

### Charlbury Neighbourhood Development Plan Update

Housing
West Oxfordshire's District Council's
Local Plan, which sets out how much new
housing is needed and where, has been
going through a formal Examination.
The outcome has been very interesting
for Charlbury. The Local Plan splits the
district into sub-areas. We are in the
Burford-Charlbury sub area, where
WODC had said 1,213 new homes would
be needed between 2011 and 2031. The

Local Plan also identified the site north of

Jefferson's Piece for a development of 40

houses.

The Planning Inspector is content with the Local Plan overall, but disagreed with WODC's approach towards Charlbury. The Inspector believes that, since our sub-area is almost entirely within the Cotswolds Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB), any future development should show overall benefits to the AONB and the communities living within it, rather than being simply to meet the West Oxfordshire housing target. The Inspector has advised against the inclusion of four sites in the Burford-Charlbury sub-area (including the land off Jefferson's Piece) within the Local Plan, but that itself does not preclude development and the developers' application (17/02376/FUL) for 48 homes remains outstanding.

This is a great opportunity for our Neighbourhood Plan to set out what Charlbury's real housing needs are. Being situated as we are within the AONB and surrounded by land of high landscape and wildlife importance, the scope for Charlbury to grow is very limited. But we do need some development if we are going to meet the needs of existing residents, both young

and old, and to keep a good mix of people of all ages living in the town to support local shops, the school and the great range of clubs and societies. Exactly what scale and mix of housing Charlbury needs is the key question we are working on in the Neighbourhood Plan.

We think the town needs smaller-size and lower-cost housing rather than the "executive homes" often proposed by developers. We would like to see homes for first-time buyers, young families and people of working age who are often priced out of Charlbury. We are interested in a shared-equity scheme for essential workers in local schools, hospitals and other vital services. We also need more housing suitable for elderly and disabled people.

This could allow older residents to downsize to more manageable properties if they wish, without leaving the town. Those who can no longer live independently due to frailty, illness or disability also need housing options. Building more one and two bedroom social-rented properties would help meet a current shortage.

We aim to have a public consultation on the Plan in the Spring, once the full document has been written and agreed by the Town Council. But in the meantime, anyone in Charlbury is welcome to share their views or to help develop parts of the Plan. Please contact us on *charlburynp@gmail.com*.

Heritage, green space and wildlife
We had a fantastic response to our
request for volunteers to assess
Charlbury's streets, open spaces and
surrounding countryside to create a
record of the parish's unique character
and heritage. The volunteers took to the
streets in October and November and
produced reports of a brilliant quality.
Their work will help to produce a
"Character Assessment" which will be
available shortly. This will help us
develop any new policies that might be
needed in the Neighbourhood Plan to
conserve and enhance the town's

character for future generations to enjoy.

We have now moved on to assess a number of the town's green spaces to see whether they could qualify for formal protection as "Local Green Space". Any site that is designated as "Local Green Space" in the Neighbourhood Plan will have protection from future development similar to Green Belt status. Sites need to have a special value to the local community, for example because of their beauty, historic importance, recreational value, tranquility or the richness of their wildlife. A team of volunteers is working through the list of sites for assessment, which can be seen on our website,

www.charlburyneighbourhoodforum.org.

The consultation on the Neighbourhood Plan will be a chance for anyone to put forward views on the green spaces to be designated, and any comments are welcome to <a href="mailto:charlburynp@gmail.com">charlburynp@gmail.com</a>

The first in a series of reports produced for the Neighbourhood Plan is now available on our website www.charlburyneighbourhoodforum.org. uk

The Charlbury Biodiversity Report shows which important species of animals and plants have been found within the parish, and also where protected habitats and wildlife sites are located. This is one of the pieces of information that will help us develop the Plan. We hope that by the time the Chronicle arrives on doormats we will also have published our Housing Needs Assessment and Character Assessment. Both will be on our website when available.

#### **Bowls Club News**

2017 proved to be a very successful year for Charlbury Bowls Club. The season started with several new playing members recruited to the club and an excellent playing surface prepared by the volunteer greenkeepers.

The Men's team gained promotion to Division Two of the Oxfordshire Bowls League under the captaincy of Dave Cooper, finishing champions with 50.5 pts, comfortably ahead on neighbours Hanborough who joined them in promotion. The team averaged 90 shots per game from the four rinks of four players.

In a year of outstanding performances. Ray Hill was on the winning rink in all but two matches but it was a truly squad effort with 20 players representing Charlbury in the league. The Men's team progressed to the quarter final of the Oxfordshire League Cup where they entertained Headington A, runaway Oxfordshire league champions with a record winning margin, undefeated all season, and the biggest points score in the league's history.

Charlbury bowled well and led at half time, but the rain came and it affected the Charlbury bowlers more than their opponents who moved ahead and won the match, eventually completing the first division league and cup double. A highly creditable performance. The mixed

team in the West Oxfordshire League was used along with friendlies to blood new players and give them experience, with many notable performances but too many careless losses to make a challenge for the title.

Club member Shane Cooper, playing last season in the league for Division One runners-up Watlington, was the Oxfordshire under-25 singles champion. He went on to represent the county at the national finals at Leamington Spa where he was knocked out in the second round. Seventeen year old Alannah Ford was a member of the winning Oxfordshire under-25s triples team. Several ladies and men competed in the various singles, pairs, triples, and fours competitions but none made the finals. The winter short-mat league is ongoing.

The new outdoor season starts in late April and on Saturday 28 April and Sunday 6 May Open Days are being held at the club in Ticknell Piece Road at 2.00pm - all ages welcome to try out bowls for free - all you need is a pair of flat-soled sports shoes or trainers. 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
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England's woods and forests are slowly expanding due to new planting initiatives as well as regeneration, but when compared with much of Europe we still have a low percentage of woodland cover. In this area

of Oxfordshire we are very fortunate to have the ancient Wychwood Forest. It is in the woods that spring is often most obviously first apparent. Before the heavy canopy of leaves reduces the light levels, the woodland floor is alive with early flowers. I have observed all of the following flowers locally and it is well worth keeping an eye open for them in wooded areas during March, April and

In old deciduous woods and on shady banks **Dog's Mercury Mercurialis perennis** is one of the earliest wild flowers. The male and female flowers are borne on separate plants (dioecious), both are inconspicuous but are still a heartening sight. Much more showy is the **Sweet** Violet Viola odorata, with its dainty violet or white flowers and sweet scent. I know the whereabouts of several local clumps and visit them every year, kneeling down on the damp earth to catch the wonderful perfume. The moment the Sweet Violets are fading, Ground-ivy Glechoma hederacea, fills the shady banks with muted colour and you know you don't stand much chance of seeing too many more Sweet Violets for another year - always a slightly sad moment!

