#### The Friends of Charlbury Library

It may have seemed like a long wait for further news about the Library Volunteer scheme but, following a recent meeting with Jillian Southwell and James Hazlewood from Oxfordshire's Library service. we are now able to provide more details. Just to recap, from April 2015 paid hours in Oxfordshire's Community Libraries will be significantly reduced and the 'lost' hours made up, in most cases, by volunteers. During 2014 most of the Community Libraries will begin the process of recruiting, training and deploying volunteers. We have agreed a start date of August 1<sup>st</sup> for Charlbury with the three month training and induction period beginning on May 1st. The Library Service has produced a clear scheme and a set of accompanying documentation which has been put together with help and advice from other Friends' groups across the county, and with guidance from OCC's legal department. We propose to have an information session in the new year to explain the scheme and to encourage anyone interested to consider becoming a Library Volunteer. There will be a number of different types of opportunity available which we hope will appeal to a range of people. Anyone of fourteen and over is very welcome (with parental permission for Volunteers under sixteen). and there is no upper age limit! More news will follow in the next edition of the Charlbury Chronicle and on the Charlbury website. In the meantime anyone wishing to join the committee of the Friends of Charlbury Library to help to plan and implement this new scheme will be very welcome.

It hopes to celebrate the richness and diversity of those characters, and their stoical good humour, while at the same time offering glimpses into the gritty reality of the suffering they endured. 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# PATIENTS' FEEDBACK CRUCIAL TO DESIGN OF LOCAL HEALTH SERVICES

Oxfordshire Clinical Commissioning Group (OCCG) is calling on people from across the county to take the opportunity to have a say in how services at their local doctors' surgery, are delivered. Patient Participation Groups (PPGs) are groups of active volunteer patients who, via regular meetings with practice staff and GPs, provide feedback on the services offered and how improvements can be made for the benefit of all.

Gathering patients' perspective of services in this way allows GP practices to keep track of what works at the surgery and what doesn't. It also gives patients a channel through which to pass on comments and suggestions to OCCG about the other health services in their areas.

Jeremy Hutchins, a member of Goring and Woodcote Surgery's PPG, said: 'I have been actively involved in my patient group since it was formed in 2007. In the last two years we have worked together to achieve the following improvements:

Pairing of doctors to improve continuity of care for patients (i.e. if one doctor is not available then a known doctor in the pairing would see the patient).

Working to establish a self-care programme for minor ailments to free up more GP appointments for serious cases

Improved communications through regular contribution to the local newspapers and introducing digital information screens in the surgeries

Providing support for the production of a carers' information leaflet

I believe patients can make a difference to how health services are run, and would encourage anyone to enquire with their surgery on how to join their PPG'.

Professor Louise Wallace, OCCG's lay member for patient participation and engagement, said: "Patients must be at the heart of decision making about their care, and their views are important to shaping services for themselves and others. If you're interested in having a say in the way your local health services are delivered, getting involved with your practice's PPG is a great place to start. Not only can joining or starting a group help to shape the delivery of services, many members also find that volunteering is a great way to meet new people and develop your own skills, and it is good for health and well-being. To find out more, get in touch with the practice manager at your GP surgery'.

## Janet Shackle talks to Diana Potten about living in the Charlbury Vicarage in the 1940s and 1950s.

In 1939 at the beginning of the war my father, Thomas John Wood, usually known as Tod, was vicar of Clapham. He had been there since the late 1920s. We lived in the vicarage, which had three floors and a huge garden. My father at this time as well as being vicar was secretary of the Modern Churchman's Union. This had many progressive and influential churchmen as members such as Dean Inge of St. Paul's and Canon Carpenter of Westminster Abbey. Their aim was to bring about changes in the law, such as divorce law, and make them more suitable for the times. I was six when the war broke out and my mother and I went to stay with my grandmother in Worthing. My two elder brothers were at Prep School. Unfortunately my grandmother died suddenly of cancer and as it was becoming obvious that we could not stay in London, my father decided to take the living of Charlbury, which he had been offered by St. John's College.

