## Charlbury Museum News A new acquisition.....and a new commission:

Charlbury Museum holds a unique collection which celebrates the history of the town through diverse artefacts, memorabilia and photographs of the past.

It is vital to keep the collection vibrant and to reflect aspects of life in Charlbury in the 21<sup>st</sup> century by adding contemporary pieces to the museum's extensive assemblage of objects.

While browsing the recent exhibition of Jody O'Reilly's prints in the Charlbury Deli, our eyes were drawn to one of her lino-prints: 'Charlbury Egg Throw'.

The annual tradition of egg throwing held in Church Street celebrates the start of the famous Charlbury Street Fair; Jody's print captures the spirit of this fun evening, with detailed depictions of the crowds and the street scene.

The museum is delighted with our first purchase of a work by a local artist and we look forward to adding more contemporary artwork to the collection.

Museums around the country frequently commission artists and craftspeople to make a modern piece for a specific setting. Charlbury Museum is no exception, the committee have recently commissioned local stone carver Ben Williams to create a stone sign for a wall in the museum garden.

This hand-carved sign will have a particular poignancy: it is in memory of Jennifer Bartlett (1935 – 2020), she was special friend of the museum and her donations continue to enrich the historic collections. Ben is currently working on this commission and we hope to have it installed before Christmas.

Looking to the future the museum is excited about entering a fresh phase in its long history (1949), as it raises its profile for modern times to become a C.I.O.( charitable incorporated organisation). We look forward to achieving this important stage, we are also working towards achieving Accreditation status in 2023. The museum is grateful for the work done by additional volunteers, and members of the Charlbury Society committee in helping with this important stepping-stone in the life of Charlbury Museum.

As a CIO the museum will become independent of the Charlbury Society but the aim is to continue the close ties that have been forged over the years.

# CHARLBURY REFUGEE ACTION GROUP

Thank you to everyone for the recent donations of clothing, tents, blankets etc for another bumper collection of items for refugees: warm clothing, footwear, blankets, sleeping bags, tents, and more. We offered a selection of the best quality items for Ukrainians guests. Many thanks to the Baptist Church (where English lessons for Ukrainians are held too) for providing the space, and for their hospitality. There are currently 21 Ukrainian guests that we know of living in Charlbury and the surrounding villages. Our WhatsApp group for hosts and potential hosts is still active, offering support and information. We've set up a contingency fund to help with the cost of items needed for quests, some of which has been used to buy whiteboards and other materials needed for the English language lessons being offered in Charlbury. Many other local offers of help to guests have also been given, including free treatments, haircuts, yoga classes, fitness memberships, and art sessions. In addition to the Ukraine work, CRAG is mindful of the plight of the millions of other refugees around the world, and continues to support the vital work of charities at borders. The rest of the donated items are being sent to the charity Care4Calais, which distributes donated items to refugees in the Calais area and also now to some who have arrived in this country. This will be the second CRAG shipment this year, after St Mary's Church adopted the theme of Refugees for their Harvest Festival, resulting in a large number of donations. As always, Charlburians have been extraordinarily generous and CRAG is enormously grateful for all this help.

Looking ahead, we're pleased to take part in this year's Christmas Tree festival at St Mary's again, and please keep hold of surplus Christmas presents for the return of CRAG's January Bring & Buy sale. We also have three more wonderful Sunday tea concerts lined up for this winter season: at 3pm on Sunday 4th December, Sunday 5th February and Sunday 5th March. If you haven't been to one before, it really is a lovely way to spend a Sunday afternoon, with top notch performances by world class musicians followed by tea and cake. ### An Expedition to Kyrgyzstan

There's nothing quite like summiting a mountain. The world around me shrank in the ascent, scaled down to focus on the sharp pinch of cold air in my lungs, the snugness of three pairs of socks in my walking boots, and the width of the steady track that flanked the mountain. By the time my dad and I reached the top, our pace had slowed considerably.

Our family is pretty outdoorsy, but dog walking around the rolling hills of the Cotswolds hadn't quite trained me well enough to comfortably hike up Tryfan without losing my breath.

It's this love of the outdoors that first inspired me to look into joining an international expedition in the summer. I'd been on expeditions before, English ones with Scouts and Chippy school as part of DofE.

I knew that spending a prolonged amount of time working in a team in an unfamiliar, wild environment would be the biggest challenge I've ever attempted.

Truthfully, I didn't expect to get onto the expedition that I applied to; a five-week British Exploring Society expedition to Kyrgyzstan, so receiving a place offer was amazing!

