894 said: "a good class trade is done in this establishment and the goods supplied are of the most reliable quality.... As a tailor Mr Allen is well known and all garments turned out by him are unequalled as regards style, fit and workmanship."

The shop stocked a huge range of goods which were ordered in from quality suppliers in London and elsewhere . Here are the trimmings loved by Victorian & Edwardian ladies, material for dresses and coats, boots, hats, rugs, sewing machines, and that essential undergarment for ladies - the corset. The ladies of Charlbury must have kept in good shape judging by the number and variety of corsets sold in the shop!

In the late 1800s Mr Allen also ran a funeral business and there is correspondence arranging the transport of bodies by train for burial in Charlbury, and orders for the funeral clothes which the grieving family were expected to wear.

There are also records of Clothing Clubs being run in Charlbury, Enstone and Chilson. These were to help poorer families afford clothes which were much more expensive in real terms at that time.

The exhibition this year is built around the story of Allen's Drapery. There will be lots of old photographs of Charlbury families showing what people wore at the turn of the last century, some wonderful clothes which have survived from that era, and examples of the letters and ledgers from the shop.

Do come along and get a glimpse into a vanished world where you could buy five inches of ribbon, feathers and flowers to re -trim your bonnet, work boots and overcoats, all available in the centre of Charlbury.

Charlbury Deli:

past, present and future

Charlbury Deli & Café in Sheep Street is 25 years old and is now looking to a bright future in the town with new, expanded premises and services.

39 Sheep Street has a long history providing delicious food to the community of Charlbury. For many decades the premises was home to a bakery, latterly part of the Brown's group famed for its Banbury cakes. In the 1980s it became The Good Food Shop focusing on health food products and, in fact, the Deli's manageress Lynne Stubbles even worked there briefly.

The current business was incorporated in October 1991, thanks to the late Dr Jo Wetherall purchasing the freehold and encouraging the community to get involved. The original share issue raised £15,000 exclusively from local people, with the first board of directors taking the helm in October 1992, chaired by Mike Elliott.

Under the long-running chairmanship of Robert Caston, and the tireless work of Lynne, who took over as manageress in 1994, the business has gone from strength to strength. It has embraced numerous changes and managed to steer through difficult economic times which have sadly seen other Charlbury town centre shops come and go. Over time the range of goods moved away from health foods per se towards more 'naughtiness' as Lynne puts it, with her own skills as a baker celebrated as the town pats its tummy appreciatively.

In 2012, the shop rebranded as Charlbury Deli & Café as a more accurate reflection of its remit, and in 2015 a new team of directors took over, chaired by Richard Fairhurst, in order to secure the shop's long-term future as a mainstay of the town.

You may well have heard the rumours and spoken to the team at 2016's Street Fair stall, to the effect that the Deli is planning

to move premises to Old Bank House in Market Street.

At the time of writing the pens are almost poised to sign the lease – a larger premises will give the business the chance to offer a much wider range of delicious food and drink to enjoy. This will include an alcohol license for the sale of quality wines and spirits, much more shelving and, crucially for the centre of town, a larger café.

In 2016 the business raised more than $\pounds 40,000$ in a new share issue, again directly from members of the community, to support this exciting project. This will be aided by a new website in due course, as well as an expanded catering service for local businesses and functions. And there's more to come: the Deli is now in discussions about offering café facilities in the new community centre. Both of these should whet the town's appetite nicely!

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WYCHWOOD PROJECT -Spring 2017 Update

PROJECT Charlbury lies within what was Restaring Landscure hspiring People Wychwood, once a hunting

ground for monarchs. This area, stretching from Burford east to Woodstock and north to Chipping Norton, is rich in its variety of landscapes, habitats and wildlife. As Spring arrives bumblebees will be out and about seeking nectar from spring flowers like crocuses, dog-violets or cowslips. Look out for new leaves on hedgerow hawthorn, while ash and wild cherry will soon be coming into bloom. Frogs and toads become active in our ponds, streams and rivers – look for frogspawn – while chiffchaffs are an early migrant re-joining our native birds as they begin to nest.

The **Wychwood Project** is a registered charity that works with local communities and other partners to conserve and restore this area's natural environment. The Wychwood Project's tree planting continues through the Spring. All in all we will have planted over 1,500 trees since December in Ascott-under-Wychwood; Asthall Leigh; Charlbury; Long Hanborough; Milton-under-Wychwood; Pudlicote and Witney.

Our recent conservation work also includes managing fish stocks in the Woodstock water-meadows; coppicing trees near Charlbury; feeding overwintering farmland birds; building drystone walls and hedgelaying to improve the habitat for wildlife. This work relies on the great efforts of our volunteers.



The very early spring flowers are now fading and as the light increases and the days get just that much warmer the later spring flowers are here to delight us.

One of my personal favourites is the Sweet Violet Viola odorata which is found in the woods and on the hedge banks in the countryside around Charlbury. It is our only scented violet. It is bluish-mauve or white and I have seen good clumps of both locally. In 2016 I recorded seeing the first ones on April 6th and although any good book on wild flowers will give you a whole host of botanical features to help in identification, the one infallible test is to kneel down and breathe in its wonderful, nostalgic perfume. There is no scent in the other violets I have observed locally, the Common Dog Violet Viola riviniana and the Early Dog Violet Viola reichenbachiana, though both have beautiful, typically violet-shaped mauve flowers.

Another interesting plant which starts flowering in April is the **Goldilocks Buttercup** *Ranunculus auricomus*. Unlike the better known varieties, the Goldilocks Buttercup has very characteristic 'scruffy' flowers, often with missing or misshapen petals and without the perfect golden bowl of the Meadow, Bulbous or Creeping Buttercup. The Goldilocks Buttercup appears to like the conditions provided by some of our local roadside verges and can be spotted in April and May.

A delicate spring flower, with a wonderful name evoking a rustic scene from times gone by, is the **Lady's Smock, Milkmaids or Cuckooflower** *Cardamine pratensis,* also coming into its own at this time of year. Found in damp places it has lovely pink flowers. I have found many plants in this area, often in small clumps near local springs and streams – one of the most attractive members of the **Brassicaceae**, the cabbage family.

