

#### Charlbury Museum – At the Heart of Our Community

In 2024 Charlbury Museum celebrated 75 years of community service: collecting, archiving and preserving the town's history. From its humble beginnings in 1949 in an attic room of the Corner House, then later in 1962 the museum was offered a series of outbuildings attached to the Corner House. The community came together to support this inspired expansion, so protecting Charlbury's unique heritage for subsequent generations.

One of our Trustees, who worked in Botswana, recalls the words of the founding president of that country, who studied at Balliol College,Oxford:

'a nation without a past is a lost nation, and a people without a past is a people without a soul' Sir Seretse Khama 1970

The voluntary and transitory custodians of the museum have endeavoured over the years to preserve the soul of this small market town on the edge of the Cotswolds; telling the stories of the people, places and artefacts in our collection; creating connections for current residents and visitors with the history of our town.

A glance back at 2024 reflects the heartbeat of the museum, a valuable cultural asset in the centre of Charlbury. The exhibition 'Tradition & Tragedy' told the emotional story of the Beating the Bounds in 1924, inspiring a film produced by Alan Snelling and Rob Stepney, with music by Kath Lucas. The museum welcomed local visitors, and visiting tourists from: Australia, France, Germany, Greece, Netherlands, New Zealand, Middle East, South Africa, Spain, Switzerland, U.S.A., Ukraine.; on Street Fair Day a 100 visitors came to the museum! In August the museum's heritage walk was part of the Charlbury Festival. And academic research at St.

John's College, Oxford, has developed a fruitful relationship with their archive department, allowing 16<sup>th</sup> century documents to be photographed for our 2025 exhibition.

#### What is happening in 2025:

In January the museum commenced a new project which runs until June working with three school girls who are undertaking their Silver Duke of Edinburgh Awards. Engaging with young people is a key part of the museum's aspirations within the community.

Accreditation, an Arts Council England Museum Scheme: the journey towards accreditation status continues, this will put Charlbury Museum on a professional footing for the future. Together with a secure long term lease, the museum will be in a strong position to apply for grant funding which will offer exciting benefits for the community. In February 2025 the museum was pleased to participate in a Conservation Training Day given by our mentor, who has been appointed to guide the museum trustees through the Accreditation process.

**Exhibition 2025** will focus on the History of the Playing Close and will include a replica of a unique document held in St. John's College archives. New for 2025 is a fabulous collection of Bessie Marchant books displayed in a bookcase, donated by Andrew & Briony Lawson. The museum opens on **Saturday April 5**<sup>th</sup> at 10.30am – 12.30am.

**Fundraising events**: the museum has always been an active fundraiser in the town; in 2000 – 2005 the museum raised £35,000 - £40,000 with support from the Town Council, Corner House Committee, private donors and residents for the new Wagon Room, and museum room refurbishments. 2017- 18 saw the launch of the popular 'Vintage Fashion & Accessories Sale', a museum initiative in partnership with the Users Committee of the Corner House,  $\pounds4000 - \pounds5000$  was raised for the Corner House (next 'Vintage' fundraiser for museum is in August 2025)

The popular 'Plant Sale' fundraiser will be held on June 7 2025

We meet again in May when the subject of our lunchtime presentation will be relating to the Oxford Community Foundation from Ms Kate Parrinder who is their development officer.

New members are always welcome, and if you are not sure who we are and what we do, we are a group of local men and women who enjoy getting together once a month for a good lunch at reasonable prices and an interesting presentation on varied and diverse subjects. 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
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The Circle's year started well, with January's tasting presented by members Chris and Ant, both of whom are afficionados of Portuguese wines. From the twelve wine producing regions of Portugal, they selected six wines from just four of those regions; Alentejo, Setubal, Vinho Verde and, of course, Douro.

The first of the evening was a very enjoyable dry, fresh and light Azevedo from Vinho Verde, made from the Loureiro grape, with notes of fresh citrus.

As the first white was well received, the second was not greatly appreciated. This Douro Branco is a blend of Rabigato, Gouveio and Viosinho from the higher altitude slopes of the Cima Corgo and Douro Superior.

Most members did not recognise the promised lightly aromatic style and flavours of citrus and white fruit.

Moving on to the reds, we started with a very enjoyable Monte Velho from Alentejo, the largest of the wine producing areas.

An interesting blend of Aragones, Trincadeira, Touriga Nacional and Syrah grapes, it was full bodied with rich tastes of black fruits, herbs, mint and spices, yet with a moderate acidity.