The experience promises to be lifechanging, not least because it will be the furthest from home that I've ever been.

During the expedition, we'll have the chance to work on various science and media projects in collaboration with research organisations. I'll also have the opportunity to meet the nomadic Kyrgyz herders, who are kindly hosting our base camp in their pastures, and gain a deeper understanding of their culture.

As part of the journey leading up to the expedition, I've committed to fundraising £4000 for the BES to support and encourage disadvantaged young people

to participate in expeditions like this one. The British Exploring Society is a charity set up in 1932 to support young people develop the "skills, resilience and determination to make lasting positive decisions in their own lives and to deliver community benefit and positive environmental change".



They've been running

expeditions since 1932, all of which focus on allowing young people independence in experiencing adventure and learning in remote places.

# Charlbury Christmas Trees—an update for 2022 season

The good news is that we will be opening this year to sell Christmas trees. We will be open weekends in December as advertised from 9am to 4pm. We hope that you will add your annual visit to Charlbury Christmas Trees to your diary.

For this Christmas, we still have plenty of trees 7/8 foot and above to choose from and to have cut. However, our younger trees, and there are plenty of them, have still not made quite enough growth to be cut this year. This means that, as in 2021, we do not have sufficient trees growing up to 6/7 foot that we can cut.

For Christmas 2021, we made the decision to open. This involved us being able to meet the demand for trees up to 6/7 feet high. We did this by sourcing pre-cut trees from a well-known and well-respected supplier with whom we had a long-standing relationship. For Christmas 2022, we have reviewed our 2021 operation. Our aim each year has been to be enable us to open as we know that a visit to Charlbury Christmas Trees has become an integral part in the run up to

Christmas for many families. But we are also aware that we need to make the best offer possible for our customers and that a key criterion for our customers will be the freshness of the trees bought.

For this year we have done further research. And we believe that we have found the solution that will allow us to provide trees that we can guarantee are very freshly cut, nearly as freshly cut as ours.

We have made contact with a Christmas tree grower in the Vale of Evesham who has agreed to supply us. We have visited the grower and have been shown his trees. Not only will he supply us, but he has agreed that we can visit during the week prior to each of our opening weekends to select and cut trees to sell.

So we will be open this season and will have trees of all heights for sale. We hope that you will pay us a visit. You can enjoy your annual wander around the plantation and view the trees we have for sale and hopefully you will find the tree that you want to take home.

## **Charlbury Beer & Wine Circle**



September saw our AGM, at which there was a resumé of the year's tastings, visits and other social events.

An increase in membership and healthy finances suggest we are set fair for the year ahead, without any increase to the annual subscription of £10 and the tasting fee of £5. Ant Horn, Graham Jowett and Brian Murray were re-elected as Chair, Treasurer and Secretary respectively, promising another year of varied tastings and events.

True to style, the AGM was over in just 30 minutes and we were able to move from business to socialising and tasting.

A touch of Japan came to the gathering in the form of a very different tasting, brought to us by members Andrew and Kozue who treated us to the delights of sake and sushi.

We heard about the polishing of rice, and the amount of polishing necessary to produce the different grades of sake: Junmai, Honjozo, Ginjo and Daiginjo, all with the wide range of tastes that we associate with wine from grapes.

Something of a surprise to those present was that most sake can be served at different temperatures according to what food it may be accompanying – or even if taken as an aperitif or digestive.

With Kozue's homemade sushi to try it was a truly exceptional event - and a first for the Circle - thoroughly enjoyed by all who attended. Many thanks to Andrew & Kozue for such a great evening.

At October's meeting we tasted six wines from the Verona area of the Veneto in the north of Italy.

As whites, Rachael chose a Soave from a 6,000 hectares estate founded in 1898, followed by a Custoza and a Lugana from more recently established producers. the

reds offered were Bardolino and Valpolicella (Classico and Ripasso), which pleasantly surprised many members. All wines were accompanied by informative comments about the history of the area, the differing soil types and the various grape varieties suited to those soils. Thank you, Rachael. Clearly your time in Italy was put to very good use.

At the time of writing, the focus of November's tasting is a well-kept secret – unknown even to the secretary.

However, Matt, who worked in wine retailing, will surely repeat his success of a year ago and we are in for another well -presented evening.

At our October meeting we were delighted to see two new members who had moved to Charlbury just three weeks previously and – looking at the various clubs, societies and activities available in our town – immediately chose to join us.

Welcome Alison and Des, we are delighted to have you with us.

