

News from the Charlbury Community Centre Appeal Committee

You will all have seen that progress is now being made on the Spendlove site in preparation for the new Community Centre. The building contractor will take control of the site at the end of September. Although the CCCA has raised a fantastic \pounds 220,000+, we still need to help raise money for external works and a few things that had to be trimmed in order for the contract to come within the budget, so our work is not over yet. Below are some of our forthcoming events and ways you can help:

Ground-**Breaking Ceremony,** Friday 16th September, 5pm Spendlove car park. This is where we celebrate the start of the building project. We hope many people from Charlbury and surrounding villages can attend to help us mark this occasion. This will be preceded by:

The Charlbury Challenge, Friday 16th September, 3.30-5pm, Nine Acres Recreation Ground. There will be fun challenges for teams of children and adults. Please come down straight after school and join in the fun. There will also be refreshments available, so you can stay in town and attend the Ground Breaking Ceremony and then the Egg Throwing contest, which marks the beginning of Street Fair weekend.

Street Fair Stall, Saturday 17th September, 2-5.30pm, Church Street. We will be doing a "hunt the treasure" game, with a wonderful hamper for a prize, and displaying our plans for the Community Centre and the Library. We might even get the glitter tattoos out again! Please visit our stall.

Coffee, Cake and Picture Sale, Saturday 8th October, 2-4pm, Memorial Hall. Instead of a coffee morning this is a coffee afternoon, with home-made cakes and scones to enjoy with your coffee or tea. We will also have a display of pictures and prints for you to buy, unfortunately not originals, so not up to the standards of Charlbury's wonderful Art Weeks, but you might pick up a bargain. Charlbury Community Centre Update

Thomas Gifford Trust, July, 2016



What is the work schedule?

Site clearance and demolition work has already commenced. A retaining wall will be erected and the site levelled during July and August, using local Charlbury contractors. The main contractor, Beard Construction, will take control of the site at the end of September and the centre is programmed to open in autumn 2017.

What facilities will be in the new Charlbury Community Centre?

A large, modern library with IT facilities, Wi-Fi and workspace; a full-size sports hall to accommodate a variety of sports; and a flexible community area with a café and youth area. The aim is to complement and work alongside existing facilities in the town. The Centre will cater to the recreational and educational needs of people of all ages and a wide variety of interests.

How will this affect existing parking and Nine Acres footpath?

There will be a net gain of 12 parking spaces overall on the Spendlove site, when the Centre is complete. In the meantime however, there will be a varying amount of parking available on the site, though once building commences, this will be temporarily reduced.

The existing footpath has been diverted, to allow safe access during building work, alongside the play equipment and the front of the pavilion. A permanent diversion along this route is being progressed. We also hope to keep the access from the Nine Acres path open if possible during the works.

How is the Centre being funded and managed?

The land is owned by The Thomas Gifford Trust. The new building is being funded by money raised by the Charlbury Community Centre Appeal, private donations, funds from OCC, private and public foundations and grants, funds from Sport England, Charlbury Town Council, WODC and others potentially including Southill Solar. More funding is still needed to complete the project as originally envisaged, including some of the external works. Please let us know if you have ideas for fundraising or can make a donation.

The Centre will be managed by professional staff, supported by a core group of volunteers. Income from the Centre will support this, but fund-raising activities may still be needed to help with upkeep and maintenance.

What about the fast food outlets?

We hope to be able to allow the food vans to continue trading throughout the building phase. However, we need to come to some arrangement with the contractors over this and it is possible that they may need a few weeks where the site is completely clear for safety reasons.

How do we get regular updates about the progress of the Centre?

A Day's Life: Celia Faulkner, curator of Charlbury Museum

I was born and brought up in Charlbury, and now live in the same house which my grandfather bought in the 1930s. My mother was born here, but my father came from West Wales to teach here just before the Second World War. My mother's father was also from near Cardigan – he was billeted here in World War I – so there is quite a bit of Welsh blood in the family!

I went to Charlbury School and then to Chipping Norton, where I did A Levels in English, Art, and History – they were, and have remained, my favourite subjects. I decided then to do teacher training in Bedford. All my family were teachers – my father, my mother and my aunties. I came back to Oxfordshire to get married to Paul, who was a policeman, then stationed in Abingdon.

Our first home was in Long Hanborough, where he was appointed Rural Beat Officer. I found it hard to get a teaching job locally – Oxfordshire was well supplied with teachers in the 70s – so I got a job with Oxfam. I worked there for nearly two years, then moved on to work for Oxfordshire County Council in their Social Services Department.

We lived in the police house in Long Hanborough for a few years, but we wanted to buy our own house, and eventually found a house in Nine Acres Close. Our two sons, David and Ian, also went to Charlbury and Chippy Schools. While they were young I did voluntary work – with playgroup, playing the guitar in assembly at the infants' school, listening to reading etc.

In 1992, after short periods of teaching part time in Kidlington and working for GWP, I joined the Careers Service as an employment adviser for young people, where I stayed for about 20 years. It combined things that I was interested in – such as working with young people and employers, and researching and providing information. I went on to train as a Careers Adviser. Our office was in Witney and I enjoyed being part of a great team. I worked both in schools and in the community, providing help for those young people finding it hard to get into work and training. But the Careers Service was

always changing and by 2011 the service had been drastically downsized and divided. I was 60, there were a lot of redundancies and I decided then to retire. My mother needed more help as she was beginning to suffer from memory loss.

