IMPORTANT UPDATE ABOUT CHARLBURY POST OFFICE

The Post Office has now updated us on Network Transformation of Charlbury and have issued the following statement on the future:

"Following the recent engagement ,and Charlbury branch being advertised on our website, we believe that providing Post Office services from an alternative retailer within the community is not an option at this point in time. On that basis I can confirm that you will be able to stay as you are, on your existing contract, for a period of at least 12 months from the date of this letter June 27 2015)."

This is welcome news, but we still need to show that Charlbury Post Office is well used and needed by the community. It is vital that the community uses our services where possible. We do far more than just posting mail - we issue car tax, banking for most accounts, foreign currency, travel insurance, National Express coach tickets, Health Lottery, and Post Office Savings Accounts to name only a few of the services we provide.

We have a review next June, so we have time to show that Charlbury in Post Office terms does 'have a long-term sustainable Post Office to serve the community'. Thanks to everyone who has shown their support over the last few very difficult months. A lot could happen in the next few months regarding the Post Office Network Transformation Programme, and we will try to keep everyone updated on the Charlbury website, in the Charlbury Chronicle, and in the shop.

We are participating in Street Fair this year and hope to see many of you then!

BEWARE BUTTON BATTERIES!

Chronicle reader Janet Crumpton has asked that the following item that she saw in a newspaper should be brought to our attention: "Wiltshire, being responsible for public health, had a display at County Hall which caught my attention. Button batteries are the small round batteries you find in toys and everyday appliances like calculators and remote controls. They can be extremely dangerous for children, and if swallowed can kill within a matter of hours.

Button batteries aren't just a choking risk. If a button battery gets stuck in the throat or gullet this can trigger the electrical charge they carry and create caustic soda (the chemical used to unblock drains!). This can burn a hole through the throat and lead to serious bleeding and death. I have now displayed a poster in the town highlighting the seriousness of such an accident.

ChOC NEWS AND PROGRAMME FOR AUTUMN

We are pleased to report that following completion of the building works in the Memorial Hall, ChOC's new electrically-operated screen* has been installed above the stage thus making the technical set up much easier for committee and helpers alike.

ChOC's film programme this autumn begins in September with Woman in Gold starring Helen Mirren, followed by The Imitation Game with Benedict Cumberbatch in October, and, in November, Dark Horse: The Incredible True Story of Dream Alliance. We are delighted that prior to the screening of Woman in Gold, and in association with Art Insights, Clare Carswell will a conduct a short Q&A session with Steve Mitchell, the scenic artist who painted the artworks used in the film. Steve has worked on a large number of features including, Elizabeth: The Golden Age, The Brothers Bloom, About A Boy, and Captain Corelli's Mandolin.

In the audience survey undertaken by ChOC earlier this year, over 80% of those who responded said they would prefer earlier start times during the darker months of the year. As such, films in November and January will start at 7pm, whilst the December film will be an afternoon matinee. Please note though the film in September will be screened at 7.30pm, the Q & A session beforehand will begin at 7pm.

CHARLBURY TOWN COUNCIL REPORT, No. 76

New chairman elected: The Chairman and Vice-Chairman are elected for the year at the council's Annual Meeting (not to be confused with the Annual Parish Meeting in the Memorial Hall!). At this year's meeting, held on May 20th, Peter Kenrick was elected as the new Chairman, stepping up from Vice-Chairman. Peter was first elected as a councillor in 2012 and will be well known to many in Charlbury as the Chairman of Street Fair until recently. Richard Fairhurst was elected as the new Vice-Chairman.

The meeting marked the end of an era for Charlbury Town Council, with Nick Potter stepping down as Chairman after 20 years. Nick has steered the council calmly through complex issues and sometimes turbulent times. Town Councillors receive no allowances (unlike at District and County level) or other payments, yet the Chairman's job is a particularly demanding and time-consuming one.