#### 2022 – A Bumper Year for Apples

Hopefully you will have been enjoying the garden fruit from the Cornerstone at The Corner House – available for everyone to help themselves from 10am-1pm Monday to Saturday. Several people have said they miss the talks I used to give at the fortnightly Big Apple Take-Aways pre-Covid, and I realise I've missed that too, so here goes . . .

2022 has been a bumper year for apples and pears but not so for plums but I remember these were exceptional last year when apples weren't so plentiful. This year nearly every apple tree has produced fruit - the blossom encrusting every branch last May was remarkable and the pollination rate very high.

This led to loads of tiny fruit which then had to face the trials of drought and high temperatures over the summer – so the trees simply jettisoned even more of their infant offspring during the heatwave in August so the remaining fruit could grow on to maturity. After initial fears that the timing would be totally screwed up, it seems that all varieties matured at the normal times all through from August until November.

Bramleys have been good this year but only some have grown to a decent size, there have been lots of small ones – but then these are great for storing for the birds later in the winter – the visiting redwings will go for them in February. Some apples on a few trees just didn't grow and remained miniature – so there was a basket of gorgeous bite-sized Herefordshire Russet at the Cornerstone filling the role of the tiny Golden Knob which hardly produced any fruit this year. Even in normal years, some varieties, such as Sunset and Spartan, are prone to small fruit and really benefit from thinning in June/July, but it is worth checking all apple trees in the summer and reducing each cluster to just 1 or 2 apples - cut off the smallest and any

insect damaged fruit. Also when picking fruit in the autumn, always pick the biggest fruit first and leave the others to get bigger over the following few weeks.

Bright sunshine this year flushed many apples remarkably red - possibly the sun's rays reached more of the fruit because the leaves on the trees were reduced by the heat of August. The red flush on Bramleys particularly surprised people who are used to seeing green Bramleys in supermarkets. This highlights that August is a good time for summer pruning of new vertical growth, cutting it back to two buds is like giving the tree a hair cut and allows more sunshine onto the ripening fruit.

People always ask me what's my favourite apple, I have to reply "which week?". Only eating our local apples either fresh or stored overwinter, when it comes to August I am always thrilled to taste my first fresh apple again. So in order as the season progresses, my top 30 dessert apple favourites are: Discovery, Laxton's Epicure, Worcester Pearmain, Merton Worcester, James Grieve, Ellison's Orange, Greensleeves, Egremont Russet, King of the Pippins, Cox's Pomona, Sunset, Ribston Pippin, Gascoyne's Scarlet, Herefordshire Russet, Spartan, Suntan, Kidd's Orange Red, Blenheim Orange, Orleans Reinette, Rosemary Russet, Holstein, William Crump, Crispin, Ashmead's Kernel, Tydeman's Late Orange, Canadian Reinette, D'Arcy Spice, Court Pendu Plat, Winston, Sturmer Pippin.

We are so lucky in Charlbury that people are generous and happy to share the huge range of varieties that are growing in their gardens with everyone else – thank you.

## Corner House alive and well.



The Corner House continues as a successful Charlbury asset. The ground floor hosts two popular local services for everyone: Cornerstone and the Community Bookshop.

Cornerstone is a free sharing hub. Come in any day to see what is on offer – fresh fruits and vegetables and other groceries.

The idea is that nothing should go to waste so here is the place where delicious opportunities are waiting – and they are really free! Of course, you are welcome to make a donation but that is entirely voluntary.

If you have a crop surplus to your own requirements, bring it in and make it possible for others to dip in.

Cornerstone also operates the local food bank for those Charlbury families needing a more substantial box of help. The boxes are delivered at least once a week.

All this helps make Cornerstone something of a social meeting place too.

## **Charlbury Community Workshop**

The Thomas Gifford Trust is making land and some funds available for the start up of the Charlbury Community Workshop. We are also looking for additional funding for the workshop and equipment.

The current proposal is for a workshop area of 20 foot by 16 foot, which would provide several work areas with benches and various tools.

The CCW would be opened on prearranged mornings and afternoons, where supervision would be arranged, and there would be a small fee for each session booked.

In the long term the facility needs to be self-funding e.g. from a mixture of yearly membership fees, session fees, and special fund-raising events.

The purpose of the CCW would be to provide an affordable facility for repairing, making and training in a variety of practical crafts such as woodworking, needle-craft, electrical/ electronic repairs, 3D printing, stained glass, and upholstery.