Cowslips Primula veris are easy to find in this part of Oxfordshire and make a wonderful springtime display on many grass verges. **Primroses** Primula vulgaris are also here in good numbers. You might try to interest young children in flower structure by looking for the difference between thrum-eyed flowers which have a short style hidden by the stamens which are attached round the rim of the corolla and pin-eyed flowers with a long style which reaches the mouth of the corolla tube, the stamens being attached lower down, so remaining out of sight. Children don't need all the botanical terms to spot the difference! A magnifying glass might assist.

In Wychwood Forest, the last of my favourite spring flowers doesn't usually open properly until very early May, though there will be national newspaper articles telling you to watch out for it during April. It is the native **Bluebell** Hyacinthoides nonscripta. It is well known to everyone and its delightful blue, drooping flowers carpet the ground in many local woods and copses. The scent is wonderful, especially when the wind drops and the stronger May sunlight falls on the flowers, not yet shaded by the tree canopy. The brash, upstart Spanish Bluebell Hvacinthoides hispanica has a more erect head and broader leaves and may threaten our native plants by producing vigorous hybrids which could in time swamp the 'proper' native species (for a fascinating account of the different types of bluebell, see the link at the end of this article).

With the appearance of the bluebells we are well on the way to summer, with an explosion of wild flowers promised in the weeks to follow.

RAINFALL REPORT 2016 (a Leap year)

The rainfall measured at Lees Rest between 1 January and 31 December 2016 (366 days)

was 695mm/27.8 ins, so almost as dry as 2015 (692mm/27.8 ins) which was the driest year since 2011. The wettest month was November with 104mm/4.16 ins and the driest was July with 5mm/0.2 ins, the driest July in our records which started in 1982.

October was also the driest in our records with 16mm/0.64 ins whilst December with 34mm/1.36ins was the driest since 1991. Is this all to do with climate change?

Lees Rest is about a mile and a half east of Charlbury so the rainfall in the Town Centre may have been completely different!

I had been aware of the resurgence of vinyl for some time, when a couple of years ago, I first heard of 'Vinyl Nights' springing up in cafés and bars around our trendier cities. Given Charlbury's vibrant music scene I started thinking why couldn't something like that work here? I spoke to Tommy at The Rose & Crown who immediately was on board and the seeds were sown.

The reasons for vinyl taking off so since around 2006 when it had almost died out are various and well documented. (As a starting point you could do worse than refer to The Revenge of Analog: Real Things And Why They Matter, David Sax, Public Affairs, U.S., 2016. The argument over whether vinyl sounds better than digital is a complex and largely personal matter, but so much music is experienced these days through a smartphone with cheap earbuds that playing music over a decent system was important from the outset. The music system has evolved over the months after going through 3 sets of speakers, 4 decks and 4 amplifiers I think we are almost there! Thanks to the support of The Rose & Crown, Vinyl Solution now has all of its own dedicated equipment.

Looking at what other nights were offering, the idea of a group of people sitting around in silence listening to and then discussing a classic album didn't appeal. Neither did I imagine, some kind of kneesup finishing off with The Birdy Song! What seemed more attractive was people bringing down their own records for all to share and enjoy.

On the first night I had a vague format worked out which did include playing an entire album, but that idea lasted for but 10 minutes, when a friend whispered to me "this isn't working". So I took it off and carried on. I played 17 tracks, and the audience played 3. Then there was the idea of having a 'Guest Host', which lasted some months. Someone would be invited to play 30-40 minutes of their own records, maybe explaining their choices in between tracks to add a little context. But as word spread and audiences picked up this became difficult to accommodate, as so many people were coming along with records of their own. Now it is usual for around 15 people to contribute records over an evening (and maybe 50 people in total attending), which ensures a constant variety and a very eclectic mix!

There is a listing of everything played and by whom which now stands at almost 500 tracks. The oldest record played may be The Banana Boat Song by Harry Belafonte (1956), and I usually have something up my sleeve weeks if not days old (it helps to have a son who runs a record label!). Surprisingly only one Beatles song has been played while the most popular artist is David Bowie, with 8 different tracks spanning 44 years. I'd like to say that all kinds of music have been played but that is not yet the case. I can't recall any Country & Western, Big Band/Swing or any number of modern urban genres being represented. Latin and Heavy Metal are also sadly lacking from the listing, although I understand that this should be rectified very soon! So you never know what to expect as it largely depends on what people choose to bring along. One thing you can expect is to have a room full of people from 18 to 70+ years old enjoying the same evening out, which must be a pretty rare thing.

If I learn that someone has a collection of records and I ask them to bring some along, a common response is "oh no, you won't like my weird stuff". Which is a great shame, as it's the 'weird stuff' which often goes down best of all. So why not dust off that 'weird stuff' residing in the loft and give it a new lease of life? Or if you'd like to have some new music but don't know where to start Vinyl Solution may be the answer!

The next Vinyl Solution is on 25th February, then on 16 April and 28 May, or check the events section on the Charlbury website.

A Day's Life: Martin Prew

I was born and bred in Charlbury and went to the Primary School by the Playing Close and then crossed the road to the Spendlove School. The school closed in 1982 when I was in the 5th year. I did my last exam by April and didn't go back to school again, so I'm not in the last photo taken of the whole school. I liked school, and think it was a great shame for the town it closed. I think the town lost a lot of its shops after the school closed.

I love football, you could say I am obsessed with it! I have always played, my granddad played as well. A family story is that my gran first saw my granddad when he was playing on a pitch behind the Plough in Finstock. She was in service in the big house and watched him play from a window. When we were kids we would play in all weathers. I remember when it had snowed once, 8 of us got the school roller out on Wychwood Paddocks, cleared away the snow and played – in our shorts and Tshirts. If we couldn't find a game here, we would cycle over to Combe, Stonesfield or Finstock and find one there.

I played until I was 28, and then went to help with the Charlbury Town reserve team. I managed the team for a few years, and helped with the boys' team as well. Then 14 years ago, I did my Level 1 coaching as part of the McDonald's scheme to train more coaches. Then when I was 39 I did my Level 2 with Vinny Halsall [Ed: the West Midland's co-ordinator for coaching with the FA] It was a brilliant course and I learnt so much. I wish I had done it at 16. There were so few Level 2 coaches, I went round helping out with other local teams; I was very very busy and out 6 nights a week. I'm very lucky to have a very understanding wife.