The vicarage in Charlbury, built in 1870, then consisted of what is now the Old Vicarage. Queen Anne House and the Coach House. Even coming from our vicarage, we found the one in Charlbury huge. It consisted of a few big rooms, some with eighteen feet ceilings. There was a horrible kitchen with no windows. It had a stone floor and two of the slabs were tombstones. One was by the china cupboard and we always used to apologise to it when we went to get some china. There was a Rayburn for cooking that had to be kept alight. There was no electricity only gas lighting. The electricity was put in before we moved. You went out of the back door past a big storeroom to get to what is now Queen Anne House. Here was a large room, which was the Parish Room. It also had a dreadful kitchen with a stone floor! This was used by the WI for jam-making and tinning fruit. The machine that they used for this is with the Charlbury Society. On the next floor, there was a flat, which a couple from our Clapham parish had. Perhaps the overall impression of the whole house was how cold it was. The only warm rooms were the kitchen, where there was the Rayburn and the dining room, where there was a Courtier stove. The drawing room was an ice-box and only on Sundays was there a fire in there. My father had a little paraffin stove in his study and the confirmation classes all complained of the cold. If the 'phone went in there, none of us wanted to answer it. The bedrooms on had one bar electric fires, which were very inefficient. The vicarage had two large vegetable gardens one on land going down to the river at Queen Anne House and one where the new vicarage is now. Vic Merry's father used to come one day a week to look after these. It must have come as a shock to my mother coming to Charlbury. She had lived in Clapham all her life. When they arrived in Charlbury, there was a cook Nora at the vicarage and her sister did the housework and opened the door in the afternoons. They were very soon drafted to do war work and my mother had to cope with a huge house, where there was a constant flow of people, either staying or visiting.

I have very vivid memories of these people. There were two elderly cousins of my mother, who were there for two years. I was glad when they decided to move on and my mother's sister was able to bring my cousins, John and Sue down from Enfield after a wave of bombing or in the school holidays. We also had people billeted on us. Cornbury had been taken over by the army's Vehicle Repair Depot. It was the biggest in the country

and two women from the ATS came to live with us. I had to give up my bedroom to them and go and sleep in a tiny little dressing room. I did not mind because they were very wild and I thought they were wonderful. They let me use their make-up, which my mother did not like. They were often misbehaving and so got moved up to the "House of Correction" (!) in Sheep Street, just below Baldwin's shop. We then had two lovely girls Betty and Gladys. They used to drive these huge trucks all over the country at night, only using side lights. They were very brave. There was a constantly shifting population - many evacuees. There were the women from Ashford in Kent - they used to meet in the Parish Room and were dreaded. Although they arrived in an organised way, they began drifting back home. Some people just used to arrive haphazardly from London and my father would meet the trains or else look through his binoculars as the train came in to see if there were any new arrivals. He would bring them to the house and try with the billeting officer to get them placed. Often they would be in houses with no bathrooms and outside loos, so my father would organise a bath for them once a week. The kitchen in the Queen Anne part of the house was run as a NAAFI for the troops at Cornbury. We usually lost some fruit and vegetables, when they were around. The parish room was also used for parties held by such groups as the St. John's Ambulance and Boys' and Girls' Clubs. The Roman Catholic Church parties were something that people were very keen to go to. They were catered for by the cook, who worked for the Trees at Ditchley and always seemed to have food that no one else could get and was delicious. My father as well organised a film club that showed the pictures there. We enjoyed this as we were sometimes allowed to help choose the films.