Lesser Celandine Ficaria verna is another common plant hereabouts and its bright yellow stars, gleaming in more shaded areas, are a cheerful reminder that the days are lengthening. There are two wild subspecies, one reproducing by seed and one, characteristic of disturbed ground, which reproduces by bulbils in the leaf axils after flowering. Many people love the pale yellow native **Primrose Primula vulgaris**, another plant often found on the edge of woodland. It is so popular that it is grown commercially and is for sale in local garden centres about Easter time. Delicate Wood Anemones **Anemone nemorosa** carpet the ground and nod in the breeze, in a small copse

close to where I live. The beautiful white flowers, sometimes flushed with pink, are actually sepals rather than petals but a wonderful harbinger of spring nonetheless. Walking along a track near Charlbury in spring last year, I suddenly became aware of a strong garlicky scent, a sure sign of **Ramsons** Allium ursinum, a wild member of the onion family. Apparently cattle can develop a compulsive liking for the plant, making their milk unfit to drink!

Some early woodland flowers do not conform to an easily recognisable floral pattern and provide a striking contrast to the more usual flowers. One such is Lords-and-ladies Arum maculatum also known as Cuckoo Pint, Jack-in-the**pulpit** and by other common names. These usually appear to have been inspired by the pale green hood and club shaped flower, the spadix, a phallic symbol in the eyes of country folk from bygone times. Hidden by the hood near the base of the spadix are the female flowers, with the male flowers above; neither male nor female flowers have any petals or sepals and the structure allows insects to be trapped temporarily for pollination. Another interesting flower is that of the Wood Spurge Euphorbia amygdaloides. The flower head projects from a ruff of leaves and has about 5 rays, each one of which gives rise to a flower which has central parts lacking petals or sepals, but possessing a cluster of stamens and a 'saucer' formed of two yellow-green bracts. It is similar to the garden varieties and like them has an irritant sap.

With the appearance of the native Bluebell Hvacinthoides non-scripta in Wychwood, sometime in late April or early May, one knows that summer is properly on the way.

As well as the ancient woodland we also have some local organisations full of people determined to extend and enhance our woodland with the planting of young trees. The Wychwood Project has many such schemes and The Evenlode Catchment Partnership is also encouraging landowners to plant trees alongside the river. Such endeavour is surely worthy of our support.

The three films screening this spring begin in March with the multi award winning Hidden Figures, inspired by Margot Lee Shetterly's book about the female African-American mathematicians who served in NASA during the early years of the U.S. space programme. ### The Cotswold Voluntary Wardens celebrate 50 years of looking after the Cotswolds AONB

The Cotswolds Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty was created in 1966 and a couple of years later the Cotswold Voluntary Wardens service began. The aim of the wardens then and now is to conserve and enhance the natural beauty of the AONB and increase understanding and enjoyment of its special qualities.

There are almost 400 active Cotswold Voluntary Wardens living in or around the 790 square miles of Cotswold landscape, which covers six counties.

Over the fifty years the Wardens Service has looked after the public Rights of Way in our area, laid special matting for pushchairs and wheelchairs at the Rollright Stones, helped manage Dean Grove, looked after a Nature Reserve in Charlbury and worked with children at local schools by taking them into the local environment.

Below are some facts and figures of projects achieved across the whole AONB in the past 50 years.

- annually cleared up to 60 grassland sites & up to 50 woodland areas
- restored 33000 sq m of coppicing
- planted 6500 trees and nearly 3km of hedging
- laid 8.5km of hedging
- built or restored 8km of stone walling & 25km of fencing
- installed or repaired 1000 stiles, 1000 kissing gates & 500 other gates
- cleared 274km of footpaths and surfaced over 5km
- worked with up to 40 schools in any one year on countryside

led 3000 guided walks

There is at least one work party somewhere in the Cotswolds going out every day to carry out some of the above activities.

To mark the 50th Anniversary there are some special projects taking place. In the Oxfordshire part of the Cotswolds you will see a new woodland being planted, close to the A361 between Burford and Chipping Norton.

Work on this is shown on the photograph below.

One focus for the anniversary is education. Primary schools are being contacted with a range of activities the wardens can offer. It is particularly important for a generation more often connected to technology than where they live, to be given the opportunity to explore the wider environment with people who have a deep understanding and connection with the countryside.

Anyone can join the wardens, a genial group, with no more qualifications needed than an enthusiasm for the Cotswolds and a willingness to roll up your sleeves and put some time into keeping the Cotswolds special.

You may love walking, in which case you could share this with other members of the public by becoming a guided walk leader. All wardens receive training and all enjoy the sense of achievement and general well-being that time spent out of doors can bring.

### **Charlbury Society**

The Committee has been pleased this year to see a number of new faces at the monthly talks and presentations. As always some of the topics are of more interest to some rather than others but we are hopeful that we've been able to provide something of interest to the majority of our members and visitors.

You will recall that our first meeting of this season was about Developments in Charlbury and Tony Merry, a committee member, compiled the report below so that those who were unable to be at that meeting could read about the discussion on the night:

#### Summary of Charlbury Society Meeting on the Challenge of Development in Charlbury

"Following a talk by the CPRE earlier in the year which raised concerns about consideration of new developments in the area it was decided that the initial meeting of the Society for 2017-18 season could be held in a Question Time format. It was felt that this fitted well with one object of the Society namely to encourage interest in the character and appearance of the town. Accordingly representatives from the Town Council, the County and District Councils, the Cotswolds AONB, the Charlbury Conservation Advisory Committee and the Charlbury Neighbourhood Plan Steering Committee formed a panel at the meeting on Friday October 13<sup>th</sup>. A call for questions was circulated before the meeting and were put to the panel by the Chair Anne Lawson-Porter.

The answers and subsequent discussion were very wide ranging and highlighted the general feeling that, while most people felt there was a need for more smaller houses to be built on suitable sites, developers were getting planning permission for large houses on unsuitable sites. The representatives from the Town, District and County Council and AONB expressed their frustration that their views and advice

were often being ignored. There was agreement that if Charlbury has a Neighbourhood Plan in place it would be harder for local opinion to be ignored so this is the best way forward. An independent Housing Needs Survey for Charlbury has been commissioned and should report soon. This will form a basis of proposals for new developments in the Town over the next 15 years. There are three plans which will influence future developments.

One is the local plan being prepared by West Oxfordshire District Council and it defines the overall policy for development but does not have full details on Charlbury. This is being inspected at the moment and should be published next year.

The next is the Charlbury Neighbourhood Plan which is being prepared by a steering group for the Town Council. This cannot be at odds with the Local Plan but does give more detail and can include housing numbers for Charlbury which the local plan does not. This involves open discussion with residents during its preparation and then consultation. It is then sent to West Oxfordshire who check that it conforms to requirements and then send it to an independent examiner. Finally, after any revision, it is put to a referendum. It then carries weight in deciding planning applications

The third is a Community Led Plan. This concerns the desires of the Community on a whole range of issues such as helping neighbours. It is up to groups to decide what could be done and how it could be funded.

It was felt that this innovative exercise was a great success and many favourable comments have been received and it was obviously a useful meeting to provide information about new housing developments in Charlbury."



### Charlbury Society (contd)

In other news, members of the Charlbury Society Historical Research Group have finished transcribing the first section (dating from 1524 to 1732) of Charlbury's probate documents.