One of my interests is playing the recorder and I belong to North Cotswold Society of Recorder Players. My parents were both musical. My father was always singing, and my mother played the piano. She still plays the organ for our Methodist Church services. I learnt the clarinet at school, but I don't play it now. It needs a strong lip and takes a lot of breath. In the 1980s a friend asked me to teach her sons the recorder, so I started a small recorder group. In the end about 30-40 children were coming, in groups, to our house after school. One group carried on even though they had taken up other instruments, which was really pleasing. The recorder often has a bad press!

Then Anne Grierson persuaded me to start a recorder class for adults (there was a good Adult Education system in Charlbury at that time). This group is still going – 30 years later (some still from the original class!). I enjoy playing with others – I like the teamwork, and find it relaxing. We do a couple of concerts a year, raising money for charities – the last two have been for Crisis, and Charlbury's Refugee Aid Group.

I had started an OU course in the late 1980s. I liked learning and wanted a new challenge. I did courses that covered history, music, literature and the history of art. I thoroughly enjoyed being an OU student and would recommend it. I met so many people from all walks of life. Juggling work, family life and study was quite difficult. I remember going with Paul to cricket matches, and sitting in the car with my books, studying. I finished my degree with the OU in 1994.

About ten years ago, Jennifer Bartlett asked me to join the museum committee, which I was delighted to do. My first contribution to an exhibition was a study on the history of allotments in Charlbury, which I found fascinating to research. My family has always had an allotment and Paul and I still have a small plot. After a few years, Ron Prew wanted to stand down as Curator and he asked me to take over from him. In the end I agreed and he helped me to get going. The museum is run on an entirely voluntary basis. We have a hard-working and talented committee and over 50 people who volunteer as stewards, a number which is envied by other local museums. We are also very grateful to those who help us with fundraising during the year.

I love history and enjoy the research involved. We want to make the museum a place where people want to come, both those who live here and visitors. We still get local people who come to the museum and say they didn't know it was here. We are trying to attract a broader range of visitors: last year for example, children from the school came to see the exhibition on the school's history.

We visit the Day Centre from time to time to share some of our artefacts and photos and to pick the brains of those who have lived here for a long time. We often have enquiries and visits from people whose ancestors lived here and we do all we can to supply them with information from our archives. We have digitised our enormous photographic collection and have catalogued all the objects on display. The archives will be next in line.

At present we are working on a book on Charlbury in World War I, using the material we researched for our exhibition in 2014 and information gathered since. Financial help for this has come from a West Oxfordshire Heritage grant and from Charlbury Town Council. All being well, the book should be available by Christmas.

My mother is now 90 and suffers from memory loss. My day is punctuated by helping her with daily life, which is made possible by the fact that she lives next door. She has her evening meal with us at 6pm, which gives regularity to our day. Our sons are now in their late 30s: David teaches music in East Sussex, while Ian lives and works in Hamburg, teaching English and running a business brewing real ale. And which of us – Paul or I – make the tea in the morning? We take it in strict rotation!

DEMENTIA Dementia Friendly Charlbury has got together with Charlbury Library to acquire various books that people might find helpful

on the subject of dementia.

These include fiction, such as Elizabeth is Missing by Emma Healey, memoirs like Ten Thousand Joys & Ten Thousand Sorrows by Olivia Ames Hoblitzelle and books offering practical guidance, such as Alzheimer's and Other Dementias by Harry Cayton.

Oxfordshire Libraries have also developed a range of resources designed to encourage reminiscence by elderly people and those suffering from memory loss. Reminiscence has proved an effective and enjoyable way of stimulating mental and social interaction and to help with communication difficulties. Reminiscence Boxes, Reminiscence Packs and Pictures to Share can be reserved and collected from any library and borrowed free for three weeks. Details can be found on the Oxfordshire Libraries webpages: www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/readingwell.

We also have links with the Home Library Service (HLS), who will select and deliver books, audio cassettes and CDs once a month to people in Charlbury who are unable to visit the library in person. Reminiscence resources are also available to borrow through this service.

A local user of the Home Library Service has told us: "The volunteers who deliver the service are all very friendly and helpful and come once a month. They bring me a selection of books that they think, from experience, I will like and I choose the ones I want. If I hear about a book I'd like to read, they will order it for me. You can keep a book for as long as you like without a fine, so long as nobody else is waiting for it. To anyone who can't get down to the library, I would recommend this excellent free service."

CHARLBURY CRICKET

The 2016 outdoor season has been an eventful one for us. The club organised two tours, including the first

ever overseas trip, a two week visit to Sri Lanka for a group of our ladies and girls.

Congratulations to Andrea Mayho and other parents for arranging the adventure and spreading the word about women's cricket at Charlbury CC to a different continent.

During the tour, the group were due to volunteer with the Foundation of Goodness community programme set up after the country's devastating 2004 tsunami. MCC President Roger Knight gave a warm sendoff message to the party, saying: "An overseas tour is a sign of a thriving club and I hope that the women's and girls' section at Charlbury CC goes from strength to strength."

We also ran our fourth consecutive preseason funfest tour, managed by Tom Eaton, this time to Nottingham.