My daughter Taomi wanted to play football, so myself and Helen Turner started a girls' team. For the first two years we only did training but they have now been playing for three seasons in the Oxford Mail Girls League. I had retired from coaching, I've done 23 years coaching, but an email in June stated that they had no coach for U7's for this coming season. So I am back on the pitch with 12 U7's on Sunday mornings, until someone can be found to take over from me. Why do I do it? I don't like to see kids miss out on the chance of football if they are keen to do it.

We took over the old Sports and Social Club about 18 months ago, and put it back on a profitable footing, with the aim of making it family-orientated, as it was when it first started in the 1980s. So the idea behind the new Charlbury Town Football and Sports Club [CTFSC] is that it will be a CASC –a Community Amateur Sports Club which will allow us to put money made from the social side back into the football teams (youth and adult). The club house will be somewhere that the footballers and their families, supporters and the community as a whole can go and socialise. We organise various activities an Easter Egg hunt where over 200 people came through the door, a Halloween disco every year, Father Xmas, a Boxing Day event following the U30 v O30 football match which attracts both members and non-members. At one time the Club was one of the most popular places to go in Charlbury. If we can get the building for the new club, we would dearly love to bring back the youth club, on one or two of the nights the Club isn't open.

What did I do after school? I went to agricultural college and had a job on a local farm for a while but, unfortunately, there were not that many farming jobs around at the time. So since then I've had a number of jobs mainly in the building trade. I met my wife Carole when we were both working at Oxford Instruments. Her father worked for Dragon Air in Hong Kong, and we got engaged whilst visiting her parents over there. We have been married for 24 years, and have two children Taomi 12 and Alex 10.

I have now taken up archery. How did that happen? We went to the Wychwood Forest Fair with the kids one year, and there was a Have a Go archery course – a castle with little knights in the window – put on by the Windrush Bowmen. The kids loved it, they kept wanting to going back for more, and in the end we were given goes for free as we had been so many times. I thought if they're enjoying it, I might as well have a go and was hooked. Now we belong to a local club and can spend hours shooting there. The course, called a field course, is set out in a wooded area, with 36 3-D targets, and we have a small club house. There are clear safety rules for field archery: we all have to carry whistles, sign in when we arrive, say where we are going to start, and abide by the safety rules of the course. I have a traditional English longbow, which is a tri-laminate wooden one, 74 inches long, with a 45lb draw weight. [*Ed: Martin let me try his bow. I couldn't pull it more than an inch or two*] Some bows – called war bows – have a draw weight as high as 200lb.

You have to warm the bow up first before you use it, by gently pulling the string to bend the wood, but without letting go. When it's warmed up you can shoot. The children use Recurve bows, scaled down, with a draw weight of 19lb or so. We can spend hours on the course in the summer, often there all day with our sandwiches. Our type of archery is called Instinctive archery, where you don't use any sights, not like the archery shown at the Olympics on TV. We do miss the targets guite regularly! Some of the club members are into re-enactment, and regularly go to Tewkesbury and other Battle reenactments. I have helped with the Have a Go archery at one of these re-enactments and had to dress as a traditional medieval archer. I'm sure when my friends find out they will take the mickey out of me.

Charlbury Festival 10th - 18th June 2017

Charlbury Art Society is planning to launch the Charlbury Festival in June 2017. The last festival was in 2000 so another one is well overdue. The festival is part of an initiative by the Art Society to engage more, particularly younger, people in the arts and the emphasis will be on participation and involvement.

Charlbury has a wealth of creative talent and it is hoped to include as much of this as possible. We are working with existing Charlbury organisations, including the schools, CADS, ChOC and Speakeasy to create events during the festival.

There will be an extensive range of workshops for all ages and abilities. For example, on the opening Saturday we will be making huge prints using a Wallis and Steevens 1926 steamroller and glazing pots made by students at Chipping Norton School before firing their work in outdoor Raku kilns and plunging it into sawdust. There will be workshops for adults and children, ranging from creative writing, painting and pottery to flower arranging, music and drama.

There will be a comprehensive programme of entertainment including classical, jazz and cabaret evenings and lunchtime recitals, theatre, literature, poetry, cinema, singing, art lectures, storytelling, pilgrimage and heritage walks and a sculpture trail.

One highlight will be the open air performances in the amphitheatre in Helen Bessemer-Clarke's garden. These will include poetry from Freddie and Jenny Jones and Rob Stepney, drama directed by Sue Haffenden and an opportunity to see Charlbury Youth Theatre in action.

We plan to deliver a detailed programme to every household in the town as well as making them freely available for visitors. Events will be publicised on the websites and on posters and notice boards.

The festival aims to be inclusive, friendly and welcoming and we hope it will be challenging, stimulating and fun.

The annual one-day Beer Festival in June each year is run by volunteers for the sole purpose of raising money for good causes. Six years ago the committee decided to broaden the criteria for grants to include one overseas grant each year, for a Charlbury-linked project helping disadvantaged children in poor countries.

Our first overseas grant in 2011 was £1800 for a solar water heater for a children's home, Karm Marg in India, which was already being supported by a couple of Charlbury residents. Many will remember the solar hand and glass washing station that we put up at the Beer Festival that year to demonstrate solar water heating.

Our second grant in 2012 was for £2500 for five iPads for children with cerebral palsy and other disabilities in Zimbabwe. Special Effect, a Charlbury based charity, prepared the iPads with their bespoke communications and learning software, which were then carried to Zimbabwe by various Charlbury residents and have been put to good use by local charity Zimbabwe Parents of Disabled Children Association (ZPDCA).

In 2013 we gave a £1500 grant to Phunzira in Malawi towards the cost of fitting out a boat to bring primary health care to poor families living in remote villages on Lake Malawi. The boat began operating in 2015, and in an area with no roads this boat has been a life saver for sick patients, who previously were dying needlessly of easily treatable diseases such as malaria.