A printed copy of these can now be found in the library and you are encouraged to browse through them to get a sense of Charlbury life in times past.

We are also at the planning stages of our summer outing for 2018. This will be in June with the final date yet to be finalised. We have been investigating a trip to either Croome in Worcestershire or Highclere Castle of Downton fame. The latter would be more expensive at around £40 whilst the former would be around £25. If you have any views then please let us know.

### Important Changes to the Bring & Take

The next Bring & Take is **Saturday 3rd March** in the Memorial Hall but this time we are having to make some important changes, so please read on.

### Times for bringing things into the hall

Please bring things along between 9.30am and 10.30am (rather than 11am) and take things between 10am and 12 noon as normal.

**Electrical items with plugs** 

Please drop off plug-in electrical items the Saturday before (24th February) to Janet Sly's house at 23 The Green between 11am and 12 noon ONLY (no other time please). This will enable them to be PAT-tested in advance and made available on the day – this is because there are usually too many to be PAT-tested on the day itself. Please do not bring old-style big TVs, no-one wants them and they need to be taken direct to Dix Pit for recycling.

#### Paint & large DIY stuff

# A Day's Life: Adrian Lancini, graphic designer, writer, music maker, poet, comedian ...

Lancini is an Italian surname and is quite common in the Brescia region of the country. When I first went, it freaked me out to see my name plastered all over shop fronts and gravestones! I wasn't used to that. My father was born in London, but went to Brescia with my grandmother when he was 4-years-old, as my grandfather had been interned on the Isle of Man at the outbreak of war. My dad came back when he was about 14 and settled in Leicester.

That's where I was born and I'm a lifelong Leicester City fan - when they won the Premier League in 2016, I threatened to put a banner across Park Street to celebrate but chickened out and just had a nice pint instead. I studied Graphic Design at York and then worked for 8 years as a member of Leicester University's graphic design team. When I came here, I worked for an advertising and marketing agency in Cornbury Park. Inspired by a three-day weekend at Glastonbury Festival in 2005, I decided I wanted a better worklife balance. So the agency allowed me to work a four day week, with a pay cut of course, and I found a new lease of life. I wrote a book called Man Friday (yet to be published) about what I got up to on Fridays - taking on an allotment by Wellington Cottages, learning new pastimes such as surfing, or sometimes just lying about in long grass trying to find faces in clouds. I found that I was happier, enjoying my iob a lot more and becoming much more creative.

Eventually, after another epiphany - this time the sight of a beautiful and vivid red flower on a cliff bank in Cornwall – I decided to go freelance and set up my own business

(www.adrianlancinidesigns.com). So I work from home now in Charlbury, where a lot of my clients are based. I get a lot of work by word-of-mouth,

which is very gratifying. I do design work for businesses and organisations: printed material such as logos, brochures, advertisements, leaflets, all forms of corporate identity and also design and build websites. I always get pleasure from looking through the Chronicle and spotting how many logos I've designed. I think my current record is five. I much prefer working for myself and find having that freedom really helps aid creativity.

How did I come to be in Charlbury? It was fate! When I first drove down Sheep Street one September evening, with the sun about to set over Hixet Wood it immediately felt like home. So it's proved as I have lived here now for over 15 years – I'm told by reliable sources this is the first step to being even considered a 'local'. I lived first in Sheep Street, then Wychwood Paddocks, and then the Toll House in Dyers Hill. I now live in Park Street with my partner Jo and our 3-year old son Beau, and have my studio at the top of the house.

My poetry? I knew the Charlbury poets Rob Stepney, Ed Fenton and John Lanyon from doing poetry performances and had several poems published in earlier anthologies compiled by Rob. We were all at an Open Mic night, I think called 'Out of the Woodwork', when Rob, who had been thinking of publishing more of his poems, invited us to join him. We're now called Four Wordsmen (www.fourwordsmen.com). Our first book together, A Funny Way With Words, was published in 2012.

I wanted to add a typographic playfulness to make the work visually engaging and also humorous. This is quite common in children's poetry, but I discovered it wasn't in adults. It was a lot of fun to design. The reaction to the book and the visual element was so good that in our next book *Words Go Out To Play* I was able to take this further. We had a book launch in December at the Rose and Crown which was a rousing success. We sent Kathy Clugston, the radio announcer and newsreader, a copy of our first book,

which contained a poem based on the Shipping Forecast called 'Fishing Forecasts'. She liked it and came and hosted one of our shows. We hope to do another show at The Shed in the spring, performing poems, music and sketches based on our second book.

Another creative impulse has been to write music and to record my songs. Under my pseudonym of Neanderthal C'Papan I recorded four albums worth of songs when I lived in the Toll House. I've not really pushed this music out there, though some of it has made its way modestly onto the internet (www.soundcloud.com/neanderthalcpapan). Similarly for my book, it would be great to have it published but it really doesn't worry me.

I just enjoy doing these things.

My comedy (www.adrianlancini.com) began as a progression from performing poetry. I don't do stand-up, where you often have to riff off an audience. I prefer to hide behind a character. I enjoy taking the mundane in life, such as trying to open some cling film, or eating a sandwich and exaggerating it to make it funny, perhaps in a surreal way. I've created a show called 'Rubbish' where I play many characters including a spoof singer-songwriter, a pretentious poet called Lawrie Hurt, and a magician who thinks everyday things like lighting a joystick is magic. Plus a host Michael who speaks in a made-up language. I've performed at the Shed, the Three Horseshoes and at the Riverside and Wilderness Festivals.

I also have a 'comedy' manager Jason King, who's actually just a great friend living in London. He thinks my talent is deserving of the masses outside of Charlbury and keeps hassling me to travel 2 hours to London and take part in 5 minute Open Mic spots, but so far I've resisted. I prefer walking five minutes to Barry's backroom at the Three Horseshoes and playing there for two hours, doing what I want.

Again, I don't know if I can be bothered with all the energy involved trying to 'make it'. That said, I have decided I'm going to put a bit more effort into getting


my comedy out there this year. Watch out Fawler!

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### Reflections on our first 100 days

### CHARLBURY Community Centre

With much help from the people of Charlbury, the long-held dream to build a community centre became a reality in September last year. Now fully operational, good progress has been made towards achieving our ambition of providing a place to connect, read, learn and play - a multi-activity public space that can serve all sectors of the community. Here is just a taster of the things that are coming up, or happening now - there is not space to tell you about everything, so please visit our website (www.charlburycommunitycentre.org.uk) or call in and see us. And please join us for our public meeting on February 28th at 7.30pm at the Community Centre.

The library - more books, easy access and longer hours

There's no doubt Charlbury library is thriving in its new location. If proof were needed, there are over 200 new members, with a significant rise in the number of families with small children, teenagers and people with mobility difficulties, for whom access is now easier. There's a regular flow of books being borrowed and returned - the selfservice machine can still be used when the Community Centre is open, but the library is unstaffed. Transactions have more than doubled to an average of over 3,000 per month. Future plans include talks by authors and more activities for children.