Back at home our 1st team in the OCA have been showing their best form for

some years, competing for top place in the league's premier division, a definite stepup from recent battles to avoid relegation.

In one game, Ashley Rump scored a fantastic 196 not out in a team total of 274 -7. The 2nd team, though, have struggled in division five, while the 3rds have seen some fine performances from our youth players, including fine knocks from Alex Bush and Robert Jenkins.

The club also hosts a traditional evening limited overs tournament, the Ernie Clack knockout competition, and won it for the second year running with a comprehensive win in the final against Wolvercote.

The ground staff have had a busy season catering not just for all our league, women's and youth games but also for many county youth games, including the U11s finals as well as the upcoming women's midweek league finals.

The acquisition of a new cricket square roller has added to other recent improvements, including new sightscreens and roll-on covers. Echoing Mr Knight, we do seem to be going from strength to strength.

Even before the gates opened at midday on Saturday 25 June, queues of keen beer-drinkers were defying the weather – and soon afterwards the Culture Club tent was full of families eager to see an enchanting performance of songs by the choirs of Charlbury Primary School, led by Jennie Grierson. It was an inspiring way to start the day ... 'One world, one people, living together in harmony,' they sang. 'One world, one people, one family.'

After that the Culture tent was busy all day, even if sometimes the rain was so heavy that the speakers and other guests threatened to be drowned out (or even drowned).

After the choir, artist and cartographer Jane Tomlinson was in conversation with Nick Millea of the Bodleian Library's map department - Professor Simon Horobin of Oxford University talked about his book How English became English: A Short *History of a Global Language* – and this was followed by a 'From our own correspondent' session with journalists Kieran Cooke, Mark Gregory, Harriet O'Brien and Ali Ross. Senegalese musician Jali Fily Cissokho led a kora workshop, talking about the importance of his musical tradition in his country and demonstrating the kora's diverse styles. Afterwards there was a 'Meet the cider maker' session with Christine Elliott. Charlbury Youth Theatre rounded off the programme with an exuberant performance, 'Shakespeare or bust'.

Inevitably the poor weather had an adverse effect on the number of people attending, but we still raised a five-figure sum for good causes locally and in the developing world. We're also well ahead of the game for next year's event, which will take place on Saturday 24 June 2017. Put the date in your diaries!

Fourshires LETS Local Exchange Trading Scheme

I wanted to explain about the local, old fashioned barter system that is set up in this area called Fourshires LETS.

I joined LETS to "pay", in credits only, not money, for my neighbour's eggs. I then started to realise that I could do all sorts of ideas, i.e. I set up a project to do a photographic digital record of a large garden over 12 months, with a hard copy of the best shots at the end of the year for her to look at in the cold winter months.

So I earned credits each month, which I was able to "spend" on another members' delicious jams, marmalade and chutney.

When summer came along I "bought" cosmos, nicotiana, pansies, foxgloves, raspberry and strawberry plants for my garden. So no money is exchanged, as you just trade in credits.

I also bought, for credits, a bread maker from one member and this has helped transform our attempts at healthy living.

If you have anything you would like to "sell" you just post an email to the LETS group that goes out to about 50 members in the four shires around Charlbury.

I have found it invaluable for meeting other people in the area and tapping in to peoples' many skills and talents. It is very flexible and you can get help with any task on offer from any of the 50 members, like French or Japanese tuition, transport/lifts, cycle repairs, garden design and maintenance, help with IT and one member supplies her excellent horse manure, to list just a few!

What on earth are Death Cafés ? Find out soon!

The first Death Café was held in Hackney in 2011. Since then the idea has spread round the globe, and to date there have been more than 3,300 held in all sorts of places. The idea is very simple: at a Death Café people drink tea, eat cake and discuss death. Surprisingly, this can be a very positive experience! As the website (*www.deathcafe.com*) says – "the aim is to increase awareness of death to help people make the most of their (finite) lives".

There's going to be a **Death Café in** Charlbury on Monday 26th September, at 3.15 pm in the Garden Room, Memorial Hall.

Death Cafés are a kind of social franchise – anyone can organise one on the understanding that they follow the guiding principles. The main ones are that there should be no agenda, objectives or themes. It is a discussion group rather than a grief support or counselling session. In addition, Death Cafés are to be offered on a not for profit basis, held in an accessible, respectful and confidential space, and should have no intention of leading people to any conclusion, product or course of action.

The Death Cafes that I have been to around Oxfordshire have been enormously worthwhile – there's often a good deal of humour, as well as serious discussion. Far from there being awkward silences, in my experience there's been more to talk about than time has allowed.

The organisation OxBEL – Oxfordshire Befriending for Life, part of AgeUK Oxfordshire - has been promoting and organising Death Cafés in the county for several years. They will be involved in the one at Charlbury.

Charlbury Garden Society

Charlbury Garden Society is a society for all local people who are interested

in gardens, gardening, growing or learning how to do any of these things. Besides running three shows a year, we have a range of activities including talks by experts and enthusiasts, a Gardeners' Question Time, outings to gardens, a Harvest Supper, coffee mornings and plant sales. We have a special cup for the best cultivated allotment as well. We played a prominent part in the Flower festival in June. We like to beautify Charlbury by planting bulbs in public places and some of our members voluntarily manage the gardens of the Memorial Hall. We give donations to the School and the Playgroup to help them instil in children a love and understanding of plants and gardens. We run competitions for children in potato and sunflower growing. Our members get discount at some local garden centres. All this for a membership fee of (currently) £3.00.