In 2014 we gave a grant of £1878 to Cecily's Fund, which was set up in

Stonesfield with the goal of enabling orphans and vulnerable children in Zambia to reach their true potential and have better futures through education. Our grant was used to buy shoes for children who otherwise would not have been able to walk long distances to school. Later that year we gave £1345 to the One Way School in Zimbabwe for much-needed books.

In 2015 we gave a grant of £1855 to YCare International to enable 20 disadvantaged young people aged 16–25 to buy sewing machines and other equipment to start their own small businesses in Colombia. YCare works with local YMCAs to create job opportunities by providing training and access to resources to give young people a second chance.

In 2016 we gave a second grant to Cecily's Fund of £1182 to buy equipment for vocational training for orphans and vulnerable children in Kitwe, Zambia. We are now reviewing applications for possible funding later in 2017.

We try to strengthen linkages between our overseas grantees and local ones, such as Charlbury Primary School. We ask all our grantees to send us photos and news of the impact that Charlbury Beer Festival funding has had, so that we can put it on our website and display it at the Beer Festival.

So while the bulk of the funds we raise at the Beer Festival goes to local charities, we hope you agree that our investment in these overseas projects is worthwhile and does a little to address the challenges faced in villages and towns less advantaged than our own.

CHARLBURY NEIGHBOURHOOD FORUM

The Charlbury Neighbourhood Forum held a public meeting in December to present the results of the Neighbourhood Survey. The survey had achieved a remarkably good response rate of over 40% of Charlbury residents and the public meeting was well attended and seemed to spark a good deal of interest. Some of the results were surprising and have left us with a lot to digest.

A Survey Report of the multiple choice responses was put together by an independent analyst and can be viewed on the Neighbourhood forum website: www.charlburyneighbourhoodforum.org.uk

There were also a large number of free format comments, issues and ideas/ initiatives that were included on the survey. These are being categorised (which needs some local knowledge) to identify common themes and bring together comments related to the same or similar topics. These will also be progressively added to the website as they are completed. Where possible we include an analysis of the topics raised and also include all the comments in full with only a very few redactions where individuals' identity or sensibility would be affected. There is a very large number of such comments and they inevitably include some data transcription errors but we think the meaning remains clear.

Following some comments about the transparency of this process we are making sure as best we can to put everything, including minutes of meetings and attendees on this website.

From a practical point of view we have reorganised the Neighbourhood Forum so that it now comprises two working group. The first group is concentrating on Neighbourhood Plan issues related to development and land use and directed at creating a formal Neighbourhood Plan that will have statutory recognition in planning matters. The second group is concentrating on actions to address the large number of other issues raised by the Community. This is directed at creating what is called a Community Led Plan. It is, however, recognised that many things can and should be addressed before a full plan is completed and that the survey results give a very clear mandate from the community to kick off on some actions and this is now the priority.

With this in mind we have recently started an exercise to highlight the issue of parking at the junction of Nine Acres and Pound Hill where we believe the large number of comments in the survey warrant some action from the relevant authorities. We are passing the results on this topic to the Town Council and other relevant bodies and will keep people informed of progress.

Both groups will lodge their documents on the Neighbourhood Forum website (above) and there will be a quarterly meeting of the overall forum group to co-ordinate things. All of this of course is under the stewardship of the Town Council albeit members are a mix of Town Councillors and interested residents.

It was with great sadness that we heard of the recent death of Ben Wright. Ben had worked for and with the Neighbourhood Forum in its early days and had contributed greatly and as well as spicing up our meetings had added a good deal of professionalism to our activities. He will be greatly missed.

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

Southill Community Energy

2016 was an incredible year for Southill Community Energy (SCE), and with the solar farm built here is an update on the project.

Southill Solar was commissioned in November 2016 and moved from construction to the operational phase in January, once the testing period had been approved and signed off by the bank. This means that control and access to the site as a whole has been handed back to SCE, and the ongoing operational contracts are now in place between SCE and its service providers. These include:

- Operation & Maintenance
- Asset Management
- Administrative services

To the end of January the solar farm had generated over 210,000kWh of electricity, saving over 135,000 kg of CO2. This is operating above the levels that we have modelled for, which is great news, and has partly been thanks to better-thanexpected winter irradiance levels.

For security reasons access to the solar farm is tightly controlled but our intention is to hold open days so that those interested in having a closer look and learning more about the project can visit, meet the team and ask any questions. We are delighted that we have already had three organised visits to the site, two from educational establishments:

- Lycee Eugene Livet a class of secondary school students from Brittany who were visiting Oxfordshire to learn more about renewable energy and solar PV in particular
- Oxford University Environmental Change Institute – students of the MSc in Environmental Change and Management course
- Community visit, following the orchard and tree planting morning

We would like to thank all those who turned up for the orchard and tree planting event. We had over 30 volunteers and planted 54 orchard trees and 60 indigenous species whips. These trees will provide many benefits for the solar farm. As they develop the trees will provide additional shielding for the site and nesting habitat for farmland birds. More importantly, the orchard trees should provide an excellent crop of apples of many varieties, as well as a few plums and nuts in future years.

Many thanks to our resident ecology expert Guy Parker for organising the event and to Christine Elliott for the wonderful work she's done researching the varieties and coordinating the orchard planting.

Thanks also to you professional gardeners out there who provided good tips to us all through the morning! Our next activities will be to rebuild the stone wall crossing the site and to plough the field prior to sowing the wild flower seed mix in the spring. Tim Crisp Southill Community Energy

Charlbury Neighbourhood Plan

An important objective in producing a Neighbourhood Development Plan for Charlbury is to secure a greater control over the type, mix and location of housing in the town to meet identified local housing needs. Identification of potential development sites (for which housing mix and other expectations can be clearly indicated) and local green spaces provide important aids to achieving this objective.

Engaging in preliminary consultation with landowners is a necessary step in the Neighbourhood Plan process. It does not imply that any particular site considered will be found suitable or be allocated for development nor even if it is, that its development would necessarily proceed. Any actual proposals would still be subject to the usual planning application procedure.