We next tried two reds from Setubal, an area on the opposite side of the Tagus estuary, to the south of Lisbon. 200 Gallons Reserva is a juicy, fruity red, aged in a very special cask.

Produced from the Alicante Bouschet grape that oozes rich flavours of black cherry and pepper, it has a silky texture, although some were put off by a slight fragrance and taste of tobacco.

Baia De Troia Castelao produced from the Castelao grape had a rich, smooth and

velvety black fruit taste with aromas of blackberry, raspberry and spice. All in all a wonderful creation with 14.5% abv and worth every penny of the £13.99 price.

Our last of the evening was *Baronessa De Vilar Port Finish Reserva*, a gorgeous, rich red from the 15th-generation winemaking van Zeller family, who have been crafting fine ports in Douro since 1715 - and now sumptuous dry reds, too. Using a trio of Douro grapes, aged in old port barrels, this is brimful of spicy fruit and was very well received. A wonderful wine on which to finish.

Our thanks to Chris and Ant for searching out such a wonderful selection and for presenting them so well.

By the time you read this, our February meeting will have taken place and it will surely not have disappointed our membership.

We have been fortunate to arrange a return visit by Peter Tompkins from Goedhuis Waddesdon Ltd.

When Peter last came to Charlbury, members of the Circle were rewarded with both an incredible tasting and unbelievable prices for all wines tasted that evening.

We look forward to return visits by Oli Gauntlett from Eynsham Cellars on 17 March and Marcus Thornton from Haynes, Hanson and Clarke in Stow on the Wold on 14 April.

Guests and new members are always welcome but we do ask you to notify us in advance.



#### Stories tall but true

#### Charlbury's anti-vaxxers and a littleknown Hitler portrayed on stage

Though vaccination has mostly been voluntary, in the late nineteenth it was not. And in 1897 Charlbury was an unlikely battleground between those who favoured heavy-handed implementation of the government's smallpox prevention strategy and champions of choice.

The dispute also involved social class since the "anti-vaxxers" were ordinary working men and women pitted against the local medical and legal establishment.

Those who refused to vaccinate their children were fined. Failure to pay led to the confiscation of household goods, an attempted auction on the Playing Close, and a riot which risked serious injury.

The men accused of leading the protest were charged with violent disorder and escaped prison thanks only to an openminded judge who concluded their objections were based on conscience not conspiracy.

Premiered in the Memorial Hall in January before transferring to Oxford's Burton Taylor Theatre, *An Innocuous Prick* – directed by Tim Crisp and written by Ian Cox, who also played Harold Frumpage, journalist and narrator – told this intriguing tale well, and with gusto. It is a complicated story to convey in 45 minutes, but the play puts nuanced arguments in the mouths of believable characters. Paddy Hitler, the companion piece in this double-bill, plays out on a far wider geopolitical stage and tells the true-life story of Adolf Hitler's nephew -- born in 1911 to an Irish woman, Bridget, and Alois, half-brother of the Führer. So Paddy is part amiably Irish, part kin to the most hated man in history. The play opens with him as an old man living comfortably on Long Island, grappling with a past "as slippery as a basket of eels".

He recalls a childhood growing up in poverty in Liverpool, then time spent in 1930s Berlin where Paddy experiences the excitement of being at history's high table, but also the sinister smell of the Gestapo who governed access to his uncle.

Moving to New York, being a close relative of Adolf brought Paddy a dubious celebrity, and recruitment by MI6 to spread distrust of Germany.

The sustained monologue, delivered with considerable humour, makes great demands of Kieran Cooke, who also wrote the play.

But this is a virtuoso performance (deftly directed by Stuart Parker), aided by the effective use of Nick Parker's sound effects and a few props, notably a mannequin representing Paddy's father – dandy, deceiver and ultimately bigamist. But does Paddy's tale too have an element of fantasy?



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#### **Cotswold Line Promotion Group**

With the continuing unreliability of the service, it is hard to shout out in support of GWR but it has to be said that the problems are largely not of their making.

With the finances of Great Western and Network Rail being controlled by the Department for Transport and ultimately the Treasury, there is little chance of early release of funds to enable the train operator to acquire more trains to increase capacity or for Network Rail to eliminate any of the single track sections of our line and, in so doing, reduce delays.

The recent formation by the government of the shadow Great British Railways (GBRTT) is likely to have considerable impact at some stage, as more of the train operators' franchises are brought in house.