As Charlbury changes, so the Society needs to change with it. The Garden Society (under its original name the Charlbury Horticultural Society) goes back well over a hundred years to the days of brass bands and to when the Annual Show was the climax of the growing year for both amateur and professional gardeners. Things are different now: gardens in new developments are the size of postage stamps, both parents work and have much less leisure time, garden centres sell plants in full flower with no need to know how to grow and nurture them, even though you are lucky if the flowers last a week after purchase.

Yet, the green impulse runs deep and is still there in most people. I know people who get huge pleasure from a couple of hanging baskets or a tub of tomatoes. When I walk around Charlbury, I see beauty in tiny places. Many people want to know more and learn how to do more. The Garden Society is full of people who really do want to pass on their experience to others.

If any of this strikes a chord with you,

please join. The Society's entry on the Social section of the Community pages on the Charlbury website give ten good reasons for joining and do have a look at our Facebook page. The Society is run by a dedicated committee but none of us are getting any younger. Like a lot of Charlbury societies, we need new blood and new ideas.

Our next major event is the **Annual Flower and Produce Show on 3 September** which is our local festival of growing. Don't be intimidated, put something in.

There are classes (divided by age group) for children aged from four to fourteen. For adults, cash prizes of up to £25 and 17 magnificent cups are to be won. There are special categories of entry for produce from a small garden, and for family contributions of vegetables, flowers and cookery. You do not have to be a member to exhibit, but membership has several advantages, including discounts at five local garden centres. The Schedule is on the website and available in the Pharmacy, the Corner House, the Station and elsewhere in the fortnight before the Show. Come along and have a look.

I'm biased, but I do think these things are important. Like Philip Larkin, I see the Show as a celebration of Craft and a reaffirmation of Community. His wonderful poem "Show Saturday" finishes with the end of the Show:

"as the dismantled Show Itself dies back into the area of work, Let it stay hidden there like strength, below Sales bills and swindling; something people do, Not noticing how time's rolling smithysmoke Shadows much greater gestures: something they share That breaks ancestrally each year into Regenerate union. Let it always be there."

Looking further ahead, there is a **Garden Society plant sale** at the Corner House on **22nd October**.

WWI News The Battle of the Somme

Over the last two months there have been many events to commemorate the first Battle of Somme which began on 1 July 1916 and lasted until the middle of November that year. It is perhaps the most well-known battle of the war, notorious for the number of men killed and wounded. Among those who fought during those long months were men from Charlbury, while a young nurse from the town helped to tend some of those who were terribly wounded in the fighting.

The men from Charlbury who died in the battle were

- Harry Pratley
- Wilfred Bryden
- Herbert Lainchbury
- Francis Bartholomew West
- Wilfred Howes
- Gordon Harrison

Herbert Lainchbury is pictured below. He volunteered for a post of danger, while his brother Billy won the Military Medal for rescuing a wounded officer.

The Lainchbury's owned the shop in Sheep Street, opposite the former News & Things premises. Wilfred Howes' father was a postman in Charlbury - his brother George won the DCM for gallantry just after Wilfred's death. Harry Pratley,

Wilfred Brvden and Wilfred Howes are remembered at the Thiepval Memorial in Picardy, northern France. This records the names of the more than 72.000 British servicemen who fell in the Battle of the Somme but who have no marked grave. Over 90% of them fell in the first battle in 1916.

Albert (Bert) Harbod (also pictured below) served as a stretcher-bearer in the battle. He joined the Oxon & Bucks Light Infantry in 1914 as a bugler. His job in the war was common to all buglers – he was a stretcher-bearer. By 1916 he had been promoted to Lance Corporal. After the terrible slaughter during the battle of the Somme, Bert was awarded the Military Medal for carrying wounded across open around between the lines on 23 July

following the British attack at Pozières.

He was injured three times during his service.

Nora Constable, whose parents were the proprietors of The Bell Hotel, Charlbury, served in the Queen Alexandra's

Imperial Military Nursing Service throughout the First World War.

In July 1916, she was nursing at No 1 General Hospital in Etretat, a seaside town close to Le Havre. Nora is mentioned in the Diaries of Edith Appleton (A Nurse at The Front – The First World War Diaries). During that period they worked together at No I Hospital in the summer and autumn of 1916. Nurse Constable would have nursed some of the badly injured soldiers from the first Battle of the Somme in July. Throughout the next four months she would have experienced the horrors of the Somme offensive, while she aided and cared for the casualties of war on the hospital wards. (All the details of Nora's war service records can be found in the National Archives at Kew).

Work is still going ahead on the book to commemorate the part which people from Charlbury played during the First World War. There will be stories of Charlbury soldiers and sailors, women's work in wartime and life on the Home Front. It will give a fascinating insight into Charlbury during the war years.

Let's be Proud of our Town

My wife and I moved to Charlbury 34 years and half a lifetime ago with our, then, young family and we have always been proud to be part of this great community. Many things have changed but Charlbury remains a wonderful vibrant town – let's keep it that way!