TG's café – a real community space

The café area, alongside the library, is a great place for friends to meet and for people to work. It is now open longer hours, and new offerings are available in response to customer requests. It is staffed by Community Centre staff and volunteers, Charlbury Deli remains our main supplier of consumables. We would like to make people aware that there are board games and puzzles available if you want to use this space to meet and socialise in that way.



Young - and old(er!)

Pilot schemes to provide holiday activities for children during the Christmas holidays and the October and February half terms were a success and are likely to be repeated. We are trying to work out the best format for the after-school activity clubs (Monday-Thursday 4-5pm) and would welcome feedback.

Over 100 young people have attended the term-time Friday night youth club, most Fridays there are 30-40 there to socialise, play team sports in the hall, challenge each other to table tennis, pool and board games and sometimes watch movies (with popcorn and drinks) – all for £1 per person.

In prospect for the youngest members of our community are such things as structured play sessions for pre-school children, health visitor Under 5 health checks, stay and play sessions, soft play sessions, and Bump-to-One sessions for expectant mothers and their babies. Please check our website to find out when these will be starting.

Age UK is running a series of film showings in the early afternoons on the last Friday of every month. They are aimed at retired people, but are open to all and the ticket price includes cake and tea or coffee, so there will be chance to socialise. Plans are also under way with Age UK and a local coach to start Strength and Balance sessions to improve the wellbeing of Charlbury's older people. Many retired people are enjoying activities such as walking football, pickleball, badminton, table tennis and many other sports.

Sport - conventional and pioneering

The number of sports on offer in the town has almost doubled as a result of the range of opportunities the indoor facilities provide.

For Charlbury's existing football, cricket and tennis clubs, coaching and practice sessions are no longer weather - dependent. The badminton club has expanded and new volleyball, netball, pickleball and walking football clubs have started. Charlbury Community Centre is now part of the nationwide network of "All Stars Cricket", a new initiative from the England and Wales Cricket Board, aimed at providing children aged five to eight with a great first experience of cricket.

Circuit Training, and gym-based exercise sessions, called *LEANGym*, are now well-established. New for 2018 is our Community Gym, complete with optional personal training from Jason, our Wellness Manager. This is in its three - month pilot phase and we are interested to gather feedback, for example, about the opening hours (currently 9am-1pm daily). We are, of course, restricted by staff availability and other users, so we cannot open the gym for all the hours we'd like to – for this reason, it is priced at only £18 per

month. There is a limited number of spaces available, so please apply early to avoid disappointment.

#### Setting out the future

The centre has got off to a flying start and, as planned, the building is operating at a high level of energy efficiency. We would like to thank Southill Community Energy for its contribution towards helping make that a reality.

Much has been learnt about the needs, hopes and aspirations of different parts of the community and we have all sorts of plans for the future to try and fulfil as many of these as possible.

None of this is possible, however, without our friendly and flexible staff and our fantastic band of volunteers, who devote many hours to provide front-of-house support and behind-the-scenes practical solutions to ensure the smooth running of the operation. There are more opportunities to volunteer which we'll explain at the public meeting on February 28th.

### Charlbury Town Football and Sports Club is making good progress

This is to update you on the progress being made by the Charlbury Town Football and Sports Club (CTFSC) with its project to achieve a new home for its activities on the Nine Acres Recreation Ground.

Backed by a new constitution we have submitted our application to be recognised as a Community Amateur Sports Club (CASC), which would make us eligible for favourable treatment for taxation and rate relief purposes with some similarities to charitable status.

The main criteria for registration are:

- the club must be open to the whole community
- the club's main purpose must be to provide facilities for eligible sports and to encourage people to take part in them
- the club must be organised on an amateur basis.

Our building plans have now been given planning permission by West Oxfordshire District Council (WODC). We will be providing a separate self-contained annexe on the end of the current pavilion. This will include a social and refreshment area (with a bar which can be locked away when children are using the facilities), a kitchen and an outside viewing area with tables.

The new facility will enable Club members, especially the adult and junior football teams and other users of the field and their families, to meet and socialise after matches, to watch key sports events on TV together and to take part in informal sports and games, such as darts, pool and Aunt Sally. (The restoration of an Aunt Sally pitch is particularly eagerly awaited.) We will also be able to organise our traditional annual series of children's and family social events there.

Our estimated building costs are at least £180,000. We are very grateful to have received the following contributions so far towards the total, in addition to our own funds which we are working hard to build up:

WODC grant offer of £50,000

Town Council grant offer of £70,000

A number of generous individual donations, including one from The Bell as a result of a raffle.

So how will local residents be able to use our new facilities and join in our activities? Club membership will be open to anyone in the community who wants to join. There will be a reasonable membership fee including a special family rate and also some concessionary rates.

We are already most grateful for the ongoing support and practical help being received from the Town Council, the Nine Acres Management Committee, our Members and other interested local residents. We would not have been able to reach this position without them. However, we would welcome additional support.

If you would like to see us achieve our plans, you could help us in the following ways:

- A financial donation
- Help "in kind" for example, we need someone to create a new website for us and give us other help with publicity. We have also already received some offers of practical help with the construction work.
- We would also benefit from having new members on our Management Committee – we meet monthly on a weekday evening.

### The 21st Annual Charlbury Beer Festival: All in a Good Cause




Those of you who started the year with a dry January may be interested to know that the Charlbury Beer Festival committee are looking forward to a dry June – as far as the weather is concerned, that is.

### IS THIS CURTAINS FOR THE DAY CENTRE?

Twenty one years ago on 14<sup>th</sup> May 1997 Charlbury Day Centre was officially opened to provide a place, where twelve local pensioners could meet on a regular basis for friendship, entertainment and a good home cooked lunch.

The idea was conceived by local people and backed by Social Services to fill a need for support for some of the older more isolated pensioners in the town. The premises in the War Memorial Hall was improved to make a comfortable day room, a manager was employed to run the Centre, and volunteers were recruited to support the manager.

The Centre has been a great success and has proved invaluable to so many members and their relatives. We have received generous help both financial and practical from the community and of course from Oxfordshire County Council. However the Council will be unable to continue their grant and we thought this would be our main worry.

Not so, our membership has dropped dramatically in the last year due to the members increasing age and health problems and the need for day care locally seems to have fallen away. We are not getting new people wanting to join us, despite our efforts to publicise the Centre. Sadly, if this really valuable facility is not used, the Centre would have great difficulty continuing in its present form. However, on a more positive note, we will be rearranging the "Open Morning" that we had to cancel before Christmas, because of the bad weather, to Wednesday 28<sup>th</sup> March. ### The Working Party of Charlbury

A reminder of what this is and what it does: the Working Party currently has 80+ members who are townspeople who care about the town environment and who recognise that, as it stands, neither the County nor the District Councils have the money to keep this town in the state that we would want it to be. In our second year of operation it looks as though we are sustainable as a community group and we should continue

Thus far we have concentrated on autumn and winter group activities – gathering the huge leaf fall around The Playing Close and on the top end of Hixet Wood in November and December. WODC have supported our self-help efforts by providing bulk bags and then lifting off the full bags to go to their community compost pits.