The plans for the Charlbury Community Workshop are progressing well, and our current thinking is to have, at least initially, one work space for fabric/ materials and another work space for woodworking and other crafts.



In the last edition of the Chronicle, we looked at how the Cotswold Voluntary Wardens go about keeping the countryside accessible for everyone who wants to enjoy it.

This time, we are talking about the Wardens' guided walks programme, which gives people the opportunity not only to get out into the countryside, but to do so in the company of wardens who can provide extra information about the route to enhance the experience.

The wardens who lead these walks are the public face to those who join them. Having the footpaths in 'good nick' is essential to running successful walks, and this demonstrates clearly how the wardens work together to keep our countryside accessible.

Our guided walks are not just a ramble in the countryside. They are informative, with researched information that is relevant to the walk being added in snippets as we go along.

The routes are planned with the distances accurately plotted. Notes are made about any hazards that might be encountered and what precautions we might take: sometimes we have to adapt a route if circumstances require it. Hence knowing that our work-party teams are keeping public rights-of-way in good condition is essential.

About a week before a walk takes place, the route is checked again, largely to make sure that all is well – and also to refresh the minds of the wardens who will be leading it. Anything that has overgrown the paths is also cut back, ready for the walk. In the winter, footpaths can become muddy, and occasionally impassable. We can't changethat, but we can rethink the route so that any really muddy bits can be bypassed.

If you have never walked with the wardens, why not give it a go? All the walks are online, and new ones are being added all the time. To find out more about them, go to *www.cotswoldsaonb.org.uk*, and follow the 'guided walks' link on the home page. Choose a distance you are comfortable with and you will find yourself finding hidden corners you didn't know existed.

There are always two wardens leading a walk, both of whom will have walked the route before. We all have first-aid training, and carry a first-aid kit on the walk. We like to arrive nice and early at our designated starting-point, and can easily be picked out by our hi-viz.

The wardens do not charge for leading guided walks, but ask for donations: the money raised is used for projects such as installing information boards or providing a coach to bring city children into the countryside.

There is also a series of self-guided walks on the website that have been funded by these donations.

If you pay Income Tax at the higher or additional rate and want to receive the additional tax relief due to you, you must include all your Gift Aid donations on your Self-Assessment tax return or ask HM Revenue and Customs to adjust your tax code.

#### Support with cost-of-living increases

For anyone concerned about the effect of cost-of-living increases and what support they may be able to access, there is a useful section of West Oxfordshire District Council's website: go to *www.westoxon.gov.uk* and on the Home Page you will see a blue box saying "Cost of Living Support". If you click on this you will get to a page on "Help if you're struggling with living costs". There is information on a whole range of different spending issues and ways in which you might be able to get help.

If you do not have access to the internet, you can phone WODC's Resident Support officer on 01993 861077 and tell them what you would like help with.

ATIC, the Town Council and the Cornerstone project have also produced some leaflets on the following:

- Sources of help and advice on a range of cost-of-living issues, including help if you are struggling to pay bills
- Sources of debt advice
- Eligibility for benefits check for people over pension age produced by AgeUK
- Government cost-of-living grants what they are, who will be receiving them and when - If one or more of these grants applies to you, the money will usually be paid automatically and it does not need to be paid back.

These are available at the Cornerstone project, which is based in the Corner House in Market Street opposite the "Rose and Crown" in the centre of town (open from 10.00 p.m. to 1.00 p.m. Monday to Saturday) and can be viewed on the *charlbury.info* website (go to the ATIC page in the Community section – Charity and World). There are also a lot of useful links on the Town Council website: www.charlbury-tc.gov.uk – look at Community information – Cost-ofliving support.

#### A review of ATIC activity 2020-22

Following the appearance at the beginning of 2020 of COVID19 with its effect on personal and community activity, ATIC has not had the occasion of an AGM each year to prompt the production of annual reports.

We have now remedied this by carrying out a review of our activity in the three years since then. This shows the following:

Transport help provided: 2020: 84 journeys (the lockdown effect) 2021: 152 journeys 2022 (figures to August only): 121 journeys (might reach at least 170 by December)

Ongoing shopping/gardening/visiting/ help with paperwork: 8 clients

We are so grateful to all the members of our small volunteer team for enabling us to make a contribution to Charlbury's already rich pattern of informal goodneighbourliness which goes on unseen day by day all around the town.

Don't forget – to ask for ATIC help with a trip or task call **01993 776277**. This will get you to the staff of Volunteer Link-Up who kindly act as our call centre and who will see if one of our local volunteers can meet your request. The phone line is now staffed from 9.00 a.m. to 1.00 p.m. Monday to Friday with a regularly-checked answerphone when staff are not available.