How much land will be needed to meet local development needs is not yet certain but potential sites for it will need to meet normal planning criteria. Our consultation will be an open exercise, with landowners forewarned that any information given to us may be made public. Meetings will generally follow a similar agenda and will be minuted. Similarly, sites to be considered for protection as 'Local Green Space' will be assessed against the government's published criteria and landowners consulted before such sites are named in the draft Plan. We will also be considering the infrastructure that would be required to support any new development and will be consulting on that with the relevant authorities.

Following this preliminary consultation, a draft Neighbourhood Plan will be prepared which will be available to everyone to comment on, including any proposed site allocations or designation as Local Green Space. Copies of all minutes of meetings and draft proposals will be on the Neighbourhood Forum web site (www.charlburyneighbourhoodforum.org.uk).

Only after that stage (and possible revision as a result of it) is the Plan submitted to the District Council who in particular will consider its consistency with their own (district wide) Local Plan.

The Neighbourhood Plan would then go to an independent examination run by the District Council and if accepted, it will be put to a referendum of all residents. If passed, then it becomes a set of policies against which all planning applications must be considered.

Charlbury Refugee Action Group has

raised a lot of money since we last reported here, all of which has gone to help refugees and asylum seekers in dire

straits across Europe and the Middle East, especially in France and Greece.

The Art Café we held in St Mary's in November raised £800. Together with several individual donations, we were then able to send £1200 to the Help Refugees 'Choose Love' Christmas appeal focused on camps in bleak conditions in northern Greece.

Tea concerts

We made 'Choose Love' the focus of our fundraising over Christmas and the new year. In December we held the first of our Sunday 'tea concerts'. Richard Boothby, professor of viola da gamba at the Royal College of Music, played to an audience of nearly eighty who enjoyed a delightful recital followed by tea and cakes!

We had a second tea concert in January, when local musician Jane Downer (baroque oboe) and Warwick Cole (harpsichord) performed to over 120 people. Word had got round that these are excellent occasions, and the two recitals together raised a further £2000 for Help Refugees. The musicians very generously donate their time and talent, and these were just the first in a series of Sunday afternoon tea concerts devised by CRAG's chair, Val Parker. They are extremely popular and are proving an asset to Charlbury's social and cultural life.

Refugees have also benefited from an amazing £1012 from the Bring and Buy which Gene and Fran organised in the new year. (And thank you to the Quakers for letting us use the Meeting House.)

As of the end of January we have raised a total of £7562 in Charlbury for this appeal, in under three months, including gift aid. You can see the progress at www.mydonate.bt.com/fundraisers/crag

Tickets are £10 and include tea and cake (under 15s £5).

Woolly Hugs

Meraud Ferguson Hand is doing a brilliant job getting Charlbury knitters behind a nationwide initiative happily called 'Woolly Hugs'. Here's how they describe it: "We can get woolly warmth to families in refugee camps in Kurdistan and in Syria. There are 1.8 million refugees trapped there, most have fled civil wars and ISIS in Syria and Iraq. We are also developing links to get resources to children and families elsewhere and on their arrival in the UK.

"We can use 12 inch or 6 inch squares, knit or crochet. Use any good quality acrylic DK, for example Stylecraft special DK. Any colour, any style.

"We'd also love to receive whole blankets, hats and gloves/mittens for any age, baby sized through to adult, the same for jumpers, cardigans, scarves/shawls. For these items, any yarn is fine, from 100% wool to acrylic. But we understand that's a big ask!

"Together we can make a difference. Sadly we cannot accept items other than home made woolly ones at the moment."

Seven years of silence

Peace@thePub will be 7 years old in May this year. Some of us must have sat in The Bell in silence for over 75 hours! It is great to come across people – as we do all the time – who have never come to one of our gatherings, but who are aware of them and supportive of what we do.

Most communities like to think that they are special, if not unique – that's one of the things that contributes to a sense of belonging. Charlbury could so easily be an unremarkable small town in middle England, but it isn't. Perhaps partly because of the railway and because of Oxfam's origins just down the road in Oxford, it has a high proportion of people who are very aware, in depth, of national and global issues, and who are working for a more humane, just and sustainable social order.

Each month at Peace@thePub we focus on one particular topic. A scan of our concerns over the last 7 years shows that we have learned more about, and from time to time become involved in, issues as diverse as healthcare in sub-Saharan Africa, human

rights in Saudi Arabia, what goes on in Campsfield House, Tibet, climate change and refugees, global trade deals, nuclear power, South Sudan, Haiti, employment in the Philippines, homelessness in the UK, Palestinian olive oil, Bhopal, end of life care, fracking and fossil fuels, and many more.

What is remarkable about Charlbury is that there are local, personal links with almost all the above causes. Some Charlbury residents are employed by large or small charities in these fields: some run their own enterprises or businesses to promote social and individual wellbeing: others volunteer in innumerable ways, often giving unsparingly of their time. It is rewarding at Peace@thePub when we focus on a cause that is particularly special to someone, and identify for a little while with those they are supporting. Among other things it reminds us again of the value of our freedoms and opportunities, and at the same time that we all share together a very small world.

FOODBANK

Charlbury has been contributing to the North Oxfordshire Community Foodbank since it started in 2011. It has three distribution centres in Chipping Norton, Woodstock and Kidlington and this covers people suffering hardship in Charlbury.

The collection points in our town are located just inside each of the town's five churches where you will find a large plastic container near the entrance. Donations of non-perishable staple foods are always welcome. Items needed are tins of fruit, custard, rice pudding, vegetables, soup, meat and fish. Also packets of instant

mash, long-life milk and fruit juice, cereals (not porridge oats), pasta, sauces, coffee and small packets of sugar. Volunteers make regular deliveries to the distribution centre's warehouse. The Oxford Food Bank also collects fresh food from the supermarkets in Oxford and makes weekly deliveries to the North Oxfordshire Foodbank.

Other ways in which you can help are by donating money or by using a Foodbank Nectar card when shopping.

If you know of anyone suffering hardship, please direct them to the social services, Citizens Advice, children's agencies or a church minister who will assist them to obtain the necessary voucher to access this service.

service. Again everyone is welcome, men as well as women.