Members are now suggesting that we might extend our work through the spring and summer by doing footpath and bridleway cut-backs in May and June on the network immediately surrounding the town.

This seems an excellent way of giving our residents more enjoyment of the local landscape – nettles and brambles and drooping blackthorn can be a real deterrent to family walks.

You may not have noticed that our town website manager has given us a dedicated 'chat room' on the main Forum page (top left: "Working Party"). This has not been used to full effect this year but has the potential to become a real information exchange on how to maintain/improve our environment.

#### OLIO - The Food Sharing Revolution

Anybody else watch Hugh's War on shown 2016? Waste on BBC2 in Astonishingly, he found that we throw away a quarter of the food we buy each week. I wonder if anything has changed two years on? The date on packaged food partly to blame, making people uncomfortable about eating food which is still perfectly edible and leading people to throw food away even earlier just to be on the safe side. If any of this sounds familiar to you then maybe you'd like to register with OLIO on your mobile phone and then instead of chucking the food in the bin you could take a photo and post it to the OLIO app so someone else living in Charlbury could take it off your hands.

OLIO was launched in London in 2015 and is now available across the UK, but it works best within a close community like Charlbury with everyone within walking distance. You wouldn't want to drive miles just to pick up a tub of olives, but you might be happy to just pop round the corner.

Even if you don't throw fresh food away, I bet there's food in your cupboards that's been there ages and which you're unlikely to eat – if you were, then you'd have eaten it already! I know, because I have stuff just like this. Rather than leave it there even longer, you could just take a photo and post it to the OLIO app. This is actually the best way to start to get things moving. If everyone reading this now registered with OLIO and posted something today, then wow, we'll have started something that could work out really well.

We are a mixed group of Morris dancers in the Border Morris Tradition. This is a traditional form of dancing that originated in places on the English / Welsh Border but which died out in the early 20<sup>th</sup> Century. There are few records of the dances performed or of the music they used but most modern Border sides base themselves on the few accounts and pictures that remained. It is distinct from the Cotswold Morris tradition in a number of way in the costumes, dance movements, music and exuberance of the dances.

It seems possible that the tradition is derived from a form of Morris known as Bedlam Morris.

This was generally thought of as a more boisterous form of the dance in comparison to Cotswold Morris. There are many disparaging remarks about Bedlam Morris but from descriptions it has many characteristics of the appearance and dances of Wychwayz Morris.

Wychwayz was set up in 1999 and we may be distinguished in the following ways

- We have rag costumes often homemade and many sides have different colours for each dancer
- We always dance with sticks which are generally stouter than in Cotswold Morris
- We wear hats which are usually highly decorated and individual. Pheasant feathers are often used
- The dancing tends to be less formal with lots of clashing of sticks (sometimes pretty hard)

- The dancing is often accompanied by hoots and other loud sounds from the dancers
- Unlike Cotswold Morris the appearance is of a group of individuals with little in the way of a common theme or costume

Generally, we dance to have fun and there is a great social atmosphere with our mixed group. However, we do need more dancers and more musicians. No previous experience is required and we will show you the dances. They are not particularly complicated and most people pick them up quickly. We practice every Tuesday in the Shed from 8 to 9 pm and this is generally followed by a session in the Rose and Crown. If you want to know more, then just come along and see us or get in touch.

The music is essential to our dancing and we are looking for new musicians so that we can perform at dance outs during the year which include the Oxford Folk Festival, Cornbury and Wilderness festivals, the Wychwood Forest Fair, Charlbury Street Fair, Halloween at Wychwood Brewery and Boxing day at the Bell. Traditionally we have melodeons for the main musical accompaniment but we also need drummers and any other instruments, we often have a flute playing when we dance out.

So if you want to have some fun, meet new people and entertain others then come along and see what we do and hopefully join the side.

### Gardeners' Question Time

Outside it may have been a wet and dreary January evening but, in the aptly named Garden Room of the Memorial Hall, the welcome was warm as thirty one visitors and members of The Garden Society settled down with hot drinks to put their questions to the panel of experts. Chaired by Geoff Holmberg, our well-known garden 'sages', Society President Peter Bridgman and Vice-Chairman John Moore, were joined for the first time by local garden designer Michelle Heather and her dog.

It was no surprise that many questions had been e-mailed. However, the address of the first questioner, 'Naivasha Prison Kenya', was met with much amusement and gasps of disbelief. The Garden Society is thriving, but could our fame have extended so far? Geoff explained that our erstwhile chairman, Nick Johnson, was currently visiting the prison but was quick to add, 'Not as an inmate!' Nick's email about leek moth in his Charlbury garden was the first of many questions, ranging from pruning clematis and how to grow potatoes in containers (an excellent use for redundant W.O.D.C. black recycling bins provided you drill holes in the bottom), to where to begin designing a new garden.

Newcomers to Charlbury may be interested in suggestions for plants that thrive here. Recommendations included: clematis, delphiniums, penstemons, geums and lily of the valley.

Perhaps the most unusual question asked was how to renovate flower beds and a lawn that had been trampled by cows -- thankfully a problem that not many of us had experienced!

No one could fail to be impressed by the knowledge of the panellists, though they were not always unanimous in their views. There was good-humoured debate about the merits of mixing vegetables and ornamental plants. Michelle is a keen advocate of this technique and recommended a visit to Barnslev House Hotel in Gloucestershire to see an outstanding example in the garden created by the late Rosemary Verey. Peter and John were less enthusiastic pointing out that harvesting veg such as beetroot leaves an unsightly gap in the border. But it was acknowledged that companion planting is a well-established tradition in cottage gardening. For example, marigolds are grown to deter whitefly from tomatoes, and Sweet Williams are grown alongside vegetables to encourage pollinators.

As a new member, I thoroughly recommend coming along to one of our forthcoming events. Whether you are an experienced gardener, or a beginner like me, there is likely to be something of interest in the programme for 2018 (see <a href="https://www.charlburygardensociety.org.uk">www.charlburygardensociety.org.uk</a>). Check regularly as additional events are added throughout the year.

Among events we look forward to is Ian Gourlay's illustrated talk (15th March; 8.00pm, Memorial Hall) on **social and therapeutic horticulture** at Bridewell Organic Gardens, Wilcote.

The Society's **Spring Show** will be held on Saturday 24th March in the Memorial Hall. As well as daffodils, there are classes for other spring flowers such as tulips, hyacinths and hellebores. The Garden Society Show will again be held in conjunction with the Charlbury Art Society.

On Saturday 12th May we have the **Plant Sale** at the Memorial Hall, with 9.30am start.

And there is a guided tour on Tuesday  $22^{nd}$  May of the garden at Eastleach House (admission £9), half an hour's drive by car share from Charlbury. The garden covers 14 acres and has four ponds, steep steps and slopes (see Eastleachhouse.com). The tour takes 1.30 to 2 hours. Enquiries and bookings to Angela Gwatkin:

### News from Charlbury Primary School

In this edition, we would like to focus on Music in school and to tell you about a special annual event in which the school is involved. Jennie Grierson, our music co-ordinator, is this issue's guest reporter.