When I first came to Charlbury I shared a governess with Julia Delmege at Queen's Own.. Her father taught us French and we used to go on nature walks with Margaret McCall but from the age of eight to ten and half I went as a weekly boarder to a school at Grove Farm. In 1944 this was closed as the teacher was deemed not to be doing proper war work. I then took five different school entrances as my mother could not make up her mind where I should go. Oxford High was favoured except for the travelling as there were no weekly boarding places at this time. I remember certain things of Charlbury at this time. The Morrises, who lived at Lee Place had cows and they used to give the Butlers, who lived at Ivy House, and ourselves a litre of milk a day. We had to go and get it through the side gate by the infant school. Charlie Morris was my father's churchwarden. He would ride down on his horse to see my father, walk straight in and shout for him. He always brought a present with him, Hugh and Diana, came to stay. During the war you had to register with a grocer and put your ration book there. We went to Bailey's in Church Street . Mr Sandals, the assistant, was called up and his wife took his place. She was a mathematical wizard and always knew how many points you needed for a tin of peaches or anything else. Things were weighed out for you in blue bags. My mother and Mr Bailey used to like talking about pre-war musical comedies in London and much to my mother's concern Mr Bailey paid no attention to the queues building up behind them. I was always having to run back for the things my mother had forgotten. There was a flat tomb on the path and my brothers and I used to put our shopping on it for a short while as an offering. Baldwin's in Sheep Street was the draper's. There were not many clothes available and coupons were needed. We all wore second hand clothes; jumpers were unpicked and the wool re-used. Shoes were a terrible problem. Chris Price ran the shoe shop and there was not much there. We wore sandals with the toes cut out.

In 1945 with the end of the war in Europe things changed. Suddenly all the London people disappeared and I found it lonely. My mother decided to get me a pony and that opened up a new world. I, however, had to start thinking about what I would do. I spent a year in Switzerland working and learning French. In 1954 I took a secretarial course in Oxford and worked in the Almoner's Office at the Wingfield Morris, now the Nuffield and I also had a job at Exeter College, working for the bursar. In 1957 I got married. My father stayed on in Charlbury but in 1962 he decided he should retire when the new houses were built in Hughes Close. It had always been a tenet of his working life that he should regularly visit everyone of his parishioners. He now did not feel that with so many that was possible. I will always have many memories to treasure of our time in Charlbury vicarage.

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#### **CHARLBURY TOWN COUNCIL REPORT, No. 68**

We have been following up on some of the issues raised at recent public meetings as well as holding the Town Council Annual Meeting, see the details below. All Town Council meetings are open to the public so you are welcome to attend to hear the discussions and reports from your Town, District & County Councillors.

The Town Council Annual Meeting took place on the 22<sup>nd</sup> May. Nick Potter was elected Chairman and Valou Pakenham-Walsh Vice Chairman for the 19<sup>th</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> successive terms of office. All the Town Councillors sit as independents. They are Kathy Broughton, Richard Fairhurst, Susie Finch, Willem Hackmann, Jim Holah, Reg James, Peter Kenrick, Tony Merry, Liz Reason and Russell Robson. You can contact them through the Town Council website, see how to contact us, at the end of the report. Appointments were made to Council Committees and other organisations. A full list can be obtained from the Town Clerk. The Council has now completed the first year of office, with a further three years ahead before the next elections.

<u>Parish Boundary Walk:</u> 5 May, Rogation Sunday. 14 walkers led by Harriet Baldwin completed this annual event. Our thanks go to Harriet, the walkers, Stewards, helpers and especially Maxine & Robert Hobill for lunch arrangements at Model Farm, Ditchley.

Grants for Financial Year 2014/15, any organisation that thinks it may need a grant from the Town Council for the financial year 2014/15 must obtain an application form from the Town Clerk and return it together with supporting documents by mid-day on 31 October. Late applications cannot be considered. The Clerk can advise on what can, and cannot, be grant aided under the Local Government Act.