But Lent isn't all quiet reflection. On Fridays from 3 March to 7 April people from the five churches in Charlbury will be busy preparing delicious soups for lunch. Good Friday is a public holiday but it is also a holy day when we remember that Jesus faced the worst the world could do to him and died a painful death. There will be an open air service, to remember his suffering and the way he prayed for forgiveness for those who treated him so cruelly, starting on the Playing Close at 10 am and moving round the town centre to finish at the Parish Church. Jesus showed compassion – which literally means to 'suffer with or alongside' - and we will be remembering people suffering in the world today and seeking ways to show compassion towards them.



SPRING IN YOUR GARDEN

Some timely suggestions and reminders

Pruning/cutting back

Prune late flowering shrubs such as buddleia, summer flowering clematis, bush roses, hardy fuchsias, shrubby salvias, penstemons etc. Cut them well back to stop them becoming leggy and to encourage strong new shoots. Early flowering shrubs such as forsythia, viburnum, flowering currants, early flowering clematis, etc should be pruned as soon as they finish flowering. Aim to keep them within bounds and remove old shoots completely once they become fully established. If it has not already been done, prune all new growth on wisteria to 2 buds as soon as possible! Some summer shrubs such as kolkwitzia, philadelphus and deutzia can become congested with too many basal shoots. Try to remove up to 1/3 of these as low down as possible.

Perennials

Consider giving some tall growing perennials the "Chelsea Chop" such as

phlox, Michaelmas daisies, rudbeckia etc. Around the last week of May, cut shoots back by about one third to delay flowering and stop plants getting too tall. Do not cut lupins or delphiniums in this way but remember to stake them before they start to fall over. If you can get them, there is nothing better than well branched hazel or young elm shoots for this. Apply a mulch of compost or leaf mould around, but not on top, of plants in borders. Water well beforehand if the soil is at all dry. Also remember, if water is needed, make sure it gets to the roots, not just wafted over the foliage!

Seed Raising

Why not try to raise some of your own plants from seed? It might save you some money and is very rewarding when successful. Buy a good seedling mix and don't try to start too early. April is usually early enough for most summer flowering plants. Keep seedlings shaded on hot sunny days. Grow on in multi trays, harden off and plant out when safe from late frosts.

THE CHARLBURY HISTORICAL RESEARCH GROUP

WALCOT (part 2)

In the last issue we explained that John Hacker, who died in 1548, was the tenant of Walcot. His landlords were the Catesby family of Ashby St Ledgers in Northamptonshire. In 1496 the property was owned by George Catesby, the son of William Catesby, one of Richard III's councillors. After George's death in 1505 the property passed to his son Sir Richard Catesby and then in 1553 to Sir Richard's son William. William was the father of Robert a member of the Gunpowder Plot. In about 1575 William sold Walcot to Richard Fitzhugh, whose family came from Bedfordshire. At that time the manor Walcot with Shorthampton comprised about 1060 acres of land, meadow and pasture plus six houses and six cottages and six tofts (the site of a former dwelling).

Richard Fitzhugh took occupation and in 1585 his daughter Elizabeth was baptised at St Mary's Charlbury. His two older sons Thomas and Roger attended Magdalen Hall, Oxford in 1588. Despite Richard's daughter having been baptised at St Mary's, he and his wife were fined for not attending divine service, and Lord Salisbury noted him as a Recusant (a Roman Catholic) at liberty. But Richard Fitzhugh was buried at Charlbury in April 1602, and in his will dated 17^{th} April, he left his wife all his goods and asked his son Thomas to pay her forty marks (about £53) a year and the cost of a man and maiden. He left his daughter, Elizabeth Fewer £100, and his son, Roger, £30 a year.

Thomas succeeded his father at Walcot. He married Elizabeth Sheldon, the widow of Sir John Sheldon of Norfolk and the daughter of Lord Cromwell, a descendant of Thomas Cromwell, Henry VIII's chancellor. He died in 1613 but there is no record of his burial in Charlbury. In his will he envisaged that his lands at Walcot would be sold partly to pay his debts. He left to his sister, now married to Sir John Townsend, his nag known as the Spectacles, to his wife his coach and horses and to his mother a gold ring costing twenty shillings, and all the furniture in her and her maid's chambers. Following his death, Walcot was sold and by 1616 it had been acquired by Robert Jenkinson a wealthy City Of London merchant.

The Charlbury Community Centre Appeal was established in 2004 with the aim of raising £250,000 towards the building and fit out costs of the Community Centre. Through a lot of hard work and determination from a small but dedicated group of people (mostly before my time here!) we have almost achieved that target. We have raised around £229,000 and it would be lovely to reach our aim before the building is completed, which at the moment is on target for September 2017. However, £21,000 in six months may be a bit ambitious! We'll do what we can.

Charlbury Town Council report

Parish Poll and community buildings loan

On Thursday 8th December, a Parish Poll was held in the Memorial Hall to gauge the Charlbury community's view on whether the Town Council should take out a loan to fund two projects: the new Community Centre on the Spendlove Site, being built by the Thomas Gifford Trust and a new multi-function community building for the Football & Sports Club. Loan repayments would be funded by a rise in the parish precept, the part of the council tax that is levied by the Town Council. The results were:

• For a grant of £130,000 for the Thomas Gifford Trust (Community Centre): yes 332 (67%), no 164 (33%)

• For a grant of \pounds 70,000 for the Football & Sports Club: yes 378 (74%), no 134 (26%)

At 518 voters (21.52%) the turnout was slightly higher than recent Parish Polls in Chipping Norton and Woodstock.

With this result in mind, the Town Council felt able to proceed with an application to the Department for Communities and Local Government for loan approval. We are currently awaiting their response. If they give the go-ahead, the parish precept is expected to rise by £9.84 per year for a Band D property (£6.40 for the Community Centre, £3.44 for the Football & Sports Club). Details will be posted on *charlbury.info* and the Charlbury Town Council website as soon as they are known, and included in the next Chronicle report.

Thank you to all who took part in the public meeting to discuss the proposal or has otherwise been involved. We greatly look forward to the success of the two projects.

Councillor vacancy

Gordon Clemson has decided to step down as a Town Councillor, causing a vacancy on Charlbury Town Council. If the vacancy is contested, there will be an election on Thursday 9th March in the Memorial Hall, which will be publicised via the usual posters and on the web. Many thanks to Gordon for his contributions to the council. The next full elections to Charlbury Town Council will be in 2020 – it's never too early to think about standing!