The next, regular face to face meeting between the CLPG committee and the senior members of the GWR team will take place in Moreton in Marsh as the Spring edition of the *Charlbury Chronicle* is published. A report of the meeting will be made in the Summer edition.

With this year being the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the inauguration of the Stockton and Darlington Railway and, with that, the start of the country's modern railway network, it is fitting that nationwide commemorations will be held under the banner of *RAILWAY 200.* 

Rather than arrange a carnival-like family fun day, CLPG is arranging something very different – a competitive, educational project open to secondary school and academy students in Oxfordshire, Gloucestershire, Worcestershire and Herefordshire.

They will explore the use of STEM subjects by railway companies today and also look decades into the future. Great Western Railway, Network Rail and the Railway Industry Association are collaborating with us in this project.

This is hoped will open the minds of the participants to science, technology, engineering and mathematics in our railways and the considerable number and variety of highly paid jobs in the wider railway industry, both in this country and abroad. There will be some very interesting prizes too.

#### Corner House to close down



The Corner House is set to become warmer and more comfortable thanks to the installation of secondary glazing to all the sash windows.

There is heat loss through the aged single-glaze windows and some of them don't fit very well and are draughty.

But the glass in some windows has appealing uneven characteristics of hand made glazing. On this prominent listed building, there is reluctance to permit exchange of those windows for the uniformity of modern double or tripleglaze units.

Instead, the solution here seems to be to retain what we have and add secondary glazing inside. That idea is not without criticism because secondary glazing can be unattractive and awkward to use. Secondary glazed units often need removal in the summer months so windows can be opened. And UPVC frames? Definitely not here!

None of those negatives will apply to the Corner House because the trustees have identified a unique and extremely neat system which is hardly noticeable – and where sashes open and close without fuss just like new windows.

To achieve smooth operation, the first step is to remove each window from its frame and put it thorough comprehensive renovation. That includes, where necessary, the fitting of new sash weights and other components.

There are ten sash windows on the ground and first floors of the Corner House and every one of them is to receive this treatment.

This is a big project and will take about a month to complete. Several windows will be removed simultaneously, and the former kitchen is to be transformed into a carpentry workshop where the significant work will take place.

The trustees are confident the results will be appreciated in better working windows, free from draughts, easy to open and close, of course insulated, and – importantly – very good-looking.

This is an expensive project costing over £30,000 which is entirely paid for by grants from Sustainable Charlbury (profits from Charlbury solar farm), plus CPRE Oxfordshire Buildings Preservation Trust. Many thanks to both of those for their generous support.

It will not be realistic to use the Corner House whilst all this disruption is going on. As well as windows missing, there will be unacceptable safety issues if public are in the building. Therefore, except for the Art Room, Corner House will close for about four weeks expected to be towards the end of March and the first weeks of April.

Cornerstone's important contribution to the life of Charlbury cannot close for such a long period. That project will temporarily relocate to the Garden Room at the Memorial Hall where it will continue with as little disruption as possible. The room will be closed from the main hall and access will be from the terrace on the left side of the hall.

Those activities which usually happen in the Garden Room will continue instead in the Green Room at the back of the hall.

Some inconvenience but a change of surroundings often inspires renewal, and the expectation is that new life to the windows will make the whole interlude very worthwhile when done

# Sustainable Charlbury

# Reducing carbon, restoring nature

Sustainable Charlbury (also known as SusCha) has a new website! It's brighter, fresher and more friendly than the original, with graphics showing images of a Charlbury-like townscape, rolling hills, trees and solar panels in a palette of greens, yellows and orange.

The site was built by Me3, a locally-based web development company. We think they did a great job and we've been busy populating it with case studies of projects we've supported and a news section.

Over the last few years, SusCha has awarded £120,000 worth of grants to more than forty local community and environment projects. We expect a minimum annual income of around £30,000 to invest in new grants for projects that reduce carbon emissions and/or support nature recovery in coming years.

Funding comes from surpluses generated by Southill solar farm, located just outside Charlbury, which is community owned and run.

The new site aims to make it as easy as possible for local groups to file grant applications. At the same time, we've streamlined our application process to make the form more user-friendly, easy to understand and fill in. Me3 have also designed us a new logo.

Recent grant awards include:

• £31,000 to pay for secondary

glazing at The Corner House, a community facility donated to the town soon after the second world war. This is the largest single grant we've ever made and forms part of a long-term commitment to help renovate the listed, historic building.