There are many things that make Charlbury special and many of them depend on the way in which our people are prepared to get involved. It's the efforts of local people that give us the range of clubs, societies, support groups and events that many a larger community would love to have. To mention just a few, think of Riverside, the Beer Festival, Street Fair, Art Society and Art Weeks, ChOC, CADS, Youth Theatre, Museum, Library, sports clubs (football, cricket, tennis, bowls and badminton), School Association, Pre-School, Day Centre and Meals-on-Wheels – I could go on and on.

But there is one more aspect that now needs more community support and that is the look of the streets and other areas in the town – weeds in the pavements, grass verges, dirty road signs and pot holes! It is not all bad news – with reduced verge cutting, the proliferation of wonderful wild flowers and the associated bio-diversity is a real bonus – but much more needs to be done.

Most of this work has been in the domain of the district and county councils but in these days of austerity this is changing and with the support of the Town Council I am proposing a three-pronged approach. Working with OCC and other authorities – The Town Council has established a working group to look into services which it may be able to take over, or be more actively involved with. The council will discuss this with OCC and other local authorities to see what assistance can be provided and how councils may sensibly be able to work together on this. As a result, it may be necessary for the Town Council to pay for some additional services.

Establishing a Charlbury Task

Force – many of the additional services could be carried out very well by volunteers who have a real interest in keeping the town looking great. For example, some verges could be managed as wild flower refuges or mini-nature reserves and this is much better done by local enthusiasts than by paid contractors. Also, a townwide day of volunteer action may well be the best way to tackle leaves on footpaths or snow on pavements. To make this a possibility I would like to encourage interested residents to come forward to form a task force, supported by the Town Council.

Encouraging residents to look after their own patch – at a more general level, if everyone took care of the areas around their own homes and in their vicinities rather than always assuming that "someone else will do it", the place would soon look very different.

The friendly demolition contractors managed to rescue the CTFSSC name board intact for us, which provides an additional incentive to make sure there are eventually new premises at which to display it.

We are very grateful for all the offers of help and support we have been receiving from Club members and non-members, including the Town Council with whom we are now meeting regularly via a designated joint working group. The group is helping us with constitutional improvements, including closer integration with the Charlbury Town Football Club, as part of our forward planning for grant applications. Joint working with the Gifford Trust is also ongoing.

Our fund-raising through events and donations is making progress in small but steady stages. Watch out for our stall full of child-friendly attractions at the Street Fair and our newly-launched crowdfunding site: go to *www.gofundme.com* and type *ctfssc new build* in the search facility on the home page. Charlbury Museum News

The Museum will be open until Sunday 25th September when it closes for the winter. So if you haven't been to see the current exhibitions yet, please do call in this month – they are well worth viewing. The first is on Charlbury Sports and Clubs and includes lots of photographs of past events. You may spot a younger and fitter version of yourself on the cricket pitch, playing football, tennis, bowls, or swimming.

The second exhibit follows the story of Bessie Marchant who lived in Gothic House in Church Street for many years until her death in 1941. She was a prolific writer of adventure novels featuring female heroines set in countries all over the world. Which is quite remarkable as she never travelled herself but researched meticulously about the countries she was describing.

The permanent exhibits have much to offer too. It is noticeable that many of our visitors are from outside Charlbury, some from as far away as New Zealand. They are always very complimentary about the displays so do pop in and see them for yourself, there is always something new to discover.

The Museum garden has been a real pleasure this year and was part of the Open Gardens event in June this year for Street Fair. Many thanks to Vi Welbourn who is the gardener behind the wonderful displays there throughout the seasons. You may have noticed a new addition to the garden this year – an original Great Western Railway gas lamp which formerly stood on Charlbury station. It was kindly donated to the museum and is painted in the GWR colours of cream and brown.

The Museum is open Saturday and August Friday mornings 10 – 12noon, Sunday afternoons 2.30 to 4.30pm, and Bank Holiday Monday 2.30 – 4.30 pm.

In addition, on Saturday 17th September we will be open all day for Street Fair from 10 am to 5 pm. Do come and visit us!



Southill solar (and more) – coming soon to a field near you!

Even if you're not an investor in Southill Community Energy, there will be much to enjoy once the solar

farm is built and matures. An early example of the joys to come - the result of its first year of not being ploughed, sown or treated with pesticides - was the blaze of red poppies in the field.

Less visible, the newly-planted hedgerow trees which have been growing since the Spring – hawthorn, blackthorn and field maple. In fact, they had been rendered almost invisible by super growth of bindweed which was definitely winning the battle who can grow fastest. Until the last Saturday in July when a small party of volunteers armed with long thick gloves and powerful arms dragged the bindweed down, revealed our whip trees, and left it to die.

Once the solar farm itself is built, orchards will be planted, and a wildflower meadow sown. Both of these will take some time to make a big difference – but watching the changes will be part of the fun. We're working with the Wychwood Project whose volunteers will be helping us to re-build the stone wall down the middle of the field, which is the parish boundary between Finstock and Fawler. Our beekeeper – Tom Worsley from Spelsbury – is lining up some beehives and swarms to go with them. You'll soon be able to put Southill Solar honey on your toast!

What about the solar farm itself? When will we actually see some activity?