20mph limit

The Town Council has been working on a proposal for a 20mph limit in Charlbury which we have now submitted to Oxfordshire County Council, the highway authority. We are hopeful that OCC will be able to bring this forward and that it will result in a real improvement to pedestrian safety in the town.

West Oxfordshire Local Plan

West Oxfordshire District Council has been consulting on its planned revisions to the Local Plan, which sets the planning framework for the area. Charlbury Town Council submitted a detailed response which argues for supporting the commercial role of Charlbury and other small town centres; for the preservation of the Cotswold Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty; for recognition of Charlbury's role as a tourist centre for walkers and other visitors; for better bus and train services, including full redoubling of the Cotswold Line to Oxford and commuter buses to Witney and for affordable housing. If you would like to see a copy of the full response, please contact the Town Clerk.

Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held in the Memorial Hall on March 31st at 8pm. Do come along and find out more about the work of the Town Council in the last year. if you have a resolution that you wish to be considered by the meeting, please submit it in writing to the Town Clerk at least seven days beforehand.

Boundary Walk

The Annual Parish Boundary Walk will take place on Rogation Sunday, 21st May. It starts at 10am at the old oak tree on Forest Road (B4437 to Burford) at the top of the hill, nearly a mile past the railway station. The walk crosses land not normally open to the public by kind permission of the landowners. There will be a break for lunch at Model Farm, Ditchley, for which we are very grateful to Rob & Maxine Hobill. We always welcome volunteers for stewarding and chauffeuring on the day – if you would like to help, please contact the Town Clerk.

In brief

- Bus users may have noticed increased competition between Oxford and Woodstock in recent weeks. Stagecoach have warned that this may affect the viability of the S3 service from Charlbury to Oxford. Please do continue to support this vital link – it's free if you have a concessionary pass, but the bus company still receives money when you use it!
- Thank you to all the town centre residents and businesses for illuminated Christmas trees, to Geoff Burroughs for donating the tree for the Corner House, and to the team of volunteers led by Liz Walton and Anna Fairhurst who organise this beautiful display every year.
- The Town Council has set up a small working group to look at ways in which the council's work can be more accessible and transparent to Charlbury people. If you have any suggestions, you can contact the group via the Town Council chairman, Peter Kenrick (peter.kenrick48@gmail.com).

We are now moving at a real pace towards the County Council Elections on $4^{\rm th}$ May, but the workload seems to be increasing by the second. I mentioned the Budget in the last Chronicle edition and this should now have been decided on $14^{\rm th}$ February. An increase of 4.99%, with 3% going into elderly care, will be the order of the day.

The Unitary Debate is still with us, and is gaining more and more support across the County, to the point where a submission to the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government is getting closer, with more and more partners in Health and Local Government accepting the proposition – the Secretary of State being the decision maker.

Oxfordshire Fire and Rescue is once again being threatened with take-over by the Police and Crime Commissioner. As a vital part of the County Council, for which I am portfolio holder, which goes way beyond just putting out fires, its value to elderly care, road and cycle safety, Trading Standards, Emergency Planning, flood prevention and recovery, etc, etc is beyond value. I do hope we will all fight to keep it exactly where it is, and under local accountability.

Lastly, on a local issue, parking at our stations is getting tighter and tighter. To park for a later train than the 07.31am is a risky bet. I am working with GWR to hopefully improve parking at both Charlbury and Hanborough, for there is nothing worse than not getting a parking space, missing a train and being left with no real alternative to get to London or other meetings.

As promised, an update on progress at Enstone Airport. I have been told by officers that the site for a potential recycling centre has now been identified and the property department is in discussion with the site owners. The next stage will be for officers to do a feasibility study. I am in regular touch with officers and will update people whenever there is further news.

The new waste contract will be starting this year and, from April, collections of garden waste will no longer be free. To have your garden waste collected, you will need to sign up for the service. The cost is £30 a year, and you can sign up on the West Oxfordshire District Council website, www.westoxon.gov.uk/residents/binsrecycling/garden-waste-recycling/. The main changes to our recycling collections will be starting in October.

I have recently been in touch with the Chipping Norton Hospital Action Group, and a meeting has been set up for district councillors in the wards close to Chipping Norton to meet with the Action Group to look at what can be done to keep the hospital open.

The nurses at the hospital are no longer employed by the NHS, and there is great concern that this may eventually lead to beds being closed. With the downgrade to maternity services at the Horton Hospital in Banbury, this could leave local people in a very vulnerable situation.

We are lucky to be equidistant between Witney and Chipping Norton and at the moment there is no likelihood that Witney hospital could be closed, but there is a shortage of intermediate beds across the county and if Chipping Norton were to close, that shortage would be exacerbated. Charlbury Youth Theatre continues at The Shed on Mondays and two groups are flourishing : The 8-10 year olds (5.15-6.15) and the 11-15 year olds (6.16-7.30 pm).

The Youth Theatre help children and young people develop their confidence and self esteem using creativity workshops, play readings and production in achieving their maximum potential as individuals. You don't have to feel you are not an actor to join but if you want to meet new people and find a new interest contact professional actors and directors Andy or Geoff 01608 659462.

They will be presenting their latest production at The Memorial Hall on April 6th.

The Youth Theatre is looking for people who would like to support and help to run the Youth Theatre from September and a local committee based in Charlbury is needed to help fundraise and create governance in order to sustain it in the town for this and future generations. Please contact us if you can help; all ages considered.

We are grateful for the support of Charlbury Town Council who have offered a grant of ± 1000 towards the activities and other applications are awaiting decisions.

Last year's leaflet appeal set up an email group which has since become known as the **"Working Party"** and now has a membership of over 80 people. So far the volunteers have filled 30 builders' bulk bags which the WODC men have collected and taken to compost.

Most people know that the County and District Councils cannot now afford to give us the level of environmental maintenance that we were used to in past years. We all probably have to adjust to the basic fact that most Council Tax money will go towards children's services and community care for the elderly. Therefore, if we want to be proud of our town environment, we will have to do a lot more self-help work.