- £2,000 for a 'whole building plan' identifying ways of improving energy efficiency at Charlbury Primary School.
- £1,400 for insulating the ceiling, frost heaters and other energy efficiency improvements at Charlbury Scout Hut. This brings our total funding for the scouts to £3,400 and has already led to a £500 a year saving in the hut's electricity bill.

SusCha paid half the cost of staging the successful launch event /tea party for the town council's Charlbury Year of Nature Recovery on 11<sup>th</sup> January, which drew a large crowd to the Memorial Hall to discuss ways of increasing biodiversity and supporting local nature.

#### Charlbury Arts Save the dates! Noye's Fludde Performances 2025 Saturday, April 5th 3pm and 7pm, Sunday April 6th 3pm

Today the sun is shining after weeks of rain, there are flooded, muddy fields and big puddles everywhere. Hopefully we are in for a dry spell, otherwise we could be flooded.....

In April 2025 we really will have a flood!

There will be three productions of Noye's Fludde in St Mary's Church, Charlbury and preparations are starting now!

Benjamin Britten's Noye's Fludde is a community opera, first performed in 1958 at the Aldeburgh Festival.

It was written for mainly amateur performers, particularly children, in local settings such as churches and halls and is based on a Chester Miracle Play.

The Chester Miracle Plays were written in the 14th century by ordinary people for performance by craftsmen, tradesmen and their families.

The story of Noah and the flood, the third play in the Chester cycle, was originally performed by the Drawers of Dee (the water carriers). The last recorded performance in Chester was in 1575 until the mystery plays were revived in the 1950s.

The Charlbury production will be delivered by The Oxford Concert Party, started more than 30 years ago by Arne Richards and Isabel Knowland who are well known in Charlbury for their music making. Noye's Fludde is a final celebratory project after many community concerts and workshops making music accessible to all.

The production will be conducted by Ben Goodall, Musical Director of the Chipping Norton Choral Society and other adult and youth choirs and directed by Pat Winslow. Pat has worked for twelve years in theatre and is a writer and storyteller. The overall aim is for local youngsters to have great fun providing an amazing spectacle for the enjoyment of all.

The performances will be preceded by the Oxford Concert Party playing a short selection of their repertoire - music from Ireland, Scotland, France, Eastern Europe plus tangos from Argentina.

The chorus of fifty animals will be local children, Noye and his wife will be adult singers and teenagers will play Noye's sons, their wives and Mrs Noye's Gossips.

# CRAG

On the last Saturday of January, nearly 250 people packed the Memorial Hall for this year's CRAG Gala Concert and were royally entertained by The King's Singers. Renowned for their unrivalled technique, musicianship and versatility, this six-strong 'a capella' group ran through a varied selection of songs from their extensive repertoire in a programme entitled 'Close Harmony'. It included traditional folk songs, Rossini's Overture to the Barber of Seville as well as hits by Gershwin, The Beach Boys and the Beatles.

Many of the innovative arrangements were by former Charlbury resident and King's Singer Bob Chilcott, who also attended the concert.

Huge thanks to our local sponsors and everyone who participated and volunteered to make this an extraordinary community event. As a result of everyone's generosity the concert raised over £8,000! This was preceded by a sell-out performance from Roderick Williams and Susie Allan in December which raised another £4,000. And, despite the arctic temperatures, we raised further funds from our annual January Bring and Buy.

Which all means we've recently been able to make substantial donations to Medical Aid for Palestinians (MAP) as well as our seven partner charities: Safe Passage, Refugee Community Kitchen, Care4Calais, Asylum Welcome, Collective Aid, The Hope Project and Refugee Resource.

#### **Repeat Prescriptions**

By the time this edition of The Chronicle has been circulated, the changes whereby patients are no longer able to telephone CMC for repeat prescriptions will have been in force for more than a month. CPPG has posted information on the Charlbury website, but please contact us via the e-mail at the bottom of the page if this is causing you difficulties.

#### Surveys:

**CMC Survey**: A survey was handed out to patients at the last vaccination clinic and was also available at reception. 107 responses were received and the overall satisfaction with the services provided were high with 55 ticking 'excellent' and 46 ticking 'good', 5 'fair' and 1 'poor'.