Incoming Chairman Peter Kenrick writes: "By any standards 20 years of dedicated service to the council, the town and the community in this role is an outstanding achievement. The Town Council unanimously voted their thanks to Nick and we hope that other members of the community will wish to echo This is perhaps an appropriate moment to recall just a few of the things that have happened in Charlbury during Nick's tenure as Town Council chairman: The Town Appraisal was published in 1996 and Nick led the council in working towards the implementation of many of its recommendations including the introduction of the railbus service. Three phases of high quality social affordable housing have been built in the town to meet the requirements of local people and the Town Council played a key role in facilitating this. Charlbury and neighbouring Cornbury Park have become established as festival venues with Riverside starting in 1995, the Beer Festival in 2003, Cornbury Festival in 2004 and now Wilderness Festival. Whilst these events are generally popular they bring challenges to the community and the Town Council has liaised closely with the event organisers to seek to minimise inconvenience, disruption and nuisance. The 750th anniversary of the Town Charter was celebrated in 2006 and Nick was able to arrange for the Princess Royal to visit the town and unveil a plaque outside the museum. The anniversary was also celebrated with the production and sale of a commemorative beer! Also, with Town Council support, the skate park has been installed at Ticknell Piece, a new pavilion has been built and new play equipment installed at Nine Acres and the War Memorial Hall has been extended and improved. Nick remains a member of the Town Council where his extensive knowledge and experience continue to be appreciated.."

By-election result: Tom Skelton has been elected as a new Town Councillor, following the by-election on 25th June caused by the resignation of Reg James. Congratulations to Tom and thank you also to Gordon Clemson who also stood for election. The whole council will be up for election in May 2016. If you think you could help make a difference to Charlbury – and particularly if you believe you could represent voices not heard on the Town Council at present – then please do consider standing. Details of how to stand will be in the Chronicle, the Town Council website and the Charlbury Website nearer the time.

Defibrillator: We are pleased to report that an emergency defibrillator has finally been installed outside the Medical Centre, following an anonymous donation made for the purpose via West Oxfordshire District Council. The installation has been an (at times exasperatingly) protracted process but we are delighted to see it in place. A defibrillator gives an electric shock so the heart can recover after cardiac arrest. Instructions for use are included with the device but we also hope to arrange training sessions. Thank you to the Medical Centre for their support and, of course, to our Town Clerk Roger Clarke for his persistence in getting this installed.

Wigwell lease: Another long-running issue has been the transfer of management of Wigwell (behind Nine Acres Lane/Close) to the Wychwood Project. Following the conclusion of negotiations (see previous *Chronicle*), the lease has now been formally handed over and a letter to neighbouring householders will be sent out shortly. If you would like to support the upkeep of Wigwell, please contact Peter Kenrick to find out

about the new Wigwell Friends group (01608 811021).

Boundary Walk: The Parish Boundary Walk took place on 10th May, Rogation Sunday. 15 people joined the walk, which was led by Councillors (and volunteer AONB wardens) Tony Merry and Harriet Baldwin. Thank you to Rob and Maxine Hobill at Model Farm for lunch, and to the landowners who permit access across their land for this annual event.

Applying for Town Council grants: Any organisation that thinks it may need a grant from the Town Council for the financial year 2015/16 should obtain an application form from the Town Clerk and return it together with supporting documents by midday on 31st October; late applications cannot be considered. The Clerk can advise on what can, and cannot, be grant-aided under the Local Government Act.

Planning applications Among the most significant of the Town Council's responsibilities is commenting on planning applications within the town. In the most recent period these have included significant applications at Rushy Bank, Little Lees, Ditchley Road, Southill Solar and the new Community Centre. The decision on whether to grant permission rests with West Oxfordshire District Council, but the Town Council is a statutory consultee and takes its responsibility very seriously.

You can sign up for alerts on planning applications on the WODC website, and they are also posted automatically to the Charlbury Website every Monday morning. If an application affects you, please consider cc:ing the Town Council on any comments that you send to WODC; an understanding of residents' views helps inform our response to the application. Our responses are decided at the Planning & Correspondence Meeting held on the Monday before the full council meeting; see the Town Council website for dates.

Town centre streets: The Town Council is discussing with Oxfordshire County Council (the highway authority), and event organisers, how to discourage unsuitable traffic from using central Charlbury as a through route. Vehicles have become stuck several times recently on the narrow streets, with the obvious inconvenience to residents and town centre businesses.

If you park your car on Browns Lane, you can do your bit by making sure you are parked close to the kerb and that your wing mirror is tucked in. Double-decker buses can and do get stuck when cars are protruding, on one recent occasion leading to a two-hour jam. Thank you.

Bus subsidies: Oxfordshire County Council has announced that it is planning to remove most or all bus subsidies. The withdrawal of subsidies would almost certainly lead to the cessation of the Railbus service and very possibly the downgrading of the X9 Witney/Chipping Norton bus. (The S3 to Oxford is unaffected.) Any changes will take effect in April 2016. Charlbury Town Council understands OCC's budget pressures, but believes that there are better ways of reducing the subsidy than the current proposals. In particular, we believe OCC should continue to support non-discretionary journeys (such as Charlbury people getting to work in Witney); consider the environmental and congestion effects of withdrawing buses; and institute a programme to help the busiest routes (such as the X9) move to fully commercial, unsubsidised operation.