"If you can walk you can dance, if you can talk you can sing." This proverb from Zimbabwe embraces something we believe at Charlbury School: that all children can sing. We provide pupils at school with ample opportunity to find their voice, to experiment and learn how to pitch match and explore rhythm. They should also enjoy singing so we try to make it as fun and accessible as possible. As part of our music programme at the school all children attend weekly singing assemblies where they learn a wide variety of songs ranging from pop music (both past and present) to traditional British folk songs and music from all around the world.

Throughout the autumn term the children learn specific songs in preparation for the Young Voices concert, which for many children is one of the highlights of their time at primary school. Young Voices is an organisation that exists solely to promote a love of music, or, to quote their website: "inspiring children to discover their love for music." Every year they put together the largest school concerts in the world in the biggest arenas in the country, and we get to be part of it!

We encourage all of our older pupils to participate, from Years 4-6. On the 9th January 75 pupils travelled by coach up to Birmingham's Genting Arena to join over 5,000 other children who had all spent the past term learning the same amazing songs.

We were guided by a professional conductor, accompanied by a band of professional musicians and a professional dance group also taught us a few interesting moves to some of the songs. We spent the afternoon rehearsing in the arena and then put on a thrilling concert to a packed audience. The lights were incredible and all the children had tiny torches that they waved in time with the music whenever the lights went low, adding to the electric atmosphere.

This year's repertoire included a traditional Kenyan greeting song, The Call from Tales of Narnia, a medley of cartoon theme tunes including Inspector Gadget, Dangermouse and Pink Panther, a Stevie Wonder medley, a medley of last year's pop tunes as well as several beautiful songs written especially for this year's concert.

A lot of work goes into making it possible for the children to participate in this concert every year, however, we believe it is entirely worth it, as it provides the children with memories and music they will never forget. To quote Beverley Knight, who is a huge supporter of Young Voices: "These kids will be retelling the story of this day for the rest of their lives."

#### A walk on the wild side

The ancient forest of Wychwood has gone through many guises and changing fortunes over its long history. Recorded in the Domesday Book, it was variously a Royal hunting forest, supplying the king with deer, wood, timber and charcoal; a source of timber for the navy; home to abundant wildlife which local poachers found irresistible; provider of employment but also refuge of highwaymen and robbers. It also picked up stories of murders and ghosts along the way, and was the scene of riotous partying in Victorian times during the Forest Fair.

Come and explore this rich past with us through old maps and stories, photos and oral history. Learn about the invaluable work of the Wychwood Project in working to restore and conserve the rich habitats and diversity of the forest encouraging the local wildlife and wildflowers to return, and helping all of us to enjoy and appreciate what is left of this historic landscape.

We are planning various local events to tie-in with the exhibition:

Early summer: Tony Graeme will lead a walk through the forest, pointing out places of interest and looking at the

birds, animals and flowers of the area

An evening of writing and poetry based around the forest, its history and people

A local craft event highlighting skills such as willow weaving and basket making

The Museum reopens on **Easter Saturday, 31<sup>st</sup> March**, with a new exhibition exploring the work of the Wychwood Project and the links between the forest and Charlbury.

# CHARLBURY MEALS ON WHEELS The Big 5 – 0

Fifty is a significant number for Charlbury Meals on Wheels. For more than 50 years, area residents have both given and received meals through our local organisation. Many of the 50-member volunteer workforce have gone on to become recipients of the lunch boxes which are delivered at around noon each Tuesday.

If you're unfamiliar with our local Meals on Wheels program, recipients pay £3.00 each week and receive a freshly cooked main course, vegetables, and pudding prepared in the Memorial Hall kitchen by a team of talented cooks and helpers on Tuesday mornings.

Meals are delivered by three pairs of volunteers who set off from the Memorial Hall each Tuesday at 11.45am to deliver to Charlbury, Spelsbury, Chadlington, Fawler and Stonesfield. Usually, the deliverers have a brief visit with the

recipients – a mutually rewarding time which strengthens community ties.

Fifty is significant for another reason: for fifty years the Griffiths family has been involved in Charlbury Meals on Wheels. Diana Griffiths, now 101 years old, managed deliveries for over 40 years, and Jan and Howard Griffiths helped organise the operation for the past 10 years. With great reluctance, Jan and Howard have had to step down at the end of 2017. We owe them and Diana a huge amount of gratitude for all of their years of service.

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

## Churches together in Charlbury

Hands up if you know where Suriname is! You can be forgiven if you don't know as it's a country we hear very little about, but for those of us who had to look up its geographical location, it lies in the north -eastern part of South America.

The reason for mentioning Suriname is that this year it is the focus for the "Women's World Day of Prayer" Service. and if you are unfamiliar with this service, or think it is only for women - let me explain.

The Women's World Day of Prayer is a woman-led worldwide ecumenical movement, the largest and the first to be established. It's a long story from its origins in the 19<sup>th</sup> century when Christian women in USA and Canada initiated a variety of co-operative activities in support of women's involvement in mission at home and abroad, to today when over 100 countries and islands participate, with the service being translated into over 1000 languages. Each year a different country is responsible for writing the service. Over the past few years women from Chile, the Bahamas and Egypt have provided the service and Slovenia, Zimbabwe and Vanuatu will provide services from their own unique perspective and cultures in the next few years. From the freewill offerings made at these services, grants are allocated to many different projects, around the world and here at home.

One of the joys of the services is that each is so different, vibrant, creative, and challenging. However, because the word "Women" is in the title, some men feel excluded and that the service is not for them. That is not so. The services are written by women, but are a gift to the whole church, and in some countries it is one of the few opportunities that women have to make their voices heard. Many places have already dropped or never used the word "Women" in their title including Scotland and Ireland and The National Committee is now asking its members if they feel now is the time to do the same for the rest of our country. I wonder what you think?

The World Day of Prayer is always on the first Friday in March, and each year a different church in the town organises the service. This year it's the turn of The Friends to host us in The Friends Meeting House on Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> March at 11.00am.

The first of the services begin as the sun rises over Samoa, continuing as it makes its way around the earth, ending some 36 hours later as the sun sets over American Samoa. Throughout that time continuous prayer and worship is offered. A truly remarkable, moving and humbling service which is worthy of a much higher profile and participation. So do come and join us on 2nd March.

May I also remind you of the Lent Lunches taking place on Fridays from  $16^{th}$  Feb -  $23^{rd}$  March, each of the Churches taking responsibility for one or more. There are posters advertising where and when, with further information in the "Leaflet".

Each year the Churches Together Committee organise a series of Lent Talks and this year the theme is "Visions for a Better Tomorrow" and feature talks and other presentations on a number of Modern Prophets. Cecily Saunders, Pauline Webb, Jean Vanier, Dietrich Bonhoeffer and Peter Benenson. Again there are posters and leaflets giving further information. The first talk is on Tuesday Feb 20 at 8.00pm in St. Mary's Church and is about the life and work of Cecily Saunders, founder of the hospice movement.