Overhanging branches to pavements and weed growth: the promising spring growth is now fully grown into lush vegetation, so you are again requested to check your boundary hedge and cut back overhanging branches, making pavements easier to use. The weed spraying is now complete with different treatments used at a range of locations to allow comparison of their effectiveness. Has this made a difference for good or bad? Please let us know. A decision whether or not to repeat this next year will be taken later in the year.

<u>Walkers are Welcome</u> is a national initiative launched in 2007 to encourage towns & villages to be "welcoming to walkers". On 16 July, Charlbury became the first Walkers are Welcome town in Oxfordshire & the Eastern Cotswolds. Please see details on the website for how to be involved.

As we develop the plan we will be interested to hear from any residents who may be keen to be involved as part of a response team. Watch out for details.

<u>Local Government election</u>: Rodney Rose (Conservative) was elected to represent the Charlbury & Wychwood Division on Oxfordshire County Council and is the Deputy Leader of the County Council and the first elected member for the new division. Cllr. Rose lives in Milton under Wychwood and has attended Town Council meetings since his election.

<u>Dog fouling:</u> "Scoop it, Bag it, Bin it!" An unashamed repeat of the last report as this remains a constant nuisance reported by residents, caused by dog owners allowing their pets to foul the public areas of Charlbury. We'd like to feel he is still in spirit with us as the club continues to make use of one of the better summers of recent years, with a full programme of games and training for a full house of men and women's league and friendly cricket, along with a panoply of tots, kwik cricket, U11s, U13s and U15s boys' and girls' matches.

Up till the end of July, the club could celebrate some notable team victories as well as strong individual performances, including centuries from Ben Geeson-Brown, Ashley Rump and Josh Hornsby. All three senior OCA league teams are showing steady improvement on last year, the 1sts captained by Bimalka in division one, the 2nds skippered by Josh Hornsby in division four, and the 3rds led by Victoria Strode in division ten. 

#### A landmark season for The Charlbury Society

This season's series of Charlbury Society talks begins on Friday 11th October with a real coup: thanks to a little persuasion from the Society's president, Jennifer Bartlett, Richard Buckley from University of Leicester Archaeological Services will be leading off the programme with the inside story of how he and his colleagues were able to find the remains of King Richard III – "The king in the car park", as the papers said at the time.

We will be following this in subsequent months with a really fascinating and diverse selection of topics. In November, Dr Martin Parsons from the Research Centre for Evacuee & War Child Studies at Reading University will be talking about Second World War evacuees who came to north Oxfordshire – including Charlbury. For December's talk, we move to Russia, where Professor Catherine Merridale has been researching the history of the Kremlin for her latest book, while in January we come closer to home as Bill King looks at the Thames Path as it follows the river's course from source to sea

The sometimes eccentric behaviour of Oxford's town and gown since the 13th Century will be the focus of BBC broadcaster and tour guide Richard O. Smith's talk in February, then in March we take to the skies with a bird often seen swooping through our streets in summertime - the swift. Chris Mason of the Cherwell Swift Conservation Project will be showing a film and talking about the work being done to help stem the decline in swift numbers across our region (despite the apparent size of the flock in Hixet Wood). Finally, we are back to history in April, with veteran presenter John Hunt talking about Cromwell and the Civil War. Thanks to the Society's campaigning, Charlbury will soon have its first Blue Plague. The Oxfordshire Blue Plagues committee has agreed that Larcum Kendall – the 18th Century clock- and watch-maker who helped develop accurate marine chronometers - should indeed be recognised in this way. We will need to raise about £600 to pay for the plaque to be cast and installed at some stage next year in a position close to where the cottage stood where it is widely believed that Kendall lived as a child.

Finally, please remember that the Society is here for the benefit of everyone in town, and that all of our talks are open to members and visitors alike. Put the dates in your diary – 8 pm on the second Friday of each month from October to April. We look forward to seeing you.