If you are a bus user, please make your feelings known by commenting on the Oxfordshire County Council website at www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/stconsultation. The consultation is open until 14th September.

CHARLBURY WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

The Women's Institute continues to pop up in the news in this, their centenary year. From serving tea and cake at Glastonbury, to the screening of ITV's drama series 'Home Fires' about a fictional WI in rural Cheshire during wartime, to the possibility of the Duchess of Cambridge becoming a member, the WI has captured people's interest.

While best known for The Calendar Girls, the slow handclapping of Tony Blair at their AGM in 2000 and 'Jam and Jerusalem', it's not always recognised that the WI has a long history of campaigning on a wide range of issues that matter to women and their communities. At a time when it was considered unladylike to do so, the WI lobbied the government to provide more public health information about sexual disease when VD was prevalent among British troops during WWI. A Women's Institute report published in the 1940s about malnourished, unclean and sickly child evacuees prompted a national debate about the health of children living in poverty in urban Britain. Onwards to the 21st century and current campaigns include 'SOS for honey bees' (calling on the Government to increase funding for research into bee health) and 'Care not Custody' (appealing for an end to the inappropriate detention of people with mental health problems).

Back to matters on a local level and Charlbury WI have been busy marking the Wi's 100^{th} birthday. Following the centenary 'baton' passing through Oxfordshire in April, we've had members attend the Buckingham Palace garden party, watch the first live streaming of the AGM on a big screen at the WI's college, Denman, in Marcham, and visit the former toll house in Llanfairpwll on Anglesey, Wales where the very first WI meeting was held in 1915. In September we'll join the other 140 Oxfordshire WIs in a centenary celebration at Christ Church cathedral.

In June we had a promotional stall at the Beer Festival for the first time and, together with the Charlbury Yack & Yarn group, took part in a 'Worldwide Knit in Public' event alongside the farmers' market stalls on The Playing Close. We invited Chadlington and Spelsbury WIs along to a BBQ we hosted in July and went on a summer outing to see a play about the WI, 'Raising Agents', by the (narrow boat) travelling Mikron theatre group in August. We have been keeping busy!

Neighbourhood Watch - building on local community spirit

Neighbourhood Watch (NW) is about local people looking out for each other, especially the elderly and more vulnerable members of the community. It is all about self-help and mutual support – not "curtain-twitching". NW schemes are community initiatives owned and run by their members. They help people get to know their neighbours and work together as a group in order to make the neighbourhood a friendly and safe place in which to live.

NW aims to encourage people to develop closer links with each other, the police and other agencies to share information and address any local issues. NW schemes can:

Reduce opportunities for crime; Help and reassure those who live in the area by providing safety tips; Encourage good neighbourliness.

There are currently 2 Neighbourhood Watch schemes covering different parts of the town: one covering Hughes Close and the other covering an area around the junction of the Slade and the Enstone Road. The Hughes Close Neighbourhood and Community Watch (HCNCW) scheme is particularly active and combines efforts to provide a range of community safety information for local residents with lively social events such as a community lunch and coffee mornings.

The Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator covering our area and HCNCW have got together to organise a meeting on Wednesday, 9 September at 7.00 p.m. in the Anne Downer Room at the Corner House. CLERICAL WIVES IN CHARLBURY, 1693-1736

Findings of the Charlbury Society Historical Research Group No 6

Margaret Brabourne, Widow of Charlbury, died in 1736. In her will, in lieu of direct descendants, she left her assets to her sister Mary Allen and Mary's sons.

Margaret and Mary, daughters of the Saunders family of Eastleach Turville, had come to Charlbury in the 1690s. Margaret married the vicar John Browne in 1693, but he died in 1696. Undeterred, she acquired the advowson – the right to appoint a vicar – and presented the next incumbent, John Brabourne. She then promptly married him, thus retaining her new home and status. Margaret had one son by each husband.

Mary married the widowed Henry Allen, Charlbury's curate and schoolmaster, in 1698. Unlike the unfortunate first Mrs Allen, Mary would live to see three of her children grow up. The grammar school was in the present Old Manor House and Sunnyside; when not teaching, Henry Allen stepped across the churchyard to perform his clerical duties.