# A Day's Life: Wonder Woman and partner

Did you see Wonder Woman at the Riverside Festival this year, or perhaps at Charlbury Station waiting for a train to London? I was able to track down her alter ego Phil Grant and talk to him and his wife Debbie last week. I began by asking Phil how he turns himself into Wonder Woman

The first thing I do is have a good shave! Then I put on makeup – concealer, eye shadow, blusher and lipstick. I no longer wear mascara due to its effect on my eyes. Then I put on my costume – this comes in several layers. Debbie makes my costumes – dress, gold belt and tiara, corset and all. Do I mind wearing a corset – no. I used to be in the American military and wore a flak jacket, so it's more comfortable.

My costume is very restrained now, having evolved over the years. I used to wear a short skirt and top but found that tended to come apart too much. So now I wear a longer dress. I try to be the 'Essence' of Wonder Woman.

I become Wonder Woman to raise funds for Muscular Dystrophy – our son Christopher was diagnosed with MD in the 1990s, when he was 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> years old. There were no treatments nor cures then. So we decided to help raise funds to finance research and help the society Muscular Dystrophy UK. They organise a Town and Gown Fun Run in Oxford each year, and most runners are sponsored. In 1992 Debbie's sister made up a company team to run and for the first two years that I ran, I made £60 and £90. The next year I ran as a St Trinian and made a lot more money. People seem to be more generous if you are in costume, plus it is more fun for the spectators and me.

Over the years I have worn different costumes. One year I was an Indian Squaw, and the next year Debbie refashioned the costume and I became a Cowgirl. Wonder Woman is a comic book character, but since the TV show with Linda Carter, she has become very recognisable. Her signature move is to twirl round, shouting 'Wonder Woman', and then shoot off to tackle the latest villain. [*Ed: I watched one of my kids do that years ago, as he went to deal with his supposed 'enemy'*]. I used to swap my costumes around but I stick with Wonder Woman now.

I took a two year break from Fun Runs, and then started up again from 2010. These Town and Gown Fun Runs raise money for Muscular Dystrophy only, so everyone there, runners and spectators, are there to support the charity. I'm not actually running any more, and so I don't get sponsors—but my role, in costume, is to egg the crowd on to support the runners, make them laugh, and encourage them to give as I dive back and forth talking to people and making them smile.

For the first race after Covid, I was the starter and MC. I also support other MD events: for instance I went to help at a cake sale plus bake off type competition in Bicester that raised £1000. I have been to Cheltenham, Gloucester Docks, Birmingham, London and Cardiff among other places, helping other groups fund raise.

As well as collecting at events like the Riverside Festival, I collect at supermarkets, railway stations and on the street. There are strict rules and regulations when doing a collection; you need a licence from the council and/or permission from the property owner. You also need liability insurance which Muscular Dystrophy provides.

You are not permitted to audibly bring attention to yourself, so the costume is a way of getting people's attention, and then it is up to them to approach me and ask what I am doing.

I have collected outside several stations, including Paddington, Reading and Oxford. These have been successful and popular enough with the public, that I have been invited back by the station masters several times. Recently I stood outside Tesco in Abingdon, and raised about £300 in a five-hour stint. The Coop in Chipping Norton is a welcoming place, and I am usually invited back after a session. It can be fun at times, but there can be a lot of standing and waiting around. I have raised about £25,000 over the last 30 years, on and off, from these individual events. In two years from 2010 I managed to raise £15,000. In 2014 MD gave me an Individual Fund Raiser award. [*Ed: Muscular Dystrophy UK calls him 'their resident Superhero'*] I have come across several famous people – David Cameron, when he was prime minister, in the Chippy Co-op, and the Duke of Edinburgh at an event.

He was kind enough to speak to me for five minutes or so, and listened while I explained what I was doing. I already have several bookings for 2023, including the London Marathon.

My background? I grew up in the USA, and was in foster homes for the later part of my childhood. Like many such kids, I enlisted when I left foster care, in my case the US Air Force, and was stationed at Upper Heyford. Debbie and I met at the US Square Dancing club on the base. After we were married, we lived for a few years in South Dakota, but then came back to the UK to live. We moved to Charlbury in 1989.