#### **Minor Injuries Units**

For minor injuries it is best to contact 111 who will advise on the most appropriate facility to attend. There are minor injuries units (MIUs) at Moreton in the Marsh and Witney. It is worth noting that MIUs are not able to X-ray hips, pelvises, backs, spines, faces, or ribs. Out of hours service (after 7:00pm and at weekends ) is also available at MIUs but patients **must** ring 111 to make an appointment.

#### **Blister Pack Recycling**

Some pharmacies (Boots, Superdrug) offer this service. CPPG are looking into providing a local collection service to reduce waste from these products and possibly raise money for charity.

#### **Breast Screening**

The Breast Screening mobile unit will be at CMC for a few months. Women patients automatically eligible for screening ( ie. those between the ages of 50 and their 71<sup>st</sup> birthday) will be contacted by letter by the Breast Screening Service. Women patients of 71 and over who want to request a screening appointment should phone 01865 235621

At a time when many pubs are closing around the country, Charlbury is lucky to have no less than four thriving public houses. Occupying a prominent site on the corner of Church and Market Streets, the Rose & Crown has always played a central role in the life of the town. In her *History of Charlbury* Lois Hey says that the first written record of the pub is in the deeds of the local Barclays Bank in 1688. So it has been at the heart of our community for over 330 years.

Little is known of the early years of the pub. From the mid-16<sup>th</sup> century, every keeper of an alehouse or inn was required to enter into a bond (or recognizance) usually to the value of  $\pm 10$ , binding him to keep an orderly house upon forfeit of the money. The bond was in effect a licence. From 1753 full registers of these licensed victuallers had to be kept and these are a great resource for discovering who ran the local alehouses and inns. The first recorded licence holder of the Rose & Crown was Nicholas Wrenford who ran the pub from 1753-56. His will survives, showing that he also owned the White Hart: it seems he was a man of substance. Jackson's Oxford Journal, also founded in 1753, was a popular place for businesses to advertise and is another rich source of local information on the local pubs.

The Rose & Crown premises once occupied a larger plot than it does now, stretching further along the north side of Church Street. It offered accommodation for travellers, stables for their horses and carriages for hire. Pubs were not only places to buy liquor and share a drink with your neighbours: being the largest public buildings in the town, they were used for many public events. These could range from sales of horses to inquests into sudden deaths, to auctions of furniture and other household goods.

The Rose & Crown was a convenient place to hold meetings: in 1892 farmers came together there to discuss how to increase their stock now the railway had expanded offering them new markets. It often provided food and drink for big gatherings. In 1872 a troop of the Oxfordshire Yeomanry put on an exhibition of drill in Cornbury Park after which they retired to the Rose & Crown for a good dinner provided by landlord Percival Kench. The Heyford Hunt were active in the area and in 1883 held their annual dinner for gamekeepers and earthstoppers there in what sounds like a very jolly affair. 50 people sat down to the meal which was followed by toasts and lusty singing. The pub also organised the catering at outside events such as the cricket match between the Forest Club and a Chipping Norton side in June 1856 where they provided food for the obligatory cricket tea.

And who would have thought that you could see a dentist at the Rosie! Mr Lukyn, 'Dentist to Oxford University', toured the area in the 1830s holding surgeries in various towns including Charlbury. You'll see from his advert (below) that in 1833 he was offering dental appointments at The [Rose &] Crown on 3<sup>rd</sup> August and 2<sup>nd</sup> September from 4 o'clock . You might well have needed a stiff drink after that visit.

It also provided the venue for more sombre events such as inquests into sudden deaths. In 1855 there was an inquest into the death of the infant child of James Farmer the hairdresser, and a harrowing case from 1880 tells of a young child who drank from a kettle of boiling water leading to his death the same day. And in 1898 a long inquest was held there after the apparent suicide of the wife of George Forest who was the landlord of the pub at Oxford House (Glovers Arms) in Market Street.

Pubs changed hands frequently and publicans often moved from one Charlbury pub to another. In 1783 John Clary, publican at The Royal Oak, left and took over at the Rose & Crown. Thomas Buscott bought the Rose & Crown from him in 1794 and 'laid in an Assortment of the best Wines and excellent Liquors'. It seems he did not plan to run it himself as

by May the next year it was up for sale or let, having 'undergone a thorough Repair'. Publicans then brewed their own beer and the pub is advertised as being 'worth the attention of a Person who understands Brewing, there being every Convenience erected for that Purpose'. Women could hold licences too: in 1797 Mary Weston took on the Rose & Crown's licence when her husband John died and she ran the pub for three years.