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# Charlbury Town Council report

Housing development

Whenever new developments are proposed in Charlbury, the Town Council asks West Oxfordshire District Council (the planning authority) to require some form of community benefit from the development. The new development at the Grange, Woodstock Road, is a case in point. We were pleased that WODC listened to our call for a significant contribution to affordable housing provision, and the developers will be asked to contribute £120,000 towards this. We will continue to lobby for this funding to be spent in Charlbury rather than elsewhere in the district.

We were also pleased that our suggestion for an access onto Woody Lane was taken up, making it easier for residents of these new houses to walk into Charlbury town centre or to the school. Unfortunately, WODC did not support our request for a pavement to be provided along Woodstock Road as the first step towards better pedestrian provision on this busy road. We are continuing to discuss with WODC how developers can be required to make the fullest possible contribution to Charlbury facilities via the Section 106 / Community Infrastructure Levy mechanisms.

Separately, the Inspector's review of the WODC Local Plan has concluded that the draft plan did not give enough weight to the special characteristics of the Cotswold Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, in which Charlbury is situated. Our understanding is that this will see the proposed development at Jefferson's Piece withdrawn from the Local Plan list of sites. This does not imply that the development will necessarily be cancelled, but the developers may need to rethink the density and mix of houses to have a chance of obtaining planning permission.

#### Precept

The town council precept, part of your Council Tax, has been set at £97,730 for 2018/19, giving a Band D rate of £75.03. This is an decrease of 2.88% on last year's rate. The largest part of Council Tax goes to Oxfordshire County Council, which this year is proposing a 5.99% rise to pay for

social care – equivalent to £80 for a Band D home.

Mill Field management plan

The Mill Field is one of Charlbury's crown jewels and is owned and managed by the Town Council. It is an important recreational facility for the town and a significant wildlife habitat.

The Town Council has recently reviewed its management, supported by surveys from the BBOWT (Wildlife Trusts) small mammals group and the Wychwood Flora group of the Wychwood Project, and comments from local conservationists and residents. The full management plan is now available for consultation. You can find a link to it from the Charlbury Town Council page on the Charlbury website (go to www.charlbury.info and search for 'Town Council'). Recommendations cover the frequency of grass cutting, an uncut strip along the riverbank, bank repairs, and river access. We would be pleased to hear your comments.

#### Traffic and speeding

We are continuing to work on the proposed 20mph speed limit for Charlbury town centre although staff changes at Oxfordshire County Council have slowed progress. The latest advice is that it could be implemented in early 2019 if consultation results are positive. We are also working with OCC on a series of small alterations to parking restrictions, adding new double yellow lines where parking has proved a problem (particularly the bottom of Nine Acres Lane) and removing lines where the need is no longer there. Again, any proposals will be put to public consultation.

Separately, OCC hopes to repaint a number of parking and other road markings this year where the existing markings have faded away.

**Annual Parish Meeting** 

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held in the Memorial Hall on April 6th at 8pm. Do come along and find out more about the work of the Town Council in the last year. if you have a resolution that you wish to be considered by the meeting, please submit it in writing to the Town Clerk at least seven days beforehand.

#### **Boundary Walk**

The Annual Parish Boundary Walk will take place on Rogation Sunday, 6th May, led by Tony Merry. It starts at 10am at the old oak tree on Forest Road (B4437 to Burford) at the top of the hill, nearly a mile past the railway station. There will be a break for lunch at Model Farm, Ditchley, for which we are very grateful to Rob & Maxine Hobill. We need volunteers for stewarding and chauffeuring on the day – if you can help, please contact the Town Clerk.

#### In brief

- Thank you to all the town centre residents and businesses for illuminated Christmas trees; to Geoff Burroughs for donating the tree for the Corner House; and to the team of volunteers led by Liz Walton and Anna Fairhurst who organise this beautiful display every year.
- We are pleased to see the continuing progress on the Neighbourhood Plan (see article elsewhere in this issue of the Charlbury Chronicle). The process will include public consultation on the plan later this year.
- Please take a few moments to check your boundaries and cut back overhanging branches and excessive growth so that the pavements are kept clear for pedestrians.

Full council meetings will be held in the Corner House at 7.30pm on Wednesday 28th March, 25th April, and 23rd May, with Planning & Correspondence two days before (8pm unless there is a speaker). The May meeting is the Annual Meeting of the Council (not to be confused with the Annual Parish Meeting), at which the Chair and Vice-Chair are elected and nominations to committees made. The next open 'surgeries' will be in the Corner House from 10am–12pm on Saturday 7th April and 2nd June.

# From County & District Councillor Liz Leffman

Some months ago, I wrote here about a new not-for-profit company which has been set up to bring buses back into West Oxfordshire, called West Oxfordshire Community Transport. At the time, I approached the District Council for a grant to pay for the start-up costs, which they agreed to. The first project was to replace a bus service in Witney. This has been very successful, and the next project has been to replace the bus service in the Wychwood villages, which was lost when subsidies were cut eighteen months ago.

I am delighted to announce that the new bus service started on February 12<sup>th</sup>, and that I was able to assist once again, this time as the County Councillor. The County has a pot of money called the Communities Fund which is administrated by councillors, who can choose which projects to allocate money to in their area. My choice was to support this bus service, which will make a big difference to many people in my ward, especially older people no longer able to drive, and young people who do not have their own transport.

The Lib Dem group on the Council is committed to improving public transport and recently proposed a motion to look at new ways of funding bus services across the county. This was accepted and we are now putting together a working party to take this forward, of which I will be one of the members.

At a recent meeting of the County Council Performance Scrutiny Committee, it was noted that recycling rates across the county are in decline. This is very disappointing and I have been asked to work with officers to look into the reasons why this is happening. It is too early to say whether the new system we have in West Oxfordshire is contributing to the decline, though I know that many Charlbury residents are very concerned that we can no longer recycle fly-away plastic and there has

recently been a lot of publicity about the fact that mixed packaging, for example boxes with plastic windows, are not recyclable. Other districts have different rules about what can be put into recycling bins and I will be looking into whether we can improve recycling rates by creating more uniformity across the county. Another issue is the longstanding one of whether we need recycling centres in more parts of the county – Dean Pit closed long ago but we still miss it.

I recently read about a new use for plastic waste which is to turn it into road surfacing material. It would kill two birds with one stone if we could find a way to use our waste plastic to resurface the county's roads!

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Charlbury Refugee Action Group held a record-breaking concert in January when Margaret Fingerhut, a world-famous pianist, gave her time and talent in a barnstorming performance for the refugee cause. The audience was a CRAG record of 152.

All our performers and musicians give their time, for which we are very grateful indeed. The total raised at this concert was about £1600 which has gone to the charity Help Refugees. Our online fundraiser is at *mydonate.bt.com/fundraisers/charlburyrefugee* if you wish to add a donation yourself.