John Brabourne meanwhile spent his time pursuing academic honours in Oxford. By 1709 he was Principal of New Inn Hall, paving the way for his son John junior to become Vice-Principal in 1717. The diarist Thomas Hearne had little good to say of either: the father was 'a poor scholar' and a 'toper'; the son likewise 'a man of no learning' and 'an excessive drinker'.

Margaret's life in consequence may have been difficult. That her family were aware of the problem is clear from the wills of her mother (1703) and uncle (1719), both of whom made provision for her but ensured that John Brabourne could not benefit. At this time any property acquired by a married woman automatically belonged to her husband.

When the Rev. Brabourne died (in debt) in 1726, Margaret attempted to install their son at Charlbury vicarage. But the advowson reverted to St John's College and young John died shortly afterwards. Bereaved – her older son had also died – Margaret was nevertheless finally entitled to her inheritance and her independence. Mary was also widowed in 1732, Henry Allen having continued as schoolmaster until his death. It is tempting to imagine the two elderly sisters living quietly together in a cottage near the church, relieved of the pressures of being clerical wives.

AS WE HEAD TOWARDS AUTUMN THE FLU SEASON IS

ALMOST UPON US - Ben Sherwood, manager at The Midcounties Co-operative Pharmacy in Charlbury, explains why it is so important to protect yourself, vulnerable relatives and your community by getting vaccinated.

We're lucky to live in a country with a fantastic healthcare system, where all it takes is a quick trip to the GP or your local pharmacy to protect yourself by receiving a flu jab.

We strongly recommend thinking ahead and getting vaccinated before the cold weather comes. The flu jab is a quick, simple and generally painless injection. Some people worry that there might be side effects, but the worst you tend to get is a slightly sore arm, localised skin irritation or mild cold-like symptoms. It is impossible for the Flu jab to give you the flu as the viruses in the vaccine are inactive, not live.

To remain as protected as possible, you should get the flu jab every year, as the three strains contained in the vaccine change, depending on what is considered to pose the greatest risk in the UK at the time.

If you are over 65 or pregnant you will even be entitled to a free NHS vaccination, as you will if you have any of the following medical conditions:

Diabetes - Lung disease or severe asthma - Heart disease - Kidney disease Liver disease - Lowered immunity due to disease or treatment - Neurological disease Also if you are involved in caring for someone whose welfare may be at risk if you fall ill.

Those over 65 will need to get their free NHS flu jab at their GP surgery, but what many people don't realise is that everyone else has the option of going to their local pharmacy and getting vaccinated in a relaxed environment that is convenient to you. For those not entitled to a free NHS vaccine, **The Midcounties Co-operative Pharmacy** in Charlbury offers an inexpensive private flu jab service for just £10, with no appointment necessary. There is no reason not to have a flu jab this year. Get it early, get protected early and you can help prevent yourself, your loved ones and the community from being at risk.

John Hole - A Day's Life

I had a slow, lazy morning today (Monday) even though I got up a bit too early at 7am. It was Charlbury Beer festival on Saturday, and I am part of the Festival team. We bought up some barrels on one of Salter's steamers from Abingdon, offloaded them in Oxford, and bought them on to Charlbury. Even though this was hard work, it did bring Witney TV and the Oxford Mail on board.

As a teenager, I became an apprentice gas fitter, and in my spare time helped out at the Unity Theatre in Kings Cross, making the set for one of their plays. I was, and still am, a practical person. I sensed that I might enjoy working and being in the theatre. In my early 20s, I went to Sittingbourne College of Education to study for my Certificate in Education, and then became involved in drama seriously.

I worked as a drama teacher for 19 years in secondary schools. It was an enormous privilege to work with young people, especially sixth formers, with their huge amount of energy, commitment and belief. Subsequently I worked with Coral Arts, a community arts group, who worked with schools and community groups, liaising closely with local authorities, and so attracting private sponsorship. We were the first film crew to go inside the perimeter fence at Greenham Common once the US military had left. We wanted to celebrate the release of Greenham from the Cold War, with the local primary school children playing there, flying paper darts, kites, anything that flew. Another time, we did a carnival in Grove, then a place with no pubs, and only one community centre. The carnival theme was based round stories about Arthur Hitchcock, a chimney sweep, and his donkey, both local legends. We even went 'overseas', to the Isle of Wight, one of

the few times I've been seasick! I have worked with other community groups, such as Fusion on the Cowley Road, the Cowley Road Carnival, and with Pegasus Theatre, the Playhouse, and the Oxford Stage Company.