Towards the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century big breweries often stepped in to run previously free houses and this happened to the Rose & Crown who were taken over by Clinch & Co of Witney. In September 1905 a fire broke out in the premises of a watchmaker in Church Street on land belonging to and adjacent to the pub. Clinch & Co took the opportunity to demolish the old pub and rebuild on the same site with a smaller footprint.

A purpose-built Post Office (now No5 Market Street) was added into the space between the pub and Lukers shop (now the Deli).

The pub today carries on its long tradition of providing a friendly venue where the community meets. It holds an annual beer festival, groups meet there for pleasure and for business and it takes an active part in events such as the Charlbury Festival. Here friendships are forged, creative projects are hatched, music is made and games played. Those who run it take an active interest in the welfare of their regulars and many people have reason to thank them for their care and concern. A big thank you to Nikki and her staff for carrying on the pub's centuries-old tradition as the lively hub of our community.



#### **Churches Together in Charlbury**

Churches Together in Charlbury has been arranging a series of public talks in Lent since 2010. In the first series, on the theme 'Art and Faith', the Rt Rev Richard Harries, former bishop of Oxford, was one of the speakers. He introduced us to the work of a Christian artist, Roger Wagner, who depicts scenes from the life of Christ in modern settings. This year we are delighted that Roger himself will talking about his dramatic paintings in our Lent series 'Images of Jesus in art and poetry'.

In this series we will focus on the person of Jesus, using pictures and poetic imagery to enhance and expand our understanding of his life, ministry and message. Art and poetry can speak to us in ways that no amount of preaching and teaching ever could. Talks will take place on Tuesday evenings from 11 March to 8 April at 7.30 pm in St Mary's Parish Church.

Everyone is welcome. Admission is free but donations will be welcome to cover expenses and to support Christian Aid's work in the Middle East.

Another opportunity to reflect on the Christian faith from a new perspective takes place on Friday 7 March at 11am when a service will be held for the World Day of Prayer in St Mary's. This year the service has been prepared by women in the Cook Islands and will give us an insight into their lives, the way they celebrate and the challenges they face. Again everyone is welcome.

But Lent isn't all quiet reflection. On Fridays from 14 March to 4 April people

from the five churches in Charlbury will be busy preparing delicious soups for lunch. A meal of soup, bread and cheese will be offered in one of the churches each Friday between 12 and 1.30 pm. Come and meet friends and get to know new people. There is no fixed charge but donations are requested which will be given to support Christian Aid's work in the Middle East and other troubled areas of the world.

Lent finishes on Good Friday which this vear is on 18 April. Good Friday is a public holiday but it is also a holy day when we remember that Jesus faced the worst the world could do to him and died a painful death. We will be 'Walking the Way of the Cross', stopping at each of the five local churches where there will be a reading and hymn to remember his suffering and the way he prayed for forgiveness for those who treated him so cruelly. We will be starting by the fountain on the Playing Close at 10 am, walking round the town centre and finishing at the Methodist Church for refreshments. Jesus showed compassion - which literally means to 'suffer with or alongside' - and we will also be remembering people suffering in the world today and seeking ways to show compassion towards them.

All these events will be listed on Charlbury.info and publicised in the local churches. They are open to everyone – please come and join in.

Dementia Oxfordshire also operate a dementia support line staffed by Dementia Advisers. This is available 9am – 5pm, Monday to Friday on 01865 410 210 to provide advice and guidance on dementia to everyone, including relatives, carers, and health care professionals.

Dementia Oxfordshire's website, www.dementiaoxfordshire.org.uk has a section "Next steps after a diagnosis" which includes a useful Post-Diagnosis Dementia Checklist. This covers all the key financial, care and planning-for-thefuture issues, which people living with dementia and their carers need to deal with.

Dementia Oxfordshire's website is a useful resource, which provides information on dementia and support services available and also events including dementia information sessions.

There are information sessions for informal carers and for people who have recently received a dementia diagnosis. Dementia awareness sessions can also be delivered to local organisations and businesses.

There are online sharing sessions for people living with dementia. The sessions aim to give people the

opportunity to meet others sharing the same journey, to learn positively about dementia and to swap practical tips and advice about living well and retaining independence. The sessions take place online on the 4th Wednesday of each month, from 1pm-2pm. For more information and to register for a session, contact Dementia Oxfordshire at education@dementiaoxfordshire.org.uk

There are also sharing sessions for carers who have access to Zoom – Care2Share. These sessions are facilitated by Dementia Advisers and are aimed at providing an opportunity for carers to share their thoughts, feelings and experiences with those in a similar position.