#### SOLDIERS OF OXFORDSHIRE MUSEUM

In the run up to the opening of Oxfordshire's newest museum, The Soldiers of Oxfordshire are giving you a little taster of what you can expect to see in the new galleries. As of April 2013 SOFO have been showcasing some of their collection in the Object of the Month case at The Oxfordshire Museum at Woodstock.

From War Horses, Prisoners of War to the secret work of the FANY you can experience what the new museum will have on offer. June's objects tell of the contribution of the FANY in both world wars. The First Aid Nursing Yeomanry, always known as the FANY, was formed in 1907 as a corps of volunteer female nurses who would ride onto the battlefield to pick up wounded men and carry them to the Regimental Aid Post on horseback.

In World War I the FANY drove motor ambulances and organised privately-funded military hospitals, canteens and soup kitchens in Belgium and France. In the era of the Suffragettes the Corps attracted powerful and well-connected women and in spite of male opposition to women in the war zone, established a formidable reputation for determination, resourcefulness and bravery. Seventeen FANY were decorated with the Military Medal.

At the outset of World War II the FANY provided the instructors and the initial recruits to the Auxiliary Territorial Service (Womens') Motor Transport Companies. Later, under the leadership of a succession of dynamic commandants, the FANY also provided the administrative staff, drivers, wireless operators and cipher clerks for the secret training schools and radio stations of the Special Operations Executive in the United Kingdom and abroad. They were trained in SOE establishments in Oxfordshire and many served in three special wireless stations near Bicester handling traffic with agents in occupied Europe. A special detachment of the FANY supported the Polish Forces. Several FANY were sent as secret agents into France to serve as radio operators and couriers. Twelve died in concentration camps; three were awarded the George Cross.

Many women who later became distinguished in public life played their part as young servicewomen in the FANY involved in highly secret military operations. Today the FANY continues as an exclusively female part-time unit providing civil and military communications, language skills and drivers. The Commandant in Chief is HRH The Princess Royal and today the Corps is known as the FANY (The Princess Royal Volunteer Corps).

The museum is continuing its work behind the scenes on the galleries ready for the grand opening next year. 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
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#### **Report from County Councillor Rodney Rose:**

Work on our annual February Budget started early this year. Well, not quite true, as budget planning is always a longer term event than just one year for a "business" with a £600 million turnover on revenue alone. But the Spending Review from Chancellor Osborne has certainly sharpened both minds and pencils from its announcement on 26th June. We at the County Council have done well in supporting the national effort towards deficit reduction, and will have delivered/planned some £200 million savings between 2010 and 2017. But this has been by picking all the so called "low fruit", and every extra saving above this becomes more and more difficult. The June statement has added in the region of £51 million to the savings needed, and as yet we are not sure where they are to come from. And I stress this is on top of the savings we have yet to deliver to complete the £200M we have planned. We do have to look again at bus subsidies, library services, children's centres, recycling centres, etc. We do have to bear in mind that an overwhelming message on the doorsteps in May was for more spending on road maintenance, when the opposite is more likely. One option is cer-tainly to increase Council Tax, but 2% will not do it, and above that we require a refer-endum. I have no doubt we will try to find out your views, should this seem the only an-swer, with an explanation of the likely increase, and what the money would protect.