#### Debbie takes up the story

Christopher, our eldest son, was born with muscular dystrophy, but the signs came on very slowly. When he was two years old or so, we realised that something was wrong, and then a year later he was given a diagnosis. There are 64 different types of MD, and Christopher had Duchenne's. By the age of 8, he was using a wheelchair. We needed to adapt things for him – for example adjustable tables. His wheelchair foot rests were uncomfortable, so I made two small 'beanbags' for it. Phil went to work in 1999 for a new firm, there were only 4 or 5 people working for them then, that were making specialist bathing and care equipment.

We needed a lot of specialised equipment for Christopher, such as height adjustable sinks and baths, and it was good to work with them. I became Chris's full time carer. He was a happy, bubbly person, who didn't complain. He managed to go to Abingdon College, and do three one-year courses. While doing a Business Studies course, he was awarded Student of the Year which is sponsored by Witney Chamber of Commerce.

He loved going to the cinema, which we did often. Both Chris and Phil loved comics and we would all often go to Comic Book Conventions, where people would dress up as their favourite characters from comics, films and TV. Chris died last year, and some of the friends we made from the conventions came to his funeral dressed as characters from Star Wars. I even got hugged by a `wookie'!



At the annual meeting in October we reflected that, for the first time since 2019, the past year was mostly 'business as usual'. We held united church services, Lent talks and Lent lunches, collected donations for Christian Aid's work helping people suffering the effects of climate change, supported the Holiday Club for junior school children and ran a stall at the Street Fair. Life in Charlbury seemed to be back to normal.

But the world has changed and we must face up to the changes, however much we dislike them. Russia's invasion of Ukraine, with all the devastation that has followed including the world shortage of food supplies and fuel, has shown us we all live in an insecure world and are vulnerable in ways we may not have expected. Floods, drought, fire and famine have shown that the climate emergency is real and we must adapt very quickly.

The problems in this country cannot compare with the suffering in Ukraine, Pakistan, Somalia and many other parts of the world but are very real for people caught up in the cost of living crisis. Churches and community organisations across the country are helping where they can, running food banks and planning warm spaces for when the weather turns cold.

In Charlbury we have Cornerstone receiving surplus food and delivering weekly boxes to people on low incomes. The Community Centre will be offering a warm space for anyone having difficulty heating their home.

Homeless people and those in inadequate accommodation have a very hard time in winter. The Porch in Oxford provides a day centre where people with no facilities of their own can come to spend their time, wash themselves and their clothes, have hot meals, join in practical activities like cooking and gardening, read newspapers and play Bingo. The demand is such that new premises have been acquired with more space so that the centre can be open longer hours and offer more services. It now includes a quiet space where rough sleepers can have a safe place to sleep during the day.

During December Churches Together is asking families and individuals in Charlbury to support the Porch through building up a 'Reverse Advent Calendar'.

The idea is that rather than receiving a treat of some kind hidden behind a door in an Advent calendar to be found each day up to Christmas, we should instead make a collection of small gifts that can be used at the Porch, to help provide meals or washing facilities for example.

There will be leaflets in churches or at Cornerstone with suggestions of the kind of things that would be useful in the day centre. The list will also be shown on *charlbury.info.* Boxes or bags with items collected can be brought to Cornerstone or any of the Charlbury churches after Christmas for delivery to the Porch in January.

For Christians, Advent is a time of preparation, looking forward to celebrating the birth of Christ with the promise of a new spirit of love, joy and peace. For everyone, Advent can be a time of hope for a kinder way of life, sharing our resources and showing respect for our fellow human beings and all living things.

#### **Charlbury Market**

The Town Council's Food Team helped local chef Chloe Horner to organise the new Charlbury Market. It ran for five weeks in September/October 2022 as a trial and is now taking a break. Charlbury Market is a local food market on Saturday mornings, with a small collection of stalls selling locally-grown and locally-prepared food. Feedback from stallholders and those attending has been very positive, including: supporting local businesses; enabling people to buy a range of locally-produced good quality food in one place; bringing more footfall to the town centre; creating a friendly, social and accessible event. The group has been gathering more feedback and will be meeting with other community organisations to scope out potential restart of the market in Spring 2023.



#### Local buses: use 'em or lose 'em?

The Government has requested that all local authorities work with their bus operators to ensure financially sustainable services going forward, with operators required to identify all services as either commercial, marginal or noncommercial. Following this exercise, both bus routes S3 and X9 serving Charlbury were declared as non-commercial by their operators. This puts the future of our buses in jeopardy. The County Council has identified funding for the services in order to give them time to return to self-sufficiency over the next two years. Therefore, contracts have been awarded for continuation of these services at their current level until August 2024.