To complete the tally at the end of January: our autumn and January concerts, the Art Café, Churches Together, the Quakers and personal donations raised £6705 in all. As we go to press, we don't yet know the proceeds from the February Kismet folk concert and the Bring and Buy.

And where does it all go? Since September we have given £3200 to Help Refugees (much of whose work is with grassroots NGOs in Greece), £2500 to the Refugee Community Kitchen (providing clothing and hot meals for growing numbers - mostly kids - still

sleeping rough around Calais and in Paris) and £771 to Lighthouse Relief who provide welfare services for refugees landing from boats on the Greek island of Lesvos.

Moreover, as a result of our appeals, especially our 'Keep a Place at Your Table' Christmas campaign, individuals have donated a further astonishing £2510 (plus gift aid) on CRAG's fundraising pages, where the money goes direct to the charities we support and not through our books.

And what's next? On Sunday 25 March we are honoured to welcome the internationally renowned viola da gamba players Asako Morikawa and Richard Boothby. The latter will be making a return visit to Charlbury after his extremely popular recital for CRAG in 2017. This will be a rare opportunity to hear some rarely heard gems of the French viola da gamba repertoire, introduced by the soloists. Full details are on the Charlbury website.

## Charlbury Speed Watch

Charlbury Speed Watch is operated by a group of volunteers in support of Thames Valley Police (TVP) and with the approval and support of Charlbury Town Council. The project is part of a national Police sponsored scheme that acts as a deterrent and also collects details of speeding motorists, using recording equipment approved by the police and purchased by the Town Council. Our aim is to improve safety on our roads for all users, by drawing to the attention of Charlbury and the wider driving community that excessive speed is antisocial, unwelcome and will not be tolerated.

Once recorded, TVP add the data to the database and follow up by writing to speeding motorists asking them to respect speed limits and to drive within them. Should the same vehicle appear regularly then TVP will consider taking further action. The data also potentially provides statistical information to the Town Council and Neighbourhood Plan Group to support future planning of roads and traffic management.

The group has been operating since September 2017, carrying out 13 recording sessions in the three months to December. During the sessions 1242 vehicles have been



recorded exceeding the 30-mph limit. Analysis of the data collected electronically shows that almost 32% of all vehicles recorded (Total 3926) are speeding through Charlbury. This shows that we need to continue with the monitoring & recording of speeding drivers.

We spent some time at the December Farmers Market explaining what we do and received a lot of support for the activities, as well as suggestions of where best to set the sessions. We will be following up on these suggestions over the coming months.

# Free nuisance call blockers for people living with dementia

The National Trading Standards Scam Team has secured Government funding to provide free call blocking technology ("trueCall Secure" units) to protect those in the most vulnerable circumstances from nuisance and scam calls. Free call blockers will be available to any person living with dementia who is currently receiving scam or nuisance calls.

If someone is eligible for a free call blocker, it will be installed and set up by a qualified engineer who will show them how to manage the unit's settings. Once they receive a unit, it will become theirs to keep and the NTS Scams Team will not ask for it to be returned at any point. There is no cost to the user for the unit; however, it is recommended that the "caller display" service is activated on the user's phone line for the unit to perform at its best.

One month after installation the user will be contacted by a member of the NTS Scams Team and asked to complete a short survey to assess how effective the unit has been at blocking nuisance calls and how they feel about nuisance calls since receiving the unit. The NTS Scams Team will contact them again three months after installation to carry out another survey.

There are only a limited number of units available and they will be allocated on a first come first served basis. Go to the Friends Against Scams website - www.friendsagainstscams.org.uk (click on Callblocker) - to complete a survey to check if you or someone you know is eligible.



## The Charlbury Society Historic Research Group

#### Report January 2018

After five years work, the Group has completed the transcription of all the Charlbury probate documents from 1525 to 1857, for just over 700 residents of the town and outlying villages. Members of the Group are now completing the final editing, and we are also starting to investigate how we can make these transcripts available on the internet. In the meantime, paper copies for the period 1525-1732 are available for consultation in Charlbury library.

However we have found further wills which were not proved through the church courts. These were identified when the family of the late Don Stuart of Collins House, Park Street, donated the deeds of the property to Charlbury Museum. It was decided to transcribe these, and we found amongst them the will of Richard Gardiner dated 1844, which did not appear to have been proved.

Up to about 1925 much of the freehold land in Charlbury was held by the Lord of the Manor, St John's College Oxford, and let by them on Copyhold tenancies. The transfer of Copyhold land had to be approved by the Lord of the Manor through the Manor Court and each transaction was recorded in the Court Rolls or Court Books. These documents are held in the Oxford History Centre and those in English, from 1732, are in over

12 volumes, each containing about 600 pages. This would be a huge task to transcribe, but they do give a good view of the ownership of land during this period.

Where the property had been transferred by a will this document was copied into the Court Roll. We have been able to identify some 30 further Charlbury wills which had not been proved and up to now have not been included in any published list of wills. We are now transcribing these.

The documents do help us to identify more precisely the properties mentioned in the wills. For example in Edward Claydon's will of 1854 he left to his widow 'All those two tenements one in my own occupation and in the other in the occupation of Jane Burdon which I purchased of John Penson' The property is described in the Court Rolls as a small Barn which Edward Claydon 'converted into two tenements', and identified as being on the 'south side of Pools Lane between the Plain Close and Fishers Lane'.

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# News from Charlbury Library

The library has now been open since the beginning of September 2017. Our initial IT issues have been fixed and I'm feeling a lot more settled in the new library now! We've been lucky, as a "new" library, to have lots of new stock allocated to us and our Adult and Junior Fiction shelves in particular, are full to capacity. Our statistics show that footfall for the period Sept-Dec 2017 had increased by approximately one third compared to the same period in 2016. However, this does not take into account the customers visiting the library when there are no staff or volunteers around to "count" them, so the actual percentage increase could be much higher.

We've also had approximately 180 new customers join the library during Sept-Dec 2017, which is fantastic! However, there's always room for more! Joining the library is free and just takes a couple of minutes, either in person at the library, or online at <a href="https://libcat.oxfordshire.gov.uk">https://libcat.oxfordshire.gov.uk</a>.

We are just about to start a Digital Helper session once a month in the library for those looking to gain more confidence with their IT skills. The

February session is fully booked and the date for March is yet to be confirmed, but it's bound to be popular, so if you're interested, let me or one of the volunteers know ASAP. We also hope to be holding a number of book-related events throughout this year, so watch this space!

In line with many other libraries, we hope to be offering a regular RhymeTime session for pre-school children and their carers during term time. This would involve a short session of simple nursery rhymes and stories with assorted instruments and props and will ideally need volunteers to run it. I would be organising, setting up and supporting the RhymeTime session and any volunteers would need to be trained, so if you feel this is something you would like to get involved with, please let the library know.

Finally, the library is regularly staffed with our bank of dedicated and hardworking volunteers, many of whom offer their time for one session per month, sometimes two. If you would like to find out more about volunteering in Charlbury Library, again, please pop in or phone the number below.