We're in the very final stages of pulling together the £4.5m we need to make it happen. If we sign the many documents involved in the first week of August, we should be set for the contractor, Solar Century, to start work on site in the third week in August. They have a lot of preparation to do, and then the panels will arrive in September, with electricity generation commencing by 16^{th} October. All those who want to know specific dates will be informed as soon as we have final confirmation.

We've signed an agreement with Coop Energy to sell them all of our electricity.

In the meantime, there is a lot of 'rogue' wheat growing in the field – a hangover from the previous year's crop. This needs to be cut down where the panels, road, cable and transformer station are going. We're investigating whether it is possible in any way to use the wheat grain as bird food.

We're delighted at the number of local investors in the scheme and we held our first members' meeting in June. But even if you couldn't invest, the community as a whole will benefit from the scheme.

Our progress means that we will be able to provide the funding we promised to the Thomas Gifford Charity for the new library and sports hall to ensure that it has excellent energy performance and very low running costs. Indeed, the construction will start on site at pretty much the same time as our panels are being installed. A nice piece of synchronicity.

And there will be plenty of opportunities to get involved. If anyone wants to volunteer to help with the planting (and weeding), or to help organise educational visits, we would love to hear from you.

Refugees in need of homes and help

It's nearly a year since the first meeting in Charlbury about welcoming refugees. Over twenty people signed forms saying that they were willing to consider accommodating refugees, whether families or single people.

Sadly the forms were mislaid, so we don't know for sure who all those people were.

If you would like to know more about what options there are for hosting refugees, we have been putting information together. You will find most of it in the first item at *www.facebook.com/charlburyrefugee*. If you want to host a refugee, even just for a short while, several organisations can help, and they are listed there, together with information about refugees' rights and the benefits they are entitled to.

Refugees are evicted from their Home Office accommodation 28 days after being granted 'leave to remain' in the UK. If they can't find anywhere to live, they become homeless. In theory they can claim certain benefits, including housing benefit, register with a GP, and open a bank account (necessary for benefits to be paid into), but the latter can be a particular problem without a home address. They can also sign on at a Job Centre. All this needs pretty good English, or a translator, or a befriender.

'Full Community Sponsorship' is a new government scheme whereby charities, churches and CICs can sponsor and accommodate a particularly needy refugee family. It's the kind of thing a dedicated group of people might undertake, and it's important to read the information before getting too excited! Just type 'Full community sponsorship' into Google for full details on the official website.



There are also many practical ways you can help refugees without actually putting them up. Most are very keen to learn or improve their English, and will really appreciate either formal classes or opportunities for conversation. They are allowed to do paid work. Befrienders and translators are also needed, the latter mainly with tolerable (or fluent!) Arabic. Sharing social, sporting or cultural activities is also very valuable, as is giving lifts. Please get in touch if you would like to help in any way as more families and individuals arrive and their needs become apparent.

A top priority for refugees settling in the UK is a laptop. They need it for language learning, and also Skyping family at home. If you have a spare laptop, or tablet, let us know. It will be well used.

Churches Together in Charlbury

The aim of the Churches Together initiative is to grow in strength through people from different traditions finding new ways to work and worship together. In the June issue of The Chronicle, Rosalind Scott, CTC Secretary, described the work of Churches Together in Charlbury, supporting the extensive international scope of Christian Aid.

The total raised this year for work with refugees from Syria and Iraq and families in Bangladesh losing everything from flooding has now amounted to \pounds 4902.68. A further \pounds 252 has been raised for Charlbury Refugee Action Group's work for refugees.

This desire to work together in the most relevant ways was further exemplified by Churches Together in Charlbury supporting a local initiative and contributing to the setting up of four homes in the Witney area for newly arriving refugee families through the 'Adopt A Room' initiative. Luci Ashbourne of Witney Refugee Action Group writes,

'Thankfully homes have been secured... and with this collaborative effort it is looking as though we can furnish them in order to help make the transition as comfortable and welcoming as possible.'

Few who watched the excellent BBC programme 'Exodus: Our Journey to Europe' which followed the heartrendingly slow and tortuous progress of a few groups of individuals from war torn countries to Europe, will have failed to grasp the depth of the traumatic circumstances that has led to the displacement of millions of people and compels some of them to make such hazardous journeys to seek asylum. The majority of the Syrian refugees the Government has agreed to resettle are from UN camps in the Middle East.

CTC will be keeping informed through the Charlbury and Witney Refugee Action Groups (linked with Asylum Welcome and WODC); the newly developed programme of Churches Together in Britain and Ireland - Focus On Refugees, which has an emphasis on practical action; and the Government's new Community Sponsorship Scheme for refugees. We can all take individual responsibility for promoting the actions that are needed.

In Charlbury at the time of writing, the CTC Holiday Club will be looking forward to a fun week on the theme of 'Waste Watchers' at the beginning of August. With money raised they have chosen to support 'Melon Mission', a project in Nakura, Kenya, which began initially to support street children and is now working on building and equipping a school.

The CTC Street Fair stall, 'Home Grown and Home Made' on $17^{\rm th}$ September supports the Corner House and Memorial Hall.