My last job was with Oxford Brookes, running their BA Combined Honours course in Performing Arts, Community and Education. Sadly, the BA course at Oxford Brookes no longer runs, as the university decided in 2011 it was no longer a good fit with their offer to prospective undergraduates. So 4 years ago, I was offered and accepted early retirement.

I was told, after a few months, to get out more! So I joined too many committees at once! Besides Street Fair and the Beer Festival, I'm a member of CADS, and have done a couple of productions with them. I am on the Council of Chipping Norton Theatre. It is almost unique in England for the range of work it puts on in a small provincial town, producing its own plays, including the Christmas Pantomime which is famous for its standard of production

And finally, I am co-chair of the Charlbury Neighbourhood Forum with Graham Terry. We are working very closely with Charlbury Town Council to develop two 'plans': the Neighbourhood Plan and the Community-Led Plan, either of which the town could adopt. The Neighbourhood Plan is concerned with building developments in the town, and gives people a small say in where any development should go. The Community-Led Plan is wider, and gives people the chance to say what they would like to see in the town in all its aspects.

And for relaxation? I am not a happy traveller, and don't like flying, whereas my wife Maureen would like to travel the world, and probably will with friends. However, we have bought a narrow boat, a 7metre Springer, made of very thin steel. As I said, I am a practical person, and so I am refitting it in Paddington, near to where our son and family live. I am enjoying this but it is hard work, especially as tools such a spirit level are not much use on a boat, which moves about a lot! So this is our adventure together.

I was very pleased when the plans for Southill Solar were approved in July. I was asked to talk about it at the recent Energising Oxfordshire conference organised by Low Carbon Hub. There was a great deal of excitement about it at the conference. I look forward to celebrating when the solar farm is built next year. Your district councillors are putting together a new plan for a Dean Pit replacement, working with WODC officers. We know that we cannot expect the County Council to provide this facility, and WODC were unable to progress Greystones because of difficulties over access. So we have to find a way of doing this ourselves, and together with the officers, have come up with some ideas that we hope might work. The new willingness of WODC to discuss this has come about because of concerns over the growth in fly-tipping. Until a few months ago items left outside the bins at bring sites have been classified as "side waste" and collected in the normal way. But now that officers have started to break out items left on the side, and classify them as fly-tipping, the level of the problem has been revealed. Given that the County Council has said that they may have to close more recycling centres, we need to find a new way of dealing with our waste, and we hope to come up with some new ideas very soon.

A40 - LTP4: This was discussed at a recent Cabinet meeting and plans for A40 improvements were accepted.

Consultation of HWRC: The main importance was to establish a strategy for Household Waste Centres, as this would make it possible for developers to contribute towards repairs and renovations to the Centres, and the hope is to have the strategy in place by the New Year. We also need savings in the order of £1.35m out of our HWRC so the consultation will also be seeking public views

Other consultation: The subject of supported bus routes is out to consultation until Sept 14 so local views would be appreciated on this. Also, a consultation will soon be starting on the Children's Hubs and Centres

As the newly elected councillor for Charlbury I am writing out of breath with the whirlwind of activity that faced me as a councillor. Sitting on the PI:anning Committee and having to deal with the Rushy Bank application, quickly followed by Little Lees, Ditchley Road and the Solar Farm, was not quite the baptism of fire I expected. The decisions made: the rejection of Rushy Bank (wrong location, adventurous project); the approval of the inspiring Solar Farm project and the deferrement of Little Lees for safety aspects and access to be reconsidered, all seemed on balance to be the right decisions. So, thanks for electing me, you have certainly kept me busy! Of further interest it was brought to my attention by the residents of Sturt Close the need to have the recreation ground behind their properties back into use with play equipment as the previous vandalism issues of some years ago had gone. Residents agreed to get their own working group together and a petition was organised and over 100 people signed to show their support. Cottsway Housing who own the land. Charlbury Town Council Chairman and Clerk, the Playing Fields Association. WODC and Liz Leffman came to a meeting to discuss possibilities. Despite the positivity, Cottsway are putting in a planning application to build affordable houses so we are working to see if the recreational needs of both current and future residents can be realised. Charlbury Youth Theatrte will be back at The Shed from September - on a Saturday morning 6-11 year olds and Wednesday evenings 11-18 year olds. 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