#### School Year Off to a Flying Start.

#### Charlbury Town Council Update: Recent Work and Community Highlights

As we step into 2025, Charlbury Town Council is continuing its efforts to support our community, preserve our environment, and enhance the town's facilities. Here's a roundup of some key activities and decisions that have been taken recently:

#### **Improving Our Local Environment**

The recently launched **Year of Nature Recovery** initiative, started with a well-attended event in January. Please see the article specifically on the Tea Party for more information on the day, including the visual minutes, kindly funded by Sustainable Charlbury. Residents are already forming networks to share ideas and take part in projects. If you'd like



to get involved, visit the Nature Recovery page on the council's website for updates. We're kicking off monthly coffee catchups at the Community Centre on the **first Saturday of every month at 11am**. It's just an hour to chat about ideas, share progress, and swap stories about nature (and maybe your Big Garden Birdwatch sightings ). Mark your calendars

The council has also approved an exciting new river restoration project for the Mill Field. This initiative aims to improve water quality, enhance biodiversity, and restore the river's natural flow dynamics—all while making it more enjoyable for canoeists and walkers. Stay tuned as the project develops!

#### **Progress on Parking and Transport**

Parking in Charlbury remains a hot topic. The council has worked closely with Oxfordshire County Council on the recent parking scheme consultation. Alongside this, the council is advocating for adjustments to the Spendlove car park to increase capacity. Efforts are also being made to ensure that any parking changes align with the Neighbourhood Plan and support local businesses.

#### **Enhancing Community Amenities**

The Nine Acres Recreation Ground has seen several updates recently, including the installation of a new swing and repairs to the tractor steering wheel at the playground. The council also gave the green light for resurfacing the rear tennis courts, with fundraising now underway to bring this project to life.

Meanwhile, the Five Ways bus shelter will stay in place following feedback from residents who value it. The council is committed to maintaining and cleaning the shelter for ongoing use.



The Blavatnik School in Oxford was the venue on January 31<sup>st</sup> for the Oxfordshire and the Midlands Rail Conference, where we launched a new brochure for the North Cotswold Line, outlining the business case for dualling the line and improving the signalling at the Worcestershire end. The case is supported by GWR and I am hoping that following on from Rachel Reeves' announcement of plans for the Oxford to Cambridge "silicone valley" the case for our line will be given serious consideration, as so many people travel into Oxford and beyond for work.

The new parking arrangements in Charlbury will be coming in shortly, and I am aware that this will add to pressure on the parking at the station. I have been in discussion with GWR about extending the parking there and they have looked at the possibility of a second storey on the main car park, but have rejected this as too expensive – it was estimated to cost around £4 million.

An alternative which was to utilise some of the space at the cricket club was being considered by the Town Council but as that land floods easily that idea has also been rejected. I will continue to look with the Town Council and GWR at options for extending parking at the station.

Devolution and local government reorganisation have been the subject of a

lot of discussion recently. A meeting was held on January 31<sup>st</sup> (yes, the same day as the rail conference so I was dashing between them!) between leaders in Oxfordshire and Berkshire, at which Swindon was also present.

Buckinghamshire was invited but did not attend. The conclusion of the meeting was that we should progress with a plan for an Oxfordshire/Berkshire mayoral combined authority which would reach the governments stipulated minimum population of 1.5 million.

The government is also requiring all twotier local authorities like Oxfordshire to become unitary authorities within this parliament. We have written to government asking to be on the fast track for this as we believe that to delay would only add to the uncertainty that the staff of our councils will undoubtedly feel.

This means that soon West Oxfordshire District Council will cease to exist quite soon and be absorbed into an Oxfordshire unitary authority. The things that WODC is responsible for, such as bin collections and planning, will come under that new authority, but it is likely that we will follow the model of other unitaries and ensure that planning, for example, is undertaken by a local subcommittee.

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The ATIC contribution for this edition of the Chronicle comes from the view point of both a user of the services provided and one of the volunteer drivers.

#### A volunteer's view

"I have been an ATIC volunteer driver since the scheme started, prompted by needs which became apparent from responses to the Charlbury Town Survey in 2016.