#### **Energy Choices**

When I bought the house in 1987, little did I realise how lucky it would be to have a south facing roof now I can take advantage of solar thermal tubes to heat our hot water and solar photo-voltaic panels to generate electricity. Any electricity we make is free to use as it is being made - any excess goes into the grid and our nearest neighbours will pay their supplier to use it (but it will be greener for them, not just because it is solar but because none will have been lost during long distance transmission). So I do the washing and ironing when the sun's shining and also use the computer and recharge the phone during daylight hours. I just have to be aware of how much we're generating and how much we're using. In hot weather it's lovely to have a refreshing shower at lunchtime and to have still more hot water for the evening. We've also recently changed our gas supplier from British Gas to Ecotricity who buy gas from renewable sources. I decided to dump British Gas when I heard they were going to be providing shale gas and I just couldn't support that. Gas is also a major fuel used in power stations to create electricity (see the UK Energy Watch real-time website), so no wonder the government is determined to have fracking in the UK. In July I saw the film "Drill Baby Drill" in Oxford - this was shown by Keith Taylor our Green MEP and was followed by Q&A with various experts. Reserves have been identified as close to us as Kidlington and Banbury. This threat to our local environment brings home the consequence of the "Dash for Gas" policy and the continuing high public demand for energy. Lifestyle habits established during years of cheap energy make it difficult to reduce overall demand, but it is possible to change our habits - reducing the temperature of the house by 1°C each year acclimatises you to lower household temperatures quite comfortably. I have done this over the years and now have the house at a background temperature of 14°C and use the wood burning stove to bring the sitting room up to a warm 18°C when we're sitting around not being active. 14°C might sound cold, but it really is no hardship when you're moving around the secret is conserving your body heat, several years ago I invested in wonderful merino wool underwear, sheepskin boots and woollen clothes, so I am always comfortably warm. Christine Flliott

We've been eating a vegetarian diet for many years, mainly because of the way most animals are reared and slaughtered, but more recently I've learned that a vegetarian diet is also carbon efficient and consumes a much smaller proportion of the earth's resources which is an extra incentive to avoid meat. Now I try to buy locally grown, seasonal foods and resist fruit and vegetables flown half way round the world. Our biggest direct energy-saving has been converting our shop, One Village in Woodstock, to LED lights. The electricity used has been reduced by 75% and now we are exploring options for installing solar panels. I'm delighted to see how many houses in our area have solar panels on the roof and I hope that the proposal for a community owned solar farm on the Cornbury Estate will prove viable. Perhaps if we all show we're taking climate change seriously, adjusting our lifestyles and committing our own money, politicians will realise that investing in renewable energy, efficient public transport and other energy saving measures is popular and vote winning.

# THAMES VALLEY POLICE ADVICE ON CRIME

There have been recent thefts of tools from vehicles in the Chipping Norton area

If you drive a works van and take it home at night with you, consider whether it would be feasible to take out any portable power tools when you arrive home.

Consider marking up the goods in your van to indicate that they belong to you or the company that you work for. By using a permanent marker pen to write the company's name and postcode on the casing of drills, the framework of ladders, and the shafts of hand tools - it makes them harder for an offender to sell on.

Ensure your vehicle is left secure at all times, even if left for a short period of time. Display signage on your vehicle stating that no tools are left in the vehicle over night.

Consider alarming the vehicle or fitting an internal security cage. Do not leave sat navs or other valuables in your vehicle.

Small change can also be a target, never leave coins on view.







#### JOHN STANLEY'S WEATHER REPORT

Following four months of below average temperatures, the trend continued into **May 2013**. The month started comparatively warm with temperatures reaching 69° on 6th and 7th. Then they dropped mainly into the 50s with a low of 47° on 24th – just one degree above the lowest recorded daytime temperature in May. Overall, the average maximum daytime temperature was 59.16° (24 year average 63.69°) and was the second coldest May in 25 years. At night, temperatures were in the range 33° to 51°.

It will come as no surprise that **Spring 2013** (March-May) was well below the 24 year average of 57.36°. With a very cold March seriously affecting the figure, Spring 2013 only achieved 51.35° and was by far the coldest in 25 years – the lowest was 1996 at 57.39°.

**June 2013** was the 6th consecutive month of below average temperatures. The average for the 1989 to 2012 period is 69.25° but 2013 did not reach this figure until 19th when the temperature shot up to 75°. The lowest day was 5th at just 60°. Overall, the daytime average was 65.90° (24 year average 69.25° and was, like May, was the second coldest June in 25 years – only 2012 was slightly cooler. At night, temperatures were in the range 42° to 59°.