The next United Service is for One World Week. This will be on 16th October, 9.45am, at St Mary's Church and will be followed by the CTC AGM where we hope to have a speaker to update us on the ongoing work with refugees coming to Witney. Sue Tokumine

Charlbury Town Council News

Town councillors 2016-2020

We are delighted to welcome two new councillors to Charlbury Town Council by co-option, filling the two seats that were left vacant after only 10 candidates were nominated for May's election. Natasha Ely and Gordon Clemson are our two new councillors, joining Kathy Broughton, Janet Burroughs, Richard Fairhurst, Peter Kenrick, Tony Merry, Phil Morgan, Nick Potter, Ron Prew, Robin Puttick and Liz Reason. Thank you to the other candidates who stood for co-option.

At the first meeting of the new Council, Peter Kenrick was re-elected as chairman for the year and Richard Fairhurst as vicechairman.

Bus services

The X9 bus to Chipping Norton and Witney is now operating to a revised timetable following the ending of subsidy by Oxfordshire County Council: see the summary timetable on **page 37 for** details, or find full times at bus stops or at *www.pulhamscoaches.com*. Though the bus is less frequent than before, there is still a good service and we are pleased Pulhams are making the effort to continue the service.

In order to minimise the number of buses/ drivers used, and to enable the buses to serve double duty as school services, please note that *two morning and two evening weekday services do not go through the town centre*. Instead, they run directly along Nine Acres Lane and the Slade.

20mph limit

Charlbury Town Council is in discussions with Oxfordshire County Council about implementing a 20mph speed limit in Charlbury, partly funded by contributions from recent housing developments. The roads that can be covered by the limit will be dictated by the Department for Transport's national guidelines. We hope to have more news soon.

Community facilities

The Town Council is working with the Sports & Social Club as they seek to find new premises for this important community facility: we have been holding joint monthly meetings to explore possibilities and discuss funding. We are also continuing our support for the Charlbury Community Centre project on the Spendlove site (see update elsewhere in this issue).

Inevitably, constrained budgets at County and District level and increased competition for third-party grants mean that some of the burden of funding these long overdue developments will fall on the Town Council. Charlbury's precept – the sum payable as part of your Council Tax – is currently lower than many nearby towns and villages: Charlbury Town Council receives £68.44 from your annual Council Tax (for a Band D home), compared to £91.84 for Chipping Norton, £96.31 for Leafield, £120.70 for Ascott, and £130.52 for Witney.

With this in mind, the Town Council has agreed to consider a precept rise of around £10 per year (for a Band D home) which could be used to support community facilities such as these; the resulting precept would still be considerably lower than the parishes mentioned above. We will only apply for such an increase if we believe that the result will be worthwhile for the town and we can demonstrate the support of the community. Work will continue through the summer on this: we will have more details when available in the next Chronicle and on the Charlbury website.

Grants

Any organisation that thinks it may need a grant from the Town Council for the financial year 2017/18 should obtain an application form from the Town Clerk and return it together with supporting documents by midday on 31st October.

Sorry, late applications cannot be considered. The Clerk can advise on what can, and cannot, be grant-aided under the Local Government Act.

Overhanging Branches and Untrimmed Minister Theresa May. I have met her on several occasions regarding major issues

After a strong growing season, these can be a real nuisance to people using our pavements and paths so please be considerate to others. Please cut back branches that overhang pavements and trim back hedges that are difficult to pass, especially for those with prams, mobility devices etc.

Joint statement from Oxfordshire County Council and Oxfordshire's district/city councils

With a new Prime Minister and new Secretary of State now in place and a number of pressing economic and policy issues to work through at national level, we recognise that it is sensible to take the time to understand how the government intends to take forward devolution and local government reorganisation in Oxfordshire and other areas before presenting further proposals for reforming public services and changes to council structures in the county.

Following discussions with civil servants, all the Oxfordshire councils have agreed to work together to discuss areas of common ground, assess potential options and establish whether we can agree a way forward building on the work we have both done to date. We have agreed to postpone publication of both the Grant Thornton and PwC studies, and pause plans for consultation until these plans have been jointly developed.

Our aim has always been to seek investment in housing and transport infrastructure; to improve skills training and develop the local economy. This investment is needed if we are to reach our potential, and therefore agreeing a way forward with government is a high priority for all of us.

No doubt everyone is aware that we have recently seen major changes to bus services across the county. In Charlbury, we have been lucky to retain the X9 service, albeit with a slightly reduced timetable.

Other areas have not been so fortunate, and many villages have lost their buses completely. So a group of us have decided to take matters into our own hands and set up a co-operative which we hope will be able to commission bus services across West Oxfordshire in future. This will protect existing services, and, we hope, bring back some of the services that have been cut. I approached the District Council for support in July, and they have agreed to grant us the money needed to set the cooperative up.

I am also delighted to report that I am working closely with officers to see if we can open a replacement for Dean Pit on the Enstone Airport site, just north of the A44. We are re-visiting the proposals that were put forward for Greystones several years ago, so plans would include re-use as well as recycling facilities. The owners of the Enstone Airport site have expressed their interest in this project, so we are now developing the financial model for a centre that would open three days a week and on bank holidays. I hope to have more news on this very soon.

Meanwhile, the Spendlove remains a big problem with a lot of cardboard and clothing being left outside bins that are too full to receive more. I do my best to ensure that it is cleared regularly, but please note that it is an offence to leave rubbish on the ground, as this is classed as fly-tipping. It's easy to book, with a pre-paid account that can be set up on the phone.

Who is it for?