We are lucky to have Volunteer Link Up, VLU, who operate from the Methodist Centre in Witney and who act as a call centre to match requests for assistance with those people available to help. VLU have long experience of running their own Good Neighbour Scheme service in Witney and areas of West Oxfordshire not otherwise covered by a local service like ATIC's in Charlbury The staff manning the VLU office are a delight to work with.

As a volunteer you make yourself available at times that suit you, so as not to disrupt other commitments you may have or regular social engagements. Charlbury has about 7 or 8 volunteer drivers. I may be called upon to help someone perhaps once or twice a week, or maybe nothing for 3 weeks - very variable. VLU are quite clear, when they phone with a request, that there is no obligation to say Yes, unless you want to.

Other ATIC volunteers are available as befrienders, where someone would like a regular visit and a chat or other activity, such as a walk, with arrangements made to suit both parties

As a driver I find it very rewarding to assist taking a client for a hospital or clinic appointment, or an essential shopping trip. Usually it is because there is no family or friend available to help and having a friendly travelling companion takes some stress out of the situation for the client. We are also lucky, as registered drivers, to have some parking privileges at the major hospitals. This means that I can drop patients off at the main entrance and subsequently find a parking place at leisure (at the Oxford NHS hospitals there are some special spaces reserved for us). There are also some occasions when I need to accompany the client to the actual department, which means that, for a short time, I can park directly outside the entrance.

Parking at the major hospitals is quite a headache for most people as spaces are so limited. It often causes anxiety about making the appointment on time. I would advise people driving themselves to hospital appointments to make use of the special hospital bus service which runs from the Water Eaton Park and Ride just south of Kidlington. This service has drop off and pick up points at the JR, the Churchill and the Nuffield hospitals. Leave plenty of time; it eases the journey and you are not stuck in traffic fretting.

One further point: I find it helpful to check that patients have appointment confirmations with them before we set off, either paper or digitally. The administration system at the hospitals has sometimes let people down."

#### A client's view

"I have used the ATIC service many times over the last few years for hospital appointments and physiotherapist appointments in Oxford, Banbury and Chipping Norton.

I have found the service excellent from speaking to the call-centre for booking help and the brilliant team of volunteers who drive you. It is lovely to have someone to chat to on the journey who is local. Thank you all so much"



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#### OXFORDSHIRE LOWLAND SEARCH and RESCUE ORGANISATION

Do you know that this Organisation exists?

Are you responsible for a vulnerable person who is liable to wander off and you lose track of them? If you do have such a responsibility, I suggest you would benefit from knowing what **LRO** could do for you.

This is my experience. I was caring for my wife who had dementia. We were going for our daily walk; distracted for a couple of minutes and Trish was gone. I walked all our usual footpaths for several hours and could find no sign.

Eventually in desperation I called 999 and was immediately put through to the missing person's department; details were taken over the phone and an alert put out. My concern was that Trish had taken to one of the many Charlbury footpaths way out of sight of a passing policeman and at a time of the year when not many other walkers were about; could she have fallen, could she have wandered off track, could she have......?

Little did I know the resources that my 999 call would bring into action. Within less than an hour a policeman was sitting with me in our flat taking more information and constantly on his radio.

I did wonder who he was talking to. I have since learned, from a talk given to Probus by David Woodgate of the **Oxfordshire Lowland Search and Rescue Organisation** that 999 missing person calls are automatically linked to **LRO**, a charitable public service. There are 70 operational **LRO** volunteers across the county who form search teams, backed up by 40 non-operational volunteers. These volunteers are professionally trained to national standards and operate 24/7 365 days a year. They have at their disposal, sniffer dogs, drones including heat seeking drones in case someone has fallen out of sight, under water search facilities, fully digitised mapping—all the technology available to us in this-day-and-age. Had I known this I would have called 999 much earlier and saved myself hours of anguish.

I do not know what **LRO** resources were called into play but within an hour or so of my 999 call and 5 hours after 'disappearing' Trish was brought home in a patrol car by two policemen having been found on the A44 by Judds Garage. She had walked there but by what route I will never know.

I was duly admonished for sending police to pick her up while I sat at home watching TV!! A walk down to the Rose & Crown and half a pint later brought things back to normal!!

A follow up call from the 999 missingperson's department introduced me to "The Herbert Protocol", 'a form that carers, family or friends of a vulnerable person can fill in'. The form provides a list of information to help police (and the LRO) should your loved one go missing. The form includes questions on the persons appearance, information including medication, normal haunts and other details which may expedite a search.

If I had known of **LRO** I could have saved myself hours of anguish.

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
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