Obviously, enough was enough, and the cold trend had to come to an end sometime. This was what happened in **July 2013**. The first four days were below average, but that all changed when the temperature reached 80° on 7th. After a short cooler period, we entered a period of 7 consecutive days in the 80s from 13th to 19th. Temperatures continued above average until 28th after which they did dip a little, The hottest days were 84° on 17th and 22nd and a total of 10 days with a temperature of 80° or higher was recorded. The overall daytime average maximum temperature was 75.58° – the 24 year average is 72.67°, It was the warmest July since the record breaking 78.94° in 2006. The coolest day was 62° on 2nd. At night, minimum temperatures were in the range 49° to 64°.

Anticipating the next report, the temperature rose to 85° on 1st August – the hottest day since since July 2006.

Community Solidarity: Two issues have emerged in the past few months that need some detailed explanation. The first is the recent decision by the District Council to implement a reduction in the level of Council tax relief. Apart from pensioners. war widows/wounded and the officially disabled, who are exempted, all of us will be required to contribute something towards the costs of running our district. The Council has selected the minimum amount prescribed by the Government overall Benefit reforms. In practical terms, those who at present receive a 100% council tax relief will be required to pay about £10 per month on Band D. There will be a full public consultation on this during the autumn. This decision could have been introduced this year, but it was decided to delay until 2014 so that people had time to adjust to the change. I feel that this very modest charge is fair and the broader shifts in overall Benefit reform have received a remarkably high level of support from the general public.

The second issue surrounds Greystones. This project begun by WODC to furnish the area with a modern recycling facility started with enormous enthusiasm and overwhelming public support. Planning permission was rapidly given and all seemed set fair. Since then there has been a string of issues that together have made the Grevstones project a potential financial problem. Negotiations with Chipping Norton for two small strips of land have proved intractable. The cost of recyclates has become more volatile with many categories of waste suffering from a rapid decline in value. The project has rapidly turned into a significant financial risk for WODC. It was a risk too severe in these times when central Government are seeking to reduce expenditure and are cutting grants and subsidies to all local councils. However all is not lost. I have secured a commitment from the WODC cabinet to instruct officers to continue to explore the options for providing an alternative waste recycling site for our area. I will continue to press for this over the next months. Do contact me if you have any questions or suggestions.

#### **Greystones plans shelved**

Regardless of having granted planning permission for the proposed Greystones recycling centre, and in spite of recognising the need. West Oxfordshire District Council's Cabinet have shelved plans because, they claim, the centre will run at a loss. The Cabinet's decision was based on prices for recvclates in May 2013, with no analysis of the historic performance of the market, or any future projections. No consideration was given to the different categories of waste that are likely to be taken to the facility, the prices of which vary guite considerably. Several councillors, including myself, gueried the figures used to make the case, and successfully called for this to be re-examined by the Finance and Management Overview & Scrutiny Committee at their meeting on July 17th. Sadly, instead of asking officers to re-examine the case for Grevstones, the committee "invited the Cabinet to explore alternative solutions for the provision of recycling facilities for the north of the District". In other words, the promised site at Greystones has been kicked into the long grass, by both the Cabinet and the scrutiny committee

Although it is the responsibility of the County Council to provide landfill sites, they are under no obligation to provide more than one site for the whole county. So the chances of them re-opening Dean Pit are very slim. I will nevertheless be continuing to work with officers to see what can be done. There are some excellent examples of recycling centres similar to the Greystones proposal in nearby Districts and I will be looking at how they are funded. Perhaps it is time for Charlbury, Chipping Norton and the surrounding villages to take matters into their own hands, and this is something that I hope may be considered as part of the town's Community Led Plan.

On a more cheerful note, the fantastic summer we have been having has meant a lot of people picnicking on the Mill Field so the rubbish bin gets full very quickly. I've agreed with West Oxfordshire that the bin will be emptied three times a week instead of once during the summer months, so that everyone can enjoy the lovely space when the sun shines in future.