The County Council does not have a budget for ongoing support of noncommercial services, and continuation of these routes beyond August 2024 cannot be guaranteed if patronage has not increased to a sustainable level. It's a question of use them or lose them.

The Town Council is looking at ways of promoting bus services locally to give them the best possible chance of survival. We are looking to see if 'realtime information' displays are possible at bus stops and we will engage with other communities on the bus routes. Let us know if you have ideas for how to encourage people to use buses more regularly.

#### Bell Hotel

The Town Council secured Asset of Community Value status for The Bell earlier this year. Unexpectedly, in August we were told that owners Greene King planned to sell the Bell. Under the powers, an Asset can have a sale delayed to give the community a right to bid, as has been seen with around 10 pubs across Oxfordshire. A public meeting was held in September by the Town Council to discuss this. After the meeting, we were told that a business running several local pubs was negotiating to buy The Bell, which has not been put on the open market. At the time of going to press, though, the situation regarding The Bell was less than clear, so the Town Council

will establish the current situation and protect this vital community asset.

#### Traffic

A Town Council online survey on extending **20mph speed limit** throughout the town was held in September/October 2022. Of 169 responses were received, 77.5% were in favour of the extended 20mph speed limit, and 22.5% against it. As a result of our survey, the County Council will shortly formally consult the town on details of the scheme.

Safety on The Slade is a concern, especially around the entrance to Crawborough and the Primary School. With potential financial support from the County Council and at a cost estimated at £15,000 from Town Council funds, we put out another online survey in November 2022 asking residents if they would support the replacement of the current pedestrian refuge at the top of Crawborough with a zebra crossing. At the time of going to press, respondents were firmly in favour of a zebra crossing here and if the final results are in favour, the County Council will consult the town formally on this proposal.

Work to make the **Enstone Road crossroads** slightly safer for pedestrians by reducing the road width (and thereby traffic speeds), and to improve sight lines for traffic leaving the Slade, are now complete. The Town Council has also approved funding for a **build-out on Banbury Hill** which would require drivers who are entering the town to give way to traffic leaving. This is an effective way of slowing cars as they enter town.

Much more work is needed around the town to make the roads and footways safer for cyclists, pedestrians and users of mobility scooters. The County Council's process for making this happen involves towns and villages creating their own Local Walking and Cycling Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP).

Because of the Town Council's proactivity in seeking safer walking and cycling

measures for the town, we are lucky enough to have a County Council officer whose specific role this autumn is to help us to develop an LCWIP for Charlbury, and residents will be engaged during its creation.

#### **Charlbury Children's Bike Rally**

This year, the Town Council's Journeys Team took on the running of the Children's Bike Rally (12th September 2022). As well as the traditional short route touring the town's five places of worship, we added a ten-mile loop to give some of the older children a bit more of a challenge.

The route wiggled up past the school and through Ticknell Piece to Ditchley Road, then wound through the wonderful grounds of Ditchley Park before coming back down Ditchley Road into town. This longer route was made possible by Ditchley leaving the front and back gates open for us, and moving the cattle from part of the route to keep us all safe. Over 65 children and 40-odd accompanying adults did the ride, and we raised hundreds of pounds.

The proceeds were shared between the Charlbury School Association and Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust. More importantly perhaps, it gave children and parents a chance to enjoy riding around some of the lovely countryside that surrounds us without fear of cars tearing past at speed.

The Journeys team wishes to thank Ditchley for letting us cycle around the estate, and the many church volunteers who acted as marshals along the short and medium routes in the town – and above to thank the rally's founder Basil Eastwood, without whom the rally would not exist at all.

The rally was followed by a picnic and Bike Gymkhana on Wychwood Paddocks (the school playing field), while riders had their bikes fixed and tweaked for free by the Windrush Bike Project 'bike doctors'! For the grown-ups, there was a selection of e-bikes to try out.

#### Car club survey

Over 160 people took part in the Town Council's car club survey earlier this year. A car club would allow people from in and around Charlbury to book a shared car by the hour or day. We wanted to find out how many people would be interested in using a car club, what types of vehicle they would use and when they would want them. There were high levels of enthusiasm, with 140 people saying they were definitely or maybe interested. For context, car club cars typically need around 40 users to be viable.

The distribution of desired usage was also helpful, with 24% of people wanting to use the cars during weekdays (biggest demand is usually evenings and weekends). Over 70% of people would be happy to use a car within a 10-minute walk from their home. More than 120 people said that if a car club car could work, they would either avoid buying a second car or be able to sell their own car. That's a staggering 300 tons of CO<sub>2</sub> saved, or around 2,400 flights to Rome per year. We are currently looking at options for making a car club a reality in Charlbury.