For those of you who use the Charlbury website, please notice that, thanks to our 'webmaster', there is a 'Working Party' button at top left of the Forum page. It would be good to see more people posting here with ideas and suggestions.

Whether you are a member of the "Working Party" or not; cutting back overhanging shrubbery or tree branches, clearing leaves from the gulleys and drains, hoeing off the grass and weed growth from the kerbs, cleaning road signs, etc, is something that most of us can do to help make us more proud of this lovely place.

NEWS FROM CHARLBURY PRIMARY SCHOOL

The return to school after the long Christmas break was greeted with excitement by our Year 5 and 6 pupils. Both classes participated in our annual History off the Page role playing day on the first Friday back.

This year, the school hall was transformed into an Egyptian marketplace for the morning and the children all came to school dressed as ancient Egyptians. In the morning, the children took part in a wide range of arts and crafts activities, from making oil lamps and Canopic jars, to painting frescos and soap carving. All the children were given roles to play, representing various people from ancient Egyptian society; a few got to be secret police working for the queen, who were investigating treachery amongst their classmates!

In the afternoon, small groups created and rehearsed their own performance: a mime, a play or a dance. To end the day, the children had an Egyptian-themed banquet and then performed to the queen, pharaoh and their royal entourage. The type of interactive learning that a day like this provides is incredibly useful as it engages children that might not otherwise enjoy history. All the children learnt a lot from the day and thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

Assemblies in January were filled with the exuberant sounds of Year 4, 5 & 6 pupils practising for their annual trip to the Genting Arena, NEC in Birmingham where they participate in the amazing Young Voices concert.

The evening sees over six thousand primary school children singing together, led by a professional conductor and supported by professional entertainers. It is a unique and thrilling experience for the pupils, and a very impressive (if loud!) show for the parents. A very special assembly, with yet more amazing singing (in Chinese!) was held to celebrate Chinese New Year on the 27th January. All pupils heard about how the holiday is marked in China and different year groups got involved by making related art and crafts, including some beautiful Mandarin writing. The children were all invited to come to school dressed in traditional Chinese dress, or something red, the traditional colour of good luck and celebration.

You'll see the new trees – a double row parallel to the roadside hedge between Fawler Mill and the Fawler turn. I've chosen favourites like Holstein, Ribston Pippin, Tydeman's Late Orange, Kidd's Orange Red, and d'Arcy Spice that we'd like more of, as well as 24 varieties I've not found locally but would love us to have; also 11 cider apples, bittersweets and bittersharps, to introduce tannins into the palate of our local Sharecroppers Gold cider available at local festivals. I've • Make sure the fences around your garden are in good condition

• Secure bikes at home by locking them to an immoveable object inside a locked shed or garage

• Keep ladders and tools stored away; don't leave them outside where they could be used to break into your home

• Ensure side gates are locked to prevent access to the rear of the property

- Ensure rear fencing is in good repair
- Improve natural surveillance at the front of your property i.e. trim high hedges

• Mark your property with postcode and house number and register your property.

chosen apples renown for flavour and storage—some lasting until May; famous ones like Pitmaston Pineapple, and ancient ones from before 1600 like Catshead and Court Pendu Plat. Most apples in the orchard will ripen in October to November but relish the prospect of Tydeman's Early Worcester a lovely apple ready in late August.

The cider apples near the Fawler turn, on M25 rootstocks, will become large standards but the rest, on MM106 rootstocks, will be pruned as half standards for good guality picked fruit. Below the cider apples come the plums, Victoria and Belle de Louvain (the lovely large red plum I used to pick from a Chadlington tree that died last year) and three greengages. Then come the dessert and culinary apples in flowering order early blossom higher up to avoid the frost and later blossoms nearer the Mill. Let's hope there'll be enough pollinating insects to discover and pollinate this lovely new Christine Elliott orchard.

Thursday 9th March 10am From Neolith to Nouveau Riche

An easy walk of 6 miles lasting 3 hours.

The start point is on the Oxfordshire/ Warwickshire county border and we also go into Gloucestershire. The walk passes the quirky village of Cornwell and through part of the Daylesford Estate. The return route goes close to Adelstrop and passes several working quarries.

Meeting place: Greedy Goose pub on A44

Tuesday 14th March 10am Stones and Ditches

A moderate walk of 8 miles, lasting 4 hours. Stonesfield was formerly the source of Cotswold Stone roofing tiles which were mined around the village. Ditchley Park is a fine country house set in a wooded estate which is now used for high level conferences but was formerly owned by Sir Henry Lee a favourite of Queen Elizabeth I. The Iron Age monument, Grim's Ditch, at Model Farm on the Ditchley Park Estate survives well as a visible earthwork along most of its length.

Meeting Place: Spendlove Centre, Charlbury

Tuesday 4th April 6:00pm Blenheim Estate: of Kings, Queens and Heroes

An easy walk of 4 miles lasting 2 hours This short walk on public rights of way around the Blenheim Estate looks for traces of its historic past. From Henry II and his mistress to Princess Elizabeth 1st, the Dukes of Marlborough and more recently Sir Winston Churchill. Meeting Place: Hensington Road car park in Woodstock

Tuesday 18th April 10:00am Swalcliffe, Epwell and the MacMillan Way

10 miles, 5 hours This circular walk through North Oxfordshire takes in the attractive ironstone villages of Swalcliffe and Epwell. It follows part of the MacMillan Way to Traitors Ford, where maybe a traitor was hung following the battle of nearby Edgehill. Please bring a packed lunch. Meeting Place: St Peter & Paul's Church Swalcliffe

Thursday 11th May 10:00am Bluebells in Foxholes 6 miles

Starting from Shipton under Wychwood the walk passes by Bruern Abbey reaching the beautiful Foxholes Nature Reserve where the bluebells should be in flower. We return by woodland and field paths. Lunch options in village at the end of the walk. Meeting Place: New Beaconsfield Hall Shipton under Wychwood

Sunday 14th May 10:00am Hiking Through History – life in Roman Oxfordshire 1

A 5 hour walk of 11.5 miles Discover the Roman influences on this part of the Cotswolds, including a Roman villa and a Roman road. Please bring a packed lunch.