Oxfordshire residents who don't have access to suitable public transport, wheelchair users or those with mobility issues. It can be booked by individuals, groups, schools or local organisations.

At your service

We can do one-off journeys, regular and group trips. We can also offer regular routes for local communities (similar to a bus route) that do not have access to existing public transport. The 16-seater vehicles are fully wheelchair and pushchair accessible, and our friendly drivers are only too happy to help. Just let us know if you need some extra assistance getting on or off the Comet, or with carrying shopping inside.

Register before you book

- call 01865 323201 to register and we'll create an account for you
- there is a one off registration fee of £3 and we will send you a membership card

How to book?

Once you've registered, book a trip by calling **01865 323201** (9am – 4.30pm Monday to Thursday and 9am-4pm on Friday).

Costs

We're charging passengers to cover running costs, not to make a profit, meaning we can keep prices to a minimum. Costs will vary based on the length of the journey and which travel option you choose. However for exclusive use, a 5 mile journey will cost from £7 and for shared travel, £3.50 for 5 miles.


Our annual Christmas card sale has outgrown its old premises and is now held in the Memorial Hall.

Big Apple Take-Aways

Autumn, the season of mists and mellow fruitfulness is fast approaching. Apples are swelling well on the trees, so please pencil in these dates for this year's Big Apple Take-Aways on the Playing Close at 2.30pm every other Sunday afternoon from September through to November.

- 6th November
- 20th November

Please contact 01608 811057 or sharecroppers@charlburygreenhub.org.uk if you have spare apples (or grapes, plums, pears, quinces and medlars) for picking to be given away free at these events throughout the autumn - we pick fruit from within an 8 mile radius from Charlbury.

Enormous thanks to everyone who offers their surplus fruit for picking and redistribution every year rather than see it wasted - we couldn't do this without your generosity.

The idea started in 2008, so this will be our 9th year. Last year we redistributed about 200 lbs plums and about 2 tonnes of apples - we had well over 30 different varieties, do you remember your favourites and when they were available?

The fruit is given away FREE and people take it for eating fresh, cooking, or freezing. Early season apples don't store well fresh and need eating or cooking straight away but varieties that ripen in October will store for several weeks, keep them in the salad draw in your fridge or in a cold garage - perforated plastic bags are good to stop russets shrivelling.

We also make Sharecroppers Gold cider from good windfall apples (20 lbs apples produce one gallon).

Last year we produced 10 barrels (60 gallons) most of which was given to Charlbury Beer Festival, Riverside Festival, and Wychwood Forest Fair to raise money for their causes.

Poor quality windfalls and residual pulp after juicing goes to local farm animals; windfalls are also stored in gardens to feed visiting birds during the winter.

Bring & Take

The next Bring & Take organised by Charlbury Green Hub will be on

Saturday 1st October

from 10am until 12 noon at the Memorial Hall.

You don't have to bring something in order to take something, so please pop-in to see if you fancy taking anything. Since items are given and taken FREE, please respect this community spirit by not taking things for resale or scrap value.

Leftovers are given to charities or freecycled. Bring along good quality items (that are not too large to carry) between 9.30am and 11am and take things away between 10am and 12 noon.

You can also bring along bikes - Back on Trax will be at the Spendlove for repairs. Bring along old spectacles and bras for reuse, and lightbulbs for recycling.

Also bring along reusable PAINT which needs to be in its original container and in usable quantities (more than one litre of emulsion paint and half a container of gloss and eggshell paints).

CHARLBURY NEIGHBOURHOOD FORUM

Committee members, along with a large team of volunteers from the community at large, are very pleased with the excellent response of the people of Charlbury to the recent questionnaire distributed to all households in the town. The views of Charlbury residents and information gathered from the well over 1000 completed forms returned, is currently being analysed by a professional data management team. This information will provide a broad sketch of the sort of community we are and a snap-shot of opinion, hopes and ideas of the people who make up the community of Charlbury. This information could well provide a sound basis for a plan for the medium term (20-30yrs) development of our town.

Charlbury Neighbourhood Forum was established over two years ago by Charlbury residents and community members in response to central government initiatives in local planning. The so-called 'Localism' initiative enabled communities to create a "Neighbourhood Plan" which, if accepted by a simple majority of voters in a referendum of community members, would by adopted by Local Planning Authorities and incorporated in official Local Planning policy. Access to government funding for the planning and creation of Neighbourhood Plans was made available and indeed, Charlbury Neighbourhood Forum (CNF) has successfully applied for and used this financial support in

conducting the Town Survey and in the data analysis currently under way. In addition to the main survey now completed, on-line (and hard-copy) surveys are available specifically for young people and the business community of Charlbury (links below).

Charlbury Town Council has fully supported the Neighbourhood Plan initiative and has been working closely with CNF in an advisory and consultative role. CNF is very pleased to receive the backing of our local elected representative body and the CNF committee includes several Councillors.

Our next steps are to assess the data gathered in the Town Survey, currently being processed, to identify the central thrust of community opinion emerging from the data and to devise a plan to be put forward to the community in a referendum. The referendum is a compulsory element of a Plan's adoption by Local Planning Authorities, in our case West Oxfordshire District Planning Authority.

CNF hopes to share this process with the community as much as possible and to this end we plan a public meeting to present the information gathered, receive comment and advice, and assess opinion in the community before going to actual Plan creation and referendum.