#### Low-carbon homes

The Town Council's Buildings Group wants to look at ways to help community buildings and individual householders to install retrofit and low-energy alternatives by looking at the following areas:

- Producing whole-house retrofit plans for 10 different house types in Charlbury – this means an assessment of a home's current emissions and modelling to show how retrofitting could improve its energy usage – and we have just secured funding for this work.
- Raising awareness by engaging the planning system so there would be no unwanted barriers if people do choose to retrofit.

encouraging local trades to train in the relevant skills.

 Understanding and communicating what financial help is available to help with retrofit for homes.

#### Fallen leaves, snow and ice

At this time of year, fallen leaves can become slippery and cause a hazard, particularly to elderly and frail people. If you are able to clear leaves from pavements near your home that would be appreciated. As winter approaches, ice and snow may also be a possible hazard. If this happens please try to clear your own "patch" and look out for vulnerable neighbours - thank you.

#### **Permissive paths**

Permissive paths through Nine Acres Recreation Ground will be closed all day on Thursday 5th January 2023 in accordance with recommended practice to ensure that the access retains its permissive status.

Similar closures of permissive paths through Wigwell will occur on the same day by order of the Wychwood Forest Trust. Residents with gates opening onto to Oxpens Allotments, Nine Acres Recreation Ground and Wigwell are also reminded that these do not constitute a Right of Way.

The permissive path between Hundley Way and Banbury Hill Farm (and the Old Shed) will be closed on Sunday 8th January 2023.

The work at the Enstone crossroads has at last been completed, and the Town Council has consulted with residents about extending the 20mph speed limit across the remainder of the town. I am pleased to say that this will be going ahead shortly.

OCC is also supporting walking and cycling in Charlbury, where we will be piloting a Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP) for smaller communities. Some of the larger market towns, such as Witney, are already working on such a plan but towns the size of Charlbury offer some different challenges when devising these schemes, and I am very pleased that we will be piloting this approach in the town.

Recently the County Council has completed consultation on traffic filters in Oxford, designed to reduce the number of cars in the City and speed up bus travel. This is very important as we are investing in a fleet of electric buses, having won a bid from the (previous) government, and having committed to speeding up bus travel as part of that bid.

A YouGov poll conducted by Oxfordshire Liveable Streets showed that 60% of people polled approved of this measure. We have also introduced a new parking policy that will significantly reduce the number of cars on new developments in and around the City, and also approved new requirements for transport planning based on the principle of 'decide and provide' rather than 'predict and provide' which will help the county move towards our goal of net zero transport by 2040.

The County Council is currently working on the budget for 2022/23. The County Council's revenue budget, which pays for adult social care, highways maintenance and children's services, is already stretched thanks to increased demand, and we have had to find savings of £30 million, but we have also had to find a further £15 million in savings to deal with inflation. While this is a challenge, we are looking at new ways of managing our services, providing early intervention and focusing on prevention when it comes to health. To this end we are working more closely with our health partners, through the newly established Integrated Care System that will bring together health and social care services across Oxfordshire, Buckinghamshire and Berkshire.

2022 has been a very challenging year – we have emerged from the Covid pandemic into a cost of living crisis, which has affected many people in our town. The Cornerstone and Community Centre continue to offer support to residents, and the County Council has made a fund of  $\pounds 2$  million available to support local communities, keeping our libraries open and offering grants to community buildings to stay open as warm spaces.

We are also working with the District and City councils to support people who are struggling with their council tax, and have joined with the Oxfordshire Community Foundation to establish a cost of living grant fund.

I would like to wish everyone a very happy Christmas, and the hope that 2023 will prove to be a much easier year for us all.

It has been a very eventful year in 2022. As one of your local councillors on the district council I have been busy supporting the Charlbury Bowls Club application for funding which I am pleased they were successful, supporting the preservation of the Area of Natural Landscape as a recently appointed member of the board, and becoming the leader of the West Oxfordshire District Council as part of the West Oxfordshire Alliance-a cooperative and collaborative partnership of 15 Liberal Democrats, 9 Labour and two Green councillors.

Homes that are environmentally quality assured with more custom built homes where infrastructure has been planned and provided before building and transport has been factored in to ensure safety and active travel is integrated.

Expressions of interest in the rural grant support have started with the announcement of a grant scheme soon to be announced in the New Year.

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
